### GREENBELT PLAYS HOST TO 1,500 MARYLAND NATIONAL GUARDSMEN

When Governor Marvin Mandel declared an emergency Monday and called up units of the National Guard to help control student protests at the University of Maryland, Greenbelt suddenly found itself a staging ground for all National Guard units assigned to the operation. Headquartered at the local armory, a scant four miles from the trouble area, the Guard units drew upon many resources of the community.

Approximately 1500 men were bivouacked in Greenbelt. These comprise two battalions - the 1st Battalion of the 115th Infantry and the 121st Engineering Battalion. The 1st Battalion consists of three companies, of which one is the Greenbelt unit, one is a Silver Spring unit (Headquarters and Headquarters Company) and the third is composed of men from Catonsville, Frederick, Hyattsville, and Kensington.

The 1st Battalion has received extensive training and experience in riot control, having been called up five times for this purpose since 1963, including both the Cambridge and Baltimore riots. According to a lieutenant with the unit who asked that his name be withheld, no one to his knowledge had ever been hurt as the result of a Guardsman's action in the many times that his unit had been called up for such work.

For the University of Maryland incident, the unit was activated on Friday afternoon but then disban-They were reactivated at 10:40 a.m. Monday and began moving in to Greenbelt that afternoon and evening.

### Cooperation from City

The Guard unit is well aware of some criticism from residents concerning the extent to which facilities within the city had been taken over. Commenting on the "absolute cooperation" which the men had received from the city of Greenbelt, the lieutenant stated his personal regret that the citizens of the community had to be deprived of their recreation area. He pointed out, however, that the armory was quite crowded with the needs of the headquarters for the emergency operation. The availability of nearby restroom facilities was a major factor in the troops' being located near the town center, rather than, for example, at the lake

First to rise with the arrival of troops was a tent city, erected on the sloping land between the Youth Center and the tennis courts, with other tents erected on the baseball field and St. Hugh's athletic field. As of noon Tuesday, however, the softball field, which had been sodded only the day before, was kept open and city officials were hoping that a scheduled game could still take place that

### Water Turned On

To provide latrine and shower facilities for the sudden influx of troops, the city's Public Works crew worked after hours Monday, turning on water and gas heat for the showers ahead of season for the municipal swimming pool locker rooms. Mess facilities were erected in the north parking lot near Candy Cane City and two first-aid tents set up in the woods behind the tot lot. A field hospital tent occupied the front lawn of the armory. Officers for the four companies of men were quartered in the Youth Center, which was closed to the public. A gasoline supply truck was parked off the entrance to St. Hugh's School driveway, and the Operations Center for the Enigneering Battalion occupied the Jaycees building near-

In addition to opening city fa-

cilities to the Guard contingents, the city also provided garbage disposal to the troops in the form of one of the municipal dump trucks, which was permitted to use the city sanitary landfill site. Greenbelt policemen also participated in the emergency, directing traffic at the intersection of Greenbelt Rd. and U.S. 1 on Friday and on Mon-

day afternoon and evening.

### SPECIAL TRASH SERVICE

The city wishes to remind residents that a special trash collection service is available at no extra charge beyond the quarterly fee now charged for garbage collection. (Fees for GHI residents are included in the monthly charges paid to the corporation.) Such items as tree prunings, raked leaves, and discarded furniture may be set out for disposal.

Residents are merely asked to call the city offices, 474-8000, at any time of day or night and ask for a special trash pickup. Trash should not, however, be placed near the street, since accumulations of unsightly trash violates a city ordinance against littering and dumping. A \$50 fine may be charged against anyone violating this ordinance.

# Sewage Problems Surface At School Site Meeting

School site developments continued to create confusion and uncertainty in the minds of the city council, the city manager, and local civic groups as evidenced by last Monday's council meeting. Among the items that caused much speculation and received few clear answers were:

(1) whether or not Governor Marvin Mandel will sign Joint Resolution 81 calling for a moratorium on construction of the Greenbelt senior high school on parcel 2 until alternate sites are explored by the Prince Georges Board of Education with the City of Greenbelt.

(2) the plans of the school board for handling sewage from the senior high school after its application for a hook-up with the major trunk line on Indian Creek near the Beltway was denied by the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commis-

the attitude of the State Health Department toward a temporary portable sewage treatment plant which was recommended by

(4) the legal powers of the city to inspect and control such a temporary sewage plant so as to avoid

(5) the existence or non-existence of a legally-executed reverter clause which gives the former owners of parcel 2 first option to purchase back the land in case it is not used for school purposes.

(6) the status of a council-passed resolution on April 20 calling for the help of first district legislators in setting up a meeting with the ing the site.

(7) the status of still another council-passed resolution of March 23 calling for a city-conducted economic and cost analysis of alternate school sites.

### Will Mandel Sign?

Mayor Francis W. White told the meeting that the State Attorney General's Office had no objections to JSR 81 and that he thought the resolution would be signed at the next signing session. Other persons in contact with the Governor's Office reported that his assistants say that the Governor has not yet made up his mind.

### Temporary Sewage Plant

According to school board official Eliott Robertson, the school board owns a portable sewage treatment plant which was used at Prince Georges Community College. It could easily bring this plant over to serve the three-school complex.

Such a plant would need the approval of the State Health Department. According to Rhea Co-See SCHOOL SITE, p. 2, c. 5

### **Budget Feels Impact** Of New School Site

The impact of the Prince Georges Board of Education decision to put a senior high school on parcel 2 (land between Baltimore-Washington Parkway and Greenbelt Homes, Inc. property) was also felt on the 1971 budget prepared by city manager James K. Giese. Mentioned in the new budget are:

(1) A proposal for initiating engineering work related to access roads to the school sites on parcel 2. Streets requiring improvement, according to Giese, are Hamilton Place, Northway from Hillside to Ridge, and Ridge Road from Hamilton to Southway. No engineering funds are provided for extending either Hamilton Road or Northway. The program does include sidewalk construction. Giese added that should the high school be relocated, the engineering program would be modified, but some of the improvements contemplated would still be desirable to undertake, such as curb and gutter and shoulder improvements to Ridge

(2) \$8,000 in construction funds for improvement of Northway from Ridge to Hillside. This work would involve the addition of curbs and gutters, the widening of the street at each intersection, the improvement of parking shoulders and resurfacing. Giese proposed that the intersection of Northway and Hillside be modified so as to prevent Northway traffic moving in either direction from crossing the intersection - all Northway traffic would have to turn onto Hillside. Giese felt that this modification would prevent school traffic from using Northway between Crescent and Hillside while providing the minimum of inconvenience to residents living in the area.

# GREENBELT FACES RAISE IN PROPERTY TAX RATE

For the first time in nine years, the Greenbelt municipal tax rate may be increased, according to the 1970-71 budget submitted by city manager James K. Giese to city council on Monday, May 4. The increase proposed amounts to 15 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, bringing the property rate to \$0.95. In 1961 when the last tax hike was adopted, the rate was \$1.77 per \$100 assessed valuation.

### Saturday Beadline For GHI Candidates

This Saturday midnight, May 9, is the deadline for candidates for Greenbelt Homes, Inc., elections to file with the nominations and elections committee. Thereafter, any GHI member wishing to get his name on the ballot must submit a petition signed by at least 10 GHI members to the GHI office by 5 p.m. Wednesday, May 13.

At stake in the elections, which will be held in conjunction with the annual membership meeting on Wednesday and Thursday, May 20 and 21, are six openings on the 9man board of directors and all seats on the 3-man audit committee. Four of the six directors' seats are for two-year terms; two are for 1-year terms. Audit committee members serve for one year.

All nominees (including incumbents) are required to signify in writing their willingness to serve. Candidate's Consent Forms can be obtained from the elections committee or the GHI office. Biographies must be in the hands of Elections Chairman George Adams (46-D Ridge) by Monday night May 11, if they are to be printed in next week's issue of the News Review. The committee requests that each candidate run as an individual rather than as a member of a slate.

The latest candidates to announce for the board of directors are Norman B. Charles, 2-D Gardenway, and John Balch, 25-G Ridge Rd. They join six other members who have thrown their hats into the ring: Nat Shinderman, Steve Polaschik, Katherine Keene, Norman Weyel, Darwin Beck, and Thomas White. The first four are present members of the board.

Also announcing - for the audit committee - was Mary Welsh, 32-D Ridge Rd. She joins the two previously announced candidates-Janet James and James Foster.

Official proxy forms are available from the GHI office for any member who wishes to vote but will be unable to get to the ballot box. Such forms can be obtained only upon written request made directly to the GHI office. No member may vote more than one proxy. The official proxy forms must be turned into the GHI secretary or office by midnight, Thursday, May 14.

All persons who are GHI members of record as of April 29, 1970, are eligible to vote in the election.

The proposed budget provides crease of \$144,700 or 15 percent over the 1970 fiscal year appropriation of \$985,300. At the same time, revenue from all sources other than real and personal property taxes is expected to increase only \$59,000 in fiscal 1971, leaving \$85,700 additional to be raised through the property tax.

Giese noted that in previous years increases in the assessed valuation as the result of new construction or county reassessments helped to produce necessary additional revenues without raising the tax rate. This year ,however, because of the almost complete lack of growth in the last two years, the city's assessed valuation, it is estimated, will increase only from \$44.3 million to \$45.1 million. In the two previous years the increases had been \$3.3 million and \$2.2

Giese also noted that presently over \$2.6 million of increased valuation resulting from reassessment is under protest by Greenbelt Homes, Inc., and Springhill Lake. Another item used to balance the budget was a surplus of \$70,000 realized from previous fiscal years.

In addition to a property tax hike, Giese proposed an increase in waste collection charges, effective July 1, 1970. For owner-occupied homes, the basic charge would increase 75 cents a month to \$3.25. The rates for others would be increased proportionately. During fiscal year 1970, garbage collection charges fell short of expenditures by an estimated \$16,400. "Further increases in collection costs," Giese said, "will make the operating deficit even greater in future years unless there is a rate adjustment."

The proposed budget requires the collection of \$495,200 in real and presonal property taxes for the year ending June 30, 1971. Other anticipated revenue items of major significance include \$311,000 from Greenbelt's share of State income, admissions, race track, and gasoline and motor vehicle taxes (up \$63,000 from last year's estimate); \$63,700 in Federal and State grants-in-aid (up \$13,000 from last year); and \$161,800 from self-supporting activities (swimming pool, waste collection, etc.) and other charges for current services (up \$6,000 from last year).

Each \$5,213 in expenditures or revenues account for one cent on the tax rate.

The city council has scheduled its first budget review meeting for tonight, May 7, with the Finance Department. Other meetings have been set for Monday, May 11, for the Public Works Dept., and Wednesday, May 13, for the Police Dept. The budget must be adopted by June 10. A public meeting date

Major Expenditure Items The major items contributing to

the net increase of \$144,700 in the budget are as follows:

(1) Provision for the first full year's payment of principal and interest on the \$950,000 bond issue authorized by referendum in November 1968. This will amount to \$92,735, compared to about \$29,000 attributed to this item in fiscal

(2) \$40,000 for a 6 percent acrossthe-board increase in city salaries, paralleling that recently granted by the Federal government.

(3) \$9,900 for the operation and maintenance of the newly-acquired Lutheran Church property on Ridge Road as a community center primarily for use for meetings and for the conduct of supervised recreation programs.

(4) About \$12,000 for two fulltime assistants in the city manager's office, reflecting the increased workload as a result of growth of the city, greater activity on the part of council, and the under-See PROPERTY TAX, p. 2, c. 1

In case you don't grasp what I'm driving at, please be informed that the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) will not - and has no plan to - extend a sewer line up to the school-perimeter road area. So the school board will have to build a sewage treatment plant to service the school complex and they are planning to dump the effluent into Beaver Dam Creek. Where else? I don't know if they have informed the Agricultural Research Center of their plans, but so far WSSC has refused the preliminary drawings and the board is redesigning the treatment plant. And what will we do and what will the Research Center say when the devoloper of Parcel 1 also dumps his effluent into Beaver Dam Creek?

It seems to me that the city fathers ought to turn Mr. Giese away from that perimeter road kick he's on and find something else for him to do. For example, there's the constant flooding down into Lakewood and Boxwood from the slopes of Ridge Road. An engineering study for a trench and catch basin to divert and carry off the rain fall would be a fine environmental project. And it wouldn't cost one-twentieth as much as the perimeter road Mr. Giese is planning and would do a lot more good. Don't you think so?

### Reaction to Cambodia

This morning, like every morning, I opened my curtains and looked out toward the Center School and Braden Field. What made this morning different was the encampment of military tents that had sprung up there because the National Guard had been called out to quell disorders at the University of Maryland.

Later I went to the university with my husband, who is a professor, and listened to speeches at a crowded faculty meeting and at a student rally on the Mall. My impression was that the reaction of young people of draft age to the invasion of Cambodia goes very deep; they are frustrated, frightened, and angry. My own feeling is that the invasion of Cambodia is going to do far more harm to the United States of America than to the Viet Cong. Supporting our soldiers in Vietnam is one thing but I draw the line at invading a neutral country. I would like to see this policy speedily reversed by Congress using its powers to influence the President; for example, by cutting off military funds.

As soon as I got home from the university I wrote brief letters to the President and to our representatives in Congress expressing these views.

I hope other people in Greenbelt who feel the same way are going to write letters because it might do some good. As a reminder, our Senators are the Hon. Charles McC. Mathias and the Hon. Joseph D. Tydings, Senate Office Bldg., Washington, D.C. 20510. Our Representative is the Hon. Lawrence Hogan, House Office Bldg., Washington, D. C. 20510.

hen, vice-chairman of Save our Community Committee, health department officials have expressed concern about its polluting effects since the effluent from the temporary sewage system would spill into Beaver Creek, a part of which has a flat bed. The Citizens for a Better Environment, the local antipollution group, has passed a resolution opposing the installation of the temporary plant.

#### City Controls

A question as to whether the city had legal powers to inspect and control the sewer system brought no answers. Councilman Dick Pilski expressed concern that the city was not getting information first hand which he felt was vital since there may be a health problem. The council adopted his suggestion to write the State Health Department and WSSC to get all pertinent data dealing with the school complex. The council also asked its city solicitor to research the legal rights of the city to inspect sewage plants.

#### Reverter clause

A series of letters between the city council and school board officials was read into the record regarding a city request for a fully documented copy of the "deed-back" agreement between the school board and the former owners. Apparently there was some confusion as to whether the city was also referring to an oral agreement between the former owners and the school board relative to the dedication of certain streets in the event the board proceeds with its three-school plan.

#### Meeting with Governor

The city council and manager confessed to confusion over who was to initiate contacts with the State delegation to set up a meeting with the Governor. The council finally directed Glese to write letters.

### Economic Analysis

William Lathom, SOCC chairman, expressed concern that the had done nothing to employ a land economist to look into alternate school sites and their respective costs. Mayor White said that undertaking such a study before knowing what alternate sites the school board might consider could be costly. George Beauchamp suggested that the city manager get additional staff help, in view of many claims on the city manager's time, especially during this time of year with the budget.

(5) About \$12,000 in additional expenditures for police personnel and equipment (after subtracting anticipated grants from Federal government under Safe Streets Act and Highway Safety Act). This includes installation of a system of reporting - utilizing portable tape recorders - and the gradual establishment of a traffic safety division.

(6) About \$24,000 in additional salaries and expenses for public works activities, including parks and playground maintenance.

(7) About \$8,500 in additional expenditures for non-selfsupporting recreation activities, including additional amounts for special events and activities and for program leaders.

(8) \$8,900 in increased pension contributions and insurance costs over last year's appropriation.

A major offsetting item to these increases is the omission of a \$40,000 expenditure item for the Center Mall improvement project. At the same time, the revenue side of the budget omits \$20,000 which was to be raised through special assessment against the center mall property owners.

### City Notes

With ground-breaking for the widening of Southway Road expected to begin within about two weeks, the city is taking steps to insure as little disruption as possible of the present landscaping. On the west side of the street, a proposed sidewalk will be laid out with a bend or two to avoid removal of some ornamental trees. On the east side changes will be more extensive though only a very small number of trees there will be endangered. While these trees are too large to be transplanted, their absence will be less noted because other flowering trees will be planted along the median strip which will separate the two halves of the road as far as its intersection with Ridge Rd.

City officials have been meeting for some time with adjacent property owners to advise them of any changes that will be required in the landscaping of their yards. The Parks crew has also relocated plants and in one case staked a hedge line which must be moved

Despite a short staff which has forced the Public Works Dept. to assign regular crew members to the trash collection detail, the city has been able to make some progress on special projects, partly with the help of two additional summer employees for the Parks crew. Following petition by some two dozen young people in the vicinity, the city installed a basketball net at the playground at the top of the hill where Crescent and Ridge Rd. merge. The large filled area behind the Municipal Service Building was also cleaned up. But further development there was postponed until the ultimate development plans for the area have been formulated.

Following the loss at Braden Field of considerable grass over the winter, caused by salt leaching from sand used last year, the Public Works Dept. treated the area with lime and other chemicals. After it tested satisfactory for grass, new sod-some 600 square yards of it-was laid.

An attendant is now on duty from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekends at the Lake Park.

The staff at the swimming pool is cleaning and readying the pool and locker rooms for the 1970 season. Printed announcements concerning pool passes have now been received from the printer and will soon be distributed. Passes have not yet been received, however.

Spring is here, and the Recreation Department felt the full impact during the weekend's activities. On April 26, an estimated crowd of several hundred watched the opening ceremonies and parade for the beginning of the Little League season. At another part of Braden Field, a sizable group of spectators also gathered to watch

### New Oil Leak Traced by City

The latest oil leak to find its way into the feeder streams to the lake has been traced by the city to the basement of one of the stores in the commercial center. A broken feed line between a fuel tank and the nearby furnace, which was the source of the leak, has already been repaired and all spilled oil cleaned up.

Traces of oil are still appearing in the creek however, forcing the city to a new hunt. At this point the city does not yet know whether a new leak is involved or whether oil spilled earlier has disappeared into the soil, only to be washed out by the recent heavy

Are oil leaks catching? With three different leaks in the same general area within the last month or two, one might begin to

Both the main crews and the Parks crew have been doing many spring spruce-up jobs - painting new picnic tables for the parks, painting the reconstructed footbridge (after the oil fire), at the base of the lake peninsula, cleaning roadsides, cutting grass, and placing trash receptacles near ballfields and play areas.

The Parks crew also continued with a tree and shrub planting program near the bay end of the lake. Flowering pear trees have been planted between the pathway and the water on the west side of the bay, with some star magnolies interspersed. From the lake park near the bandstand, these flowering trees will form the far view of the lake.

Hemlocks have been planted along the shoreline at the bay end of the lake where mud dredged from the lake bottom last year had been piled. Although these trees are reported to be somewhat spindly in appearance this effect results from a shearing performed by the nursery in preparation for the transplanting. The trees will fill out to a rounded conical shape, according to the Parks crew, which did the work.

With the recent heavy rains, the city crews have been cleaning catch basins of debris throughout the city. They also cleaned the underpasses near the Center and tidied up parks and streets.

The mechanic recently performed a major job on the front end loader. Work involved repair of brakes and the steering mechan-
