Citizens Present Their Views At County Delegation Hearing

At a hearing held Wednesday, Feb. 24, in the state house in Annapolis, local associations and individuals expressed their views on zoning and planning to Prince Georges County's delegation to the Maryland Assembly and recommended legislation to alleviate some of the more pressing needs. Many of the points raised during the hearing reflected, directly or indirectly, conclusions drawn from the Jaeger zoning case.

Edward Conroy, who heads the county delegation, chaired the hearing which was held in the marbledecked assembly hall. Present were most of the delegates; Prince Georges Senator Fred Wineland; County Commissioner Gladys Spellman; William Stevens, chairman of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (MNC-PPC); and about 120 county residents. Among the Greenbelters present were Mayor Edgar Smith, Councilman David Champion, City Manager James Giese, and Simon Pristoop, representing the Prince Georges Citizens Planning Association.

Zoning by Courts Opposed

First to speak was Mrs. Gordon Hull, president of the League of Women Voters (LWV), on parkland needs in the county. She supported the proposed legislation to enable the MNCPPC to buy scenic easements on land without outright purchase (a bill to this end has since been introduced in the assembly). She also spoke in favor of laws which would require developers either to allocate part of their land to parks or, where this is impractical, to pay an equivalent amount for parkland development.

Mrs. Merwin Phelps (also representing the LWV), expressed the opinion that zoning is essentially a legislative process; therefore, she urged that the power of courts to reverse zoning decisions be, abolished. She also said that zoning changes, because of their importance, should require the approval of more than a simple majority of Phelps supported the demand that recommendations of the technical staff of MNCPPC go on record in zoning hearings, and that a zoning decision should be accompanied by a summary stating the exact reasons behind it (as is now being done by the board of zoning appeals).

Sworn Testimony in Zoning

The next speaker, Mayor William Gullett of College Park (introduced by Mayor Smith of Greenbelt), asked for legislation requiring cities to make recommendations on zoning within their boundaries, and requiring the commissioners to include these recommendations in the record of each zoning case. Gullett was followed by Walter H. Maloney of the Prince Georges County Civic Federation, whose long presentation reiterated many points previously raised and introduced some new ones, such as the demand that zoning testimony be given under oath (as is the practice in Baltimore County, among others), and that subpoenas be available for securing such testimony when needed. He also commented on conflict of interest in zoning cases and asked for the appointment of a "people's counsel" who would represent the interest of local residents and associations in rezonings.

Among other speakers was Mayor Smith, who reviewed the Jaeger case and asked for legislation to make municipalities eligible as "aggrieved parties" in any rezoning affecting land within their limits or a stated distance beyond them. carried the Jaeger case to the Maryland Court of Appeals, presented detailed arguments against the 1963 law which removed recommendations of the MNCPPC staff from the zoning record. He noted that, at present, the general public has virtually no way of learning the content of these recommendations.

Spellman Praises Avrutis

The arguments of the evening were summarized by the last speaker. County Commissioner Gladys N. Spellman who first reviewed the points raised by the preceding speakers; then voiced her reservations about some of them; and finally gave reasons for her support of the main proposals.

Speaking about the Jaeger case, Commissioner Spellman said: "Let me tell Mr. Avrutis something that hasn't been said before in the state assembly hall-I do love you. As far as the Jaeger case is concerned -oh, I feel sick about it. It is a terrible defeat in what should have been a victory. But who's responsible? You, the people . . . you were frightened . . . and pretty soon we ended with only one person who had the courage, and who lived miles away . . . And this is why I love Bill Avrutis. He had the courage."

The deadline for introduction of bills in the Maryland assembly was Tuesday, March 2. It is reported that a bill covering many of the points raised has been introduced, though not with the support of the entire delegation.

Council Denies Road Ordinance Waiver Further Discussion of Jaeger Tract

The City Council, at its meeting last Monday March 1, dealt briefly with a number of unrelated items on the agenda and adjourned at the early hour of 10:30 p.m.

specifies the construction of urban roads (32 feet wide, with curbs, gutters, and sidewalks), while Rozansky desired to construct a rural road instead (20 feet wide with side ditches). His reason was that the road (Ridge Road) adjacent to his apartment houses may eventually be relocated by the State Roads Commission (SRC), and the members of the council were inclined to sympathize with his predicament. After some discussion, however, his request was denied on the grounds that it will be a long time-at least six years-before the final road locations are chosen by the SRC. Rozansky was, however, urged to discuss the matter further with the City Manager to see whether some acceptable accommodation might perhaps be made.

Jaeger Tract

Further repercussions of the recent Jaeger tract decision were also discussed. Mayor Edgar Smith has arranged to meet United States Senators Brewster and Tydings to discuss the possible purchase of the 76-acre Jaeger tract by the federal government for inclusion in the Greenbelt Regional Park. The park surrounds the tract on three sides.

The city's recent appeal of the rezoning of the Jaeger tract for high-rise apartments was rejected by the Court of Appeals on the grounds that the city was not an "aggrieved party"; only individual property owners can be so considered. It is hoped that this situation will be changed in the future by a proposed amendment to Article 17 of the Code of Public Local Laws of Maryland, which would explicitly define the term "aggrieved party" as it relates to zoning action.

Mayor Smith described the proposed amendment, saying it would permit the City of Greenbelt, or even an "association of persons," to appeal to the circuit court any local zoning decision by the county commissioners sitting as the district council. The proposed amendment

Policeman Delivers Baby

Thomas Galifaro, 14-C Crescent, of the Greenbelt Police Department, delivered a baby girl on Thursday night, Feb. 25. Galifaro, who is also a member of the Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad, was at the firehouse when the emergency call came in. He responded immediately, and "just barely had time to put on the rubber gloves."

Galifaro has delivered three other babies in the past: two in Bethesda and one in Branchville. He was a hospital corpsman and dental technician in the navy.

The City Council voted to deny the request of Allen Rozansky, owner of the Lakeside North apartments, for a waiver of the city ordinance requirements for street construction. The ordinance was presented by city officials to the Maryland Municipal League and, in turn, after the League's adoption, to the Prince Georges County legislative delegation, where it received a "sympathetic response."

Traffic Light Review

City Manager James Glese reported to the council a communication from the State Roads Commission to the effect that no new traffic signal installations will be approved pending a statewide review of the payment arrangements for traffic signals, and the establishment of a uniform, statewide policy for the future. Several councilmen asked whether this meant that installation of a left-turn signal at the intersection of Kenilworth Avenue and Greenbelt Road (which has already been authorized) will be postponed. Giese was asked to look into the matter.

The city has received an unexpected bill for \$1,328 extra for the swimming pool renovation, because of an error by the engineering firm of Greenhorne and O'Mara. The specifications for the thickness of the concrete bottom of the pool were erroneously stated as six inches, rather than the true thickness, ten inches. The city noted this error some time ago, and so informed the engineering firm, which deleted all the errors but one, on the last page. When the subcontractor now at work on the pool discovered the mistake, he presented the additional bill. Council has referred the matter to the city solicitor.

UN Essay Contests

An essay contest is being held for students of the Greenbelt Junior High School to stimulate interest in and knowledge of the worldwide, day-to-day work of the United Nations. The Greenbelt Chapter of the American Association for United Nations is sponsorng the contest, and the prize-a two-day trip to New York-comes from the Twin Pines sale of UNICEF greeting cards and calendars.

Papers must be from 1,000 to 1,500 words long and cover the work of a UN Agency dealing with either (1) education (2) refugees (3) relief (4) economic development or 5) health. Papers must be turned in by March 19.

The winner will travel to New York May 1-2 with the Greenbelt Travel Club. The group will visit both the United Nations and the World's Fair.

topics as future housing plans and needs of individuals, adequacy of homes and parking facilities, and attitudes toward present GHI and government services, toward use of GHI vacant land and toward longrange financing of resales. Also asked will be questions on the extent to which members are interested in remodeling their homes and how much they are willing to invest for such purpose. With this information, the Committee feels it will be in a better position to recommend guidelines and policies on the future of the frame homes, use of vacant land, home improvements, beautification of grounds, and the scope of GHI operations in general.

Other Matters

The board received a recommendation from the Joint Maintenance and Improvements Committee that members be advised that heating pipes must be kept intact after removal of radiators, so that a new owner could replace radiators if so desired. Also recommended was that testing of new lines and systems for additions be done in the presence of GHI personnel.

Plans are going ahead for the construction of a boat and trailer park near the Administration Building. Sufficient members have indicated interest so that 1 lot (10 units) could be started. The yearly rent would be \$36.

The GHI board donated \$100 for the sponsorship of a Little League baseball team.

The Mayor and Council of Greenbelt, Maryland, have called a public hearing for Monday, March 8, 1965, at 8:00 P.M. to consider the proposed Master Plan for the City of Greenbelt and surrounding areas to be adopted by the City Council. This master plan will be the basis for the City of Greenbelt's recommendations to the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission and to the County Commissioners of Prince George's County concerning the zoning of property in Greenbelt and in the unincorporated area to the southeast of the city limits lying between Glenn Dale Road and Good Luck Road.

The proposed Greenbelt Master Plan was prepared by the consulting firm of Marcou, O'Leary and Associates working with the Greenbelt Advisory Planning Board. A public hearing was previously held concerning this proposed plan on July 20, 1964. Since that time the City Council has reviewed the plan with its consultants, and a number of changes to the plan were tentatively approved. Also, the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission has adopted its Master Plan for Planning Area 13 N - Greenbelt, College Park and Vicinity.

Copies of the tentatively approved Greenbelt Master Plan, together with a comparative map showing the master plan adopted by the Park and Planning Commission, are on display in the upstairs lobby of the Greenbelt Municipal Building and may be examined at any time.

Two different zoning hearings are coming up in the next week one in Greenbelt and one in Hyattsville.

The Greenbelt city council will hold a public meeting next Monday to consider formal adoption of the Greenbelt Master plan.

A map comparing Greenbelt's tentatively-approved plan with the Area 13 Master Plan is on display in the Municipal Building lobby. (See map on page 8).

This will be the first opportunity for Greenbelt residents to publicly discuss and comment on the plan.

It is not expected that the County Commissioners will hold any public hearings on their master plan. However, the District Council will hold hearings Friday, March 12, at the County Service Building in Hyattsville, to hear 25 petitions for rezoning land east of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway.

Individual residents of Greenbelt are urged to attend and to testify at the hearings. The latest Maryland court decisions have raised serious doubt as to the extent that the city of Greenbelt can represent its own citizens as aggrieved parties.

Wonder of Wonders

Public meetings are more often endured than enjoyed: all too often, speakers stray off their subjects into dull monologues that prolong the expected closing hour.

It is therefore a great pleasure to point to an exception. The hearing conducted by the county's delegation to the Maryland State Assembly on Feb. 24 (described elsewhere in this issue) was one of the best ever held in this area. There wasn't a dull moment all evening; presentations were concise and informative; speakers all remained within the bounds of their subject, time available, and-wonder-of-wonders-even taste. The chairman, Delegate Edward Conroy, conducted the meeting with an experienced hand and, judging from their questions, he and the rest of the delegates enjoyed the evening as much as the citizens.

Renew License Tags Early

It's "that time of year" againfor auto license tags, at least-and time to apply for your 1965 plates if you wish to avoid the lastminute rush, the American Automobile Association reminds Maryland residents.

The new license plates will be gold with black letters, and will cost Maryland car owners \$15 for cars weighing 3,700 pounds or less; or, \$23 for cars weighing over 3,700 pounds. Present Maryland tags expire at midnight, March 31, but new tags may be displayed anytime. after March 1,

Applications for license plate renewals must be accompanied by Form UCJ-1A, showing proof that the car owner carries public liability insurance. This form is usually mailed to the policyholder by his insurance company, or it can be obtained on request. Failure to file Form UCJ-1A means that the applicant must pay a \$70 uninsured motorists' fee, which does not provide the applicant with any form of insurance.

Renewal applications are mailed to residents previously registered in Maryland; however, the AAA advises motorists who do not receive their renewal applications prior to March 15 to contact the Department of Motor Vehicles immediately. Applications for registration should be mailed to: Department of Motor Vehicles, 6601 Ritchie Highway, N.E., Glen Burnie, Maryland. Or, contact the nearest AAA office.
