FDA TO ERECT LABORATORIES, ONE A HIGH-RISE, IN BELTSVILLE

Another high-rise building will be erected in the vicinity of Greenbelt. The Food and Drug Administration has recently received approval from the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission for a three-building laboratory complex at the northern edge of the federal Agricultural Research Center in Beltsville.

The application is now being considered by the National Capital Regional Planning Council. Envisioned are a two-story laboratory, to cost \$4,000,000; a four-story laboratory estimated at \$10,000,000; and a seven-story, \$16,000,000 laboratory. Work on the smaller building is expected to begin in October. The largest of the three buildings will probably be constructed next year. No construction dates have yet been named for the four-story structure.

This newly announced seven-story building will bring to a total of three the projected high-rise buildings in this area. Already underway is the large apartment building in Charlestowne Village, at the bay end of Greenbelt Lake. Described by its developer, Charles Bresler, as an eight-story building, it actually appears to be nine stories high. New clearing activity on the Jaeger tract off Kenilworth Ave. adjacent to Greenbelt Park indicates that construction on a projected high-rise apartment building there may also begin soon.

The location of the new FDA research facilities will be just north of Beltsville, between Odell and Muirkirk Rds., where a small laboratory is already situated. An estimated 1800 persons, mostly chemists, pathologists, veterinarians, and administrative staff, would be employed there. The new buildings would house scientific equipment used in studies on new food and drugs sold throughout the United States.

These buildings would be grouped at one end of the 194-acre tract chosen for the new laboratories. Terrain features will keep the seven-story building hidden, according to Charles Lasham, Director of General Services for the FDA. In addition a buffer of trees will surround most of the acreage. The remainder of the land not used for the laboratories will be occupied by a research farm for veterinary medicine. Here large animals, as well as the usual types of smaller laboratory animals, will be kept. At present, FDA laboratories occupy a converted dormitory at 501 1st St., S. E., in Washington. These quarters are termed inadequate.

New Facilities Planned For Pr. Georges Hospital

A major \$6.5 million expansion of Prince George's General Hospital was contracted for by the County Commissioners today. The contract will provide 200 additional medical and surgical beds, 50 pediatric beds, and 50 psychiatric beds. In addition, new laboratory facilities, x-ray, physical therapy, nuclear medicine, and other diagnostic facilities will be available to both inpatients and outpatients. New and modern morgue facilities will also be provided.

New Emergency Room facilities will be located on the third level adjacent to clinic facilities for outpatient services, making this entire area available in case of disaster. The new emergency room is being equipped with x-ray facilities in order to expedite diagnosis and treatment of accident patients. This expansion will bring the hospital to a capacity of 600 beds and provide most modern facilities for the community.

The 50-bed psychiatric section will be one of the component parts of a community mental health center for Prince George's County and will be operated in conjunction with the Prince George's County Health Department.

County Commissioner Gladys N. Spellman, who is also chairman of the Hospital Board, expressed the pride of the Commissioners "in the vastly improved quality" of services at the County Hospital to the point "where Prince Georges General was commended nationally several times in the past year."

Meade Awarded Citation For Superior Performance

Seibert D. "Blacky" Meade, of 19-H Hillside Road, has been cited by the Department of Army "for sustained, superior performance as general engineer." He received a similar citation in 1960.

Awarded by Lt. Gen. William F. Cassidy, U. S. Army chief of engineers, the citation stated:

"He has consistently shown superior competence in the development and administration of architect-engineer contracting policies and procedures. His efforts have contributed significantly to the successful completion of the mission of this division and reflect great credit on himself, the Corps of Engineers, and the Department of Army."

Meade has been associated with the corps for the past 26½ years. He is a 1935 graduate of Emory-Henry College. He is a member of Birmingham Lodge 188 and financial secretary of Mowatt Methodist Church in Greenbelt.

Council Reinstates Rights Statement Chides Community Relations Board

City Council, in a regular meeting on Monday, August 8, unanimously preferred its original statement on the private rights of individuals over a statement drawn up by the Community Relations Advisory Board. Council also took under advisement the Advisory Planning Board's recommendation to find the Board of Education's Plat Plan for the school complex unacceptable for lack of public roads.

Council's statement, as published in the July 12 News Review, is as follows:

"The city's position is that any person engaging in his constitutional rights of freedom of speech, expression, or other rights given to our citizens will be entitled to equal protection by our Police Department as all of our citizens are entitled to. I would like to request at this time if any person knows of any instance where this protection has not been received, and we hope that if there is any denial of this protection in the future, that it will be brought to our attention."

The statement by the Community Relations Advisory Board (CRAB), which council rejected reads: "The Mayor and City Council wish to remind the residents of Greenbelt that all citizens have the right to peaceful demonstrations that are conducted within the framework of the law; and, as always, anyone violating the rights of these citizens will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law."

Councilman Francis White objected to the phrase "full extent of the law," noting that council has no power to prosecute. White considered Council's earlier statement as "more realistic and covering the situation more fully." Councilman Bill Hoff preferred the specific list of rights in council's version, say the CRAB statement doesn't go far enough. He also noted the necessity of getting citizens to report to council any violations, if this statement were to have any real effect.

Stern Action

A second report from the Community Relations Advisory Board brought a stern reaction from council, who determined to take no

action before meeting with the board members. The report apparently had been leaked to the metropolitan press before being presented to council. An advisory board would normally present its report first to council, with council then accepting the report to be placed on the agenda for the next regular meeting for public discussion and/or action at that time. This formality was bypassed in this case, for the contents of the report that was presented to Council on Aug. 8 had appeared in the Evening Star of July 27, as follows:

"The Greenbelt Community Relations Advisory Board voted unanimously last Sunday to recommend that the Mayor and Council enact a fair housing law regulating apartments and properties handled through realtors."

Councilman Dick Pilski further pointed out that an advisory board normally discusses and acts only upon those subjects given to it by council. "And since he could not recall council's giving this subject to the Board, 'where,' he wanted to know, 'did they get the authority to take it up?'" Councilman David Champion wanted to make clear that he did not participate in setting up the board for that purpose (fair housing legislation) and that the board had wandered too far afield.

APB Reports

The Advisory Planning Board submitted two reports to council, both concerned with new roads. Report No. 65 finds unacceptable the School Board's plat plan for its three-school complex between Ridge Rd., and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. The plat plan shows no dedicated roads. According to APB Chairman, Ed Wuermser, if the school board expected to have public roads, those roads would appear on the plats. As it is, only the division of the parcel between the three schools is shown. There is no perimeter road and no alternate means for school traffic to exit in a direct manner out of town. For example, the high school and elementary school apparently would exit onto the sanitary landfill road (Northway extended) and travel the length of Northway to Crescent Rd. (at St. Hugh's school). The junior high school would apparently exit onto Hamilton Pl. behind the GHI offices, and travel to Ridge Rd., turn left, follow Ridge to Southway and out to Greenbelt Rd. In both cases, the school traffic would travel long distances along residential streets.

The Planning Board suggested a short, easy access to Ridge would be created by an extension of Eastway between the 42 and 44 courts of Ridge, through Greenbelt Homes, Inc., property, into Board of Education land to service all three schools. Wuermser stated that Eastway is wide enough to handle the traffic, and, if necessary, the right-of-way is wide enough for Eastway to be made four lanes. Traffic could then flow down Eastway to Crescent and out to Kenilworth.

Greenbelt Homes President, Charles Schwan asked whether Wuermser could attend the GHI Board meeting tonight (Thursday), as the entire question of public roads and traffic flow in this area greatly affects GHI. Council agreed and suggested that City Manager Jim Giese also attend. Schwan stated he was sure the GHI Board would want to comment on the plat plans, which are currently under consideration by the Maryland-National Capital Parks and Planning Commission. The Commission had forwarded a copy of the plans to the city for its comments.

The second APB report, No. 66, recommends location of the perimeter road along the western (Cont. on page 4, col. 1)

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Defender For Planning

An editorial in *The Washington Post* on August 8 praises a proposal by David Scull, Republican candidate for Montgomery County Council. As the *Post* puts it, Scull

notes that developers often reap substantial profits out of zoning changes in violation of master plans. Because the potential gains are enormous, they hire the most competent zoning talent to prepare their assault upon the master plan. Individual homeowners and civic associations who oppose such ventures find the dice loaded against them from the beginning.

The same situation infects Prince Georges County as well. Indeed, local experience has shown that not only can homeowners and citizens' associations be overwhelmed by such resources of financial and legal power, but even a municipal government struggling to sustain its master plan.

As a corrective, Mr. Scull proposes a new county official—"a public defender for master plans." By inference he is to be an able lawyer and to have at his disposal both the time and financial resources to fight for the preservation of master plans when—in the phraseology of the *Post*—"they are assailed by private interests seeking to make a fortune by breaking them."

Although details of the proposal would need careful study and its success would depend on the quality of the man selected by the appointive body, nevertheless the proposal illuminates an area of growing concern. It is self-evident that the desires of a community, as reflected in plans for orderly development, need all the bolstering they can get.

"Political Forum"

Twin Pines Savings and Loan Association has offered one of its show windows as a political forum during the current campaign. All candidates and parties are invited to submit posters, pictures, and platforms.

An excellent idea, and far better than the display of campaign posters on utility poles along the highway, which is not only unsightly but unlawful. Posting such signs in Greenbelt violates the city's littering ordinance and some have already been removed.

As the heat of summer and political tempers continue to rise, let's hope the politicians leave their campaign trail clean.

City Notes

Judge Roscoe B. Parker took under advisement developer Charles Bresler's motion for summary judgment dismissing the city's suit against Bresler for allegedly violating the covenants on the Charlestowne Village tract and dedication of parkland to the city. Following the Circuit Court hearing in Upper Marlboro last Monday Judge Parker requested from city solicitor Thomas R. Brooks by the end of this week a written argument presenting the city's case. Judge Parker indicated at the hearing that if, after studying the evidence, he rules against the summary judgment, he will set an early date for hearing the merits of the case because of the present rapid progress on the high-rise apartment building on the Charlestowne site. (The city has requested an injunction against construction of the building.)

The city has been informed that Bresler has withdrawn his request for a special exception to build a hospital on Crescent Rd. near the lake. In the withdrawal motion, he noted the city's condemnation suit against the property for purchase to extend the lake park.

The city is preparing to file its

objections to a petition of landowners of parcels 8, 9 and 10 for abandonment of roads within their properties. In the meantime, signs have been erected by the owners in the middle of old Crescent Rd. (where it deadends by the lake) and at the intersection of old and new Ridge roads (by Lakeside North Apts.) indicating that such a petition has been filed. The city has until August 23 to prepare its answer.

 boundary of Springhill Lake. Original plans located the road through the middle of the planned community, in order to facilitate resident egress to Greenbelt Rd. at 63rd Avenue (Berwyn Hts.). APB now considers this undesirable: the road, probably four lanes, would cut the community in half, isolating community facilities from the residents. In addition, several new buildings lie in the path of the roadway, and many grades and curves would be difficult to execute. Therefore APB recommends location of the perimeter road along Cherrywood Lane at the western edge of the planned community; thus also giving access to the industrial area along the B & O tracks, without going through the middle of a residential area. Wuermsier also states that this change would not appreciably increase the cost of the road. Mr. Kramer, representing Springhill Lake developers stated their complete agreement with the new location.

Bids Opened
 Low bids were accepted, subject to manager's review, for three items: completion of softball field lighting at Braden field, Thompson and Myers, Inc.—\$2,085; concrete maintenance reconstruction of sidewalks and replacement of curbing—Reliable Contracting Inc., \$3,400; and smothseal (bituminous concrete construction) resurfacing of several city streets—Contee Sand and Gravel, \$19,296.25. Streets to be resurfaced under this program are: Crescent Rd. (from Parkway to Lastner Lane), Hillside Rd. (from Northway to Crescent), Woodland Way, Forest Way, Hamilton Pl., and the Cul-de-sac streets in the Lakewood subdivision, the old section of Lakeside Dr., Lakeview Circle and Centerway. City parking lots at Lake Park and next to St. Hugh's are also to be resurfaced and a 40' by 75' concrete play area is to be constructed at the Lake Park.

Four appointments remain open.
 Mayor Smith appointed Charles Barr to the Special Police Inquiry Board.

New Business
 Items under new business included first reading of an ordinance which will prohibit group picnics in city parks on Fridays evenings, Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays. Council agreed to support the city of Laurel in its efforts to have constructed as soon as possible a dual

highway along Route 197 between Laurel and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. Funds are currently available only for improving 197 as a two-lane highway.

The City will request an extension of the length of time that the City may occupy its present warehouse facilities, due to expire January 1967. With the length of time it is taking to acquire parcels 9 and 10, which have been designated for the location of a new Municipal Service Building, it appears that construction of the new facility cannot be completed in time.

A request for use of Braden field and the swimming pool by a 60-member girls drum and bugle corps was accepted, with Councilman Champion dissenting. The girls, from Haddonfield, New Jersey, will be competing in Washington at the American Legion National Convention August 26 - 29. Councilman
