GHI Fiscal Report Shows Increase Of \$5700 Over Last Year's Figure

Despite a 27-cent cut in the city tax rate, expenses of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. for the first six months of 1962 were \$5,700 greater than for a similar period in 1961, according to the fiscal report of Roy D. Breashears as GHI comptroller.

Offsetting the \$6,600 reduction in city and county taxes were: (1) a \$6,100 increase in water expenses; (2) a \$5,800 increase in administrative and sales expenses; (3) a \$2,200 increase in board and membership expenses. In addition, the six-month report reflected a new, one-time - expenditure of \$1,082 for the ill-fated Housing for the Elderly project.

All other expenditure items showed changes of less than \$1,000 except interest expense, which is continually being reduced as the mortgage is being amortized.

Income

Total income for the first six months of 1962 was \$624,000, compared with \$621,600 last year. The increase is due to \$5,900 additional income from such sources as rents, sales of services to members and to Greenbelt Development Corporation, and interest return on savings which more than offset the drop of \$3,500 in the yield from monthly charges.

Total expenses, including those not connected with the dwelling units, were \$641,400, compared with \$635,700 in 1961. The result was a deficit of \$17,400 (before reserve allocations) after the first six months of operation in 1962, compared with deficits of \$14,100 in 1961 and \$5,200 in 1960. Because of seasonal heating costs, the budget always shows a deficit in the first half of the year.

The city and county tax item, which reflected not only the 27cent cut in city tax rate but also the 3-cent rise in the county tax rate, amounted to \$118,000 for the first six months of 1962, compared to \$124,600 for a similar period in 1961.

The increase in water expenses is mainly attributable to a 3-cent per 1000 gallon hike in the sewer rate by Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission. Because of the dry summer, it is expected that this item alone will offset any savings in taxes for the rest of the year.

The rise of \$5,800 in administrative costs is due to several items, among which are administrative increases in salaries, expenses of operating the branch office at the center (\$1,084 for the first half of 1962) higher postage costs involved in mailing out referendum and informational literature to members, and higher advertising

The increase of \$2,200 in board and membership expense is due primarily to the preparation and publication of the membership hand-

Prior to his Federal employment, McDonald had considerable experience in private employment as a registered architect and engineer.

The council placed McDonald's retirement on the agenda for the council meeting on Monday with the purpose of determining procedures for choosing his successor.
