Council, Gilbert Discuss Zoning; Public Hearing Slated Tuesday

At its special zoning meeting last Monday night Greenbelt city council recommended approval of commercial zoning for portions of two parcels of land owned by Gilbert Realty, Inc. and set up a public hearing next Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the city office on the petition for commercial zoning of a tract fronting on Crescent road. The tract is parcel 2 on the accompanying map, running about 100 feet on Crescent from the fillingstation underpass to the apartment building at the southwest corner of

Local Artist Show Art Work On TV

Athletic Club Wins Over Oxon Hill7-3

The Athletic Club ball team won over Oxon Hill, 7-3, last week.

Oxon Hill began to threaten early with successive hits but was soon halted by a neatly executed double play, from Stevenson to Deneven to Hospan. In the bottom half of the first inning, the Athletic Club capitalized on two errors to score 4 runs. From this point on it was a pitching duel between Bills of Oxon Hill and Bierwagen of Greenbelt.

Bills allowed only 7 hits and Bierwagen gave up 9 hits. However, in the tight spots it was Bierwagen who proved to be the master as he recorded 13 strikeouts.

The rest of the scoring came in the eighth inning when Oxon Hill pushed across 3 runs to come within striking distance of spoiling Greenbelt's unbeaten record. But was soon foiled by the young hustling Greenbelters who also scored 3 times in the bottom of the eighth inning.

The Greenbelt-Fort McNair game was postponed because of wet grounds. The Athletic Club plays Oxon Hill at Greenbelt on Saturday and Chevy Chase at Rock Creek Becreation Dismond on Parkway and Crescent. President Alfred A. Gilbert, who attended the meeting with his attorney, Abraham Chasanow, stated his intention of building a store on 20,000 square feet of the 36.000-squarefoot parcel, facing Crescent with parking in the rear.

Opposition


The council decided to give Greenbelters an opportunity to be heard after hearing from Arthur Goldstein and Sidney Feldman, residents of the 56 court of Crescent, which is directly across from a driveway which Gilbert proposed to place on the northern boundary of parcel 2, connecting Crescent with the parking lot and giving access to the proposed store. They opposed stores so close to their homes on grounds of the traffic hazard to their children.

In other action the council voted to recommend C-1 (light-commercial) zoning for the existing buildings in parcel 7 and 20,000 square feet additional, probably adjacent to the variety store and the bank, the balance of the parcel to be set aside for parking. It also recommended C-1 zoning for a tract of 10,000 square feet including the present North End store, the balance of the parcel on which the store is located, which the Federal government sold to Gilbert as commercial property, to be zoned R-18 for multiple housing.

Three-One Ratio

Adequate parking for the enlarged commercial center was considered a serious problem. City manager Charles McDonald proposed a standard of three square feet of parking space for each square foot of first-floor space. Gilbert proposed to convert to parking the entire rear of parcel 2 as well as all but 8000 square feet of parcel 1. (The 8000 square feet, fronting Parkway, would be zoned R-18 for apartments in order not to destroy the character of Parkway as a residential street. These lots would be contiguous with the cityowned area between parcels 1 and 2 with access to Parkway, which is already slated to be paved at the expense of Greenbelt Consumer Services as an extension of the municipal parking lot; thus creating one large lot.

The councilmen also considered the proposed drive in parcel 2 possibly too close to the intersection of Parkway and Crescent for traffic safety. As an alternative access they discussed the possibility of widening the present entrance


