An Election Platform

(Editor's Note: For the convenience of our readers, we are repeating the list of specific proposals for an election platform for city council aspirants which the NEWS REVIEW presented for the first time last week. Each candidate has been requested to comment on these proposals. Their answers will appear next week.)

City Services

1. Continued execution of a vigorous landscaping and conservation program aimed at restoring Greenbelt's ballfields, playgrounds, and green areas, with special emphasis on the employment of such additional public works personnel as is needed to maintain and to take proper care of the areas already "renovated."

2. Retention of the recreation program at its present level, with such expansion as the need develops -- for example, to include a summer program of supervised care for pre-school children.

 Maintenance of a full-time local police department, staffed so as to provide services at all hours, including a 24-hour switchboard.

 Maintenance of present bus service to Route I and its subsidization, if needed, as long as no other public transportation is available,

Capital Improvements

5. Adoption of an annual capital improvements budget, to be financed by a special tax or by application of certain sums from surplus funds. The Advisory Planning Board could be assigned the task of recommending each year which capital improvement items should be given priority.

City Employees

6. Adoption of a general payincrease for all city employees, commensurate with the rate of increases provided by other municipal, private, and Federal agencies for employees doing similar types of work.

7. As a fringe benefit for public works and garbage disposal personnel, provision by the city of free uniforms and laundering, as recommended by the city manager in his last budget message.

City Operations

8. Creation of a full-time assistant manager whose task would be to help the city manager in expediting the execution of city council directives and in scheduling and planning city administrative activities.

Surplus

9. Distribution of the surplus in the FOLLOWING ORDER OF PRI-ORITY: (a) for a city employees pay increase; (b) for a capital improvements program for this fiscal year; and (c) for a tax cut, if legal.

School Registration

Pre-school registration for first graders and all new students who have moved into the area will take place on Friday, September 1, at the school the student will attend. Parents are urged to take advantage of the early registration time to insure an orderly and satisfactory opening day for their children. The first day of school is Tuesday, September 5.

Eight Champions In Festival Race

Eight national champions will participate in the nine-mile road run on Sunday at 2 p.m. as part of the annual Greenbelt Festival. Leading the list of entries will be Vic Zwolak who is National 15 Kilo Champion. Zwolak has run two miles in 8:59 this year. Other champion runners participating in the event are: Ernie Tracy, present Junior National Steeplechase Champion; Moses Mayfield, Junior National A.A.U. Six Mile Champion; Jack Barry, former Junior National A.A.U. Marathon Champion; George Foulds of Pittsburgh, National A.A.U. 25 Kilo Champion; Mike Fleming, Junior National Three Mile Champion; Dick Haines, present Middle Atlantic Long Distance Champion; and John Gygax, D.C.A. A.U. Six Mile Champion will all be present.

There is also a possibility that Sy Villa, who won this race in 1959, will be present. Villa was 12th in the Boston Marathon and 7th in the National A.A.U. Marathon at Yonkers, New York.

Diaper Derby

Entries for the Diaper Derby (baby crawling contest) will be taken on Monday, Labor Day, starting at 1 p.m., on Braden Field. No entries will be taken after 1:45 p.m. The contest is open to all Greenbelt boys and girls under 11 monthsold. Prizes will include a silver cup for first and a silver spoon for second. All crawlers start from the middle of a circle 20 feet in diameter and crawl to the outside line. Parents can urge their children however they wish but must stay outside the circle.

Festival begins; Kuhn Speaks At Youth Center Dedication

Three new events, including a bridge tournament and an all-star Lassie League game, the return of the nine-mile road run, the formal dedication of the new Youth Center and a variety of other events will feature the whirlwind of fun and frolic that makes the four-day Greenbelt Festival, beginning tomorrow night, the big event of the year.

Other highlights are the crowning of the Queen of the Festival on Sunday night at 11:15 p.m. and the big Labor Day parade on Monday at 10 a.m. that will feature two bands, a drum and bugle corps, colorful floats, and majorettes. Riding in the first car with Parade Chairman Sgt. Austin Green will be his brother Charles Green, Sheriff of Lycoming County, Pennsylvania.

Grand Marshall of the parade will be Inspector Dick Mansfield and master of ceremonies will be city Recreation director Warren Leddick. The parade will begin forming in the vicinity of Southway and Ridge at 9:15 a.m. Bicycle floats will form at 12-court of Ridge. All entries must have a number which can be obtained at High's store.

The parade will proceed from Southway and Ridge, up Ridge, down Northway, down Hillside and then along Crescent to the Centerway reviewing stand. The marching units will not stop in front of the judges' stand to perform in order to speed up the parade,

Dr. Albin O. Kuhn, Executive Vice-President of the University of Maryland will be the guest speaker at the Youth Center Dedication ceremonies on Sunday, September 2, at 4:00 p.m. Dr. Kuhn, father of five, will speak about the opportunities of parents and the community in helping their youth grow into adults.

Weather permitting, the dedication will be held outdoors. In the event of rain, ceremonies will go inside the building.

Dr. Kuhn was born in Woodbine, Maryland, and raised on a dairy farm. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture at the University of Maryland in 1938, graduating with first honors. Graduate training for his Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degrees were at the University of Wisconsin and University of Maryland.

From October, 1944, to June, 1946, he served as a line officer in the United States Navy.

Dr. Kuhn was professor and head of the Agronomy Department at the University of Maryland from July, 1948, through June, 1955. While serving as assistant to the President of the University of Maryland from 1955 to 1958, he was a member of the National Committee on Climatology, advisory to the U.S. Weather Bureau.

Dr. Kuhn has four sons and one daughter, ranging in ages from 12 to 20.


