Police News

A call was received on Thursday evening from a resident of 3 court, Laurel Hill, to request that the police examine a small snake which he had captured and shut into a jar. The officer who was sent was bitten on the finger by the eight-inch snake, apparently about six weeks old, which resulted in his experiencing a numbing sensation in his arm for about three hours.

The snake was taken to the Beltsville Research Center, where it was identified as a baby copperhead. Copperheads come in litters of from six to eight, and the parents would still be in the vicinity of 6-week-old offspring.

The snake was found in a pile of logs near a boiler room in the wooded square bounded by Hillside and Ridge and Laurel Hill and Research, directly opposite the North End School.

Parents are urged to keep their children away from this area until it can be cleaned out. Copperheads are poisonous from birth, and their venom can make a child ill or even prove to be

Two little girls emerged from the wooded area near the armory and told police that they were lost. The youngsters, girl scouts from Camp Conestoga on Good Luck Road, had been sent to look for two other Scouts who were missing. By the time police brought the girls back to the camp, the original lost girls had returned and the leaders were now scouring the woods for the second pair.

Due to a recent increase in pilferage and mischievous pranks, youths who wish to sleep out of doors away from home will not have police sanction unless they are accompanied by a responsible adult during the entire time.

On Wednesday morning, fourteen-year-old Skip Bingham, a member of the swim team, was the first to arrive at the pool for practice. Skip noticed that one of the doors was open, and that the section of the counter where tickets are sold had been torn away. John McElderry, the team coach, called the police. They discovered that a cash box containing \$50 and three rolls of tickets had been stolen during the night. The empty canvas bank sack was later found at the creek near St. Hugh's, along with some torn ticket stubs which had also been in the still-missing cash box.

Thieves broke into a home on Northway, said police, who found that the house had been ransacked and personal items valued at \$75 removed. The residents of the house had gone away on vacation and neglected to notify police, so that a house check might be made while they were away.

Two boys have been charged with stealing doughnuts, which had been left outside the door of a local business establishment early Wednesday morning. They will face a juvenile hearing in Hyattsville.

A fourteen-year-old girl was caught setting a fire Centerway underpass on Thursday evening. The girl was released in the custody of her parents, with a report going to the County Fire Marshall for possible action.

Because of the hazards they can create, children found riding bicycles on the sidewalks in the Center will have their bikes taken away from them for a period of

Drowning Child, 2, Rescued by Slepitza

Little Douglas Dwyer, 2 1/2, of Orange, Connecticut, is alive today because of the quick action taken by his uncle, Alec Slepitza, 55-G Ridge. Slepitza discovered the child, face down under 15 feet of water in a pool near the Dwyers' home, and im-mediately attempted to revive him, using the method of mouthto-mouth resuscitation. The boy began breathing normally after 15 minutes of this treatment He was then taken to the hospital, where he remained under observation for possible pneumonia for three days. Douglas is now back home, suffering no

ill effects from his experience.
According to Dr. Louis Levy and Dr. Leonard Rapaport, neighbors of the Dwyers, mouth-tomouth breathing had saved the child's life. Only six months ago, Slepitza completed a life-

Douglas' father, Richard Dwyer, said the family had noticed the youngstee noticed the youngster was missing and had organized a search. He estimated that Douglas could not have been in the water for more than four minutes before his recue by Slepitza, who, with his family, was spending the day with the Dwyers.

P.G. Library Use Rises; Ours Drops

Library circulation has dropped in Greenbelt from 42,276 in 1959-60 to 40,613 in 1960-61, a reversal of a county-wide trend. County Library Director Elizabeth B. Hage announced that the Prince Georges County Memorial Library has just completed the busiest year since its founding in 1946. A total circulation of 711,979 included 683,533 books and 28,446 non-book materials an increase of six per cent over the previous year.

Library use has grown steadily each year, as the county population has continued to increase. Circulation per capita is now estimated at 1.99.

Additional candidates, including incumbents, desiring to become candidates in the September 19 election for the five-man council must file petitions containing at least 43 and not more than 71 names of qualified reg-istered voters at the city clerk's office (together with a \$3 filing fee). The deadline for filing is August 21.

A voter may sign only one nominating petition, even though he may vote for five candidates. Petition forms may be obtained from the city clerk's office, or a candidate may use his own form. Mrs. McCamy will check the petition for valid signatures and disqualify a voter's signature on the second and all subsequent petitions she receives on which it appears. Married women are asked to sign petitions as Mary Doe, not Mrs. John Doe.

books and related materials has grown to 150,309 (of which the Greenbelt collection numbers 10,180), an increase of 17 per cent over last year's figure of 128,522.
