VOLUNTEER NOTES

On the second Tuesday of every month a little band of women gathers in Fireman's Hall to talk over and discuss problems c to their hearts and problems which should be shouldered by every citizen of Greenbelt. These women, many of them mothers and/or wives of the men who make up the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad, are the members of the very active Ladies Auxiliary. Because they have the interest of the community at heart, because they want to stand shoulder to shoulder with their men who give so freely of their time, and because they want the men to know that they approve of and are behind their work, these women endeavor in their own way to help. Some of the women who make up the membership of the Auxiliary have no member of their family on the male squad but are members because of their interest in the community and what is good and should be done for the community with respect to the work carried out by the men.

You've seen the women holding a "bake sale' at the center; manning the booths at the annual carnival and serving refreshments at the 4th of July celebration and at the monthly dances. These are the women of the GFDRS Auxiliary; these are the women who care whether or not Greenbelt has adequate fire protection and better than adequate ambulance coverage and who never complain when one blast of the siren interrupts their meal so that the husband can go to the aid of perhaps an unknown neighbor in Greenbelt, or when three blasts take the husband away to fight a brush fire caused by some careless citizen, maybe for several hours and even late into the night. These ladies might well be called "the unsung heroines of-Greenbelt." Are you interested in seeing a new fire house with newer and later model equipment? Are you content to put up with the present small fire house, for which the Department pays an exorbitant rent? Should Greenbelt be content with the same ancient pieces of apparatus? The Ladies of the Auxiliary are not.

Fix Your Lawn

Now is the time to be getting your lawn fixed up. The middle of August to the middle of September is the best time to do lawn work in most of Maryland. Bare spots should be raked up, limed, fertilized and then reseeded. Reseed with Kentucky bluegrass or one of the desired grasses.

Fertilize with 10 to 20 pounds of 10-10-10 fertilizer per 1000 square feet. Use lime as needed. Fertilizing at this time of the year does not favor crabgrass and other weeds as much as spring fertilization. Also, fertilization at this time of the year does not mean that the lawn has to be mowed a good many more times, as does spring fertilization. This, of course, is also the ideal time for establishing a new lawn. It will also be a good time to use 2,4-D on some of the broadleaved weeds that start their growth in the fall.

QUALIFIED?

In order to be able to vote in the city council elections in September, you must be a registered voter. To qualify to register, you must be a resident of Greenbelt for the past six months prior to the election, and a resident of Maryland for a year, according to Winfield McCamy, city clerk.

Greenbelt Profiles

Perhaps several of you who are engineering graduates have at one; time received an illustrated brochure describing opportunities offered at Johns Hopkins Applied Physics Laboratory in Silver Spring. This magazine was produced under the direction of BEV-ERLY FONDA, 6-A Ridge, Art Director for a team of eight illustrators employed by the Silver Spring office. With over 25 years' experience in the field of art, Bev has covered almost every phase possible concerning illustration.

A Depression high school graduate of 1929, Bev found that financial reverses prohibited his going to Purdue University where he had enrolled. He therefore made the most of his home-taught typing ability, taking a job with a bill. collection agency. While typing bills by the thousands, he seized an opportunity which arose for him to exhibit his artistic talents, putting his very best into the project with gratifying results in the ensuing days. After having drawn a floor plan for his supervisor, he was transferred to the engineering department in the status of electrical draftsman. It was here that Bev got his start on the path to Art Director.

When World War II came, Bev joined the Seabees and was given the rating of Electricians Mate. The Fonda artistic ability, however, subdued by new environments, soon burst forth; Bev was hence transferred to the drafting section, where he got his experience in technical illustrating When the war was over and the merchandise market went up, Bev went into advertising and did freelance work. He then had several stints with department stores and did patent drafting for a while. For the past six years he has been with Johns Hopkins. Thoroughly, enjoying his work, he hopes to be with them for a few more years.

Fonda's fondness for our rock n' generation is exemplified by his active participation in the development and reorganization of the Drop Inn. Forced to abandon the old surplus housing structure and move to the Center School until the erection of a municipal center. the Advisory Committee has been faced, until recently, with the problem of decreased attendance. Bev theorizes that the removal of the former Drop Inn establishment which the teenagers of the period had grown to love and associate synonymously with themselves, created the temporary decline in attendance. With the completion of the new municipal building, undetermined at this time, Bev is encouraged to see increasing numbers frequenting the Center school hang-out during the past six months.

In his spare (?) time, he ambitiously tackles such projects as the remodeling of the Fonda kitchen (a job that would put a good carpenter to shame). With its built-in stainless steel oven and plate-type burners against stainless-steel tile, pink cabinets, and white accessories, you can readily see that even here his ingenuity shines. Another fascinating device is a built-in electrical wall clock, its hidden mechanism accessible by a trap door on the other side of the wall!

An active participant in many other community projects and civic organizations, Bev is a member of the Community Church; the Masonic Lodge of Laurel; The Toastmasters Club; The Art Directors Guild of Washington, and the American Institute of Graphics.

And here, Greenbelters, is another person who helps to make your community what it is—a community whose people may not be rich in worldly goods but whose wealth lies within its people.
