A unanimous council at its Monday, September 9 meeting enacted a financial disclosure law requiring themselves and future candidates for council to submit reports of their financial holdings. The city manager is also subject to the law, as well as spouses and dependent children.

Local Disclosure Law

**Passed by Council** 

Under the law each councilmember and candidate for council will be required to list the nature and extent of interests held in business which exceed 3 percent of the invested capital or \$1,000, the location and description of real estate in which ownership intere amount to 3 percent or \$10,000 of invested capital, the source (but not the amount) of income in excess of \$100 except from the city or from savings accounts or govermental securities, the listing of all debts in excess of \$500 except those owed to established lending institutions, and the listing of all gifts received in excess of \$50 except from relatives and employees.

Arguments made against the law for a small city like Greenbelt with its part-time officials incled a fear that the measure might discourage citizens from running for office, that it would subject council members to baseless law suits for unintentional violations of the law, and that during election campaigns it would focus attention on the financial holdings of candidates and away from the real issues of the day.

#### **Pro Arguments**

Harry Sanders, speaking on behalf of a local chapter of Common Cause, felt that these objections were overcome by the desirability of giving the citizens of Greenbelt a chance to determine whether their elected officials are acting for their private gains or for the public good. He argued that a small city like Greenbelt needs a financial disclosure law more than the state legislature because in Greenbelt each city councilman is one of only five policy-makers, whereas at the State level policy making is divided between 188 State legislators and a strong executive body.

Sanders acknowledged that the disclosure law might discourage some citizens from running for office, but he thought it might discourage others who have serious conflict of interest. He also thought the law might encourage good people to run because they would know that their opponents will also be scrutinized. Finally, he claimed that the financial disclosure law would provide well intentioned candidates with publicly available facts to counter false attacks of conflicts of interest. To Mayor Pro Tem Gil Weidenfeld one advantage of municipal disclosure laws would be that they might have the effect of forestalling state action in this area. He also said that no previous candidate or council member has spoken out against the law, leading him to assume that the law would not be an inhibition against runing for office.

The local Lion's Club wishes to thank the community for their turnout in making the Labor Day Festival Breakfast the biggest in the club's history. Over 900 people were served, which means that more funds will be available to help the less fortunate in the community this year.

Nine extra pans of sausage were donated to the Mowatt Memorial Church Booth at the end of the breakfast, to be sold by them during the rest of the festival.

## Appeal of EPA Decision Next Controversial Issue

The city council at a special meeting on Wednesday, September 11, left open the possibility of participating in an appeal of the Federal Environmental Protection Agency's decision to grant a discharge permit for the Greenbriar on-site temporary sewage treatment plant. The council first, however, wanted to see the brief filed by the law firm of Covington and Burling on behalf of the Prince Environment Coalition Georges (PGEC) which is requesting an adjudicatory hearing on the matter.

The majority of council were reluctant to ask for a hearing. They felt that, unless new evidence could be presented, their effort would be futile, since the city's arguments opposing the plant in the past had been rejected by NASA, the State Department of Natural Resources and EPA. The majority also turned down a motion to request the National Aeronautics and Space Agency to hold up its granting of an easement until after an adjudicatory hearing was held by EPA. NASA approval of the easement in July was contingent upon EP-A's approval which came through September 4.

Councilman Thomas White, supported by councilman Richard Castaldi, made a strong pitch for joining PGEC in the appeal, arguing that this would overcome the city's objection to spending its funds. He also felt that new evidence need not be presented at a hearing, but that it-was important to reemphasize the points previously made in the record. But Mayor Richard Pilski and councilmen Charles Schwan and Gil Weidenfeld thought White's proposal would be premature, and that it would be unwise for the city to accept the PGEC brief sight unseen.

Schwan declared it would be as if the city were "a caboose on the PGEC brief." City counsel Emmett Nanna said that it was not necessary for the city to adopt the appeal at this time. The city could come in later and adopt whatever part of the PGEC brief it felt applicable.

Two city councilmen from College Park - Alvin Kushner and Charles Carroll - urged the city to join the appeal arguing that failure to do so would leave the impression that the Greenbelt council had not previously been serious about its concerns over the lack of requirements for nitrogen removal and virus surveillance. They expressed concern over the effects of the sewage effluent downstream on Indian Creek as it flowed through the inhabited parts of College Park.

College Park councilman Kushner asked that if the effluent were 'better than drinking water" as attested to by Greenbriar consultant Dr. John Cookson, then why didn't the developer "recycle it and send it back to the occupants of Greenbriar, rather than sending it to us." Cookson, displaying forceful confidence in the advanced technology involved in the tertiary treatment plant, replied that it is just a matter of time until this happens. "This plant is a water reclamation plant. Everywhere we are moving toward complete water reuse. We need public health permission to do this, but it will come about as soon as people overcome their mental hang-up to drinking the water." Cookson further elaborated on his reasons why the treatment plant would not present any health or ecological hazards to Greenbelt or College Park. but White, Castaldi, and Rhea Cohen from PGEC remained unconvinced They expressed concern over the needs for more specific standards or parameters on virus and for procedures to follow if virus is found. Castaldi said he is not

situation regarding the The Greenbriar sewage treatment plant was further muddled this week with news that the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) and Greenbriar Associates are the latest parties to request an adjudicatory hearing on the discharge permit granted by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Earlier the Prince Environment Coalition Georges (PGEC) announced its intention to note an appeal.

But the reasons for the appeal are diametrically opposite. PGEC is basing its appeal on the alleged lack of adequate standards for the plant such as provisions for nitrogen removal and virus monitoring. WSSC and the developer are taking the position that some of the conditions attached by EPA are too stringent.

WSSC charged in its appeal that the permit imposes conditions which cannot be met by the agency as operator of the plant. It stated that the hearing is necessary so as to prevent a violation of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act.

WSSC took particular objection to the requirement that there shall be at all times one qualified operator on the treatment site who is certified by the State of Maryland as a Class "A" superintendent. It said that the requirement is practically impossible to attain since there are few such Class "A" superintendents in the State. (According to WSSC, Class "A" superintendents are stationed at the regional plants where millions of gallons of sewage are treated daily.) The agency asked that the EPA requirement be changed to a trained operator on the site at all times who would perform under the general overall supervision of one of the Commission's two Class "A" superintendents.

WSSC also objected to a requirement that the effluent limitations be based on 30-day average and maximum daily results sample taking. The previous EPA requirements were limitations based on 30- and 7-day averages. WSSC claimed that the new requirements are not feasible.

Finally, WSSC suggested that the expiration date for the permit be changed to either July 1, 1975 or the completition of Phase 1 of the Western Branch treatment plant, whichever is later.

The details of Greenbriar's appeal are not known at this time

Councilman Charles Schwan said that if the law turned out to be confusing or created problems of interpretation or enforcement, it could be amended. Councilman Tom White said his only problem with the law was that it would leave uncovered many conflicts of interest.

Council members have thirty days after the effective date of the ordinance to file their first financial reports. The reports are to be filed under oath to the city clerk and shall be open to inspection during normal office hours.

#### Who Will Soeak For Greenbelt?

#### To the Editor:

On September 4, 1974, the EPA finally issued a discharge permit for the Greenbriar sewage treatment plant. For a plant that was first proposed nearly four years ago in March of 1971, this was just another in a long series of setbacks that concerned citizens of Greenbelt have had to cortend with in opposing this plant. In these columns on previous occasions I have often made the point that one of the major flaws in our fight against this unnecessary and potentially hazardous facility has been a weak and equivocal position of the elected city council. "A maybe and so-so" position of the previous city council was used to great advantage by the developer in securing approval after approval.

I thought that had all changed in September of 1973 when the environmental issues were taken up by everyone running for council. Indeed, after the September 1973 council election the Greenbriar votes went from 4 to 1 against a strong opposition to the plant, to 4 to 1 in favor of stating clearly and definitively the city's opposition to this unnecessary facility. Well, it's now a year since the election and it seems that council is slipping back to its old ways. On Monday, September 9, I pre-

sented to council several strong arguments in favor of the city's filing a request for an Adjudicatory Hearing with the Administrator of Region III of EPA on the issuance of the Greenbriar permit The issues that I suggested the City use as a basis for the Hearing were:

(1) The permit does not require nitrogent removal - a requirement asked for by the city since February, 1972;

(2) The permit does not require either a standard for virus removal, or a defined protocol for virus monitoring, or clearcut procedures to be followed in the event of virus detection; and

(3) The EPA, in their consideration of the permit, gave little or no attention to other more reasonable methods for treating the wastewater generated by this project.

The city council failed to take action on this motion on Monday. Stated concerns were mainly that the costs to the city in taking such a course would be high, and that one council member was missing. The question was deferred to a special meeting held two nights later (Wed., Sept 11) Again I stated my arguments strongly and clearly. Councilmen Schwan and Weidenfeld could not be convinced that it would be worth while for the city to ask for review of the permit.

Former councilwoman Rhea Cohen, on behalf of the Prince Georges Environment Coalition, suggested that the city could join in the adjudicatory process when that organization files a request for a hearing. Such a route would allow the city's views to come before the hearing with little or no expense being borne by the city. I saw this as accomplishing the same purpose and moved for council to proceed in that direction. This time councilman Schwan had misgivings about the city being a "caboose".
