### New AAUN Group Here Police News Review To Hear Neal Potter

Organized by Greenbelters, a special county unit of the Capital Area Division of the American Association for the United Nations has been formed and will hold its first public meeting on Tuesday, October 23, at the Youth Center at 8:15 p.m. in honor of United Nations Week.

Guest speaker for the occasion will be Neal Potter, who has been active in the AAUN for the past 15 years and for the past two years was Maryland area chairman for the Capital Area Division. His talk entitled, "How to Achieve a Stronger UN," will be followed by a discussion. Potter, who is an economist with Resources for the Future, a non-profit research group supported by the Ford Foundation, also active with the United World Federalists and a member of the National Board of World Federalists.

Although members for the new local unit will be primarily recruited from residents of Greenbelt for the present, the objective of the organization is to represent all of northern Prince Georges County and become an independently functioning organization. Temporary chairman George Beauchamp notes, "This is the first time any group in the Washington suburban area has attempted to form its own AAUN unit, but I think the interest in the UN in Greenbelt and surrounding communities warrants it.'

Members who join the AAUN through the Greenbelt group will be eligible to participate both in the regular Capital Area Division activities as well as local events. The Greenbelt unit will take over the responsibility of UNICEF Halloween collections as well as sponsorship of programs in the area secondary and elementary schools connected with the UN. Tentatively scheduled is a mock UN Assembly program organized and conducted

by high school students. The objective of the AAUN is to distribute as widely as possible information about the work of the United Nations and encourage its support. It is the only national organization devoting its entire program on a year-round basis to this effort. National headquarters is in New York City directly across the street from the UN building. # **GHI Board Debates Function** Of Nominations Committee

A spirited discussion on the functions of the nominations and elections committee featured the Thursday, October 11, meeting of the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors. At issue was a proposed by-law change drafted by director Joe Cherry which would deprive the nominations and elections committee of the power to solicit candidates for the board of directors and the audit committee. All candidates would be nominated through a petition signed by ten members. At present, the committee may nominate candidates without requiring the signatures of ten names, leaving the petition route open to those who are not nominated by the committee.

The split in the vote reflected the ill feelings created at the May election, when the nominations and elections committee failed to nominate one of the members of the minority group, who subsequently had to get his name on the ballot through a petition signed by ten members. (A candidate for the audit committee also had to use the petition route after failing to be nominated by the com-

#### Motion Defended

In defense of his motion, Cherry stated that he did not feel the nominations and elections committee should be clothed with authority to screen or pass upon the qualifications of the candidates. This, he said, is a membership responsibility to be exercised at the ballot box. Comproni stated that he saw no need for a committee to go out and solicit candidates, as there have always been more than enough candidates for the board.

Burgoon pointed out that this has only been true in one or two years and that, in most years, the nominations committee had to work very hard to persuade members to run for office. It was also pointed out that practically every co-op, including the Greenbelt Federal Credit Union, has a nominations committee.

Bey Fonda and Mat Amberg. members of the nominations and elections committee, defended the committee's action in last year's election. They stated that the bylaws placed upon them the res-

### Junior Highlights

The big news at Greenbelt Junior High School is still the upcoming political rally.

At this writing, the rally, which is scheduled for October 29 at 1 p.m., has received front-page coverage in the News Review and two metropolitan newspapers and has been mentioned on many television and radio newscasts. This is due to the fact that for the first time during their campaigns, Governor J. Millard Tawes and Republican gubernatorial candidate Frank Small are scheduled to speak on the same platform. Although they are definitely not going to debate and, in fact, are slated to speak an hour apart, many voters from both parties seem to be eagerly awaiting the rally.

The issue (that both candidates will appear on the same platform), a source of much controversy both within the school and outside of it, was further plunged into uncertainty when Small made a speech mocking the fact that Governor Tawes cancelled his appearance before the Bethesda - Chevy Chase Chamber of Commerce. The whole school waits with much apprehension any further developments.

Also in the news is the eighthgrade trip to Jamestown and Williamsburg, Virginia, scheduled for November 3 - 4. At least three busloads of students will take part in the annual trip, which ties in with their studies of American His-

The board voted 5-4 against the ponsibility of recommending to the membership nominees for office who would be an asset to the corpora-Their failure to nominate tion. any individual, Fonda and Amberg alleged, did not deprive that person of his right to run, since he could get on the ballot through a petition.

At this point there was some confusion whether the committee's failure to nominate a candidate would or would not be publicized before the elections. the last election, the candidates who were not nominated publicized the event themselves through the News Review. Without this publicity, it is not known whether the membership would have deduced from a comparison of the committee's report and the ballot that some names had been turned down by the committee.

A compromise suggested the floor was that the nominations and elections committee continue to have the power to solicit nominations, but that all candidates, whether nominated by the committee or not, be required to file petition with ten names. But the battle lines had already hardened, and the vote was taken on the original resolution.

Center Sales Office Mrs. Mary Jane Kinzer, .GHI Supervisor of Sales, appeared before the board to discuss the effects of the Center office on sales. She stated that the office has been open only a total of 48 hours on weekends and that it was too early to judge the effect. She added, however, that the office was good for public relations. Local people came in all day long to exchange views, register protests, argue positions, etc.

Her main problem, she said, is to get licensed salesmen to staff the office. She was asked whether putting the sales force on a commission basis would help in the recruitment of additional salesmen. She explained that up to now the philosophy of the co-op has been to provide a service to the members, available upon their request.

No listings are solicited, example, because this is considered inconsistent with GHI policy, which is aimed at making Greenbelt attractive to members. Whether switching to a commission system would jeopardize this policy, she did not know.

One problem concerning commission is that the efforts of many staff people are involved in one Some method would have to be devised of spreading the commission among many people.

Since GHI has now worked out with Twin Pines an arrangement for a month-to-month lease on the Center office, the board felt that any final decision could await further experience.

New Comptroller

The board was introduced to the new GHI comptroller, Donald W. McGinn, who is succeeding Roy Breashears. McGinn, a certified public accountant, has had his own accounting practice for nine years. He is a graduate of Wharton School of Finance, University of Pennsylvania. A native of the area, he graduated from Bladensburg High School and still lives there.

#### Fence

Breashears reported that the sheriff has been unable to serve a subpoena on a resident of 26 Court Ridge who refuses to follow a GHI directive to take down a fence across a public walk. The GHI manager said that the judge can issue an injunction without a subpoena, if the sheriff is unable to contact the resident after two tries.

The most extensive medical statistical survey ever undertaken in the United States, the American Cancer Society's cancer prevention study, is proceeding with its third annual follow-up currently in progress announced R. Hal Silvers, Maryland Feld Representative of the society. More than one million men and women over the age of 30 have enrolled in this national project, which began in 1959 and will take six years to complete, the aim of which is to pinpoint targets for future preventative programs.

More than 20,000 persons have enrolled within the state of Maryland.
