Council Approves \$8000 Partial Pay To Architects For Building Plans

The city council approved a payment of \$8000 to the architectural firm of Satterlee and Smith for services rendered thus far, at a special meeting last Monday night. The partial fee payment will permit the architects to proceed with final plans for the Youth Center Building; final plans for the Fire Department Building have been finished. Estimated cost of the Youth building is \$142,000 plus about \$11,000 for the architect. Estimated cost of the Fire house is \$109,000 plus about \$9000 architect fee. An additional sum of \$35,000 is expected to be incurred in access roads and site improvement.

Ten Pin Lanes Offers Free Bowling Lessons

A three-week series of bowling classes, free to the public, has been announced by Donn Liston, owner of the Greenbelt Ten Pin Lanes. Starting July 30, the classes will run for three consecutive Thursday evenings. Each evening's instructional program will consist of three separate class hours-instruction for juniors from 7 to 8, for adults from 8 to 9, and a clinic from 9 to 10. During the clinic hour students will bowl under the direct supervision of the instructor. Although the classes will be offered free, Liston has asked that those interested register early since only a limited number can be accommodated.

Charles ("Robbie") Robinson of Alexandria, Va., has been secured to teach these special classes. A Certified Bowling Instructor and Junior Bowling Instructor for the state of Va., Robinson has attracted considerable attention throughout the D. C. area for his bowling prowess. Virginia State Singles the first person in this area to be Champion for 1959, Robinson was come a member of the 700 Club by actually rolling a 700 score. He was club singles champion during the 1958-59 season. A year ago he rolled a 300 game while giving bowling instruction. Well known throughout the area, Robinson has also given bowling instruction at Md., at Alexandria and

at the Shirley shopping center in Va.

"Although we can't promise to make a 300 bowler out of every student in our classes," Liston stated, "we do hope to give a good many people a first-rate start on bowling for fun." Similar classes given last year, he pointed out, drew both the youthful and adult members of several Greenbelt families, many of whom have continued to bowl as family groups throughout the past year.

Police News Review

Greenbelt Chief of Police Jim Williams is now accepting applications for the additional full-time police officer that was authorized by the city council at its last meeting. The new man, who will bring the total full-time city force to a

Next Monday the council will consider the subject of a city-wide referendum on the question of issuing a municipal bond issue for the probable sum of \$200,000, which will pay for an additional building (the city administration offices) and help pay for the two proposed buildings. The council is also expected to direct Mayor Tom Cannnig to sign the necessary papers transferring title of the Center School Elementary School to the Prince Georges County Board of Education for the sum of \$260,000. This sum will not be sufficient to pay for the Youth Center and Fire Department.

Meeting with the city council last Monday was the Youth Center Advisory Board who approved the preliminary plans for the Youth building.

Although the city had originally planned to borrow the architect's fee from the Housing and Home Finance Agency under a federal program to improve municipal facilities city manager Charles Mc-Donald disclosed that the fees will be paid directly from city funds. The money would have been paid back to the government anyway, after the buildings were constructed.

City Charter Report Received By Council By Virginia Beauchamp

The final report from the special committee appointed last October to review the Greenbelt city charter will probably be dismissed by the city council at its regularly scheduled meeting on Monday, August 10, according to Mayor Tom Canning. Adopted unanimously by the committee at a final meeting last Thursday night, the final draft consisting of nine typewritten pages has been submitted to the council. The nature of its specific proposals has not been revealed. The first review of the charter since 1949, this report may mark the first opportunity by the citizens of Greenbelt to consider and to take full responsibility for the form of their government since the federal government, on December 31, 1952, turned over its ownership of Greenbelt to the residents of the community. The original managercouncil form of administration, which Greenbelt continues to use, was selected by officials of the Farm Credit Administration, the
