COUNCILMEN GERTON, WHITE FILE AS CITY COUNCIL CANDIDATES

Two incumbents, Leo Gerton and Francis W. White, have filed this week with city clerk Nita Sacra as candidates for city council. They are the first to file for the election, which will be held on September 16.

Additional candidates, including incumbents, desiring to become candidates in the September 16 election for the five-man council must file petitions containing at least 50 and not more than 60 signatures of qualified registered voters at the city clerk's office (together with a \$3 filing fee). The deadline for filing is August 18.

A registered voter may sign only one petition, and the signature is counted on the first petition filed, should a person sign more than one petition. Petitions are filed with the City Clerk, from whom petition forms are obtained for circulation.

GERTON

Leo Gerton is a long time resident of Greenbelt; he was an original member of the Greenbelt Veteran's Housing Corporation and has resided in the area for 33 years. He is the manager of High's' Dairy store in the Greenbelt Shopping Center.

During the years he has lived in Greenbelt, Gerton has accumulated a long record of community and civic service. In March 1969, he was elected to City Council to fill out the term of former councilman Gerald Gough, who had resigned. He represents Greenbelt on the Community Resources Policy Commission of the Washington Metropolitan Council of Governments. Recently he received the Distinguished Service Award from the Greenbelt Jaycees.

Earlier, as zoning committee chairman for Greenbelt Homes, Inc., he was responsible for the development and adoption of policy recommendations. He has also served on the city's Advisory Planning Board and was chairman of its "Committee I," a planning committee for residential, commercial and industrial development. In this capacity, he helped form specific development goals which were later incorporated into the Greenbelt Master Plan.

The implementation of Greenbelt's Master Plan has been one of Gerton's main concerns. As a former member of the steering committee of Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt, he was active in cases involving planning and zoning in Greenbelt.

Leo Gerton is a Navy Veteran of World War II and belongs to Chapter 23 of Greenbelt's Maryland City Disabled American Veterans and to Post 381 of the Jewish War Veterans. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Twin Pines Savings and Loan Association and of the Greenbelt Freedom of the Press Committee, and also chairman of the Greenbelt Labor Day Festival Committee. In the past he was a member of the Greenbelt Library Association, until that organization disbanded when it achieved its aim by securing appropriations for a future Greenbelt Library.

White participated for 5 years in the Greenbelt Little League Program, later serving as League President. He served as Chairman of the Recreation Advisory Board for the years 1960-61, and has been a member of the City's Charter Review Committee.

He served on the City Council, 1961-63, as mayor, served on the 1965-67 council as Mayor Pro Tem and is a member of the present City Council.

During the past 14 years White has been employed as a Planning Engineer on the Physical Plant staff at the University of Maryland

White has served as Commander, Disabled American Veterans Chapter No. 23 American Legion Post No. 136; Vice-Pres. of the Board of Directors, Engineering Alumni Society, University of Maryland; Prince Georges County Progress Committee; Treasurer, Greenbelt Lions Club; Steering Committee, Citizens for a Planned Greenbelt. Recently White accepted appointment as the Liaison Representative to the County Commissioners for the Pr. Georges Municipal League. White serves on the Land Use Committee as a representative to the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments.

GHI to Appeal Assessment; Studies Long Range Financing

The hearings of the County Board of Assessors relative to the current re-evaluation of Greenbelt property which was contested by GHI have now been completed, it was revealed at the GHI Board meeting of July 24. Some reduction from the valuation originally set at about 1.5 million dollars was conceded by the County Board of Assessors. However, the Finance Committee was not entirely satisfied and recommended to GHI's Board of Directors that GHI appeal the matter to the Maryland Tax Court.

Finance Committee Chairman John O'Reilly pointed out that this recommendation was in agreement with the thinking of the attorney representing GHI in the case. Approval of this course of action was voted by the Board.

Other matters taken up during the meeting included parking lot improvement, how dishwashing machines could be made to fit into the kitchens of the new townhouses, whether Hamilton Place should or should not become an access road to the new schools when they are built and, last but not least, how to finance the capital improvements and major maintenance costs which are expected to accrue over the next several years if current plans are carried through.

Parking Lot

The parking lot in question is the one which is provided for the parking of trailers, campers, and small boats. The lot is to be blacktopped, the current two avenues of access reduced to one in order to effect more efficient use of the space, and the remaining access road improved. Parking fees will be raised sufficiently to effect amortization of the improvement over a period of five years. The amount by which it will be necessary to increase these fees will be arrived at as soon as the work is contracted for and the costs are known.

townhouses will not provide space for the installation of a fixed location type dishwasher. This was discovered, to their disappointment, by some of the prospective purchasers, many of whom are highly interested in acquiring dishwashers for their new homes. Appeal was made to the builder, who came up with two suggestions. First, folks could buy themselves portable dishwashers on rollers, which could be hooked up to the water pipes and plugged in as needed, then rolled away somewhere until needed again. Where that "somewhere" would be in these compact homes seemed to pose something of a mystery. The second, and apparently more constructive, suggestion was that one cabinet could be left out to provide permanent space for the dishwasher. The arrangement would be optional. Families who were satisfied with the original plan would have their cabinets left intact. The cost of providing this option was quoted at \$1200. This would come to \$48 per house if all 25 of the new owners took advantage of it. The Board seemed sympathetic to this proposal but deferred action until it could get a more accurate measure of the extent of the demand for it.

Perimeter Road Access

As reported in the News Review on July 17, the City of Greenbelt has been asked to review the subdivision plan for the proposed school sites adjacent to the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. The City Council, in turn, recognizing the impact of such plans and school access roads on GHI, invited the latter to make such recommendations as it saw fit. Of particular concern was the question whether Hamilton Place should or should not be included among the access roads. After some discussion the Board expressed the feeling that it did not possess sufficient information to decide the mater intelligent-It needed to have the actual site plans for the schools, more information as to the projected use of other access roads, etc. A special meeting will be held to reconsider this problem when the desired data has been obtained. A tentative date of July 30 was set for this meeting.

Capital Improvements

The plans for work to be done under the heading of "Capital improvements and major maintenance" call for an estimated commitment of more than \$560,000 in 1969 and 1970. Maintenance and improvement projected for the years subsequent to 1970 are estimated to cost another \$560,000, most of which will be distributed over periods of four to eight years, i.e., from 1971 to 1978. While current income will be relied upon to defray some of these costs, much of this money, particularly that which will be required this year and in 1970, must be borrowed. The Suburban Trust Company has agreed to provide loan funds at a rate of interest of 1/2 of one percent over the Federal Reserve Bank prime rate. Since the current prime rate is 81/2 percent, money borrowed at this time would cost GHI 9 percent. The rate which GHI would be required to pay would be subject to change from time to time as the prime rate fluctuated upward or downward. The Board seemed to feel that this was a bitter pill which nevertheless needed to be swallowed. Jim Smith expressed the opinion that while the cost of borrowing was admittedly high, there was evidence that the cost of doing the necessary work would continue to rise, and that therefore refusal to borrow and get the work under way promptly might result in a higher overall cost in the long run. No dissent from this opinion was expressed.
