# **GHI** Approves Zoning Applications; **Debates Criteria For Townhouses**

With two directors absent because of illness, the board of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., chaired by Ed Burgoon, heard the reports of two committees at its regular meeting Thursday night. Leo Gerton and George Phibbs of the Zoning Committee gave evaluations of 15 present rezoning petitions in the Greenbelt area, recommending against a few which depart widely from the city's master plan. Most of the others, which conformed to both the city's and the MNCPPC's recommendations, were considered acceptable. Director Gerald Gough presented a special committee's suggestions for criteria by which the proposed new GHI homes should be allocated to members.

Two petitions for rezoning of parcels near the apartments at the Center were rejected, on the grounds that they would create too high a density in the heart of Greenbelt. Another, for high-rise rezoning in Springhill Lake, had been withdrawn without prejudice before the committee had considered it. Two other petitions for rezoning about 4½ acres in Springhill Lake were considered acceptable by the committee.

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The remaining ten petitions, all immediately outside Greenbelt and located for the most part on Greenbelt Road, were considered as a group by the committee and found to be reasonably acceptable; in this respect the committee's views coincided with the MNCPPC's recommendations.

### Criteria for Applicants

Gough's special committee submitted several criteria for choosing applicants for the proposed new GHI freestanding homes and townhouses. Most of these, such as financial soundness, family size, and contributions to the community, were received well by board members. Objections were raised, however, by director John O'Reilly, to the suggestion of a lottery to determine the final successful applicants, although Gough has explained that its aim was to ensure completely impartial choice. O'Reilly also objected to length of residence as a criterion, and Gough replied that the purpose was to provide a minimum time in which to evaluate a member. Sam Cornelius expressed the view from the floor that a few of these criteria, such as "contributions to the community," were essentially value judgments-i.e. were not objective and should be replaced by more factual yardsticks.

The board passed a motion by O'Reilly directing management to send letters to the membership outlining the possible criteria that might be used, specifying membership in GHI, financial soundness, family size, and contributions to the community and GHI.

5% compared to 5%%. O'Reilly remarked that he felt more liberal refinancing was indeed needed, though one didn't want to go too far as that would encourage inflation. He thought prices being obtained at present by members were somewhat low. Director Burgoon felt, however, that this made for stability - members weren't "pricing themselves out of the market.'

### Nursery School

Mrs. Bernice Kastner, appearing for the Long-Range Planning committee of the Greenbelt Nursery School, described the school's steadily increasing enrollment (70 applications have already been received for next year) and the consequent need for more space. It is hoped that negotiations may be worked out for expansion in the present location. The committee is also looking at other alternatives; one of these is a unit of the medical building at Ridge Road and Gardenway. Board members tentatively discussed among themselves the questions of zoning and the playground space that would be required, but no definite agreement was reached.

# **CFPG Seeks Meeting** With Commissioners

The Committee For A Planned Greenbelt (CFPG) is seeking an audience with the County Commissioners for an exchange of views, a look at their side of the problem, and a chance to see if the committee and the commissioners have the same basic facts and are working from the same assumptions.

Negotiations for such a meeting are still going on.

Commissioner Gladys Spellman did meet Sunday with Mayor Edgar L. Smith, Francis White, Al Herling, Al Douglas, Al Skolnik, and Lloyd Moore for a general discussion of the problems posed by Master Plan 13 North. The meeting did not deal with specific problems.

Commissioner M. Bayne Brooke indicated his willingness to meet with the committee if a satisfactory time could be arranged.

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# Pool Renovation Work on Schedule

The renovation of the Greenbelt swimming pool is proceeding on schedule, according to Ron Dick, assistant to the city manager. The main pool is practically finished, with the exception of the tile border around the rim, which is being installed this week. Plumbers are at work completing the exterior plumbing, which regulates the pool's outflow system.

The new diving tank has been excavated, and workmen are constructing forms for the footings and side walls, in preparation for the pouring of concrete.

Bathhouse Improvements

Also undergoing renovation are the bathhouses, the brick portions of which have already been sandblasted. The brick was painted white for a number of years. It will not be repainted; instead, a coat of transparent sealer will be applied.
