Elderly Housing Vote Scheduled in 60 Days

Beating back the efforts of a minority led by Bernard Bordenet to obtain an immediate vote, the membership of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. at their annual meeting last night voted to hold a referendum within 60 days on the housing for the elderly project. Bordenet argued fruitlessly that the by-laws permitted the referendum question to be added to the election ballots being cast yesterday and today.

GHI manager Ed Burgoon read the opinion of counsel that a referendum could not legally be added to the ballot. The opinion was upheld by a wide margin from the floor. A slate of candidates opposing the incumbents had petitioned for the immediate referendum.

The membership then turned to the key question of whether to hold another open vote from the floor on the project or to hold a referendum at a future date. Director Harry Zubkoff who made the motion for the board to hold a referendum within 60 days pointed out that another open vote might result in the same alleged inconclusive results as attended the vote at the November 30, 1961, special meeting.

"If the purpose of reopening the question of elderly housing is to get the widest possible expression of membership sentiment," Zubkoff said, "then a referendum is the only way." The vote in favor of his motion was overwhelming.

Before the final vote, the membership accepted an amendment proposed by Al Skolnik that discreconduct the referendum either by mail or through a ballot at the

The one other issue that promised fireworks - a proposed by-law change - was defused early by the announcement that Federal National Mortgage Association (FNMA) had disapproved it. FNMA holds the GHI mortgage and accordingly must approve all by-law changes. No reason was given for the disapproval of the proposed change which dealt with corporation authority to expend funds.

Revised City Budget Figure Is \$321,534; Tax Rate at \$1.62

Responding to the request of council for reductions, city manager Charles T. McDonald submitted last week a revised 1962-63 municipal budget calling for expenditures of \$321,534 and a tax rate of \$1.62 per \$100 of assessed valuation. The original budget of April 16 estimated expenditures of \$333,550 and a tax rate of \$1.74.

875 Democrats, 214 RepublicansVoteLocally

Frank Lastner led the local voting for the Democratic nominations for the office of county commissioner, topping his nearest competitor, Mrs. Gladys Spellman, by the wide margin of 564 to 320 in Tuesday's primary. Total number of residents voting was 1,089, of which 875 were Democrats and 214 were Republicans.

Other Democratic nominees who received strong support were Richard Lankford. Congressman for the fifth district with 587 votes: Carleton Sickles, running for Congressman-at-Large, 432 votes, and David Hume, candidate for governor, whose local vote was 486 to 252 votes for J. Millard Tawes. Greenbelt voters generally followed the pattern of the county in voting heavily for the Independent Demo-

Pool Membership

May 30th marks the opening of the Greenbelt swimming pool. Familv and individual memberships for use of the pool are still available. So far this year 189 resident family plans, 25 non-resident family plans and 10 single plans have been purchased out of a hoped for total of 1000 memberships. Last year 450 memberships were purchased.

The family plans cost \$20 for residents of Greenbelt and entitle all members of the family to free swimming for the entire summer. Single plans are available for Greenbelters for \$12 and non-resident family plans are offered at \$35. At the closest neighboring community pool, in Berwyn, the rates are \$65 per family and \$20 per individual, plus a gate fee of between 25c to 35c for those holding these memberships.

There is no announced cut-off date on purchase of memberships at the Greenbelt pool at this point. Registrations may be picked up at the Youth Center and mailed in.

Helen Chasanow at Meeting

Helen Chasanow, local realtor and a member of the Greenbelt Realty Company, attended the national meeting of the Women's Council of the National Association of Real Estate Boards in Chicago last week. Mrs. Chasanow is Regional Vice President of the Council, and her jurisdiction includes the District of Columbia. Maryland, West Virginia, Delaware, and Pennsylvania.

At the meeting, plans were made for improving the qualifications of real estate salespeople, and emphasis was placed on strict adherance to the Code of Ethics of the National Association of Real Estate Boards.

Not all of the lowered tax rate is attributable to the \$12,000 cut effected in expenditures. About 5 cents of the reduction can be traced to the fact that the assessable tax base had been underestimated by \$311,930 at the time of the original budget presentation. The new tax base is estimated at \$9,659,670.

Under the revised budget, Mc-Donald estimates that revenue from other sources than real estate taxes will equal \$139,240, and that the surplus available from previous years' operations will total \$25,308, leaving \$156,986 to be raised from real estate taxes. The new surplus is some \$4,000 less than originally estimated. This is attributable to the fact that since the anticipated surplus for 1961-62 is based in part on the tax rate set for this year, any reduction in the tax rate will be reflected in a lower surplus.

Expenditure Cuts

The suggested cuts in expenditures include \$6,780 from the road sealing highway program, \$395 from janitorial services for the city offices, \$1,113 from salaries for the finance office, \$2,260 from recreation department salaries, \$280 from conferences and training, \$400 from replacement and repair accounts, and \$500 from the muncipal park budget. Also eliminated completely was \$282 for the recreation director's car allowance.

These cuts would still leave the 1962-63 expenditure budget some \$7,000 higher than the 1961-62 budget. McDonald explained that almost all of this increase represents fixed services that must be provided under present operating standards, including the debt service.

In conncetion with the road sealing program, McDonald stated that elimination of the \$6,780 increase permits only % of a mile paving this year, compared with the three miles normally done each year. Although the new road sealing technique will provide longer maintenance, he continued, the immediate effect of the cut would be for the city to fall behind schedule.

McDonald estimated that the employment of a full-time recreation director and a full-time assistant in place of one full-time superintendent of recreation and several part-time assistants will save \$2,260.

The \$500 reduction in the municipal park budget, McDonald said, is made possible by recent appropriations for current needs which would reduce the need for some proposed items in next year's opera-

One idea put forward by McDonald for elimination of \$500 for July 4 fireworks was immediately vetoed by council, who advised the Greenbelt Fire Department and Rescue Squad that it would match the latter's expenditures for fireworks up

The city council set Monday, May 28, for the public hearing of the budget, to be held at the Youth Center. The council will consider the budget for first reading on Monday, June 4. The deadline for budget passage is June 10.

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
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
