According to city officials, the latest development in the suit seeking to enjoin construction of 21 additional apartment units on Charlestowne Village is a July 15 motion by the defendants (Charles and Fleur Bresler, Charles Burton Builders, and Burton Reiner) for a summary judgement dismissing the case.

> In asking for dismissal, defendants allege that the covenant is only enforceable against the "instant owner of the land" and that the city did not file its complaint within 30 days of learning of the building permits for the 21 units. The latter were issued on April 18,

1968. Defendants state that the property on which the 21 units are being constructed was conveyed to Stones, Inc., a D. C. Corporation. by deed dated April 19, 1968. The city's original bill of complaint filed on May 7 named as defendants the Breslers who were the owners designated on the permits. The city says that it did not learn of the transfer of property until May 29 when the case came up for hearing at Upper Marlboro. The city then filed an amended complaint including Stones, Inc. as defendants on June 13, 1968.

Dismissal is also requested on the ground that the city has already waived the covenants "by permitting the construction of 144 units on 11.3082 acres in Parcel A more than 12 units per acre without objection." The original covenant signed by the Breslers in April 1962 called for limiting the number of dwelling units to an average of 7 per acre for the entire 50-acre Charlestowne tract.

Men from the Public Works Dept. worked four days last week

on relocating a neighborhood playground at 44 Ct. Ridge. Playground equipment was moved from a wooded area, where there was no ground cover and some hazard from stumps and woodland debris, to a sunny, grassy location. Since both locations are on GHI property, GHI and the city in a joint meeting last spring worked out approval of the move. All equipment was newly painted after installation, a bunny on a spring was added, and the whole was enclosed by a chain link fence.

The city crew also prepared the second fill area below the dam for grass seeding. The area was graded, limed and fertilzed, but grass will not be sown until cooler weather. They also painted line markings for parking spaces at the Center and, at the request of the Fire Dept., painted streets and curbs before fire hydrants so that hydrants can be more quickly located.

The Parks crew eradicated poison ivy and weeds in various locations and pruned trees along Crescent and Ridge that were obstructing vision for drivers or interfering with car parking.

A private contractor, using a special machine, removed stumps from parks, playgrounds, and the Center shopping area.

Although one garbage truck was out of service for repair last week, the trash collection crew was able to keep almost up to schedule by substituting an open body truck.

The city will be advertising for bids this week in several categories-the bids to be opened at the first city council meeting in Augut. Among the items sought are a new refuse truck, a brush chipper for the Parks crew, and a hard top utility vehicle. The city is also requesting bids for its annual insurance coverage and for contruction work-curbs and gutters and paving of shoulders for parking.

City's Dream Is Still Alive

Greenbelt residents are understandably angry about a recent article in a Washington magazine that depicts their town, in the irate words of Councilman Francis White, as a "run-down, left-over WPA community."

It is inconceivable that the freelance author of the artiele if he had done any research at all, could have overlooked the real Greenbelt in his fascination for emphasizing its aging row-houses and abortive deals with developers.

A significant point he ignored is that these rowhouses, which were built during the days of the New Deal, are still coveted as dwelling places by many who could afford much more so-called luxurious housing.

Perhaps the main reason for this is that the City of Greenbelt is not just an accumulation of houses.

Its City Council meetings, for example, are the best models of grassroots democracy in action found outside the New England town halls. Every citizen who so desires is given a chance to have his say.

The city's park and recreation facilities are tops in this area

And, most important, there is the intangible benefit of community spirit, of having a common purpose with one's neighbors.

To many residents of suburbia, these true luxuries are more valuable than those found in new subdivisions or swank high-rise apartments.

Let those who read the critical magazine article be assured that the Greenbelt dream is not dead. If anything, it is more alive now than it was 30 years ago.



The three programs most applicants say they intend to pursue are Arts and Sciences with 477 applicants, General Studies with 455, and Busines Adminitration with 415 applicants.


