GHI BOARD DEBATES PERIMETER ROAD LOCATION, ELDERLY HOUSING

Although no Greenbelt Homes; Inc., board member felt the perimeter road was imminent (indeed some felt that the bridge portions in particular would never be built), the board, at its regular meeting June 25, took its stand on where it wished one section of the road to be constructed.

In a 6-1 decision (Alex Chavrid dissenting as he felt GHI was being pushed into deciding before it had studied the matter more closely) the board recommended to the city council a middle route which would, however, swing west to join a route close in to GHI property along the settled portion of Plateau Place.

Discussion over the question was prolonged. Bill Lathom delivered the Ad Hoc Perimeter Road Committee's report, which recommended the most westerly route closest to GHI property. The reasoning was that with the road in that position it would reduce density of future development of parcel 1. Lathom reported that his committee understood that if a middle road were taken there would be 65 more units on parcel 1. This would also mean additional traffic. (It was estimated that one family makes 8.5 car trips per day.) In recommending this route, the committee noted that the road would be 120 feet from the closest GHI home.

Board members either vehemently supported or objected to the committee's recommendation. Katherine Keene felt 120 feet was much too close for even one member's home to be to the road. Thomas White felt that a middle route would have least all-around impact on GHI. Charles Schwan also opposed the route most contiguous to GHI.

Norman Weyel, on the other hand, supported the close-in route in order to deter future development. David Lange also felt he wanted to control development and traffic near GHI property. Darwin Beck felt the traffic problem would not be that great.

Some wanted to know why the decision had to be made that evening especially in view of a probable change in the school site. It was explained that the Prince Georges District Council had certain zoning applications to decide on, and amount of R-T (townhouse) the and R-80 (single family) zoning was dependent on the position of the perimeter road. Schwan also noted that July is the deadline for the county commissioners to accept zoning applications.

As a sort of compromise, Schwan proposed the middle route, which would join the close-in route near Plateau Place. If the city council did not approve of this compromise, the board then favored the fects of the concentration in a single residence of 100 elderly persons who formerly lived in neighborhoods integrated with respect to age and income. This review, they noted, should consider the effect on both the elderly persons and the former neighborhoods and the effect of locating such a residence adjacent to a youth recreational area.

Parking Problems

After having a committee meeting with area residents, the board decided not to construct a parking lot between 2 Court Laurel Hill Rd. and 14 court Hillside Rd. Another area on the corner of Hillside and Laurel Hill was decided upon as a better site, and the question was referred to the parking committee for its recommendation.

The board voted not to make an exception to a member who wanted to park a trailer in a court, since space for the trailer was available in the trailer lot. Fireworks and Concert Will Mark Fourth of July Here

Fourth of July, 1970, will be celebrated with a bang all over Greenbelt from the fireworks display at the lake, to backyard picnics all over town. In keeping with tradition, the Greenbelt Concert Band will perform at the Lake Bandstand at 8 p.m. Following the concert there will be a fireworks display at dark. The best view can be had from the north shore where the usual large crowd is expected.

Beginning the holiday festivities this year was the Fire Cracker Tournament, a double elimination slow pitch softball finals. Involving over twelve teams, the games began the week prior to the Fourth at Braden Field Number Two.

Mrs. Dorallen Davis, manager of the Greenbelt Swim Team has announced that members of the Swim Team will be on hand during the softball tournament to sell refreshments to the large crowds expected.

Other events planned are a Horseshoe Tournament at Greenbelt Lake at 10 a.m. on Saturday, and a Firecracker Golf Tournament at the Springhill Lake Golf course. The 18-hole tournament is open to any man interested. To make reservations call the Springhill Lake Golf course.

Area churches will observe July Fourth with a variety of topical sermons and anthems. Most of the congregation of the Greenbelt Baptist Church will be in Washington to attend the Honor America Day Program.

Band Concert

The program for the band concert will include the following numbers: "The Klaxon," "1812 Overture," "Stradella," "Southern Roses," "The Whistler and his Dog," "Blue and Gray (A Civil War Suite)," "Holiday for Trombones," "Guys and Dolls," and "the Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Citizens of Greenbelt are asked to bring their children to the community fireworks extravaganza and not to allow their children to play with firecrackers at home. The City Council, recreation, fire and police departments all cooperate to make the Fourth an exciting and safe holiday.

Extra policemen will be stationed at the lake to direct traffic and patrol the crowds. City Manager James Giese reminds the public that alcoholic beverages are prohibited, as is the use of fireworks by spectators.

A limited number of parking spaces will be available on Crescent Road, in Boxwood Village, and at the small lakeside parking lot. Giese recommends however, that residents walk to the lake if they can, to avoid the traditional traffic

In the event of rain, the fireworks will be postponed from day to day, and will be shown on the first day that weather permits.



COUNCIL APPROVES CONSTRUCTION OF TWO YOUTH CENTER ADDITIONS by Mary Lou Williamson

In a special meeting Monday, June 29, the City Council determined to include at this time the second phase of the addition to the Youth Center, awarding the contract to Hitt Decorating Contracting Corp., for \$24,611. In another action Council set Monday, July 6, as the date for a public hearing on a proposal by the Senior Citizens Housing Cooperative to build an apartment building for the elderly behind Candy Cane City on city-owned land. The Advisory Planning Board has reported favorably on the proposal.

The portion of the Youth Center addition in question would add a shower room, weight-lifting room, terrace, outdoor restrooms and steps down to Braden field. The decision on whether to go ahead with this part of the work was left over from the previous meeting at which council awarded the major portion of the contract to Hitt Corp. for \$139,211 (plus architectural fees of \$11,125). Since the total cost of \$174,947 (including both portions) was significantly above the amount budgeted in 1968 -\$150,000- council had asked City Manager James K. Giese for a rough cost analysis of the \$950,000 Capital Improvements Program to determine whether sufficient extra funds are available . Giese's quick survey was optimistic that such funds do exist. Contributing factors include federal open space funds already obtained (parcels 7, 8), optimism that federal funds will be forthcoming on current applications (Lutheran Church, Furey property), other state and federal aid not yet applied for and mandatory dedication of parkland in new developments (Smith-Ewing tract)-none of which were fully taken into consideration in the original 1968 capital improvements budget. Also there are savings of \$15,000 on the Fire Dept. addition and an expected \$50,000 in interest on unused portions of the money (\$17,000 already earned).

Senior Citizen Co-op

In a 6-1 decision, with one abstention, the board recommended to the city council that it endorse the proposed senior citizens housing project on the city-owned site behind Candy Cane City. The committee which made its recommendations to the board had one reservation, namely that Greenbelt residents be given priority for renting the units but decided not to encumber their approval with this item.

Most of the board felt the loss to the city of the parkland would be more than offset by the worthiness of the project. Only Chavrid objected, stating that he was against a 7-story building in the center of town and that the city might not have the engineers to properly oversee the grading for the project.

The board did make one recommendation to the Senior Citizens Board. This was to urge that it call on the resources of the University of Maryland or other quallified organizations to judge the ef-

Open Letter to Council I am aware that a letter was received by the city regarding the Perimeter Road, from the Park and Planning Commission, Therefore I suggest the following:

Any official City decisions pertaining to the Perimeter Road, such as land acquisition - and I refer to the parcels of land listed by the Advisory Planning Board which delineate the course of the proposed road - and discussion of alignment should be first discussed n a special town meeting. The March 23 meeting was strictly informational. Such a meeting as I am referring to should take place before the Area 67 Greenbelt-College Park Master Plan is sent from the Park and Planning Commission to the District Council for approval. The County Commissioners' hearing on this plan may be as early as mid-August.

It is the opinion of the Save Our Community Committee that the Perimeter Road may have been a good idea when it was first proposed, but now in light of the facts that the senior highschool site will be changed, and that many citizens have objected to the plan for the road and also in view of the economic reality that such an expensive four-lane street with 80foot right-of-way and two bridges simply cannot be financed and built for many years to come, - we believe that the concept of a perimeter road must be reconsidered.

We believe it is necessary now to link north Springhill Lake to the Greenbelt road system and very shortly it will be advisable for the City to press for a suitable subdivision plan in Parcel 1 and 2 and in Smith-Ewing north. This plan would provide for 60-foot rights-of-way in both properties for feeder streets (like Greenhill Road) and cul-de-sac development (like the Lakewood subdivision) in consonance with the original plan of this greentown. Our ideas on the subject include a land-acquisition plan that would re-establish the outer greenbelt, with the City purchasing a continuous strip of land in Parcels 1 and 2 adajacent to existing development.

The Save Our Community Committee urges Couuncil to hold a special meeting within the next six weeks, to provide citizens an opportunity to speak on the subject of the Perimeter Road.

City Notes Getting ready for the Fourth of

July holidays always makes special demands of the Public Works Dept. The lake trail between Olivewood Ct. and the dam, on land newly acquired by the city in its open space program will be graveled. One stretch through the woods has been full of mud holes and other hazards to walkers and joggers but could not previously be repaired because it was on private property. Water lines have been hooked up

from the Municipal Service Building to the locations of two new fountains near the playground and band stand. The fountains themselves have not yet been received, but if they arrive this week their installation will get top priority in the Department's activities. The fountain at Braden Field has been repaired.

The Parks crew fixed the horseshoe pits, repaired playground equipment, and installed trash cans. They also moved dirt excavated from the silt trap near the bay end of the lake away from trees near the intersection of the two lake paths from Olivewood Ct. and Lakecrest Dr.

A new children's playground has been installed on a location between 8 and 10 courts of Southway and accessible also to 14 and 16 courts of Ridge. An earlier playground, located in the woods, was removed at the time of construction of University Square.

Pepco installed lights on poles in Lakewood and Woodland Hills subdivisions to bring those areas up to the city overall street lighting standards - which require a light on every pole.

Contee Sand and Gravel Co. graveled and graded shoulders elong Edmonston Rd., an annual maintenance job. They also delivered a stockpile of gravel to the Municipal Service Building yard.

The city crew continued with its extensive job of hauling broken concrete as fill for the eroded storm ditch between Lakewood and Northway.



Recommendations To the Editor:

After reading the APB report listing priorities for "Future Land Acquisitions" in the News Review of June 25, I should like to make the following recommendations: "Springhill Lake golf course" This property is about the lowest level of land in Greenbelt and could be swampy the year around, making it very expensive to operate as a golf course.

"Furey property" - This area presents a far more serious problem for the City since it is outside the City boundaries, and as J read the City Charter, the City of Creenbelt cannot acquire property not within the boundaries of the City. This wording was written into the Charter at the insistance of the State Legslative Committee to protect such property owners as the Furey estate, Schroms, Jaegers, etc. from the City of Greenacquiring these adjacent belt properties. This situation might well have some effect on the Perimeter Road and even the City bond issue.

"GHI property next to parcel 1" - should certainly become a park and playground but with GHI retaining a sizeable portion of the



Disaster Relief Drives


