# **Council Hears Proposals to Improve Municipal Recreational Programs**

by Elaine Skolnik Last week the City Council heard recommendations on the recreation budget from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board (PRAB), Youth Council, and a Springhill Lake representative. The most comprehensive recommendations came from PRAB, represented by Hugh Jascourt, chairman. PRAB recommendations included additional sums for Little League, Aquatic Club and Boy's Club, for pathways, paving materials and park maintenance, and for recreational personnel. A request was also made for such items as a comfort station at the Lake, a bus to serve recreational activities, and game-type equipment.

Art Castaldi, president of the Youth Council, saw a future need for an automotive work-shop, gymnastic equipment and a bubble-top swimming pool.

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Kramer, representing Harold Springhill Lake, was chiefly con-cerned that the city was not providing SHL with its fair share of services.

The city manager's proposed recreation budget provided for \$155,000 expenditures, of which \$53,500 are self-supporting revenues. PRAB's recommendations would up the total recreation budget by approximately \$23,410. Major items contributing to the \$23,400 increase were \$8,000 for a comfort station, \$2,000 for a bus driver, \$6,500 for parks and paving materials, and \$3,000 for a pedestrian light crossing. Jascourt justified the increases on the basis that previous budgets have deferred long-promised recreation increases because of the priority of other items.

#### SHL Requests

As an example of SHL failure to get its fair share of services, Kramer noted that no city funds are being used to support SHL Little League teams. Last year SHL was a part of the Greenbelt Little League's farm system, but this season is operating separately. Council members said they would consider the matter now that it had been brought to their attention. Council expressed its desire for a better communication system with SHL and suggested that Mrs. Martha Sutton, SHL Social Director, meet with Recreation Director Daryl Lofgren to discuss recreation needs.

Kramer also suggested that instead of constructing an addition to the Youth Center, the council might consider a building at SHL to alleviate overcrowded conditions at the SHL Community House. City Manager James K. Giese pointed out that the Golden-Agers and the Youth Council had also requested separate facilities, but it was his opinion that the ad dition at the Youth Center would be most desirable because, "we can get the most for our dollar by consolidated facilmaintaining ities."

Pedestrian Light Crossing Council viewed favorably the installation of a pedestrian light crossing in the vicinity of St. Hugh's to assure safe access for children living in the northwest sector of the community to the Braden Field Lake Park complex and to St. Hugh's School. Council also felt this type of traffic control would be desirable at North End and SHL elementary schools. **Duck Shelter** 

PRAB recommended that \$200 be appropriated for a duck shelter, explaining that citizen groups have complained that it is inhumane to force the ducks to survive the winter without shelter. Kramer advised City Council that the ducks are not at all impressed with the duck shelter at SHL and do not use it. Giese suggested a fencedin area for ducks as a possible solution.

Revisions in Greenbelt's community goals that give more attention to commercial and industrial development will be the subject of a public hearing before the city's Advisory Planning Board on Thursday, June 6. The hearing starts at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building.

According to Ed Wuermser, APB chairman, the revisions are necessary because so many changes have taken place in the community since the existing goals were adopted by the city council in December 1963.

# **City Notes**

Unless it rains, the swimming pool is expected to open for the Memorial Day holiday. Whether or not the new hot water showers would also be in readiness was still a question at the beginning of the week. In any case, their installation would be completed in a matter of days. They also have done road and shoulder repairs on Southway, Westway, and Edmonston Rd. In addition, they cleaned up Edmonston Rd. in preparation for the fifth anniversary celebration of Springhill Lake. Excavation and grading for the new parking lot behind the firehouse continues, and the parks crew alternates grass cutting with lawnmower repair, depending on weather.

Major revisions concern the sections on character of the community and land use. The proposed goals are published elsewhere in the paper.

The current goal of preserving "Greenbelt as a residential community" would be modified by the addition of the phrase "while at the same time integrating the proper balance of commercial, industrial, and recreational facilities." Omitted is the present goal of

preserving and developing "to the maximum individually-owned or cooperatively-owned homes or apartments rather than rentals." Also omitted is the current goal of preserving "as much of the natural beauty as possible by achieving an appropriate balance between population density and open areas.

Wuermser explained that the new goals more realistically recognize current zoning developments for commercial office buildings and other nonresidential development. He said that Greenbelt is now becoming a place where people not only live, but also work and shop.

The proposed goals seek an alteration in the role of the Center, which under the present goals is viewed as the focal point for community interest, assembly, and activities. The new goal would urge the development of similar centers throughout Greenbelt, as required to meet the growing needs of an expanding community.

The proposed goals stress the development of an adequate roadways system to handle additional vehicular traffic and an adequate well-rounded transportation system. The current goals place the emphasis on provisions for "traffic arteries that do not burden the existing roadway system."

The new goals ask for an ultimate population that will not exceed 45,000 "except in the event of annexation." Under the old goals which were adopted before the rezoning of the Smith-Ewing area and the development of Charlestown Village tract, the ultimate population was put at less than 36,000.

Speakers wishing to testify before the APB are asked to register at the city offices before June 5. Speakers are asked to confine their remarks to five minutes in length.

Members of the APB who drew up the revisions are Chairman Wuermser, Wallace J. Cohen, Robert M. O'Brien, Donald Volk, Burton Jarmon, and Jerry Jenkins. George Neumann, who recently resigned from the APB, also participated.

# An Untimely Endeavor

We are somewhat bewildered by the notice received last week that a public hearing will be held on Thursday, June 6. by the city's Advisory Planning Board on revising the Community Goals. A series of Community Goals had been adopted by the City Council in December 1963. These goals have received the wide-spread support of the community and have been used as a guide in fighting undesirable development plans.

By proposing a revision, the APB is implying that at least some of these goals have outlived their usefulness. For instance, the APB suggests that we abandon the goal of preserving and developing to the maximum individually-owned or cooperatively- owned homes or apartments, rather than rentals.

Granted the fact - deplorable, in our view - that Greenbelt has already exceeded by a considerable margin what is usually considered a balanced ratio between multi-family units and single family homes, or even between owneroccupied units and rental ones, it still does not follow that the city should give up the fight to preserve as much as possible what it considered a basic guideline for the development of Greenbelt. Being realistic and recognizing what has happened is one thing; keeping in mind what is desirable for the development of our community is another.

It might be more profitable for APB at this time to spend its energy and time studying the new Area 13 North Plan to determine how closely it meets the current goals of the city.
