Citizens For A Planned Greenbelt Organize Citywide Membership Drive

Plans for a city-wide membership drive, designed to get all of Greenbelt activity involved in the Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt, were announced at a meeting of the CFPG steering committee Tuesday night. The drive will get underway May 1.

Charles F. Schwan Jr., chairman of the membership committee, outlined preliminary plans for a doorto-door solicitation. Those desiring to jump the gun may mail their contribution to P.O. Box 128, Greenbelt, and a membership card will be sent them by return mail.

Each Greenbelt family will be asked to contribute \$1 to finance CFPG activities.

Those activities were set forth last Thursday by CFPG Chairman Lloyd Moore in a letter to each of the five County Commissioners.

Seek Meetings Moore asked an audience with the County Commissioners for an exchange of views about general plans for the future growth and development of Greenbelt. No specific zoning cases would be discussed. He asked specifically for the Commissioners to meet with 6 or 7 members of CFPG's Steering Committee, and further asked that the County Comissioners set suitable times and places for the meet-

Moore told the Commissioners that the goals of CFPG are "to preserve the fundamental character of Greenbelt as a low-density, planned residential community and to insure that its future growth and development are in accord with the sentiments of more than 1,000 Greenbelters who appeared at the preliminary hearing on Master Plan 13 North last July, the official goals of the City of Greenbelt, and the Greenbelt Mas-

CFPG's program of activity, Moore told the commissioners, includes maintaining constant contact with, and soliciting the support of, elected and appointed officials in the county, state and federal governments, providing citizen representation at all hearings affecting the development of Greenbelt, and taking legal action when required.

Moore said he was asking for the meeting with the Commissioners in accordance with that program of activity and also with "the right to petition elected representatives for redress of grievances." Public Invited

The Steering Committee, in another move to achieve the widest possible community participation in CFPG affairs, also renewed its invitation to the public to attend its meetings.

GHI Annual Membership **Meeting and Elections**

Five positions on the 9-man Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors will be filled at the election to be held in conjunction with the GHI annual membership meeting, Wednesday and Thursday, May 19 and 20. The meeting on Wednesday night will be held at the Center School, starting at 8 p.m. Balloting will begin that night and resume the next day. Terms of office are for two years. A 3-man audit committee will also be elected for 1-year terms.

The incumbents on the board terms expire this year are GHI president Charles Schwan. treasurer John O'Reilly, and directors Gerald Gough, Mrs. Velma Chapman, and Norman Weyel.

At the organizational meeting of the GHI Nominations and Elections Committee, George Adams, 46-D Ridge, was elected chairman. Other members of the committee are Andrew Feeney, 14-A Ridge; J. Walsh Barcus, 2-T Gardenway; Thomas White, 21-E Ridge; and Richard Gramm, 21-H Ridge. The last two were named to fill vacancies on the committee created by the resignation of Bruce Melvin and Gerald Boisvert.

GHI members interested in running for the Board or Audit Committee are asked to contact any member of the Nominations Committee or the GHI office to pick up a Candidate's Consent Form. These forms should be completed as soon as possible and must be returned to the committee by Saturday, May 8, accompanied by a short biographical sketch of 200 words or less, outlining education, experience, family background, and any other pertinent information.

Community Relations **Board Begins Study**

The Community Relations Advisory Board announced after its first meeting that its first concern will be to find out what other communities in the county have done in this area. At its next meeting on Sunday, April 25, at 8:30 p.m. it will invite leaders of the different groups in town concerned with real estate matters. The Board stressed that it is an advisory, not an action group.

City Battles Bresler on 2 Fronts; Sets Spring Clean-up for May 3-17

Another confrontation is looming between the city council and the local developer, Charles Bresler and associates. At last Monday's council meeting, it was disclosed that a subdivision plat for section 2 of Charlestowne Village was filed with Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission (MNCPPC). This plat calls for 260 units in excess of the number agreed upon in the covenant entered into between the city and Bresler at the time the land was rezoned.

According to the city's interpretation, the covenant restricts the density of the 50-acre tract to 7 units per acre or a total of 350 units. (Actually this number is high, since the acreage was recently reduced by a 4-acre parcel rezoned for a nursing home.) Section 1 of Charlestowne Village now being constructed consists of 120 units, to which Bresler plans to add another 490 units.

The MNCPPC has approved the subdivision plat, since it only looks at the zoning of the land and does not take into consideration private agreements between municipalities

and developers.

The city council reacted immediately to the news, instructing its city manager and city solicitor to take all the legal measures necessary to prevent the developer from building according to the plat filed with MNCPPC.

The council was also disturbed that Bresler failed to notify the city of his plans, as required according to the covenant. Instead, the city only learned about the subdivision plat when MNCPPC notified it that the plat was approved.

The council approved a motion requesting that MNCPPC notify the city immediately when a subdivision plat is filed so that the city would have an opportunity to bring to the attention of MNCPPC any relevent facts.

Court Suit

The city and Bresler will also be at odds this week when the suit filed by the city against Ivy Homes, Inc. and Boxwood Village, Inc. comes before the circuit court. At issue is the rain water runoff from the latter properties onto Empire Place in the Lakewood development. The city contends that the developers by rough-grading the land and removing trees, shrubs and grass has produced excessive rain water running off Boxwood Village properties into Empire Place. The developer had been repeatedly asked to rectify the situation but to no avail.

Triangle Hearing Friday

The vital "Golden Triangle" -- the 57- acre tract bounded by Capital Beltway, Kenilworth Ave., and Greenbelt rd. will be the subject of a public hearing before the county commissioners tomorrow, April 23, at 10 a.m. The hearing will be at the County Service Building in Hyattsville.

Individual residents of Greenbelt are invited to attend and to testify at the hearings. The latest Maryland court decisions have raised some doubt as to the extent that the city of Greenbelt can represent its own citizens as aggrieved members.

The owner of the land, Milton E. R-55 for single-family homes. Selig, has filed a petition for a C-2 zoning for a regional shopping cen-

The Greenbelt Master Plan has recommended that the land be retained as low-density residential until such time as adequate traffic controls can be designed. The property lacks accessibility because Kenilworth and the Beltway are restricted access highways.

The Area 13 Master Plan calls for the western half of the Golden Triangle to be zoned C-O-P (Commercial-office-park) and the eastern half to be retained as ruralresidential. There is, however, no official zoning category as C-O-P yet.

Both plans consider the area suitable for institutional uses or an office park development, if the applicable zoning classifications are adopted.

This is the second time that the 57-acre parcel has been up for rezoning. In February 1962, a similar petition for a C-2 zoning was filed. On the motion of county commissioner Frank Lastner, the petition was unanimously rejected and instead, the triangle was approved for R-55 (single-family) residential zoning.

Spring Improvements

In keeping with the spring season, the city council approved a series of housecleaning and improvement projects. By a 4 to 1 vote, it authorized \$800 for purchase of plans renovating the Center Mall. Councilman Lewis Bernstein objected on the grounds that priority should be given to determining how the renovation project, which could run into thousands of dollars, would be financed.

It approved the construction of an additional wall at the west end of the Municipal Building to screen the air conditioning equipment (\$100), and a plan for illuminating by floodlights the entire front of the building (\$255).

Also appropriated was \$2,000 to pay for appraisal of vacant land in the vicinity of Greenbelt Lake for purposes of considering acquisition. Another \$115 was approved for purchase of a fingerprint cabinet for the police department.

Let's Fight For Greenbelt To the Editor:

In his letter on the new Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt organization Mr. Charles McDonald complains that he is a little out of tune with the new group. I find myself a trifle out of tune with Mr. Mc-Donald's views.

First, he objected to a "belligerent attitude" that prevailed at the meeting toward the revised Area 13 plan. I noticed intelligent, forthright, and articulate concern over the Commission's arbitrary presentation of its new plan and a firm determination that Greenbelt remain a planned community. Any "belligerent attitude" was only that appropriate to the occasion.

Second, Mr. McDonald objects to criticism of the revised plan because it is presented by a taxsupported, legally constituted authority. Is it the American tradition never to question a legally constituted authority? Since when does a commission's being tax-supported lift it above scrutiny? Citizens have the right to petition for redress of grievances and to make their views known to the County Commissioners who in turn are legally obliged to pass on the work of the Commission.

Third, he feels that we must not criticize the Commission but must approach them with smiles, kindness, and-it is implied-praise for their efforts. While I do not question the need for the honeyed phrase from time to time, if the past is prologue in zoning matters the only hope a community has lies in making its views known loudly, clearly, continually, and Takoma Park residents are getting further consideration in the location of the Northwest Freeway because they picketed, had mass meetings, wrote letters, made speeches, and were heardnot because they passed a resolution commending Mr. Funk for giving much thought to destroying their community.

Greenbelt is not just a plain, ordinary town. In another hundred years it will be a national monument, and losing it to four-lane highways created by greenbackcentered, fast buck zoning will be a loss to many more people than the few of us who presently live here. If we are to keep Greenbelt we have to fight for it, loudly, clearly, and aggressively now, and later at the polls.

Interior Dept. Lists Jaeger Tract Moves

The following letter to William J. Avrutis was released for publication by the Department of Interior.

April 12, 1967 Secretary Udall requested that we reply to your letter of March 10, and express his appreciation for your continuing interest in the protection of Greenbelt Park.

We are uncertain as to our next move in this matter. The existing situation is clearly deleterious to the public interest in Greenbelt Park, but our present authorization and jurisdiction in the area do not seem to offer a suitable means of correcting the problem. From the standpoint of developing Greenbelt Park as a unified and workable park, the following (in order of desirability) are possible solutions to the problem:

1. Purchase of the Jaeger tract by the United States for addition to Greenbelt Park. This would require time-consuming legislation, and, based on present zoning, would probably prove to be too expensive to justify. (Similarly, considering the cost involved and the limited benefits that would be gained, scenic easements are probably not feasible.)

2. Acquisition of the tract by the United States through the trade of other United States property at another location. This would also require authorizing legislation.

3. Work out with the tract owner as compatible a site design as is possible under the existing conditions and negotiate a land trade at the site (i.e., give a piece of Greenbelt Park and receive a piece of the Jaeger tract) that would reduce to a minimum the undesirable impact of the high-rise, highdensity development, and that would minimize the physical intrusion of the developed area with the

We will continue to explore these and any other possible avenues of solution to this problem. In this connection, we will also consider possible action towards acquisition of the eight acre tract on Good Luck Road.

Thank you for your interest in this and for all your efforts on the public's behalf.
