Integration Referendum Proposal Opposed 5 to 2 by GHI Directors

A proposal by director William Helm that Greenbelt Homes, Inc. conduct an advisory mail referendum to ascertain if members would move if GHI became integrated was defeated at the regular meeting of the board on Thursday, October 24. Directors Edward Burgoon, John O'Reilly, Charles Schwan, Nat Schinderman, and Josephine Seay (just named to the board) voted against the motion. Joseph Cherry and Helm favored the motion. The idea of a GHI mail referendum was first suggested in a recent letter to the *News Review* by Gordon Gemeny, a resident of Lakewood.

Helm felt that the referendum was needed for business purposes and that the information provided would help the board make decisions on the question of integration. Spirited discussion from the floor and the board unanimously opposed the referendum. Nearly all the discussants thought a referendum a totally inappropriate device, and would have serious consequences.

Some of the reasons given in opposition to the poll were (1) the questionable propriety and legality of the matter for voting purposes; (2) the technical difficulties of constructing a survey adequate to cope with the subtleties and complexity of the issue; (3) the referendum would polarize community opinion; (4) it would automatically make Greenbelt a target for outside forces; and (5) the validity of the responses would be questionable in that they would reflect predictions and projections of unknown variables.

First Woman Director

Mrs. Seay, 6-S Plateau Place, was elected by the board to fill the vacancy left by Hans Jorgensen. She is the first woman to serve on the GHI board. Mrs. Seay has been quite active in many GHI and civic committees. She was elected on the first ballot from among ten nominees.

In another vote, John O'Reilly was named to succeed Henry Brautigam as GHI Treasurer.

Land Use Committee

Schwan presented an interim report of the Land Use Committee. A group of Greenbelt citizens, exploring non-profit elderly housing, has expressed interest in the GHI-owned land across from the Administration building on Hamilton Place. A motion by Director Burgoon to have the cost of an appraisal determined was passed unanimously.

The committee report mentioned that the developer and builder of "Georgetown South" was to be invited by the committee to visit Greenbelt. It was stressed that the committee is fact-finding and the builders opinion on the cost and feasibility of new 3 or 4 bedroom row houses on existing GHI land is part of that inquiry. There is no commitment to this particular builder implied.

News Review Elects Board of Directors

Al Skolnik was re-elected president of the Greenbelt Cooperative Publishing Association, Inc. for 1963-64 at the organizational meeting of the new 5-man board of directors. The board, which includes Mrs. Bernice Kastner, Russ Greenbaum, Mrs. Bess Halperin, and Mrs. Mary Smith, was chosen by the staff members of the *Greenbelt News Review* at the annual membership meeting on October 13.

The board elects its own officials. Other officers named were Mrs. Kastner as vice-president, Greenbaum as secretary, and Mrs. Halperin as treasurer.

Among the topics considered by the board were the filling of the editor's chair, the circulation of papers to the new Springhill Lake Apartments, and the rates for mail subscriptions.

The position of editor has been shared among the staff members since Dorothy Sucher's departure from Greenbelt at the end of August. It is expected that a new editor will be announced as soon as personal circumstances will permit the editor to take over.

The rapid addition of new units to Springhill Lake Apartments is creating a fiscal problem since the newspaper is faced with additional charges for printing and for delivery without any potential offsetting income. The board decided temporarily to dig into reserves to pay the additional costs.

The board also decided to raise the charge for mail subscriptions from \$3 to \$4 a year for out-of-town residents. Postal rates went up last January and the board decided it could no longer absorb the additional cost.

ed that a pilot project of underbrush clearance be initiated. The project, undertaken with the advice of the State Forest Ranger, would eliminate the underbrush and scrub pine in a 50 foot belt in the woods immediately adjacent to homes. The pilot area would be between Plateau and Laurel Hill along Ridge. The recommendation was accepted by the board. The Extension of Laurel Hill Rd. as a fire lane and an access road was also recommended. This was referred to the city council committee.

The board accepted most of the recommendations of the Personnel Committee Report. The recommendations covered grades and pay scales, performance standards, incentive awards, and an employee conduct policy. Several recommendations pertaining to establishment of new positions were deferred to the next meeting.

The Member Relations Committee was commended on the fine series of new member coffees that were initiated. The next coffee is on November 13. Invitations are sent to new members.

WMA Express Bus Service to Start On Nov. 25; City Line to Terminate

Express bus service between downtown Washington and Greenbelt and NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center during the rush hour periods will be inaugurated by the WMA Transit Company on November 25 following approval of WMA's petition by the Washington Metropolitan Transit Commission. The total fare will be 60 cents. At the same time Greenbelt's own local bus line, which has been serving residents between the city and Baltimore Boulevard (Route 1) for the past 12 years, will cease to operate.

The terminal points of the express service will be Eleventh and Pennsylvania Avenue in the District and NASA on Glenn Dale road, stopping at the Springhill Lake Apartments and circling the city on the way. The bus will travel on Edmonston Road between Calvert and Greenbelt Roads. The express portion of the route will be between the downtown terminal and the District line.

Expected restrictions are that passengers going into Washington can alight at stops in the District but cannot be picked up after the bus enters the District. Passengers traveling to Greenbelt and NASA can board the bus at District stops but cannot get off until the bus crosses into Maryland. A complete bus schedule will be published in the *News Review* prior to the start of service.

Beltway Plaza Run

During the non-rush hour period the bus will make runs to and from Beltway Plaza, with the schedule designed to make connections with the new J-4 D. C. Transit bus which now runs between Beltway Plaza and Chevy Chase via the University of Maryland campus and Silver Spring. For the present the bus will not go all the way to the downtown terminal during non-rush hours but end its run at the District line, where connections can be made to a bus traveling into the city.

Originally the route was planned to come into Greenbelt via Edmonston Road, stop at Springhill Lake and then travel along to the North End, the Center and NASA. However, Edmonston will soon be blocked off just above Springhill Lake by the Capital Beltway. As a result, the bus will instead come up Edmonston from Kenilworth and Calvert Road, stop at Springhill Lake, turn back to Greenbelt Road and there into Greenbelt via Southway. The bus will then turn right on Crescent, turn right on Eastway to Laurel Hill Road, then down Hillside back to Crescent, turn left

and back to Southway, and then out Greenbelt Road to NASA.

Frequent Local Service

The bus leaving NASA will come back into Greenbelt, make the same circle around the North End, then proceed along Southway and Greenbelt Road to Springhill Lake and then to its downtown terminal. This will provide frequent bus service in Greenbelt between the North End, the Center and Springhill Lake, thereby largely compensating for the discontinuation of the local bus line. A zone fare will be instituted.

In the city's first year of existence (1939) Capitol Transit (now D. C. Transit) operated express bus service between Greenbelt and Ninth and Constitution. The service was subsidized by the Federal Government which then operated the town. The downtown express service was ended after a year, and Capitol Transit ran a bus between Greenbelt and Mount Rainier, which was finally ended in 1951 due to a lack of patronage. A few months later Greenbelt initiated its own bus line, which has operated continually at a deficit.

Long Negotiations

Negotiations between Greenbelt civic groups and officials and the Washington transportation companies have been underway for the past several years to achieve a bus line between Greenbelt and the District. However, it was not until the establishment of NASA a few years ago and more recently the construction of the rapidly expanding Springhill Lake apartment development that a serious offer was made by a bus company.

At the hearing held last July 25 D.C. Transit protested the service proposed by WMA on the grounds that "there is no need for the service now or in the near future." D.C. Transit, which controls most of the bus routes in the greater Washington metropolitan area, further said that "if we find to the contrary and hold that a need exists, then D. C. Transit should be authorized and required to provide the transportation."

Library to Open Saturdays

The Greenbelt Branch Library will be open on Saturdays beginning November 9. Mrs. Margaret M. Paris, Greenbelt Librarian, announces the following new library hours starting November 4: Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, from 1 p.m. to 9 p.m.; Tuesday, Friday, Saturday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The Greenbelt Library was begun as a city-supported library in 1939. For 16 years it was maintained and operated by the city. In 1955 Greenbelt joined the county library system.

No Hunting Permitted

There is a City Ordinance which prohibits shooting or hunting within the corporate limits of the city of Greenbelt.

Exercise in Futility

We think the GHI board was wise in rejecting a proposal to poll the members along the following lines: "Would you move if GHI were integrated?"

Such a referendum, in our opinion, would be an exercise in futility. The members would be faced with an "iffy" proposition that most individuals could not honestly answer unless and until they knew the whole set of circumstances and factors that would be involved in a real situation. Moreover, such a referendum would have emotional overtones and we would be very surprised if the poll would yield any objective answers that could serve as guidelines for future action by the GHI board or management.

We are also concerned about the effects from the standpoint of public relations. Such a referendum would undoubtedly receive national attention or at least get front-page headlines in the Washington papers. It would make Greenbelt the focal point, target, and center of attention of all groups interested in civil rights activities. We fear it might very well produce the kind of results that we are all anxious to avoid — demonstrations, pickets, agitation, and unrest. The last thing Greenbelt needs is the kind of publicity that will make persons think twice about moving into the community.

Fisher Receives Doctorate

Shalom Fisher, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Fisher, 5-D Eastway, received his Ph.D. in physics at the University of California. He was awarded a post-doctoral fellowship at the Culham Laboratory in England.

Tax Relief For Elderly

Added relief in the form of increasing the tax assessment exemption on real estate for persons over the age of 65 has been upped to \$5,000 per year provided the person has been a bona fide resident of Prince Georges County for the preceding five years and whose total gross income does not exceed \$4,000 from all sources.

People making application for relief must have legal title or beneficial title to the property as their permanent home. Applicants must set forth in writing their name, age, place of residence, combined gross income from all sources for the next preceding calendar year, total consecutive years of residence immediately preceding the date of the application and the source of ownership of the residential property for which the applicant is seeking relief.

Persons desiring to take advantage of assessment relief and able to meet the requirements are asked to obtain the proper form from the Legal Department, Courthouse, Upper Marlboro, Maryland in person, by written request, or phone. Assessment relief is not granted automatically each year and must be filed annually.

All applications must be received by the County Commissioners by December 10, 1963.

Fake Explosion Tests VFD and Resuce Squad

A few weeks ago, I received some information, as a member of the Ladies Auxiliary to the Greenbelt Volunteer Fire Department and Resuce Squad, that a special realistic drill exercise was being planned in the near future for the men of the department. The women were told because the plans included a refreshment hour after the drill. We were requested to say nothing to our husbands so that they would believe that the call was authentic. The men, in the meantime, had been told that the new ambulance was due to arrive on Monday, October 26 and they should all go to the firehouse to receive proper operating instructions.

The problem to be presented to the men was this: a gas tank had exploded on a large dump truck sitting in Hall's Garage at the Center, and three young men would be found injured on the floor of the smoke filled garage. Observers would be there to watch the steps taken by the men in Resuce and Fire operations.

Realistic Wounds

The three "victims" were made up with gruesomely authentic looking synthetic wounds. One man was made to appear as if he had one eye down on his cheek, another had a gash in his arm with a protruding bone, and one had a gash in his chest. They were fixed with a preparation of vaseline and glue, which looked like blistering skin, and were dirtied up. The shirts were removed, burned and put back on them with the torn areas exposing what looked like charred or burned skin. An ear was made to look as if it was torn half off. The stage was set in the garage, the smoke bombs set off and the men took their positions on the floor. The final touch was the spilling of a red blood-like liquid on them.

At exactly 8:30, the appointed hour, the men at the fire house heard a summons which said, "Truck explosion at Hall's Garage in Greenbelt," or words to that effect. They moved fast and arrived at the scene completely unaware that this was not "for real".

Quick Treatment

Exactly fifteen minutes later, the last of the injured men was put on the ambulance and taken away. Ten minutes later, the Greenbelt firefighting equipment left the scene. Most of the men appeared to have no idea, as they worked on the victims, that this was all a hoax.

The first indication, for many of them, that something was wrong, was when the ambulances went into the fire house parking lot with the victims. This shook them up. Even at that point, some were told that a crew of doctors had set up a station at the firehouse to take care of the victims.

The three victims were from Brentwood. They were William Beall, Wes Crawford and William Hyatt. The cosmetologists who observed the rescue operations were George Brown of Chillum-Adelphi, Master Sgt. Alfred Graham of Andrews Air Force Base and Bill Brown of Clinton. The drill was put on by the P. G. County Rescue Association Training Committee.

If nothing else, the success of the surprise drill proves that women can keep a secret.

Tuned to Same Frequency

While standing on the first floor roof of the S. Klein store in order to supervise traffic control and safety for pedestrians during the opening celebration, Greenbelt Police Chief Robert A. O'Brien, using a battery-powered megaphone, noticed one pedestrian who seemed to be ignoring the Chief's request to walk in the safety zone.

A woman who was walking near the man went over and apparently spoke to the man who stopped, put his hand inside his jacket, turned something, put his hand to his ear and looked up at O'Brien.

At this point, O'Brien looked at the man and asked, "Are we tuned to the same frequency?" The gentleman nodded his head and proceeded to walk in the safety area designated for pedestrians.


