Police Open House



Sixty citizens came to watch May 16 as Greenbelt Police Chief, William T. Lane, held a dress roll call and inspection of his men and then awarded for the first time citations to 5 officers.

Peace Officers' Memorial Day and Police Week in Greenbelt. Couneilman Francis White welcomed citizens present, told of the police department's growth and said we are "proud of our staff as it exists today." City Manager Jim Giese introduced Greenbelt Homes, Inc. president, Charles Schwan, who presented a plaque: "In grateful appreciation for services performed over many years for the members of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. May 16 1969."

Corp. Paul Reamy was given a special citation for an incident in 1966 in which he sustained an injury while apprehending a suspect. The 1967 award went to Thomas Van Valkenburgh, Pfc., who intercepted a suspect and thus prevented an attempt at bank robbery. Three men were cited during 1968; Cpl. Carl Goodwin and Pfc. Alvin Hall apprehended three suspicious persons, later arrested, in response to a bank robbery alert and Pvt. Ernest Brumley, for giving lifesaving aid to a man having a severe heart attack.

During the evening the police dept. held open house in the city council room and displayed much of their equipment and information in some 20 exhibits developed by the police officers on their own time.

A chart just inside the door showed the mandatory training program each recruit must pass through; three weeks basic training in the dept.; a state approved training academy -245 hours; on the job field training with experienced officer - 2-3 weeks; daily roll-call training and then one of the many specialized police schools. Chief Lane said he was especially proud of what this display means to the professional quality of his department. Five of his men se currently enrolled at American University studying police administration on their own time and expense. A crime map showed geographical incidence of answered calls most calls occurred in apartment areas, both new and old, the least number of calls occurred in the single-family dwelling areas Boxwood, Lakeside and Lakewood. Other displays showed items of physical evidence from real cases now kept on file: a footprint, clothing fibres, used cigarettes; riot equipment including a trunk full of tear gas shells (kept tightly closed because of a slow leak); badges and insignia worn in the past by Greenbelt police including the current patch designed by Chief Lane showing the lake with pine trees at its edge in shades of light blue, green and white. The new citation ribbon is a plain green and white bar 2 inches long and 1/4 inch high.

Zoning Denied

The County Commissioners on May 14 denied the zoning application for construction of a gasoline station on Glenn Dale Road on the basis of "prematurity." They indicated that there were no firm plans for the rest of the tract (Schrom property), which is presently zoned C-2, General Commercial.

The special exception had been filed by the Frankford Drive Construction Company, which sought a gas station on the south side of Glenn Dale Rd. about 540 feet west of the Baltimore access ramp the Baltimore-Washington to Parkway. The co-owner, Donald Gengery at the April hearing had indicated that the announcement revealing plans for the entire commercial development of the area would be forthcoming in the near future.

Schwan Again Heads GHI Board; **Other Officers Also Returned** by Al Skolnik

With no opposition candidates nominated, the present officers of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., were easily reelected at the first postelection meeting of the newly-constituted board of directors last Thursday night. Named president was Charles F. Schwan, who has served in that capacity since January 1, 1964. Other officers elected were Nat Shinderman, vice-president; Steve Polaschik, secretary; and John O'Reilly, treasurer.

The tension from the previous week's annual election carried over to the balloting as newlyelected board member Alex Chavrid abstained from voting for some of the officers and newcomer David Lange cast a negative vote against Schwan. There was also some by-play as to whether a secret ballot should be used in the voting and it was finally decided by a 4-3 vote (Chavrid, Lange, and Douglas Hawes in the minority) to have an open vote.

The tension remained during the opening stages of the meeting as incumbents and newcomers proceeded to lecture each other on their respective deficiencies. But as the 51/2 hour meeting wore on,

New staff includes lifeguards Mike Lundregan formerly with Camp Pine Tree, Jeff Cassels, and Joe Smith. Dave Lehman will operate the concession stand with Frank Moraff and Linda Hosick working in the basketroom.

As usual, the swim season will open on Memorial Day. Only a few minor repairs to the pool remain to be completed before that date. The interior surface of the pool has already received its an-nual waterproof coat, a broken tile has been replaced, and the pool is being filled.

Such maintenance items as replacing a broken window and repairing leaks in the bath house roof and refurbishing the concession stand remain to be done.

A flyer is now circulating concerning pool rates for the season. As in the two previous years, fourth grade classes at Center School will receive swimming instruction in their physical education program, using the municipal pool.

and the board waded through a number of complex agenda items, which engendered few policy differences, the tension relaxed until finally at 12:30 a.m. the following incident brought hearty laughs from the entire board:

Incident

Roy Breashears Manager brought a member's request before the board, and Schwan, looking desperately at the clock and hoping to refer the matter back to the manager for a decision, asked Breashears, "Is the member's letter addressed to the board?" Unabashedly, Breashears replied, "No. It is addressed to 'Gentlement'

With that unintentioned admonition, the board ended its deliberations at 1:10 a.m. on a relatively friendly note. A source of contention earlier in the evening the operation and staffing of committees - was satisfactorily resolved by the establishment of a new Committee on Committees to review the committee structure and to bring in recommendations with respect to their staffing, organization, and functions. Appointed to the Committee were Shinderman, chairman, Chavrid, and Lange from the board, Tom White from the Audit Committee, and four non-board members.

The new committee will also look into a proposal of O'Reilly's for the formation of an information committee, composed primarily of non-board members whose task would be to improve the flow of information from the board to the membership. The general idea won approval, but directors Jim Smith and Shinderman cautioned that the board could not relinquish its responsibility in this area. O'Reilly said his purpose was to avoid future complaints that the membership was not being kept informed, and hence was not being stimulated to participate in GHI activities.

Lange said that the board had to be more aggressive in stimulating membership interest and urged establishment of new committees or activities that would meet special needs. As a starter, he suggested orientation meetings for new members so as to acquaint them with GHI duties and benefits, a voter registration drive for city elections, a committee to study recreation needs, a committee to control dogs, and encouragement of self-help activities.

O'Reilly replied that there were plenty of committees which were begging for non-board members to join. Schwan added that there is a long-standing invitation for non-board members to join committees (except for a few, such as personnel that are considered to be more appropriately limited to board members). He took umbrage at the charge that the committees were deliberately dominated by board members. All parties agreed that the News Letter under the leadership of director Katherine Keene was doing a fine job and were pleased to note its timely appearance. Chavrid noted that during the campaign he heard many complaints which he later learned were based on misinformation, but for which he didn't have the answer at the time. He suggested that because of the large turnover in GHI homes, it would be a good idea for the News Letter to repeat at more frequent intervals certain basic information about the corporation. He referred particularly to information on the allocation of costs between frame and brick homes. While the Committee on Committees sets about its task, the present committee structure will continue to function. Named to chair the member complaints committee was Steve Polaschik. Select Committee, which also underwent a change in name to Planning Committee. A committee investigating the environmental effects of nuclear power plants on the Chesapeake was also named.

Townhouses Still Available In more substantive matters, the board voted to send out one more announcement to members that there are still 6 or 7 vacancies among the 25 townhouses now being constructed opposite the North End School. A cut-off date of 30 days was set, after which the board will consider alternative ways of disposing of any vacant homes. The first homes are expected to be ready for occupancy by August. The board also made clear that parsonages now located in GHI homes would be considered eligible as members for the new townhouses.

The board voted to authorize loans to members for the purchase of appliances (stoves and refrigerators) now available at discount prices through a national firm specializing in cooperatives. Loans would be for one year at 41/2 percent installment rate interest (8.2 percent simple interest). Any labor or services provided by the corporation in delivering the items would be charged the purchaser.

A request for waiver of a \$10 charge for changing the color of the paint trim because only one coat of paint would be involved was turned down by the board. The \$10 fee, the board said, was an average charge to cover all types of situations, including those where one coat was involved and those where more than one coat were involved.

Oil contracts were granted to BF Oil Corporation (formerly Sinclair) for #2 oil and to Humble Oil Company for #6 oil. The board expressed concern that it was becoming difficult to get other oil companies to submit competitive bids.

Council Zips Through Agenda Of City Charter Amendments

A "holiday mood" prevailed at a short action-filled City Council meeting Monday, May 19. A lengthy agenda was completed in near-record time as resolution after resolution was passed and appointments made and approved. There was little discussion on any issue as all votes were unanimous by Mayor Edgar Smith and Councilmen Gerton, Pilski and White. Councilman Hoff arriving late, did so only moments before adjournment.

The resolutions involved a series of amendments to the city charter: These changes will go into affect unless petitioned to a referendum, and will be incorporated in the codification of the city charter and ordinances now being undertaken by Michie Publishing Co

Many of the changes were of a technical nature designed to clarify existing procedures: Changes of a more substantive nature inaluded.

(1) a revised section on budget preparation whereby the city manager must submit the budget to council by its first meeting in April rather than the present May date. The budget adoption date stays the same of June 10.

(2) authorization for the city to invest in short term interest bearing notes of the United States or the State of Maryland.

(3) modification of city purchasing requirements to except from bidding the purchase of professional services and to permit the council to negotiate a specific purchase. Also authorized was the joint taking of bids and award of purchases with other jurisdictions.

(4) making the due date for tax anticipation notes 30 day after such taxes become delinquent instead of become collectible

Other Business

Appointed to the Park and Recreation Advisory Board were Jerry Shafer, 412 Ridge and George Jones 113 Northway. It was felt that Shafer's experience with the Boys' Club and Jones' with the Swim Team made them valuable additions to the Board. Council also appointed George Mathews, 107 Lynbrook, currently president of the Boxwood Citizens' Association, to the Advisory Planning Board.

John Bogumill, president of the Lakeside Citizens' Association presented to Council the results of a poll taken April 18 and May 8 of Association members. Results showed that 29 of 35 members voting approved restriction OI parking to one side of Lakeside Drive Extended only. It was deeided to take this matter under advisement and consider it further at a later date.

Amendments to the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland were adopted on May 19, 1969 by the City Council of Greenbelt. The title of each Resolution, which is a fair summary of each amendment, is as follows:
