City Receives Award For Southway Project

A beaming city council accepted a Beautification Award presented to them by county councilman Samuel Boglev at the April 3rd city council meeting. The award is a certificate of excellence for beautification through good planning and is the result of the city's engineering and landscaping efforts along Southway Rd. It demonstrates that a road can be widened without sacrificing trees and creating a freeway effect, stated Bogley. A formal presentation to the city, as well as to other winners, took place on the 100th anniversary of Arbor Day, April 5, in Upper Marlboro.

City Manager James Giese cred ited the engineering firm of Greenhorne and O'Mara as well as retired head groundsman, Hans Jorgenson, for creating the attractive setting along Southway.

Hans Jorgenson was also honored by receiving a special award for his services to the city over the years.

CITY NOTES

Work has begun on installation of the long-heralded traffic light at the intersection of Greenbelt Rd. and Cherrywood Lane.

The Public Works crew recently installed a third drinking fountain at the lake park, about ten feet from the front of the concession stand but on the other side of the service road. Putting in the fountain required excavating a trench for a 200-foot underground line from another fountain. The concessionaire, if he so desires, will now be able to tap into the line to provide running water for the operation of his stand.

The city crew also improved the pathway on the south side of the lake, filling wet spots with gravel to a dry drainage level. Several springs along the trail there have kept certain spots constantly muddy.

Referendum on Indoor Swim Pool Set For October 3

City council voted unanimously Monday night to hold a citywide referendum on October 3 on the proposed indoor swimming pool, although it received a conflicting viewpoint from city manager James K. Giese.

Giese stated that the swimming pool would be a "fine asset to the city", but he recommended against setting a referendum date until after council views the new budget.

He stated that the financial sitution for the city was bleak in that costs were exceeding revenues and that even with excessive budget cuts, he would still have to recommend a tax increase. Therefore, he didn't think the time was propitious for the citzens to approve a further tax increase which would be necessitated by the construction of the indoor swimming pool.

Councilwoman Elizabeth Maffay stated that it was up to the citizens to decide if they wanted to pay for the pool. She saw no reason not to have the referendum. Speaking for the swimming pool committee, Murial Weidenfeld pointed out that the longer people waited the higher would be the construction costs. It was estimated that the pool would cost an additional 4 cents on the tax dollar.

Group Therapy

Bruce J. Payne a roving leader supervisor in Greenbelt's Drug Abuse Center, appeared before city council to ask the city to go on record as favoring group therapy sessions to be held in schools when drug problems exist.

When asked why Payne was seeking a governing body to recommend the program to the board of education, Payne replied that he felt it important for the program's success to have the support of the establishment and also to find out from the establishment what objections there might be to such a program. Payne asserted that from 40-70% of junior high and senior high school students were using drugs, including marijuana, that students were openly buying drugs in the cafeteria, and that "pandemonium" was rampant in many schools. Katherine Keene, speaking as a teacher from High Point High School, denounced those statements, stating that she believed only a small minority of students were drug users, and that drugs were not being sold openly in the schools, and to say that pandemonium exists in the schools is a slur on the county, the board of education, and the tax payers.

Council also expressed doubt that the problem was as serious in Greenbelt Jr. High as Payne alleged. Nevertheless, there was unanimous agreement to go on record as commending the group therapy program to the Prince Georges County school system. As council-man Charles Schwan noted, ""It could be a very useful program. Even if it doesn't work, no harm will have been done."

Box Culvert

Giese replied that in some areas not too much attention was given to sodding because it was expected that the Springhill Lake developers would be putting in a road to the culvert, but this project is in abeyance due to the sewer moratorium. Council refused to accept the culvert project into the city street system until the manager investigates further the completion responsibilities of the contractor.

Westway

Council voted to hold off the improvement of Westway Rd. be-cause the lowest bid was more than \$2000 over the engineer's estimate of what the project should cost.

A representative from Tennis, Unlimited, Richard C. Stevenson, submitted to council a proposal for an indoor tennis facility to be located behind the Municipal Service Building. The proposal was sent to PRAB for its consideration.

The Reverend Kenneth Buker complained to council about the stones and debris on the sidewalk from Parkway to St. High's Church and proposed a cement culvert or blacktopping for the area. Mayor Pilski, noting that this was not the first time Rev. Buker had brought the subject up and that council had promised to take action, exhibited some pique that nothing had been done. He asked Giese to come up with some suggestions in the next few weeks.

The city agreed to publicize the next meeting of the Environmental Organizing Committee for the purpose of organizing a separate citizens environmental group as well as a city group. Also agreed to was the city paying for the mailing of by-laws to members of the committee.

Councilwoman Cohen asked if the city would erect a sign on the street opposite the library saying Library Parking in the Rear due to the number of complaints by the nearby apartment residents who feel their parking spaces have been usurped by visitors to the library.

The city agreed to submit its recommendation concerning the revisions to the mandatory dedication ordinance to the county council. \$380 was appropriated for the mosquito control program over the objection of councilwoman Cohen who favored biological controls instead of spraying. \$1,600 was authorized for the 4th of July fireworks display.

It was agreed to employ the auditing firm of Lee Hendricks, Hale & Co., which has performed the city's audit for the past four years, for the current fiscal year. A resolution authorizing the computation of interest on a deed of trust and a promissory note granted to the SHL owners at the rate of 71/5% per annum instead of 8% due to the city financing the cost of constructing Gentry Drive at a rate of Interest not exceeding 7½% per annum was agreed upon.

street and area lighting. Specifically, city solicitor Emmett Nanna has asked the court to rule on Ordinance #722, enacted De-cember 20, 1971, which authorizes the issuance of bonds and the levying of an ad valorem tax on real and personal property within the special taxing district to pay annual principal and interest costs for these bonds. The city had previously, in March,

1970 seceled a ruling on an earlier ordinance that it could not establish a special taxing district for the purpose of levying taxes against center mall property owners to finance the operation and maintenance of the commercial center. The earlier ordinance had provided that the cost of maintenance and improvement of the mall would be shared equally by the city and the property owners in the special taxing district. The 1971 ordinance provides that the property owners would bear the entire cost of the renovation but would not pay any annual maintenance and cleaning charges.

Abraham Chasanow, on behalf of several of the property owners (William and Charles Cohen, Greenbelt Realty Company, and Greenbelt Professional Building, Inc.) has filed a reply with the court. The attorney argues that the 1971 ordinance, like the earlier one, is invalid on the grounds that

(1) the ordinance would impose a double burden of taxation on the property owners, who also pay city real estate taxes on the same property

(2) the ordinance arbitrarily and discriminatorily excluded certain properties in the center when designating the boundaries of the special taxing district;

(3) the Maryland State Code cited by Nanna as authority for the ordinance does not apply to pedestrian malls and public parking facilities already in existence;

(4) no special taxing districts have been set up elsewhere in the city for improvements to property owned by the city:

The action of the Prince Georges County Council, sitting as the District Council, in approving a special exception for the Greenbriar apartment project has been challenged in court. Thomas X. White, on behalf of the Greenbelt Save Community Committee Our (SOCC), has asked the Circuit Court for a summary judgment re-

versing the November 17, 1971 decision of the district council which would permit the construction of 2- and 3-bedroom apartments in excess of the number allowed by the zoning ordinance.

The special exception would permit the Greenbriar project to add 347 bedrooms (not counting family rooms and dens)) for an increase of 18 per cent over that permitted by the R-30 zoning ordinance. The latter calls for a percentage distribution of 50% 1-bedroom units, 40% 2-bedroom units, and 10% 3bedroom units. Under the special exception, the distribution becomes 31-48-21.

In passing the special exception, the district council attached several conditions, such as occupancy limitations, rental minimums, and conformity to mortgage plans and site plans, to assure a "luxury-type" apartment.

In his petition, White charged that the district council had erred because:

(1) Part of the Greenbriar tract had been improperly zoned from R-R (rural residential) to R-30 (14 apartment units per acre). Involved here is a tract which had been set aside for a right-of-way for a proposed bisecting road at the time the property was zoned to R-30 in July, 1965. As a right-ofway, it retained its original R-R classification. Later the right-ofway was abandoned and in November, 1971, the district council zoned the tract previously omitted to R-30.

White alleged that the latter action was specifically prohibited by a zoning moratorium in effect at the time, was done without a public hearing, and that the 60-day period allowed for corrections of errors had expired..

(2) The special exception will make "possible a substantial increase in the number of inhabitants dwelling upon the subject properties" resulting in increased school enrollment and heavier traffic volume.

(3) The district council made no fort to determine whether adequate or safe sewage facilities were or would be available, although it was known that no public sewage was available and there was a state-imposed moratorium on the granting of sewage facilities.

(5) the ordinance is an attempt to punish the center mall property owners by assessing them 100 percent of the cost of improvements.

Caribbean Art Exhibited

'What's With These People?' To The Editor: CIRCULATION MANAGER

I should like to comment on Mrs. Cohen's and Mr. White's letters Mrs. Sumi Whitehead has rethat appeared in last week's News sumed her job as circulation Review. The former wrote that the newsmanager for the Greenbelt News

paper reported "words like 'specious' and 'fallacious' and . . . phrases such as 'many inaccuracies' and 'would have lost all credibility.' She complained that there were "no counterbalancing comments to show that the Council minority opinion is based upon documentation and testimony that has accumulated since last November."

The words quoted were mine, They referred to seven specific statements I asserted were without foundation in fact - statements which Mrs. Cohen or Mr. White, or both, had urged council use to support its recommendations.

The News Review reported "no counterbalancing comments" because none was made. Neither Mrs. Cohen nor Mr. White uttered one word in defense of their statements at the council meeting of March 20. In this they showed wisdom. I indicated then that I was prepared to document my charge that their statements were falsifications.

Mrs. Cohen contrasted the "socalled 'calm reasonable approach'" of council to "the high level of concern shown by Dr. Stearns." She failed to note that she had voted against (and Mr. White spoke against) the resolution passed by council requesting county council not to amend the Ten-Year Water and Sewerage Plan until it had obtained from Dr. Stearns an assurance that the discharge would not constitute a health or ecological risk.

Perhaps my strongest objection to Mrs. Cohen's letter is reserved for her "news for the News Review." She quoted a letter she received from the Deputy Secretary of Health, Richard Batterton, in which he stated, "I find no indication that local government can, through regulation, dictate the conditions by which the State will approve sewage treatment facilities."

No first year student of government or of law would disagree with Mr. Batterton's statement. No member of the council majority ever suggested that the city "through regulation" make any such attempt. The council majority, however, consistently has sought by recom-

The nearest that anyone has come to asserting a power of the city such as Mr. Batterton rejects was made by Mrs. Cohen in her dissent to council's resolution of February 7. She wrote in part, . In my opinion, the city definitely has a responsibility, (b) to enforce the city's Ordinance #719, an Ordinance Prohibiting the Disposal or Entrance of Water Pollutants into the Storm Drainage System of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland . . ." In other words, at that time Mrs. Cohen appears to

have believed that the city's ordinance would take precedence over determinations made by the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene respecting sewage treatment facilities and those of the Department of Water Resources respecting water quality.




