GHI Board Debates C. U. Loan Agreement

The special G. H. I. board meeting of November 5 was concerned mainly with whether to continue the servicing agreement that exists between G.H.I. and the Greenbelt Federal Credit Union. This agreement defines mutual procedures to be followed in case of default of payments by a G.H.I. member who also holds a Credit Union loan. Its five year period expires within a few days.

Manager Breashears stated the merits of the agreement were hard L) assess since no defaults had occurred yet to test it. Director Helm made two points in urging its continuation; he interpreted it as giving G.H.I. first claim to judgements in case of defaults, and as limiting the lender to 80% of down payments. Director O'Reilly felt on the other hand that the original need for the agreement no longer existed, because G.H.I. now finances downpayments.

Mr. Comproni, speaking for the Credit Union, was invited to explain the mechanics of a loan. He noted that the existence of the agreement may in itself have prevented its application so far, since G.H.I. and G.F.C.U. work together to prevent defaults from occurring. Director Burgoon asked whether division of judgments on a pro rata basis might be better for both parties; Comproni agreed this was worth considering.

Director Shinderman voiced his opinion that the agreement was still valuable, provided for amicable cooperation between the two parand should be continued. board passed his motion to have the manager and the chairman of the finance committee consult with a representative of the Credit Union on possible changes in the agreement.

Though Mr. Comproni explained that the agreement automatically continues after Nov. 7 unless G.H.I. cancels it, a motion by director Helm extended the agreement for 30 days after the finance committee report.

Turning to another matter, the question of whether G.H.I. can help out a member who has trouble selling his house, was posed by director Seay. Manager Breashears answered that G.H.I. can rent the house and sell it for a member when the market is good, so that the member need not pay "double rent" if he has bought another house. This solution to a vexing problem may not be generally known.

Geller, a statistician by profession, has served on the APB since its inception. Gerton, manager of High's in Greenbelt, has served on the APB subcommittee on industrial, residential and commercial development. Wuermser, an engineer with Westinghouse, has served on GHI committees on standards and is familiar with building codes. McDonald was former Greenbelt city manager from 1948 to 1962. Gibson, a relative newcomer to Greenbelt, is a lawyer familiar with zoning regulations and procedures.

The ERB conducts hearings on appeals by city employees. Herling, long concerned with employeeemployer relations under collective bargaining, served on an ad hoc committee appointed earlier this year to review the new personnel system for the city. Downs has served on the APB for three years and is employed by the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission. Mann has been a Labor Department investigator for 16 years in the field of minimum wage legislation.

The PAB advises the city on matters of personal policy, including the development of a position classification plan and a uniform pay plan. Rowland, a former member of the old Personnel Board, is employed by the Internal Revenue Service in developing classification standards. Bailey is with the Department of Labor as manpower development specialist and serves as delegate to the Central Labor Council in Washington for the American Federation of Government Employees. Polaschik has a Moster's degree of Business Management from George Washington University and is currently an administrative officer with the Department of Commerce. Hanna,

New WMA Bus Service to Make 16 Daily Runs to Beltway Plaza

The new schedule for the WMA transit bus service to be inaugurated on November 25 will feature 16 runs between Greenbelt and Beltway Plaza and six express runs to and from downtown Washington, three in the morning rush hours and three in the evening rush hours. A complete schedule of the weekday service is printed in this issue.

High Rise Apartment Zoning Denied Saul

The zoning request for a \$25 million high rise apartment complex near Greenbelt was denied November 5 by the Prince Georges County Commisisoners.

The vote on the Greenbelt Apartments was 2 to 2, meaning that the application failed for lack of approval. Commissioner Robert F. Sutphin moved to approve the request, arguing that the opposition presented "a lot of testimony but no evidence."

Baggett voted in favor of the motion, but Commissioners Brooke and Gladys N. Spellman voted to deny it. Mrs. Spellman said that the applicants had not proved a need or shown a change in the area to justify a change in zoning.

The proposed developer, B. Francis Saul II, had outlined plans for high rise and garden apartments and town houses on the 78-acre tract adjoining the Greenbelt Regional Park on Kenilworth ave.

The Planning Commission had recommended in favor of the rezoning after determining that the Interior Department, which had been interested in the tract for park land, was unable to get funds from Congress to buy it.

The fare from Greenbelt to and from NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center, Springhill Lake, Berwyn Heights and Beltway Plaza will be 25 cents. The total fare all the way to downtown Washington will be 60 cents. The run from Greenbelt Center to and from the 11th and Pennsylvania terminal will take 57 minutes.

The first trip to Beltway Plaza will leave the Center at 8:40 a.m. and reach the Plaza at 8:55 a.m. The last bus to leave the Center for the Plaza will be at 7:50 p.m., with the last bus leaving the Plaza for the Center at 7:35 p.m. These evening times will also be the last runs to Springhill Lake.

There will only be two runs a day to NASA, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. The first express downtown will leave Greenbelt Center at 6:45 a.m., and the first express run in the evening will leave the downtown terminal for Greenbelt at 5:22 p.m. Passengers desiring to travel downtown during the non-rush hour period will have to change to a D.C. transit bus either at Kenilworth Junction (Kenilworth and Eastern Ave.) or the new D. C. Transit J-4 at Beltway Plaza for the short run to Branchville and transfer there to the 82 bus.

An unusual feature is that there will also be express runs on Saturday. There will be two in the morning, leaving the Center at 6:40 a.m. and 7:45 a.m., and the return trips will leave the downtown terminal at 5:45 p.m. and 6:18 p.m. The Saturday schedule between the Center, Springhill Lake and the Beltway Plaza will be the same as on weekdays. No bus will run on Sunday.

POST OFFICE ISSUES RULES FOR OVERSEAS XMAS MAIL

(Ed. Note: The following is the first of a series of instructions and suggestions released by Postmaster Empry A. Harman of the local post office, Postmaster Harman also announced that a new Christmas Stamp will be issued this year and that the theme this year, as in previous years, will be MAIL EARLY plus a new one USE THE

The period November 1 to November 20 has been designated for the mailing of Christmas parcels by surface transportation to members of our Armed Forces overseas. For Airmail parcels the period is December 1 to December 20. Greeting cards for the Armed Forces overseas should be mailed within the periods designated for parcels if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas.

The term "Armed Forces oversons" includes personnel of our Armed Forces, members of their families, and authorized U.S. civilians employed overseas, who receive their mail through an APO, New York, New York, San Francisco, California or Seattle, Washington, or Fleet Post Office, New York, New York, or San Francisco, California, or Navy Post Office, c.'o Postmaster, Seattle, Washington.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard, or strong doublefaced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper which materially strengthens the package. Each box should be well tied with strong cord. Unless completely packed and tightly filled, boxes are likely to be crushed. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package. A slip showing list of contents and addressee should be enclosed in the parcel. Forms 2966 or 2976-A "Customs Declaration", completed by the senders are required on

The domestic rates of postage are applicable, and postage must be fully prepaid. When fourth-class parcel post rates are applicable, the zone rate from the post office where mailed to the post office through which the parcel is addressed will be charged. | Airmail articles weighing not in excess of 8 ounces are chargeable at the rate of 8 cents per ounce; those weighing over 8 ounces are chargeable at the rate of 88 cents for the first pound and 80 cents for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

Addresses must be legible and complete, and should be prepared by typewriter or pen and ink. The correct forms of address for overseas military personnel must be used.


