AD HOC COMMITTEE URGES CITY **PURCHASE OF LUTHERAN SITE**

The Ad Hoc Committee on the Lutheran Church property voted to present a report to the city council next Monday, November 3, strongly recommending immediate opening of negotiations by the city to purchase the Lutheran Church property on Ridge Road. Leasepurchase or installment purchase over a 10-year period at a low rate of interest and a very reasonable price may be possible, the committee has learned.

Details of the committee's report have not yet been released pending submission to city council.

However, at the open meeting of the committee on October 21, Darwin Beck, representing the Lutheran Church on the committee, advised the group that the church has received an offer for purchase of the property for use as offices by a national non-profit organization. The church membership, Beck reminded the committee, has waited for many months for a report from the Ad Hoc committee to be presented to council recommending what action, if any, should be taken by the city or GHI or both. Rapid action must be taken, Beck said, or the church would be forced to again offer the 3-acre property and building for sale publicly. The church has made no attempt to sell it since city council recommended against approval nearly a year ago of a special zoning exception to permit construction of a privately owned commercial nursing home on the site.

The committee will meet again next Sunday, November 2, at 12:30 p.m. in the Committee Room of the Municipal Building in closed session to review and approve the report to be submitted to council the following night. "All members, including the city representatives, are urged to be present," stated George Beauchamp, who was elected vice chairman of the committee at the October 21 meeting.

GHI to Consider Employee Pay Raise, Effect of Perimeter Rd. by Sid Kastner

Mostly internal matters were taken up at last Thursday's regular Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board meeting. Following an earlier proposal by director Dave Lange, an ad hoc committee was set up to look into the effect that the perimeter road and its traffic will have on nearby homes. Personnel pay raises were recommended by a committee chaired by director Nat Shinderman; the board decided to study the report further before acting, though increases seem likely. In connection with the recently upgraded trailer parking lot, new registration procedures and rental rates were suggested by the staff.

The pay scale proposed by the Personnel Committee covers both administrative and maintenance staff. As in the past it uses federal government rates as its criterion. This means that administrative personnel would receive increases ranging from about 7% in Grade 3 to 10.3% in Grade 10, the average being about 9%. Maintenance personnel would get a flat increase of 5% in all grades; present salaries range from \$5,720 in Grade 3 to \$10,606 in Grade 14, so that the increase would be in the neighbor-hood of \$400. Directors Doug Hawes and John O'Reilly felt the board should take more time to discuss the details of the report, so action was deferred to the next regular meeting.

Trailer Park Paving

Manager Roy Breashears reported that the boat and trailer lots have been graded, in preparation for blacktopping. He outlined a new security system in which stickers would be issued for each space, to be attached to the trailers, and all locks would be changed and new keys issued. The cost of upgrading the lots, and the maintenance would be repaid over a five year span by an increase in the monthly rental rates; the rate

per space in lot A would go to \$4.25, an increase of 75 cents, and lot B to \$4.75, up by \$1.25. According to Breashear's figures this would bring in about \$10,740 over the five years, just taking care of an estimated outlay of \$10,620.

Joseph Choper, one of the presently renting members, spoke for including such people on a management advisory committee. He stated that "some of the people are upset because they weren't con-sulted by GHI" and they would like to be included. Shinderman agreed with this approach, suggesting that the Parking committee consider the matter jointly with the members. Lange also felt that such an advisory committee would be appropriate. Tom White of the Audit Committee differed, however, taking the general view that special interest problems should not be dealt with by the people directly involved. A motion by Lange to create a member advisory committee died for lack of a second.

Progress in construction of the townhouses has been lagging recently, Breashears said, though most utilities are in and driveways are being worked on. Lange urged that the owners should be kept informed of the likely date of occupation, as it "slips".

Auditor's Report

The Audit Committee has submitted a memorandum to the board on the auditor's report. Tom White said he hoped the board would consider its recommendations together with those of the Finance Committee. O'Reilly thought this was worthwhile and introduced a motion to have the two committees, together with the Comptroller, hold a joint annual meeting to go over the auditor's report. However, O'Reilly felt the scope of the auditors report could not be specified by the corporation, as the Audit Committee had recommended, so the motion included instead "any addition to the auditors normal work".

Maintenance

Feedback from the members on maintenance efficiency was brought up next by White and Janet James. The latter pointed out that "the member doesn't know what's wrong if he doesn't get service," even if there is a reason. Various ideas for improving member-staff communication were proposed in the discussion that followed, such as a review of the present survey card, a general mailing to members and even an ombudsman proposal by director Alex Chavrid A motion by Shinderman was passed to have the Member Relations Committee consider these and outline a course of action.

for further information. The Parkdale Guidance staff is on hand daily to help both students and parents with any problems relative to going to college and for scholarship information for those who are interested.







Notice of Public Hearing Proposed Addition to Youth Center

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board will hold a public hearing:

Thursday, November 6, 1969 at the

(Greenbelt Youth Center)

8:00 p.m.

The purpose of the hearing is to receive citizen comments on the preliminary plans for the addition to the Greenbelt Youth Center. Funds for this addition are provided by the authorized \$950,000 Bond Issue.

Preliminary Plans may be viewed at the Youth Center, the City Offices and Twin Pines.

The following is a description of the improvements proposed in the plans:

General Description

Located to the rear and east of the existing building (towards the softball field) the main addition would consist of two floors. The addition is designed to function independently of the present building and has a separate entrance near the office entrance to the existing building. There would be one connection between the multi-purpose room of the present building and the new building. This entrance would be employed if the new addition is used for a function relating to the use of the old building, such as a teen dance, but otherwise only by staff. This addition consists of a Golden Age Lounge, multi-purpose room with kitchen, class room and lavatories on the first floor, and arts and crafts rooms and a large unfinished storage area on the ground floor.

A small addition located to the rear of the present lounge-snack bar area provides locker room, toilet, and exercise room facilities, accessible from both the gym and outside.

Between the two additions and behind the existing building is a terrace with stairs to Braden Field. Access to the terrace is possible from both the new addition and the multipurpose room of the existing building.

Specific Areas

Golden Age Lounge: This room is 13' by 28' with windows overlooking the wooded area next to Braden Field. At one end is a small kitchenette and storage area. The room is next to the new multi-purpose room, and the kitchenette connects to a kitchen-serving area in the multi-purpose room. The Golden Age Lounge can be closed off completely from the rest of the building and is to be used strictly as the club establishes. For large meetings the adjacent multipurpose room will be used.

Teen Center: One area will be set aside exclusively for teenagers. This will be the present multi-purpose room, lounge and snack bar area of the building. It will be furnished and decorated in a manner to provide for the needs of young people as a place to get together after school or in the evenings. Game tables can be provided, if desired.

Multi-purpose Room: The new addition will contain a multi-purpose room 28' by 55', substantially larger than the existing 24' by 42' room. The room will overlook the new terrace. Substantial storage areas are provided next to the room as well as a kitchen-serving area. A high quality moving partition can divide the room into two rooms for smaller group use, thus giving the room greater flexibility. Such activities as Golden Age Club luncheons, square dancing, ballet, social dances and teen events, moving pictures and various adult and children's classes can be held in this room.

Arts and Crafts Room: Arts and crafts will be located on the ground floor of the new addition. Access to the outside is available for the receipt of supplies and use in the summer by day camp and playground participants. The arts and crafts room will consist of one large room with tables for working on projects. This room can be divided by movable partitions so that more than one class can be accommodated. Adjacent to the arts and crafts room will be a second room in which there will be storage areas for supplies and unfinished class works, specialized equipment such as kilns and pottery wheels, and an instructor's desk. This second room can be closed off from the main room, thus securing all equipment and enabling the main room to be used for other types of program activities.

Shower-Locker Facility: A small facility will be provided for restricted use by athletic teams, weight lifters and men during men's gym. Toilet facilities will be accessible from the outside for use by ballfield participants.

Exercise Room: A 12' x 13' room will be provided next to the locker room for use by weight lifters and others who wish to work out. Presently these people work out in a closet next to the gym.

Terrace: Accessible from the new addition and the existing facility as well as Braden Field, the Terrace can be used as a smoking area and for classes in nice weather. During the summer, game tables can be set out in this area.

Unfinished Storage Area: A substantial portion of the ground floor will be left unfinished. This area can be partitioned off and used for storage for organizations like the Little League and Boys Club. Specialized facilities can be installed as required, such as a photography dark room or a small shop. In the future, when needed, this area can be finished for whatever uses are desired.

Meeting Room - Class Room: One small room will be provided in the new addition for small recreation classes and meetings. One of the existing arts and crafts rooms will also be used in the same manner.

Offices: One of the present arts and crafts rooms will be used for Recreation Department offices, thus relieving an over crowded situation.

Present Gym-Skate Room: This facility will not be changed. The new addition will relieve the need to use this part of the building for non-athletic recreational activities. While improvements here would be desirable, it is felt that the benefits received would not be worth the expenditure required and that other improvements will be of greater use.

Summary: For an estimated \$125,000 the proposed new addition will provide:

Golden Age Lounge Exclusive Teen Area Larger and more flexible multi-purpose room Enlarged and improved arts and crafts area Shower-locker room facilities Exercise room Two small meeting rooms - class rooms Expanded office facilities Outdoor terrace Large unfinished storage-future use area.
