Council Fills Vacancies On City's Advisory Boards

At a special meeting on Monday night, which lasted approximately one hour, city council made several appointments to various advisory boards, and discussed the salary of the Police Chief.

Two new members of the Advisory Planning Board were appointed: Harold Baskin, publicity chairman for the Springhill Lake Citizens Association, and J. Richard Hoffman, 114 Northway. Just a week ago, Baskin, on behalf of the Springhill Lake Citizens Association, presented a protest statement regarding the Master Plan recently made public by the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission, along with suggested revision. Baskin is Associate Art Director for Nation's Business.

Hoffman, now a member of the Charter Review Board, was formerly president of Woodland Hills Association and has taken a keen interest in the operations of the city government.

Baskin is filling the unexpired term of Charles McDonald which has until Oct. 1964 to run. Hoffman is replacing Cyril Kovalchik who resigned. His term expires Oct. 1965.

Appointed to the Personnel Advisory Board was Gerald Boisvert, 7-C Crescent, a Social Science teacher at High Point. Boisvert has also had an active interest in the functions of the city.

There were five vacancies on the Recreation Advisory Board and Council agreed to hear a recommendation from each member. Recommended and appointed to the Board were: Thomas Hieber of 120 Northway, Harvey Ratner of Springhill Lake, Ed Coulter of 71-G Ridge, and Rev. Perry Miller, new minister of the Methodist Church in Greenbelt. One Council member was not present and his recommendation will be heard at the next meeting.

Appointed to the Charter Review Board was Jim Colby of Lakeside. Colby is a former President of the Springhill Lake Citizens Association and is now the newly elected President of the Greenbelt Junior Chamber of Commerce. A vacancy still exists on the Charter Review Board because of Hoffman's appointment to the Advisory Planning Board.

Police Chief

A matter was brought before council concerning the salary of the police chief. City Manager James Giese asked council to approve a salary at a step higher than starting level within the job rate. Although authority to do so was not needed from council, he brought the matter before them because the salary would be greater than estimated in the present budget. Council agreed that the Manager take whatever steps necessary in order to appoint a proper man for the position.

A comment was made from a citizen in attendance protesting the manager's pending appointment of an "outsider". He felt that the position should be filled by one of the officers now on the Greenbelt force. Council stated that they left the matter of the appointment up to the Manager since it was an administrative action. Their confidence was in his judgment.

Howard Chasanow, attending the meeting, commented on the possible selection. He stated that his work on a county level has brought him in contact with many law enforcement officials and the Takoma Park Police Force is highly respected throughout the county. To hire a sergeant from this organization would most certainly bring a well-trained man in to be chief, he said.

Master Plan Discussed At Citizen's Meeting

The Prince Georges Citizens' Planning Organization, a group formed less than a year ago to help plan the county's future, held a public meeting on the new master plan in the College Park Municipal Building on Thursday, June 25. Presiding over the meeting was Simon Pristoop of Greenbelt, vice-president of the organization. The panel also included State delegate Robert Dentz, Professor Rolfe Glover of the University of Maryland, Greenbelt councilman Clifford Simonson and John Wright of Accocek. Park and Planning Commission chairman, William Stevens, who was invited to the meeting, declined the invitation saying that he did not want to discuss the plan in public before the July public hearings. Present were about 30 citizens, including Mayor William W. Gullett of College Park.

Dentz noted that even with a plan, there is no legal obligation for zoning to follow it, though laws to that effect have been proposed. Wright described the proposed plan as fairly good but somewhat conservative and unimaginative. He remarked that in the past the Commission's chairman William Stevens always favored "cluster development" — dense population centers surrounded by preserved parkland — and this is virtually absent in the master plan.

Mayor Gullett described some of his city's problems in connection with the plan. He noted that "Greenbelt is much further along than we are on this" but said he hoped that College Park will have its presentation ready by the time of the public hearing. The biggest problem of College Park seems to be the future of Route 1 which is zoned commercially for almost all its length, though tourists and lately even truck traffic generally bypass it. Gullett said he would be glad to see modern apartments replace some of the "shoddy" commercial growth, but noted that by far the biggest share of new apartments in Area 13 is slated for Greenbelt and not for College Park.

Greenbelt's case on the plan was well presented by Simonson who noted that while the plan calls for an unprecedented low of 33 per cent detached housing units in the area, for Greenbelt the percentage would reach only 3 per cent. Many Greenbelt residents were present in the audience and they supplemented Simonson's presentation with various comments, especially concerning the disruption of Greenbelt's traffic pattern by the proposed plan.

Greenbelt City Fair Planned for Labor Day

Greenbelt is going to have a City Fair over the Labor Day weekend — not to compete with the New York World's Fair, but to show everybody the kinds of things Greenbelt people have done through their organizations this past year, and what they are planning to do in the coming year.

A great variety of activities and exhibits are being planned which will be stimulating, entertaining and educational. The Fair will be held in the Youth Center, the Municipal Building, the Library, the Swimming Pool and on Braden Field.

All Greenbelt organizations are being asked to send representatives to a preliminary planning meeting at the Youth Center Tuesday, July 7, at 7:30 p.m. All interested Greenbelt residents who would like to help are invited to attend this meeting.

Holiday Schedule

Because the Fourth of July falls on a Saturday, the city offices will be closed on Friday, July 9. There will be refuse collection on Friday but there will not be collection for the Saturday route. Recreation department activities are planned for entire holiday weekend and the Police Department, of course, will continue its round-the-clock operation.

No Fireworks

Residents are to be reminded that this year there will not be fireworks on the Fourth of July. The city council decided not to assume the full burden of the cost of these fireworks, and when other city organizations failed to express any interest in substantially participating in sharing the cost the decision was made not to have fireworks.

Holiday Fireworks In Nearby Towns

Fourth of July celebrations will be held at Magruder Park and Takoma Park. Greenbelt will not have a fireworks display this year.

An international vaudeville show, saluting the United Nations, will be one of the highlights of the Independence Day celebration held in Magruder Park on Saturday, sponsored by the City of Hyattsville. The program, which will start at 7:30 p.m. will feature prize-winning Prince Georges County talent and other entertainers, whose numbers will represent many parts of the world.

The all-day program in Magruder Park will start at 10 a.m. with flag-raising exercises and a baseball game and close at night with a fireworks display. Races and field events will be held from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.; and there will be a bicycle rodeo for boys and girls seven to 13 years of age at 1 p.m. A men's singles horseshoe and a boys' tennis tournament, ages 13 to 17, will be held throughout the day from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The fourth of July festivities in Takoma Park will begin with a seven-division morning parade, starting at 10 a.m. from the intersection of Carroll and Ethan Allen Aves., travelling south on Carroll Ave. to Cedar St., then right to Philadelphia Ave., and to Cedar Ave. where it disbands.

Patriotic exercises begin at 7:15 p.m. under the direction of Maryland State Comptroller Louis L. Goldstein, with a band concert by the Howard University Ensemble.

Principal speaker at the exercises will be John A. Gronouski, Postmaster General of the United States. His address will be followed by a spectacular fireworks program.

Outdoor Cafe Opens

Greenbelt now has a "touch of Paris" in its Shopping Center. With the approval of the city, Bob Scholten, owner of Bob and Fran's Carry Out has installed three fancy tables, each with a large umbrella to shield diners from the sun, on the brick portion of the sidewalk in front of his store.

Comments concerning the appearance of the outdoor dining area have been highly favorable and citizens seem to be enjoying the outdoor dining area. Seemingly enjoying the scene more than anybody else is Scholten himself.

GHI BOARD PLANS TO MEET JULY 9 TO CONSIDER ACTION ON PLAN 13

The Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors will hold a special meeting on Thursday, July 9, to consider its formal position and presentation of material with respect to the College Park-Greenbelt Master Plan. A public hearing on the plan will be held on Thursday, July 21, at the Greenbelt Center School at 8 p.m. The GHI zoning committee has been asked to present a report to the board on July 9.

City Recognized For Safety Award

Greenbelt was among the four Prince Georges County cities commended by the American Automobile Association in recognition of its efforts to save pedestrian lives in traffic.

Greenbelt received the Pedestrian Safety Achievement award for reporting no pedestrian deaths over the past several years. Greenbelt has gone 14 consecutive years without a pedestrian fatality.

Hyattsville, Laurel, and Mt. Rainier were also cited by the AAA.

Police Chief Appointed

City Manager James K. Giese has announced the appointment as Chief of Police of the City of Greenbelt William T. Lane, presently Detective Sergeant with the City of Takoma Park. Sergeant Lane has been a police officer 11 and one-half years with the City of Takoma Park and has held positions of command for the past 8 years. He has been with the city's Detective Bureau for the last 4 years, during the last 3 of which he has been the commanding officer of the Detective Bureau. He is the third ranking officer in this 22-man police force. During his employment with Takoma Park, Sergeant Lane has attended a wide variety of police schools including courses at Montgomery Junior College, the University of Maryland, and the University of Louisville. He is married and has one boy, 7 years old. He plans to move to Greenbelt as soon as possible.

Sergeant Lane will assume command of the Department on July 15.

City Notes

Last Friday, the General crew replaced one of the old nylon nets at the tennis courts with a new aluminum chain link net noted for its long life.

On Tuesday, the Public Works "Garden Club Crew" spent the day removing the pansies and respading the flower beds in the Center. Three beds of bright red (President) cannas and scarlet sage, four beds of red, white and plum petunias and one bed of Maryland's own black-eyed susans now add their color to the mall. Because of the recent high temperatures, the crew shaded the beds with snow fences to protect the new plants from the hot sun.

Many hours were spent during the recent hot spell watering the sod placed around the new Municipal building, in front of the bank, and on the islands around the new parking lot. Some of the grass is now turning green and prospects for survival are increasing. The new grass may be ready for cutting in a few days. The sod at the municipal building was installed as part of the contract.

Fireworks Prohibited

The sale and private use of all kinds of fireworks are prohibited by law in the State of Maryland. All violators will be prosecuted. Last year several serious injuries were caused by fireworks in the Washington area. Damage to the eyes and hands is often the unhappy result of using fireworks.

Five members of the staff of North End School have been reassigned to new positions by the Board of Education, and their familiar faces will not be seen when the school re-opens next fall.

Mrs. Maxine Cunningham will be the principal of the brand-new Buckingham Elementary School at Belair, Md. Mrs. Elois Miller, secretary, will work at Belair with Mrs. Cunningham in the office. GHI president Charles Schwan stated at last Thursday's regular GHI board meeting that GHI has agreed to share part of the cost of the city's hiring of an attorney and professional planner. The city is seeking modification of the master plan as proposed by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission. GHI, Schwan said, has a deep and direct interest in this master plan, since it calls, among other things, for most of the streets servicing GHI property to become four-lane highways.

Schwan said that since the city and GHI have parallel views on this, it has been the GHI board's position that it could accomplish more in cooperation with the city than by acting on its own. A common plan of action would avoid duplication of effort and would assure the most effective presentation at the hearings. Schwan denied that GHI was in "partnership" with the city or seeking any preferred treatment from the city.

Schwan reported that a master plan for Greenbelt is expected to be presented shortly by the city's Advisory Planning Board in cooperation with the planner. This plan will be considered by the city council, by GHI, and by other interested citizen groups as part of the "dialogue" that will take place to reach a common agreement.

When asked whether he had any indication that all this could take place before the scheduled meeting of July 21, Schwan was hopeful. Director Velma Chapman, who is also a member of the APB, said that a master plan will be submitted to council as soon as the board can hold a quorum.

Audit Committee Report

Chairman David Lange submitted the first report of the newly elected audit committee. The report recommended development of better communications between board and members through (1) an active member relations committee with grass root contacts and (2) quarterly or more frequent publication of the corporation's news letter. GHI manager Roy Brea-shears announced that a news letter will be coming out shortly and that an administrative assistant would soon be appointed, one of whose duties would be to get out frequent news letters.

Other Action

The board moved unanimously to publish only the actions of the board during executive sessions, plus any explanatory material needed. The move was taken to avoid a recurrence of disclosure of detailed executive session minutes which are intended to be confidential.

The board approved a motion by director Gerald Gough that a vigorous program of clean-up, paint-up, and fix-up of GHI properties be initiated. The matter was referred for action to the standards and improvements committee.

The board approved the request of Joe Schubert for a sheltered unit for wiring in order to engage in rehabilitative work, after receiving the approval of his neighbors.

The board is anxious to bring up to full strength the various committees: by-laws, land, maintenance, member relations, standards and improvements, and zoning. Members interested in serving are asked to contact Schwan or Brea-shears.

Through a special arrangement with Bankers Life, which is handling the employee's pension plan, GHI directors will continue to be able to participate in a group life insurance plan.

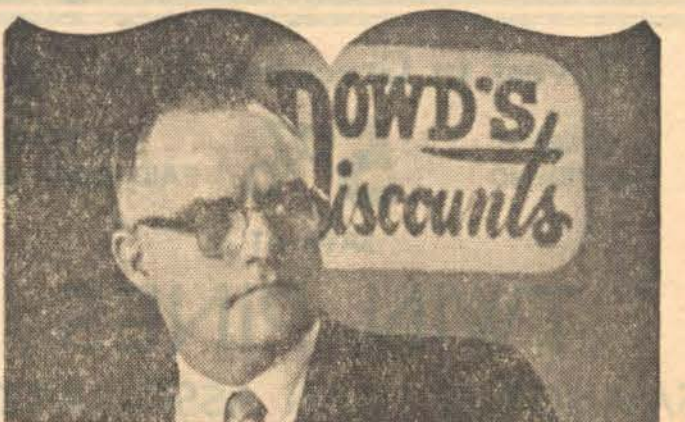
