State Health Officials Schedule Discussion Of Polio Vaccinations

Educators and health officials from all over the State were to meet Monday (March 7) in Baltimore to discuss the proposed poliomyelitis vaccination project in Maryland schools this spring, it was announced today by Dr. Thomas G. Pullen, State Superintendent of Schools, and Dr. Robert H. Riley, Director of the State Public Health Department. The meeting will be held at 10 a.m. in the Lord Baltimore Hotel.

Approximately 60 representatives of county and city departments of education, including public, private and parochial schools, and health officials will make plans for the inoculations of first and second grade school children if the results of last year's field trial are successful and if the vaccine is licensed by the National Institute of Health.

Provided that the vaccine is released, it will be available to approximately 150,000 children in Maryland.¹ The inoculations will be entirely voluntary and parents will be asked to sign a formal request before their child is vaccinatd by the physician.

"Although the results of the evaluation study will not be known until April, plans must be made now so that if the vaccine is proved effective we can start vaccinating at once in order that the inoculations be completed before the polio season begins," said Dr. Edward Davens, Chief of the Bureau of Preventive Medicine, State Health Departmnt.

"It is important that each child who starts the polio vaccination series gets all three injections," Dr. Davens said. There is to be approximately a two week interval between the first and second inoculations and a lapse of 3 to 4 weeks between the second and third.

"If the vaccine is released, time will be extremely limited, because of the intervals in giving the three injections, the closing of schools, and the necessity in having the entire series completed before the beginning of the polio season in Maryland," he said. The onset of the polio season in Maryland is generally about the first of July, he explained.

"The main reason for the selection of first and second grade children for the inoculations is because of the high occurrence of paralytic poliomyelitis in this age group," Dr. Davens said.

There will be no charge for the vaccination of school children, Dr. Davens said. The vaccine will be supplied to the State Health Department without charge by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The NFIP has taken a calculated financial risk by contracting to purchase a supply of vaccine to keep production going during the period before the results will be known. This is to insure that vaccine would be on hand immediately after licensing.

The Red Cross opened its annual drive in Greenbelt, March 1, and hopes to meet its goal of \$1000 by March 31. According to Henry Brautigam, chairman of the Lions Club-sponsored local drive, volunteers to solicit contributions have already been assigned in most courts. However, anyone wishing to volunteer for such services should contact him at the local bank or call 4416. Every housewife is urged to become a Red Cross member by making a contribution in addition to that by her husband at his place of business, Brautigam declared.

9 GVHC Candidates Speak At GCS Forum

Tuesday, March 8, the Greenbelt Citizens' Association sponsored an open forum giving candidates for the Greenbelt Veterans Housing Corporation an opportunity to express their aims, if elected. The meeting was attended by nine of the fourteen candidates, and eleven members of the GCA.

The candidates spoke briefly and pledged to bring to the board the benefit of their training and experience, with a view toward improving present conditions as concern GVHC management, the board of directors and the membership. Ed Burgoon, acting president of the Board and candidate for reelection, reiterated that membership participation is so poor that a monthly newsletter must be issued in order to keep the membership informed of activities, and urge them to take part in these affairs. After the candidates expressed their views, a general discussion followed on problems of current interest such as landscaping, maintenance, private construction of fences, shacks, garages, the parking problem and its transfer to the city government, and other issues affecting mutual home-ownership. It was brought out that some members are apathetic about participation in the corporation's affairs, while others go all out for better understanding and relationship between the membership and GVHC. It becomes the duty of the board and management to make decisions that benefit and please the majority of the members. Parking Plan In Courts Proposed; Permits Only; Cost Dollar A Year

A new parking plan for Greenbelt inner courts was proposed by city manager Charles McDonald which will alleviate the shortage of parking space. The plan calls for city permits to be issued to residents of each court at a cost of \$1 a year and a space will be assigned to the resident. Spaces will be marked off, and additional unrequested spaces will be set aside for visitors.

Ambulance Club Drive Passes Half-Way Point

As the Greenbelt Rescue Squad's annual fund drive passed the half way point this week, volunteer workers from every court were canvassing local residents for a \$2 membership fee in the Squad's Ambulance Club. This fee will entitle members to Club services—immediate first aid, ambulance service, or other emergency treatment for accident or illness—during the year.

Squad President Marshall Zoellner reports that the drive is "off to a good start" with many areas still to be canvassed. He emphasized that fees collected during this drive are the sole source of funds for service to local residents.

Since the Rescue Squad is a completely volunteer organization, members receive no compensation for their service. All funds collected during the annual drive are used for upkeep of the Squad's two ambulances and other emergency equipment.

During the drive one or more key workers from every court are contacting all residents of their area. Since only these workers receive membership cards for canvassing purposes one for each family in their court—residents can be assured that all canvassers are authorized to collect funds for the Squad, President Zoellner reports.

Chairmen for the membership drive are Joe D'Agostino and Elizabeth Iseli. Any resident who is not contacted by next Tuesday, the closing day of the drive, may call Mr. D'Agostino at GR 4-9419 or Mrs. Iseli at GR 4-9205 to have a worker call for his Ambulance Club fee. Since no funds are being collected by the Police Department this year, residents are requested not to call the Department for this purpose.

Lights Go On Again As Baseball Begins

Lights in the ball park will be refurnished for the coming baseball season, it was decided at the McDonald disclosed that numerous complaints of citizens regarding the shortage of parking space near dwellings has prompted the parking proposal. Also, some courts have residents with two or more cars in the family, increasing the space shortage. All residents approproached by McDonald so far, regarding this plan, have expressed approval, informally, M c D o n a l d stated.

"Permit Only"

Signs will be placed at the entrances to each court stating "parking by permit only" so that motorists can be informed. Guests of residents can use their hosts' parking space, but the host will not bepermitted to use a neighbor's space. It is assumed he will park on the street.

The plan was approved for first reading by the city council and will be discussed further at the next meeting. It is expected that resident reaction to the plan will beexpressed to the council members: by that time. The ordinance provides for a fine for motorists using space without a permit. Mc-Donald disclosed that the courts arecity property and regulated by municipal ordinances.

City To Spend \$3,000 On Street Curbing

Greenbelt streets will soon be-"curbed," it was disclosed at the city council meeting last Monday night. City Manager Charles Mc-Donald asked approval of the council to spend city funds for a project to put rolled macadam curbing along the streets. The practice of motorists parking on the edges of the grass has caused continued expenditures of funds to repair the damage, McDonald explained. Hefelt it would be more economical to place curbs along the streetedges to prevent this damage.

A suggestion by Councilman Ben Goldfaden to have the work done by contract will be considered by McDonald. However, McDonald stated, the work would probably be more costly by contract; it would require lengthy specifications and drawings, and the work of qualified engineers, he added. McDonald expects to hire additional help to install the curbs so that the normal spring work program will not be delayed. The work was estimated by McDonald to cost about \$3000 and will take three months to accomplish.

Additional amounts of vaccine will also be available to private physicians.

"There is a great deal of preliminary planning to be done and educators and health officials will have to work out the details for this proposed mass inoculation program very carefully," Dr. Davens said.

"The support and cooperation of all supervisors, teachers, principals and others in the schools will be of utmost importance in carrying out this important preventive health activity," he said.

Everyone must bring a permission slip and register for bus transportation by Wednesday, March 16. The bus will leave from the Greenbelt Post Office at 7 'p.m. city council meeting last Monday night. After a plea by Councilman Ben Goldfaden to add greater illumination in the ball field area, the council voted \$1000 to replace and repair faulty light fixtures.

'Some of the outfielders couldn't see the ball until it was on top of them," Goldfaden declared.

The lights were originally erected 15 years ago, and the reflectors have rusted and deteriorated, city manager Charles McDonald disclosed.

The lights are expected to be in good order in time for the opening game of a new softball league which is being organized. The teams will represent various organizations in the Washington metropolitan area and will include a Greenbelt team. The city will provide bats and balls for the team, but not uniforms, which are expected to come from local business organizations.

The softball games at night were called "the best summer entertainment in Greenbelt" by spectator James Corneal, who approved the council appropriation.






All persons interested in membership in this organization which is dedicated to soil conservation and the propagation of wild life, should attend this meeting.
