## Center School Dedicates American Heritage Hall

On Monday, Feb. 17, Greenbelt Center School students and faculty dedicated their American Heritage Hall. Theodore Miazga, county attorney, gave the keynote speech. The school's glee club, under the direction of Mrs. Doris Cook, sang a medley of patriotic songs.

The hall has three sets of bulletin boards on its walls, each with a selected theme. The main and center set of boards is dedicated to "Famous Statesmen", the theme for the second set is "Outstanding Americans," the third set is dedicated to "Historical Events."

The Great Seal of the United States is displayed above the center of the main bulletin board, and over each end are two gold eagles. The main exhibit, however, is a unique set of flags of the United States beginning with the revolutionary flags and progressing to the 50-star flag. Since these flags were not available commercially, they had to be custom-made by a flag manufacturer.

At the east end of the hall are hung pictures of historical sites in America, and at the west end of the hall are displayed 14 commemorative battles in American

The purpose of American Heritage Hall is to create in our students an awareness and understanding of the ideals and principles that have evolved, and that are perpetuated by the commemorative occasions celebrated during the school year. The materials exhibited will be changed each month, when the teachers receive from the a list of commemorative dates for the month. This list will be read and discussed with the class, and then posted on the classroom bulletin board. A student can voluntarily select one of the commemorative dates and do a research

It is hoped that from this experience our students will be able to discuss intelligently historical occasions and individuals who have contributed to or influenced in some way the progress and development of our country.

Fred Cardano, Principal of Center School, sponsored the project, did the reasearch and made all the community contacts necessary for its realization.

#### City Fights Planners Of New Community

The Prince Georges Planning Board will continue their discussions on the 38 petitions for the zoning of the undeveloped land between the Baltimore-Washington Parkway and the Goddard Space Center on Wednesday, Mar. 4 at 10 a.m. in Silver Spring.

On Feb. 19, the planning board heard Greenbelt City Councilman Clifford Simonson and City Manager, James K. Giese protest proposals for high density development within the city boundaries. Simonson pointed out the imbalance in having a community of 12,-000 apartment units and only 500 single family units. He said he felt such a high number of apartment units in this area unneces-

Giese pointed out to the Board that the new planned community ignored the city limits of Greenbelt -half in and half out. Since the land within the city limits is planned for high density apartments, most of the residents in the new community would be living in Greenbelt, while most of the services, as now planned, such as schools, library, youth center, would be physically located outside the city limits.

# New Municipal Building Opens; City Telephone Number Changed

The Greenbelt City Offices will move into their new quarters at the new intersection of Southway and Crescent rd. on Friday, March 6. The police dept. section of the new municipal office building will be open Saturday and the city offices will be open for business the following Monday, March 7. An important change to note is the new telephone number of the city offices - 474-8000. The police dept. will retain the old number 474-5454.

### Bresler Development Plans Heard at Twin Pines Mtg.

Twin Pines Savings and Loan Association, at its annual meeting Tuesday night, heard Charles Bresler give his views on the future of Greenbelt. Mr. Bresler is the owner of 95% (approximately 600 acres) of the undeveloped land in Greenbelt, and is presently constructing the Boxwood, Charlestown, and Lakeside developments.

Mr. Bresler described Greenbelt as the future metropolis of Prince Georges County. The developments presently under construction, together with Springhill Lake, will mean more schols are necessary; presently planned are an elementary school near Boxwod, one on Greenbelt Road near the Charlestown development, and a senior high school in the present sanitary land fill area on Northway extended. A motel is projected for the Greenbelt Road - Capital Beltway area to service visitors to the Regional Park, and a nursing home is being considered near the Armory. He described a light industrial complex to be built next to the Baltimore-Washington Parkway, to house companies associated with NASA. The location of the complex will be near one or more projected overpasses over the parkway, about two miles north of the present Glendale road overpass.

If his own 600 acres were developed for single family dwellings, Mr. Bresler stated, at the county average of four units per acre, this would mean about 10,000 more residents to service, which would increase the tax rate beyond a reasonabe amount. He gave this as an argument for commercial and multiple family developments.

In response to a question from the floor, concerning the future of the Greenbelt Lake Park, he said that the elementary school and the playground contemplated by the School Board for the Boxwood area would take up some of the land, but that the rest would probably remain as parkland.

Some of the proposed zoning can be seen on the map on page 4.

#### Children's Section Featured In New Regional Library

Children can look forward to having a spacious and brightly decorated department of their own when the first regional library in Prince George's County Memorial Library system opens March 2 at 6530 Adelphi Road, Hyattsville.

Miss Elizabeth H. Gross, regional librarian, said the Boys and Girls Department has a capacity of 15,-000 books, 1,000 recordings, and reading areas specially equipped with small tables and chairs for the very young and attractive reading tables and chairs for older boys and girls. In addition there is a special program room, use of which is for story hours and other activities, and a special collection room housing representative books in the field of children's literature for use by parents and teachers.

There will be a preschool story hour once a week later this spring, and there will be reguar story hours for youngsters in the six to ten age bracket after school hours. Miss Mathews who will be in charge of the library would like to develop a book discussion group for older boys and girls.

The current estimate of the total construction cost is \$117,500 - up from the contract estimate of \$113, 635 by the Bishop Construction Co. of Baltimore. Unexpected utility relocation accounted for \$3400 of the difference. Architects for the building are Walton and Madden of Mt. Rainier. George Brunatti, 32 Lakeside, was the firm's principle architect for the project.

There are still several month's work to be done. Still to come are such items as a new council table, seating for council room, desks and committee room tables and new fing poles.

#### New Telephones

The new telephone system gives separate numbers to the city offices, the city manager, police dept. and Eimination of the warehouse. switchboard and the increased number of lines will add greater flexibility of service according to city manager James K. Giese.

The Greenbelt committee system was recognized in the inclusion of committee rooms in the new building. City manager Giese reports that three separate committee meetings can now be held simultaneously - in the past the manager's own office has frequently doubled as the only available committee room.

The City Council has been discussing the formal dedication ceremony for the new municipal building, expected to be held sometime in May. A Dedication Committee is expected to include past mayors and city councilmen.

The completion of the municipal office building now finishes up the building program begun in 1959 which has seen construction of a Youth Center building and a new Fire House.



#### Mortgage Tips

To the Editor:

Your article in the February 20 issue "Tips on Mortgage Loans" is hardly a service to your readers as it contains statements which might lead your readers to lose considerable money. Your statement "While the conventional mortgage loan user may have the advantage, he'll have to pay a 6 to 61/2% yearly interest rate with a down payment of 20% to 25%" might lead some of your readers into falling into the hands of the few profiteers who charge these rates. Actually your readers may easily obtain a 51/2% rate with 20% down, a 54% rate with 25% down, and a 5% rate with 334% down.

Your statement "Dont overlook closing or settlement costs, which may cost you an additional 3 or 4% in cash of the total price" would also lead your readers into the hands of the wrong people. Actually, closing costs should not cost more than 2 to 21/2% of the mortgage price (not the total price). All homeowners must pay taxes and insurance and these are not considered closing costs.

Your statement "A difference between 54% and 64% annual rates can put \$100 yearly in your pocket on a \$10,000 mortgage" is likewise misleading. Actually the difference is about \$65 per year for the average 20 or 25 year mortagage since the principal is constantly decreas-You would save \$100 yearly only if the \$10,000 mortgage principal never declined during the term of the mortgage and this is obviously contradictory.

A responsible newspaper should verify its information before passing it on to its readers as tips.

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

The map above shows the location of the rezoning requested by petitions filed by Charles Bresler and Theodore Serner. The curved line at the lower right represents the Baltimore-Washington Parkway.

These zoning petitions asked for 40 acres of commercial office buildings (behind 20-Ridge to 32-Ridge). Proceeding northward, the request included 28 acres of high-density walk-up apartments (R-10) plus 7 acres for neighborhood commer-

cial development (C-1) off Northway extended. Then the density would taper off to 16 acres of row houses (R-18) and 109 acres of garden-type apartments (R-20) on Plateau extended. The land is now zoned RPC-Planned Community.
