Springhill Lake School Opening Is **Delayed: Double Shifts at Center**

Construction of the new Springhill Lake Elementary School has been delayed, and the nearest date the County Board of Education can give for the opening is "sometime in November", according to Mr. Wendell, head of pupil accounting for the county. Until that time, Springhill Lake and Charlestowne Village elementary pupils will attend Center School; the first four grades will be on double shift and the 5th and 6th grades will be on regular school hours. Bus transportation will be provided for these stu-

dents, expected to number about 330. According to Mrs. Golden, prin-cipal of the Springhill Lake School, hours for the double shifts for the first four grades will be from 9 a.m. to 12 noon for half the students, and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. for the other half. Grades 5 and 6 will be on regular hours; 9 a.m. to 3:15 p.m.

Mr. Ellis. principal of Center School, expects an enrollment of about 390 pupils. Hours will be from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Ellis emphasized that even though SHL and Charlestowne Village students will be housed in Center School, the two schools will be run quite independently. There will be no double shifts for Center School students.

Mrs, Golden will have her office in the basement of Center School, and her students will use the four temporary classrooms and the auditorium. After school registration is complete, she will mail letters to individual SHL and Charlestowne Village parents, assigning students in the first four grades to either morning or afternoon sessions

Kindergarten for Springhill Lake will be held temporarily in the Presbyterian Church, Berwyn Heights. Kindergarten parents will have to provide their own transportation.

Mrs. Poland, principal of North End School, expects little change in enrollment from last year. As usual, children from Lakewood. Boxwood and Lakeside North will attend North End School. There will be no temporary classrooms.

Parker Falls Through Roof

John Parker, 16, 2-L Research, a temporary summer employee of the city work crew, while working on the roof of the Youth Center, fell through a bubble-shaped plastic skylight to the floor of the gymnasium, 16 feet below, last Thursday, Aug. 18. He landed on his feet at first and then on his left breaking his arm in three side, places, at the wrist, thumb and elbow. Two vertebrae were chipped and his left ankle was sprained, bruised and swollen.

John had been assigned to clean up the roof of the Youth Center. At about 9:30 a.m. he bent down to pick up a beer bottle which had been thrown up there and lost his balance on the sloping roof. Afraid of sliding off the edge, he grabbed at the domed skylight to break his fall, and the plastic gave way and he fell through. His head narrowly missed hitting the metal edge of a trampoline; a tumbling class v in progress in the gym, under the direction of Alan Christy.

Christy advised him to "lie still" and the Rescue Squad was sent for. Plastic splints were applied to left arm and leg and John, at the request of his mother, was taken to George Washington Hospital, where he was admitted, He now has a cast on his arm and a brace on his back.

August 18 was John's sixteenth birthday and he spent most of it lying on a stretcher in the X-ray room and Emergency room of the hospital. Asked if he had anything to eat while on the stretcher, John said, "I missed breakfast because I got up late, I missed lunch altogether and for supper they gave me jello and a cup of tea - and it wasn't a full cup!"

Better luck next year, John.

Girls Needed for

Peace Group Still Out Of Labor Day Festival

On Monday night four members of the Steering Committee of the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival Committee met with four members of the Greenbelt Committee for Peace in Viet Nam. The meeting was at the request of the Peace Group to have the matter of denial of a booth explained to them more fully.

At the meeting Leo Gerton, Chairman for the Festival Committee, informed the Peace Group representatives that the entire committee was behind Mrs. Rita Fisher's decision to deny a booth to the Committee for Peace in Viet Nam based on the assumption that since so many organizations had declared that they would not participate if the Peace Group did, that in the interest of the community and the mode of the Festival the decision had to be to deny the booth.

The members of the Labor Day Festival Committee issued the following statement:

"Our decision to exclude the group was based on the fact that this is a community affair with its goal that of raising funds for our youth and other civic organizations.

"The committee, after giving the matter full consideration, decided that it would not be consistent with the purposes of the Festival to permit political organizations a booth. We had to consider not only the present request but the future of the Festival , if we should establish a precedent by granting permission to a political organization at this time.

FIRE ALARMS KEEP GREENBELT **VOLUNTEER FIREMEN HOPPING**

A long and busy night began for Greenbelt's volunteer firemen when they responded to a fire last Thursday evening at 8:02 p.m. The building, an eight-bay garage contained several customized cars, trucks and a boat and was fully ablaze when firemen arrived on the scene at the old Schrom air strip. The closest hydrant was more than one mile away at the Greenbelt Armory so the firemen protected the home of Mr. Charles W. Baker, Jr., which was only thirty feet from the burning building, with water carried on the trucks. They also used water from a pond located near the Schrom Construction Company. Estimated damage to the garage was nearly \$30,000.00. The Fire Department left the scene at 11:04 p.m. but it was nearly midnight before all equipment was cleaned up and men released to go home.

Later, at 1:19 a.m. Friday morn-

ing, a burned TV dinner called the men to Spring Hill Lake; at 2:45 a.m. a report of alarm bells ringing at Lakeside North Apartments again put men and equipment on the road but it proved to be a false alarm.

The final alarm sounded at 3:43 a.m. and again called the firemen to Spring Hill Lake. Fire had broken out in a second floor apartment, the home of Mary and Jay Welch and their year-old baby girl. Because of intense fire in the living room, the Welches couldn't reach their baby and were forced to jump out of their bedroom window. Lt. Robert W. McCracken, of the Greenbelt Fire Dept. entered 'the apartment wearing a self-contained oxygen mask, and carried the baby from her crib to firemen waiting on a ladder outside her room. Only the fact that the door to her room was closed saved the child from exposure to the smoke and fire. Welch suffered a severely lacerated hand when he jumpd; all members of the family were treated at Prince Georges Hospital and lareleased. Mrs. Vivian Boyko and her daughter, who lived in the apartment above the Welches, were led down the stairs to safety by firemen; flames shooting up from the burning apartment to the Boyko balcony prevented firemen from reaching them with a ladder. Six other residents of the third floor remained on their balconies until firemen could get ladders in place and take them down.

Greenbelt firemen and their neighboring companies, who run mutual aid on all fire calls in their area, were back in service at 5:16 a.m. Friday morning. About 6 a.m. equipment was in order and ready to roll when needed, and some very tired and sleepy men were released to go home. Some were able to get well-deservd rest; others prepared to put in an eight-hour day on their regular job.

The Right to Dissent

Shocked at the Decision

We are shocked at the decision of Mrs. Rita Fisher and the Labor Day Festival Committee to rescind permission for the Greenbelt Committee for Peace in Vietnam to participate in the Labor Day Festival. If the presence of the peace group's booth offends individual citizens of Greenbelt, they can and should boycott the booth. If the presence of this booth offends the American Legion and the DAV, they are, as they have pointed out, perfectly free to withdraw. It is difficult for us to understand, however, how these two veterans' organizations, which have long and vociferously advocated the "American way of life," could allow the Committee to so blatantly contradict that very concept, as manifested in the healthy American tradition of airing honest differences of opinion in a peaceful manner. If the action of the Committee represents Americanism, it is certainly not the kind envisioned in the bill of rights; nor, we believe, can it be the kind that all our veterans have defended for us in the past. Under the circumstances, we shall look elsewhere than Greenbelt to celebrate a traditionally American holiday with our children.

Minority Rights

It is indeed unfortunate that such well-meaning organizations as the American Legion and the Disabled American Veterans should feel unable to participate in the Labor Day Festival if the Greenbelt Committee for Peace in Vietnam also participates. This, however, is no justification for the barring of the CPVN from the festival. Mrs. Fisher, in defense of her decision, says that she made it "in favor of a majority." A democracy, however, implies that while no one is obliged to agree with a minority, that minority must still be allowed its right to speak. It is just the principle for which so many of the American Legion and the DAV went to war to defend, and which is so sadly lacking in the communist countries.

As long as the Labor Day Festival is subsidized by the City of Greenbelt, which provides its facilities free of charge ,the opportunity to participate should not be denied logitimate organization he-

views.

Review.

Two years ago when I brought my family to Greenbelt I had thought I had found the ideal place to live in the Washington area, primarily because of the type of people who live here-people who care about their community, people with ideals. My beautiful dream was shattered not by the rape of Greenbelt but by the action taken against the Greenbelt Committee for Peace in Viet Nam (CPVN).

To be candid, if I had been in the position of Rita Fisher I, too, would have succumbed to the outrageous pressure which w a s brought to bear. Faced with the prospect of the Labor Day Festival meeting disaster, I probably would have given in. However, that is as far as it goes!

The Festival Committee, the News Review and the citizenry should publicly censure those organizations which threatened to withdraw from the Labor Day activities unless CPVN would be deprived of its booth. It is far too fundamental for discussion that democracy cannot work unless we afford those who disagree with us the right to dissent. It is far too obvious that if the majority of citizens do not like the public policy stands by the American Legion that they would still have no right to bring pressure to bear that the Legion not participate in the Festival nor in any other way have lesser rights than others. If we are to allow such pressure tactics against those who dare to differ, moral decay is inevitable!

Although I am one to speak my mind and have strong opinions about many of the items which have made news in the News Review, I have never been outraged enough before to compel me to use what little spare time I have and write a letter to the editor. I might stress that I have nothing to do with CPVN and II do not care whether CPVN is correct or erroneous in its beliefs, just so long as it has met whatever reasonable requirements have been used in the past to determine who should be allowed to have a booth at the Festival. I do limit my value structure of tolerance to be intolerant of those who are intolerant. It is, therefore, my suggestion that, as an object lesson, those groups who sought to pressure the Festival nmittee should los se their pla
