First Fallout

in GHI Home

Shelter Built

A dining room in a residence of Greenbelt has been converted into the first fallout shelter built in the community. The owner of the cinder-block home, who prefers to remain anonymous at this time, is employed at Goddard Space Flight Center and has felt that the time is now to prepare for an eventuality and to provide protection for his family against the deadly radiation in the event of a nuclear bomb attack.

The entire dining room was bricked from the inside with the exception of the closet and door to the kitchen. A brick partition has been built in the kitchen on one side of the opening into the, dining room to block the entry of radiation while a freezer blocks the other side.

A cabinet is being planned which will fit snug against the door to the kitchen when needed. This cabinet which will have a metal base as a protection against fire, will be on rollers, and the back of the cabinet will be bricked.

The cinder block which was placed where the window had been, as well as the cinder block below it, has been filled with sand as added protestion. Four inches of concrete were added to the ceiling before bricking.

Vents are provided for air and a pipe has been installed which will be used to pump air into the room with a hand pump. This pipe will have a Civil Defense-approved filter on it. There will be an exhaust pipe which will go through the kitchen door and through the cabinet in front of it.

The plans for this room were submitted to the OCDM, and the resident had to obtain approval from GHI, tri County Defense Agency, and Prince Georges County.

Although this resident has a contractor doing the work, he mentioned that this can be a doit-yourself project. He noted that FHA financing can be obtained.

The resident has already placed a thirty-day supply of water in the wall-to-wall storage space which also provides seating in the room. He has been storing food stuffs in the closet. The family will continue to use the

Highway Overpasses 16.

Constructed Here

New highway overpasses will soon surround Greenbelt. Under Top Navy Scientist construction now is a second bridge over the railroad tracks on Greenbelt Rd, in Branchville. With completion of the bridge, Greenbelt Rd, will then be dualized from the intersection with Kenilworth westward to Rhode Island Avenue.

At the same time, the first signs of activity on the construction of the Capital Beltway cloverleaf--1000 feet south of Glendale Rd, on the Baltimore Washington Parkway--are now in evidence. Work crews have been felling trees and clearing land, preparatory to constructing two overpasses for the new freeway.

Temporarily, these will connect with the present dualized Greenbelt Rd., which, with University Blvd., forms highway 193 to Langley Park. The section of the new Beltway, lying east of the Parkway will be under construction soon after the cloverleaf is completed. This will connect Greenbelt with Lanham,

Speaks at St. Hugh's

Dr. William J. Thaler, nationally known scientist of the Office of Naval Research and professor of physics at Georgetown University, will speak at the next regular meeting of St. Hugh's Home and School Association on October 19 at 8 p.m.

The work of Dr. Thaler as a highly creative physicist in the defense field was hidden for eight years under a cloak of secrecy until 1958 when newspaper headlines revealed that he headed a project that developed a new technique for detecting missile launchings immediately after firing halfway around the world. The project is named Tepee which standsfor T.P. or Thaler's project.

New Huge Apartment Project Estimated to Bring 11,500 Here

Featuring an artificial lake about one-third the size of Greenbelt Lake, the largest apartment development in the Washington area, known as Springhill Lake, will be built in Greenbelt on the 311-acre tract bounded by Greenbelt Road and Kenilworth Avenue, according to plans announced last week by Community Builders. Construction on the more than 5000 apartment units, which will eventually increase the city's population by 11,500 residents, is scheduled to begin this winter.

Police News

A complaint was received on Friday evening concerning Greenbelt youths who were reported blocking the entrance to a place of business at the Center. The proprietor of the store complained that these youths were quite difficult to handle. Chief James Williams stated that an effort will be made to correct the situation. He further added that anyone blocking an entrance could be charged with disturbing the peace. This charge could also be placed against persons using abusive language in public places.

In another instance last week, a nineteen year old Greenbelt youth was charged with assault and battery and drunkenness for an unprovoked attack on a police department clerk as he walked through the Center. The clerk was injured in the ribs.

Three Greenbelt youths, ages 14 to 16, were charged by the complainant for throwing rocks at passing cars on the Parkway.

Police have received numerous complaints from various parts of town concerning noisy motorcycles. Unnecessary loudnoises created by vehicles, such as motorcycles, could result in a charge of disturbing the peace to the owners.

A Greenbelt woman, arousing the suspicions of Co-op employees, was charged with shoplifting after being apprehended by police outside the store. Although only a few dollars worth of merchandise was found on her person, charges were placed against her.

Another water-filled balloon was thrown into an auto in the vicinity of 47 Ridge, according to a complaint received by police last Thursday. This is the second such incident reported in that area of town and is considered vandalism to an auto. Parents are advised to caution their children as to the possible danger of a serious auto accident if the driver of a vehicle should lose control of his auto as a result of being hit by a filled balloon. The apartment units with one, two or three bedrooms will include luxury lakeside units, garden apartments, town houses and some elevator buildings. All will be air conditioned with picture windows, patios and bal-conies. Specialfacilities planned for the project are a swimming pool, compact golf course, a community house, a shopping pavilion a garden at the entrance of the community, and lakeside walks and terraces. Occupancy will begin in late spring.

The project is owned by Greenbelt Associates, a syndicate headed by Isadore M. Gudelsky, owner of such business interests as Prince Georges Plaza and Wheaton Plaza. It is estimated that the total value of Springhill Lake will be \$50 million when completed, making it the largest single project in Washington, with the largest concentration of apartment zoning granted in one site.

Community Builders have won 14 different national and local awards for Sleepy Hollow Woods in Virginia. Their current 350home Tilden Woods development in Bethesda was recently selected as a national McCall's Magazine award winner. They have engaged in apartment construction in the District and in Richmond, Frederick, Laurel, and currently in Norfolk and Avlington. They state they expect to complete the 5000 units "within a relatively short period of time."

In a special economic survey conducted for the building firm, Community Builders point out that over 19,000 families will need rental housing in this market area within the next ten years. They further claim that the average family income in the Springhill Lake market area will be over \$11,000 by 1970.

One of the Washington daily papers in describing the new apartment project made the following comment: "Appropriately, Springhill Lake abuts the town of Greenbelt which was the first professionally planned suburban rental community in the nation. Completed in 1938 by the old Resettlement Administration, it housed 1,000 families and cost the Federal Government over \$31 million."
