Eleanor Roosevelt Tree is Dead

The Eleanor Roosevelt Memorial Tree is dead. Although the exact cause of its death is unknown, city officials surmise that too much disturbance of the area in the process of preparing the memorial enclosure was an important contributing factor.

The memorial site, however, will continue to be preserved. As a precautionary safety measure, all limbs of the tree have been lopped off, leaving only the tall stump. The Greenbelt Woman's Club, sponsors of the memorial project, plan to set out ivy to encircle the stump and cover it with living green. In that form the tree will continue to serve as a memorial to the former First Lady, whose early interest and continuing concern helped to bring Greenbelt into being as the first federally planned community in the United States.

The tree was dedicated on November 2, 1968, at a ceremony in which Mrs. James A. Halsted, Mrs. Roosevelt's daughter unveiled the plaque. Warren Jay Vinton, research director of the Resettlement Administration in the 1930's was the principal speaker.

WSSC Turns Down Sewer Request for School Complex

A request by the Prince Georges Board of Education to hook up sewage lines from the three-school complex on parcel 2 with the major trunk line on Indian Creek near the Beltway was turned down by the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission on April 14. The request specified a new line to go east from the trunk line over to Beaver Creek in the Agricultural Research Center follow along the creek bay and then go south to school board land. The new line would also serve the rest of parcel 2 and parcel 1 (the vacant land between Baltimore-Washington Parkway and Greenbelt Homes Inc. property).

WSSC said they could not justify the expenditure of \$570,000 for 18,000 feet of extra sewer line. Instead, WSSC recommended that the school board build its own temporary sewage treatment plant confined to just the senior high school. In the meantime, ways of reaching a permanent solution to serve the additional development on the school site will be explored.

Another alternative is a lift station, which is a permanent facility used when sewage cannot get into an existing station that flows naturally by gravity. Such a lift station would require reinforcement of Greenbelt's existing sewer lines and would be very costly, since there are recurring costs of maintaining and operating a lift station.

WSSC did approve one part of the school board request — extension of water lines from Ridge Rd. to the senior high school site. WSSC is asking the school board to contribute \$16,835 for these water lines.

Local Pianist to Perform With Baltimore Symphony

Martin Berkofsky, a native of Prince Georges County, will appear as guest solo pianist with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, at Prince Georges Community College Auditorium, on Thursday, May 7, at 8 p.m., in the final concert of the Prince Georges County-Baltimore Symphony series. He will play the "Mozart Piano Concerto No. 21."

Berkofsky was born in Greenbelt and attended High Point High School. A graduate of the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore he studied as a Fulbright scholar in Vienna under Richard Hauser. For the last two summers he has participated in the Marlboro Music Festival, Marlboro, Vermont.

Berkofsky has performed at New York City's Town Hall and Carnegie Recital Hall.

Three other numbers will be presented by the Symphony Orchestra: Beethoven's "Egmont Overture," Tchaikowsky's "Romeo and Juliet Overture Fantasy," and Rimsky-Korsakoff's "Capriccio Espagnol."

Admissions may be purchased at Prince Georges Community College Auditorium and at Twin Pines Savings and Loan Assn. in Greenbelt.

DEMOS TO SUPPORT CITY ON SCHOOL SITE ISSUE

A strongly-worded resolution urging the Prince Georges County Board of Education to seek an alternative site for the Greenbelt senior high school was one of the actions taken by the First District Democrats at a fully-packed meeting in the Greenbelt Municipal Building on April 19.

The organization formed recently to create a strong unified Democratic Party in Prince George's County's First Legislative District also voted to endorse candidates and a platform in the scheduled Democratic Primary this September.

The school resolution, which was approved unanimously supports "the citizens of Greenbelt in their opposition to a school complex including an elementary school, junior high school, and senior high school on a single site (parcel 2) landlocked between Baltimore-Washington Parkway in a maze of narrow winding streets."

The group expressed concern over the impact of traffic congestion stemming from buses and automobiles generated by a 4,200 student complex that "could destroy the community." It suggested that in the event the school board could not be prevailed upon to relocate the senior high school the Board of County Commissioners and the State Roads Commission act in concert "to expedite the planning and development of the perimeter road that will provide arterial access to the school site and relieve the traffic pressure on the historic planned community in Greenbelt."

The resolution observed that the implementation of the perimeter road shall remain a matter of most urgent priority "as long as the threat of the multi-school complex persists in the face of sensible land use criteria and the will of the community." In any event the school board was urged to delay construction until access to the school site is available via an improved perimeter road.

In addition, at the meeting held Sunday evening at the Greenbelt City Hall, the group elected its permanent officers under the newly adopted Bylaws and Constitution. Elected were: President: Louis Pohoryles, Laurel; Vice President: Francis W. White, Greenbelt; 2nd Vice President: Gerard F. Devlin, Bowie; Corresponding Secretary: Mary E. Devaney, Bowie; Recording Secretary: Jean Pomeroy, College Park; and Treasurer: Sam Barranca, College Park.

The First Legislative District consists of the following election districts: Vansville (1), Marlboro (3), Queen Anne (7), Laurel (10), Bowie (14), Mellwood (15) and Berwyn (21). It includes the towns or cities of Laurel, Greenbelt, College Park, Bowie, Beltsville, and Upper Marlboro.

Notice of Special Voter Registration

Compensation for Board, Audit Committee on Meeting Agenda

Preparations for the annual membership meeting on Wednesday evening, May 20, occupied most of the attention of the Greenbelt Homes, Inc., board of directors at its regular meeting on April 23. The evening session of the annual meeting will be held at the Center School Auditorium, starting at 7:30 p.m. Balloting for the six seats on the 9-man board and the three spots on the audit committee will begin that night and continue the next day at Twin Pines from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The agenda will include other items of business besides the balloting. Left over from last year's annual membership meeting was a motion for the membership to consider an increase in the compensation of GHI directors. At present the directors receive \$500 a year and the four officers \$750. The proposal last year was for an increase to \$750 for board members and to \$1,000 for officers. The last increase in GHI compensation took place ten years ago — in 1960.

The politically-sensitive board decided to take no position on compensation but to leave it up to the membership to decide on May 20. It did, however, agree to recommend to the membership a by-law change

that would compensate the three members of the audit committee. At present audit committee members receive no compensation. The board agreed upon the amounts — \$350 a year for the chairman and \$250 for the other two members.

Another item left over from last year's membership meeting concerned an inquiry into the effects of a Chesapeake Bay nuclear power plant on the environment. A committee of five was directed to determine and report to the board and membership whether GHI had an interest that would be adversely affected.

Townhouse petition

Also placed on the annual membership meeting agenda by petition was a proposal by new townhouse owners that the resale formula be modified so as to exclude improvements and additions (sheds, fences, etc.) from the appraised evaluations. Under the present formula, the equity in such improvements is shared with the corporation upon resale, which the townhouse members feel is inequitable. Another point at issue concerns the deduction from the resale price of mortgage interest saved by the homeowner by virtue of the fact that the original purchase price of the home did not include the value of the land.

Individual board members expressed sympathy with some of these points but felt that the regular membership meeting might not be the appropriate time to consider the intricate subject. When the formula was first adopted in 1967, it took more than one membership meeting before a consensus was reached. It was decided that the GHI larger homes committee would meet with the townhouse owners in an effort to agree on language which all could support at the membership meeting.

In a related matter, the board relieved the concern of townhouse owners that delays in the appraisal of the new homes would rebound to their disadvantage by requiring that the appraisals be applied as of January 1, 1970. Under the resale formula, the ratio of the original price to the appraisal at the time of purchase determines how the member and the corporation will share in any appreciation at time of resale. In another townhouse matter, the board voted to require that sheds, fences, and clotheslines be placed on the non-street side only.

Parkland Policy

The board agreed to a policy position regarding city concern over a lack of open space in the North End of town — a concern which the board shared. The board said that it recognized the need for extensive wooded parks in the North End area, parts of which it said, should be located on GHI property.

It felt, however, that specific locations could not be designated until GHI has adopted a Master Housing Plan. It therefore requested that the city delay any consideration of purchase of GHI land. It also felt strongly that several vacant tracts in the city will be developed long before GHI embarks on a building program and urged that the city give first priority to acquiring parkland in these tracts before they are rezoned or developed while the land is at a more reasonable price.

Other Action

The board accepted a proposal of the maintenance subcommittee that management undertake a study of illegal sheds and notify the membership that such sheds must be brought into conformity by September 30, 1970.

SOCC Meets Tuesday

The Save Our Community Committee will hold a general membership meeting on Tuesday, May 5, at 8 p.m. in the GHI board meeting room, Hamilton Place. Anyone who makes the specified contribution, or who has already done so, may register as a member, and everyone is invited to attend. The agenda will include a description of SOCC goals, a review of the past three months' activities, and a program for continuing action.

Since its beginning in February, SOCC has initiated resolutions of support from five diverse groups in recognition of the efforts of Greenbelt citizens to relocate the Junior and Senior High School complex. The organizations, with the dates of first contact and final membership approval: The P.G. County Federation of Civic Associations, Feb. 5 and April 2; The Citizens-Taxpayers' Alliance Inc./Taxpayers' Revolt Mar. 5 and Mar. 25; The P.G. County New Democratic Coalition, March 17; The First District Democrats, Mar. 29 and April 19; and The Maryland General Assembly, March 23 and Mar. 31.

New GHI Candidate

One new candidate has signified his intention to run for the Greenbelt Homes, Inc. board of directors—Thomas X. White, 8 Woodland Way. This brings the total so far to six. There are six openings on the board. The deadline for filing with the Nominations and Elections Committee is Saturday midnight, May 9, George Adams, chairman.

Registration for Kindergarten and First Grade for the 1970-1971 School Term

The Board of Education of Prince George's County announces that registration for kindergarten for the 1970-1971 school term will be held on Friday, May 1, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., in all elementary schools.

Parents should register their child at the elementary school in their attendance area. If parents are in doubt as to the school serving their attendance area, please call the Board of Education Office for this information. Telephone: 627-4800, extension 315.

Parents who are registering their child in kindergarten should bring the child's birth certificate as proof of age. Children entering kindergarten must be five years old by January 1, 1971. Verification of the child's smallpox and diphtheria immunization must be presented to the school on or before the opening of school on Monday, August 31.

Registration will also be held for children who will be entering first grade in the 1970-1971 school term. Children entering the first grade must be six years old by January 1, 1971. Children who are enrolled in the Kindergarten Program in this school year (1969-1970) in the Prince George's County public schools need not register. Birth certificates and verification of immunization must also be presented by parents registering children in the first grade, as the procedure is similar to that for registration of children in kindergarten.
