Greenbelt Faces 1959

This is the traditional time of the year for taking stock w what progress has been made during the previous year and for considering what lies ahead in the next 12 months. The big question that we always ask ourselves is, "Are the prospects for a growing, developing Greenbelt any better for next year than they were the previous year?"

Burned by previous optimistic estimates, Greenbetters have learned to mix their enthusiasim over future possibilities with a certain amount of skepticism. Nevertheless, the answer for 1959 can only be an affirmative one. Several factors have combined to convince us that by the end of the coming year the beginning of a new Greenbelt will be well underway.

One factor is that the old Green Valley development, planned as the first major housing development on the city's vacant resideatial land, was taken over by a new builder, who gave it the new name of Lakewood and proceeded to sell and build homes as planned. These new homes should be occupied by the early spring, with the probability that this will be followed by the opening of a second section. In addition, two modern apartment houses, totaling some 6 units, will soon be under construction near the shopping center. These new apartments, to be completely air conditioned, will help to label Greenbelt as a modern and progressive community.

This is as it should be since Greenbelt is destined to be intimately associated with the space age. As is well known, the new National Aeronautics and Space Administration has decided to build its main space research center across the Washington-Baltimore Parkway from the entrance to the city. The research labor atory supposed to be up by next summer, will be staffed by high caliber personnel, a number of whom may choose to reside with us.

By that time we expect that the city will be adding to its basic attractions with the construction of our long-planned municipal buildings. The major requirement, the sale of the present community building used as the Center School, has been met. The price of \$265,000 offered by the county school board and accepted by the city, means that the cost of the three new buildings to the community will not be exorbitant. Sometime during the next six months the city council will hold a referendum in which the citizens of Greenbelt will be asked to support bonds in order that the city can borrow the additional \$100,000 or so needed to build the three units.

It is true that the citizens, already faced by a high tax rate to pay for Greenbelt's special services may balk at any increase in our financial burden. In that case, the city may have to decide either to build only the youth center and the fire department and rescue squad buildings and let the city office building go for a while or build all three units on a more limited scale. It is our belief, however, that the other hopeful signs for Greenbelt's future-with a larger number of residents to spread the financial burden--will persuade the voters to support the bond issue.

Finally, like icing on the cake, the new dual lane Greenbelt Road which will tie in with the section of the new Circumferential Expressway that will connect the Parkway (at Greenbelt) with the Annapolis Expressway, will make it a pleasure to drive to and from Greenbelt in all directions. Construction on both these highway projects will begin next year. Nor should we forget that work has just started on the new high school down Glenn Dale Road, which will eliminate the present long journey to High Point High for our youngsters.

When all this is added up, it is difficult not to become enthused about 1959. However, no one can appreciate it more than those of us who have waited so long and had faith in the basic qualities and promise of our community.


