

Special Awards

The most coveted honor, Fireman of the year, awarded to the man chosen most valuable in 1965, went to Victor Fisher. Mike Dutton was honored for having made the greatest number of both fire and ambulance calls in 1965 - 196 out of 347 fire calls and 145 out of 341 ambulance calls. Dutton left for the Army Monday, to the loss of the Department. The runner-up trophy went to Kenny Stair. In recognition of his long years of devoted service, a Life Membership in the Department was presented to J. Paul Williams. This is the highest type of membership in the Department and is awarded only to an active member in good standing by vote of the entire Department.

Other Awards

Other awards presented included tie pins to those attending the most fire calls: R. Dutton, F. Beguette, J. P. Williams, J. Hunt; tie pins for attending the most ambulance calls: R. Bragonje, B. Olson, G. Clinedinst, Jr., R. Kerr. J. O'Loughlin received a pin for his services as past-president. Five-year service stars went to J. Fuston, R. Bragonje; ten-year service stars went to V. Fisher, J. Reynolds, H. Wynkoop; 15-year service stars (starting with other companies), to J. McLaughlin and Paul Reamy.



The ingredients of the proposal put forward by Bresler on March 1 remain unchanged. The developer would make the Beltway-Lake site available for a senior high school provided the city supported R-30 (apartment) zoning in parcels 1 and 2, picked up the tab for 5 acres of open space at the Beltway-Lake site, and donated the 5-acre city sanitary landfill site for other school use.

In addition, Greenbelt Homes, Inc., would be asked to make available 10 acres of GHI-owned land for an elementary school site. Bresler also would extend to the city an option to purchase 15 acres on parcels 11 and 12 north of Greenbelt Lake for parkland.

GHI officials have indicated no disposition to participate in the proposal, since their major concern is to keep the density of parcels 1 and 2 to a level something below R-30 zoning.

The council asked the city's Advisory Planning Board to review the city's land use plan for parcels 1 and 2, considering the proposed school complex, open space needs, and density. Councilman David Champion proposed this step in anticipation of zoning applications that Bresler is expected to file as soon as the school site question is settled.

In view of the impasse, Mrs. Hedy Anderson of Gardenway, inquired whether the school board had considered any sites other than the Beltway-Lake site and the Parcel 2 site. She suggested that the school board investigate some of the government-owned land in the area.

The Police Blotter

Two cases of accidental poisoning were reported recently. An 18 month old boy swallowed 50 baby aspirins. In the other case a young man at a dinner jokingly grabbed a glass off the bar thinking it was someone else's drink; he took a swallow of sanitizing solution. Both young men survived.

Chief Lane urges all parents to warn their children against accepting rides with strangers and asks that youngsters take down the license number of anyone attempting to pick them up. Several attempted pick-ups were made this week, fortunately with no ill results. A 63 year old man was apprehended when a crossing guard at Greenbelt J.H.S. noticed him picking up a neighborhood boy. A call to the boy's parents revealed that he had been driven home without harm. Several girls have reported attempted pick - ups by people asking for directions. Two recent pick-up attempts have also involved attempted or actual indecent exposure within the past week on Northway and Woodland Way. Two stolen cars were recovered this week. One was used for joy riding. The other car, along with the thief, was recovered by Officer Paul Reamy. Reamy noticed the unauthorized driver having trouble with the car some distance from where the car was normally parked. Knowing that the driver had a past record of stealing cars, he asked for registration papers which were not produced.

Council Studies Problem Of Springhill Lake Traffic

The problem of traffic circulation at the Springhill Lake development occupied a major part of council's attention at its Monday, March 7, regular meeting. Residents of Springhill Lake, led by Robert Foley and Zalman Altschuler, complained that it took 25-30 minutes to get out of the development during morning rush hours. They also expressed concern about police and fire safety since there was only one exit and entrance to the project.

City manager James Giese outlined the steps the city is taking to ease the traffic flow. Negotiations are now under way, he said, to provide additional exits and entrances and he is optimistic that they will bear fruit by the summer. The proposed new roads would exit adjacent to the Beltway Plaza. Meetings have been held with the owners of Springhill Lake, and officials of the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission and the State Roads Commission.

Foley and Altschuler suggested that, in the interim, the city should take steps to speed the flow of morning traffic from the development on to Greenbelt Road. Foley suggested assignment of a police officer during rush hours to let the traffic run continuously through several lights. Altschuler suggested a recycling of traffic lights so as to provide longer green light time during the morning rush hours.

City Notes

Two personnel changes have taken place on the municipal administrative staff within the last two weeks. Newly hired as parttime assistant to City Manager James K. Giese is Michael Fischetti, a graduate student in the Dept. of Government and Politics at the U. of Md. A native of New York, Fischetti served in the U.S. Army for three years. He is a graduate of the Columbian Preparatory School in Washington and of the U. of Md. He is single. Fischetti will spend more than half time on his city responsibilities, increasing that load later as he completes his graduate program.

The other change in personnel came about with the resignation, effective Feb. 25, of Mrs. Margaret Perdue, clerk receptionist at the police desk. She resigned to take other employment. Currently her position is being filled by Mrs. Pauline Bordas, who has worked previously as relief dispatcher.

A vacation in balmy Hawaii was the pleasant experience of Greenbelt's city manager. Between Feb. 11 - 28, Giese visited his brother and several distant relatives who reside there.

and Dick Pilski explained that the city is somewhat limited in what it can do. The lights are under SRC jurisdiction and major responsibility rests with the developer to construct the roads.

At Giese's suggestion, council approved a motion requesting MNCPPC to make a traffic study of the total needs for streets, within Springhill Lake. At present Glese said, there is much confusion. He noted that pending before MNC-PPC is a subdivision plan for Springhill Lake on the northerm side of the Capital Beltway which provides for no public roads whatever.

Giese also cited the difference of opinion surrounding the need for a bridge across the Beltway connecting Springhill Lake with the rest of Greenbelt. The SRC has recently withdrawn money from next year's budget for this item.

GHI Parking

Introduced for first reading was an ordinance repealing the authority of the city to assign parking spaces in GHI courts. The city had received an opinion from its solicitor Thomas Brooks to the effect that city assignment of parking amounts to diverting public property for private use.

According to Brooks, the question of whether the GHI courts are public or private property is fairly debatable. In either event, however, it was his opinion that the city lacks authority to assign parking spaces. If the service courts are the private property of GHI, then the city lacks jurisdiction and if the service courts are public property, then the city is using its powers to promote a private purpose.

Delinquent Accounts

Also introduced for first reading was an ordinance providing for delinquent charges in connection with refuse collection. A penalty of \$1 for accounts remaining unpaid 30 days after submission of bills and discontinuance of service after 60 days delinquency are provided for.

Upon Pilski's motion, the council voted to open council meetings with the pledge of allegiance to the American flag. Pilski also suggested including a prayer in the opening ceremonies. This will be considered at the next council meeting.

Giese introduced to the council his new administrative aide, Michael Fischetti. Fischetti, a native of Brooklyn, is a recent graduate of the University of Maryland and is now attending the graduate school of government and public administration.


8 p.m. to hear Coach Sabin speak on the prospects of the Maryland team for the coming season.


LITTLE LEAGUERS by Jerry Shafer





DAV Launches Nationwide Bumper Sticker Campaign Backing Viet Nam Fighting Men

The DAV's campaign supporting servicemen in Viet Nam is the first of any large national veterans' organizations, and is aimed with a two-pronged approach to answer the protesters of the Viet Nam Conflict.

The bumper stickers on the cars will prove to American fighting men that the people at home do support their action

Commenting on the campaign's purpose, DAV National Commander Claude L. Callegary pointed out: "We don't disagree with the right to protest, but we violently disagree with the ideas behind the protests."

A letter from Commander Callegary explains the DAV program:

"Somewhere in the hot grass battlefield of Viet Nam, a combat-weary young man looks home to America . . . and wonders if anyone cares.

"Today, this brave young man needs your loyal moral support of the patriotic contribution he is making to preserve freedom in Asia . . . and throughout the entire world. Tomorrow, this same young man may need the help and support of

of the Disabled American Veterans, a non-profit organization chartered by Act of Congress to serve all wartime disabled veterans.

"This is why DAV believes it is every American's responsibility to show our fighting men in Viet Nam that somebody does indeed care. We hope you will join us in this belief.
