## Council Conducts Tour To Inspect Littered Areas

On Saturday, July 19, the city council led by city manager James K. Giese took a walking tour of Greenbelt parkland to inspect littered and eroded areas. In addition to councilmen Bill Hoff and Dick Pilski other participants were Ed Thornhill, Jack Taylor and your News Review reporter. Some attention was focused on trash surrounding "Flying A" and the apartments on Parkway. Another area given much scrutiny was beyond the garages on Parkway and Crescent. Debris from vehicles (tires, car parts etc.) was heaped into a pile at the end of the garages. In the woods, council noted more junk tossed about; some of it was trash left by campers.

Suggestions for curtailing the dumping and littering were: posting anti-littering signs enforcing existing city regulations with prescribed fines (heretofore violators were simply warned), perhaps using the state laws which carry higher fines, and simply requesting private individuals to cooperate in cleaning up. Also considered was using Boy Scouts to clean up littered areas which has been done previously.

The council then crossed Crescent to look at the wooded area adjacent to the Community Church. The problem here was erosion and dead trees which need removal. Hoff and Thornhill suggested that the trees which had already fallen should be broken up and laid on the ground to decay and create humus and also stop the run off. Suggestions were made to increase the small vegetation to retain water and to ask agronomists at the University of Maryland for additional advice.

The council then moved on to Greenhill Rd. where four residents had complained about surface drainage on a sidewalk and in yards. The force is so great that a cement porch is being worn away. The slow draining water in the yards results from a fast runoff from a hill behind the homes and GHI storm drains. This problem could be solved by an equal easement 10 feet each from GHI and the four home owners for placement of a drainage pipe that would lead to an existing pipe to carry the run off. (This had been proposed in the early sixties. The original homeowners balked, but GHI was willing to comply.) Also digging a small trench to connect with a grate and a pipe beneath would increase the drainage in one yard.

As for the drainage on the sidewalk (perhaps partially caused by settling below yard levels). Giese suggested two plans. One is mud jacking, which is done by forcing compressed "mud" through holes drilled in the walk, thus forcing the sidewalk to rise. The alternative was to tear up the walk, raise the level of it, and then replace it. Giese discarded the first method, because it was too expensive. Thus ended the tour.

## Dutton Re-elected MNCPPC Chairman

A majority of the ten members of The Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission voted to re-elect W. C. Dutton, Jr., to the Chairman's post of the bi-county regional agency at the regular monthly meeting on July 9.

Mrs. Caroline Freeland, Vice-Chairman of the Commission and Chairman of the Montgomery County Planning Board was also nominated for the position. Commissioner Gordon Lamb made the nomination stating that the chairmanship should alternate between the two counties. Since the founding of the Commission in 1927, the chairmanship has always been in Prince George's County.

With Mr. Dutton receiving six votes, Mrs. Freeland automatically retained her position as Vice-Chairman of the Commission. Both will serve their offices for one year when they will again be subject to this same review next year by their fellow Commissioners.

## Jascourt to Chair PRAB

At the last regular meeting of the Greenbelt Park and Recreation Advisory Board, Hugh Jascourt of Maplewood Court was elected to the position of Chairman. Mrs. Virginia Moryadas was elected to the position of Vice Chairman with Jerry Shafer, Richard Stevenson, George Jones, Betty Smyth, Rev. Kenneth Buker and Robert Barton joining the board as new members. This brings the number of voting board members to its capacity of twelve.

## FESTIVAL NOTES

Greenbelt's Labor Day Festival will be a big one this year if the turnout for last week's concession and booth meeting was any example. Over 45 people attended the July 18 meeting to start planning game booths and food concessions.

Some of the events you can look for this year are a lemon squeeze, milk bottle throw and a dip-for-a-duck game. And if you get hungry, look for anything from sloppy joes to a chicken barbecue.

## City Notes

The city offices were closed last Monday in observance of the Apollo 11 moon landing. However, many city services still functioned; refuse was collected, the police and recreation departments worked as usual, as did some of the summer maintenance crew.

A breakdown in trash service the previous week was attributable to a manpower shortage because of absenteeism and vacations, but by Wednesday the crew caught up and were back on schedule.

The Public Works crew last week worked on curb and gutter construction on Crescent Rd, and completion is expected this week. The city has also been involved with making adjustments to some driveways, backfilling behind the curbs and filling holes in front with concrete.

Work was completed on the flooring of the Lake Park bandstand. It was found that the floor was beginning to rot generally, all the way through in a few spots, though the underpinning was solid. The entire flooring was replaced. Two new lights were installed at the front of the bandstand so that now the faces of performers will be highlighted. The two older lights are at the back of the stand, and they serve to illuminate the music stands but when used alone the players' faces are in shadow.

## COUNCIL SEEKS CLARIFICATION OF STORM DRAINS PROBLEM

Inconsistencies in the city's policies pertaining to storm drains located on private property led city manager, James Giese, to seek a clarification on the subject at the July 21 special city council meeting. Although the city was advised that legally it has no obligation to maintain these drains, which have variously caused erosion problems and flooding conditions, council felt it has the responsibility for doing something.

Council therefore voted to instruct the city engineers to examine the sites in question, one at 71 court Ridge and 3 court Research, a second at 21 Lakeside, a third at the University Square apartments, and a fourth at 12 court Ridge, and come up with its recommendations. Manager Giese felt that most of the problems could be taken care of with relatively little expense to the city.

## School Site Approval

Council also considered the preliminary plans for the school site adjacent to the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. An 80 foot right-of-way is provided for the perimeter road. The plan shows Northway Rd. (Sanitary Fill Rd.) east of the perimeter rd. as planned to be abandoned and shows the City Landfill property as planned to be acquired.

The city council held up acting on the matter until its next regular meeting so that Greenbelt Homes Inc., can give its views on the plan. The plan does not show Hamilton Pl. being extended to join the perimeter rd. as the city manager recommends. Nor is there any real indication as to when the perimeter rd. may be constructed.

## SHL Tract

Council approved the preliminary plans for parcels A and B on the Springhill Lake North Tract to be zoned for the proposed office and motel-convention. Parcel A consists of about 22.8 acres and is the area proposed to be zoned for office building construction. Parcel B, about 7.7 acres, is proposed to be zoned C-2 Commercial for a motel-convention center. An 80 foot right-of-way is shown for the extension of Cherrywood Lane on the north side of the Beltway. Cherrywood Lane would eventually become part of the perimeter rd. A second 80 foot right-of-way is shown for a street which would run from Kenilworth Avenue at the city cemetery west to Cherrywood Lane.

No action was taken on how to make appointments for election of judges and workers for the upcoming city council election pending the advice of the full council. Councilman Leo Gerton and Mayor Edgar Smith were absent from the meeting.

## Clean-up Program

A city clean-up program was proposed by councilman William Hoff, but council seemed unable to come up with any recommendation. Hoff thought civic groups might undertake such a project with the city's support. Discussed were implementing the fine for littering, setting a day for cleaning up wooded areas in particular, and emphasizing the city's trash pick-up program.

July 21 was declared a legal holiday and city manager Giese was authorized to pay overtime to trash collectors who worked that day.

The Greenbelt Boys Club has planned a much improved program for the coming year. More programs than ever before will be offered in Greenbelt: football, soccer, boxing and bowling. ## Apollo to Greenbelt to Houston

About two seconds after Apollo 11 emerged from behind the moon on its crucial first lunar orbit Saturday, a green light glowed on a computer console in NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt.

The Goddard computer began talking to its mate in Houston, passing on to Mission Control the message that the maneuver had gone well.

Spoken words or computer-coded data, everything Mission Control has heard from or about the astronauts since they left the earth Tuesday has gone through Goddard.

The suburban Maryland facility, 12 miles from Washington, is the headquarters of NASA's Apollo communications. "It's the heart," said NASA communications director Verne Stelter. "We can't afford to have anything happen here."

From tracking stations through-

out the world, over a network of two million miles of wire, from ships and planes and satellites, fractional seconds before it gets to Houston, all data from Apollo 11 comes to Greenbelt.

And all of Mission Control's instructions go through Greenbelt before being beamed back over the network and into space.

Although hundreds of miles from Houston, the center, named for American rocket pioneer Robert H. Goddard, is the logical place to locate Apollo's communication headquarters, Stelter said.

Saturday afternoon, in a room entered by opening a combination lock, Stelter and some visitors watched blinking lights that showed data was flowing from Apollo to Madrid through Greenbelt and on to Houston.

One light blinked off. Immediately, another blinked on.

"We took a hit," Stelter said.

**Signal Rerouted**  
Somewhere in the main data route from Greenbelt to Houston, Stelter said something had gone wrong. It was a rare event, and he was interested, but not overly concerned.

Houston-bound signals normally are beamed from an antenna atop Goddard's Building 14 to a micro-

wave relay station near Tyson's Corner, Va.

The signals then proceed at the speed of light north into Pennsylvania, west to Kansas City and south to Dallas and Houston.

But somewhere in those hundreds of miles, something had gone wrong—perhaps a rainstorm interfering with the signal, perhaps an auto striking a power pole.

Recognizing that something was wrong, although not knowing what, the computer, with the electronic cunning built into its multi-million dollar innards, immediately and smoothly switched the signal to an alternate route.

Electronic signals describing the latest position of Apollo 11 leaped from the Goddard antenna, this time bound first for Suitland, then Waldorf, in Charles County, Md., eventually reaching Houston by way of Atlanta.

Data was now pouring out of Goddard, into Houston at a rate equivalent of 2500 words a second. And 20 times a second, Goddard's computer demanded acknowledgement from its Houston counterpart, asking in computer code, "Did you get that?"

Twenty times a second a white light pulsed. Houston was saying it got the message.

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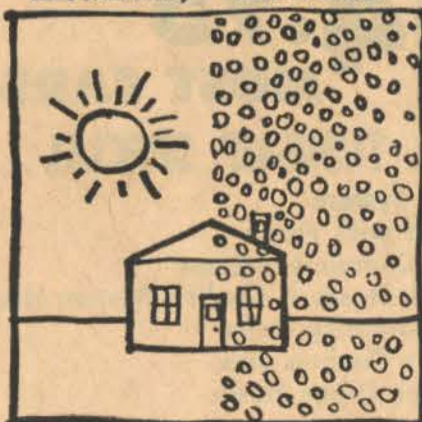
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### Viewing of Sex Ed. Materials Available
