CITY CEMETERY - 1-95 HIGHWAY PRODUCE HEATED DISCUSSION

The only controversy at Monday's city council meeting was sparked over the city's cemetery. (The cemetery, located adjacent to the State Roads Commission on Kenilworth Avenue, was deeded to the city by the Federal government at the time the town was sold.) Councilmen Gil Weidenfeld and Charles Schwan felt "the city should get out of the cemetery business" by not selling any more plots. Since there are only 168 plots (of which only 17 have been sold) it would not be fair to the taxpayers to have to subsidize such a small number of residents-or former residents-or permanent residents, they argued.

councilmen Tom White, Richard Castaldi and Mayer Richard Pilski (the latter two had already purchased plots before the moratorium on sales placed by council almost two years ago) felt that the city was obligated to sell more plots to, at least, fill in those sections where plots have already been sold. All agreed that the sale, if resumed, would have to include a price which would provide for perpetual maintenance.

The city manager, James Giese, had proposed that the cemetery be made into a memorial park which would preserve in an appropriate manner, the existing grave sites, including the Turner Family cemetery, and would provide for memorials - such as living plants, trees, gardens, markers. The park would be for the enjoyment of the living, and, in particular, the enjoyment of the citizens residing in the neighboring developments.

Four city advsory boards commented on the city manager's proposal, all in essence agreeing with his plan for ending the sale of plots and maintaining a park. The Community Relations Advisory Board (CRAB), the Advisory Planning Board, the Park and Recreation Board and the Bicentennial Committee all favored a memorial park concept developed around a natural setting; the Bicentennial Committee also recommended a "Library of Remembrance" in the cemetery.

The city manager noted that a reserve of at least \$20,000 would be needed to provide minimal maintenance if the property remained solely as a cemetery.

Council carried over to its next meeting a final decision on whether to maintain the cemetery as a cemetery with unlimited sale of plots, whether to sell some plots to fill in the sections where plots have been sold, or to cease selling plots and turn the area into a memorial park.

I-95

At the request of the chairman of the county council and the county executive, a study of highway facilities in the Rockville area, including the outer Beltway, is proposed to be extended to include the outer Beltway from the Montgomery County line to the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. Council has been asked to comment on this proposal before any action is taken.

Giese noted that in the past. council has expressed concern over proposals to use a section of the outer Beltway to route I-95 from its present location over to the B-W Pkwy., in order to run the interstate highway into the District of Columbia. The inclusion of the outer Beltway from the Montgomery County line to the B-W Pkwy. again raises the question as to whether this is a means to proceed with the construction of the I-95 connector link which had drawn much citizen opposition, he added.

Councilman Gil Weidenfeld strongly opposed the connection, stating that such a connection would destroy the Parkway by bringing in heavy commercial traffic.

Councilman White angrily protested this further move to turn a "study" into an "investment in concrete". He felt Montgomery County has always sought to funnel its high load of traffic from 70S into Prince Georges. And he expressed his dismay at what he called the "Maryland DOT's dismal record for rapid transit-all they want is concrete.'

White proposed to communicate to the county executive, the delegates to the legislature and the communities of Bladensburg and Cheverly, stating that "the city is opposed to piecemeal study of major transportation facilities which would impact on the B-W Pkwy. and that a full environmental impact study, including the entire region of the outer Beltway, be completed before any major transportation facilities are imposed."

Following unanimous passage of the motion, White crypticly remarked that "Greenbelters are captive to Md. DOT. The B-W Pkwy. is in desperate need of improvements, for reasons of safety, but DOT won't make any improvements unless we go along with their grand scale design for the Parkway."

Use of School Property

The Board of Education will consider its staff recommendation to enter into an agreement with the city for the city to utilize various school facilities and unimproved property for recreation purposes. The council commended the Board of Education's staff on its cooperation in this matter. Council also agreed to pay nominal legal expenses for preparing the agreement.

The city also agreed to write letters to Governor Marvin Mandel in support of the Springhill Lake Elementary School PTA's efforts in appealing the decision of the State Interagency Committee for State Public School Construction not to provide funds for reconstruction of the school. Although a new gymnasium and a diagnostic center for the school, built in 1966 and expanded in 1969, were approved, the PTA is seeking air conditioning, an improved library and media center, improved multi-purpose kitchen-cafeteria room, office and storage space, health room, and teacher work areas and conference

Monsignor O'Donnell and Pastor Birner were reappointed to CRAB.

Senior Citizen **Bus Service**

A weekly shuttle bus service for Greenbelt's senior citizens was initiated this morning. Every Thursday at 10 a.m. and again at 12:15 p.m., the bus will wind its way around Greenbelt to the Beltway Plaza Shopping Mall. Return trips from the Plaza are scheduled at approximately 12 noon and 2 p.m. Passengers will be picked up and discharged at points throughout the core of Greenbelt including the Greenbelt Shopping Mall. Stops will also be made along Greenbelt road - Greenbelt Convalescent Home, Giant Food Store and Beltway Plaza.

Former city manager Charles McDonald, president of the Greenbelt Golden Age Club, spearheaded the project, which is funded by the county under the auspices of the Department of Human Resources' Division of the Aging. McDonald stressed the importance of having enough senior citizens utilize the bus service in order to justify the new program. Eligible persons, 55 years and older, may pay their 10c fare (one way) on the bus or obtain a book of tickets at the Golden Age Club's quarters in the Youth Center on Wednesdays from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Senior citizen cards may also be obtained at the

Scheduled stops on Thursdays will be as follows: Crescent and Lastner at 10 a.m.; Crescent & Greenhill; Crescent and Northway; right at Parkway to Co-op parking lot loading platform; along Crescent to Hillside with stops on Hillside at 6 court, Northway, Laurel and Research; stops along Ridge at Research, Laurel, Plateau, Northway, Eastway, Gardenway; back to Co-op loading platform; along Crescent to Westway; Westway and Ridge; 14 Ridge; Southway and Ridge; 10 Southway; along Greenbelt road with stops at Convalescent Home, Lakecrest road, Giant Parking lot; Beltway Plaza Mall where a stop will also be made at the A & P. The bus will return via Greenbelt Road as far as Kenilworth and come into Greenbelt past the lake to Lastner and Crescent where it will follow the same route. Persons may get on or off at any

Shopping Trips

The county also offers a shopping trip to senior citizens the third Friday of every month. According to S. Seabey, Supervisor of Transportation for the Division of the Aging, there has been a "fair turnout" for trips to Landover Mall since July. The bus picks up Greenbelt passengers at the Suburban Trust Bank at 10 a.m. and usually returns about 1 p.m. The cost is 10c each way or a \$2 card, representing 10 round trips can purchased at the Golden Age Club quarters. Trips to other shopping malls are planned.

To participate in both programs, a senior citizen does not have to be a member of the Golden Age Club. For further information call McDonald at 474-6475.

City Council to Consider Charter Amendments and Advisory Board Reports

Coming up at this week's city council meeting on Monday, March 3 is a number of charter amendments as well as a number of advisory committee reports.

One charter amendment reverts the formal date of adoption of the city budget back to June 10, the date that had been in effect up to two years ago. At that time, a June 20th budget adoption date was accepted in order to enable the council to determine final action on a county tax rebate prior to adopting the city budget. (The county council had a later adoption date than the city council.)

The county charter has now been amended so that its budget must be adopted by May 15th. Therefore, the city is changing the deadline for adoption of the city budget back to June 10 in order to enable its finance department to have more time for the preparation of

Another charter amendment will bring present city tax procedures into conformity with State law, which prevails.

A third charter amendment scheduled for final hearing deals with the proposed revision in city election procedures. However, city councilmen have indicated that a public hearing will be held on this subject before final action is taken.

Advisory Committee Reports

The Park and Recreation Advisory Board has submitted a preliminary report on the city staff's playground survey. PRAB recommends redevelopment of the Lake Park playground and Candy Cane City as Bicentennial projects, to be funded during the coming fiscal year.

The Bicentennial Committee has submitted for council's approval the text of the historical marker to be placed on Southway in front of the 11 court adjacent to the proposed city entrance sign. This marker commemorates the city and its origin as a planned community. The committee also requests the city to pay the cost of the marker in the amount of \$358.30, and proposes that it be erected in time for dedication on Greenbelt Day, 1975.

The CABLE Television Committee has submitted an extensive report describing all aspects of the feasibility of franchising CABLE television in Greenbelt. The report recommends that CATV is not feasible for Greenbelt at the present time, but that the city should continue to monitor development in CABLE television.

The committee further feels that, in order for CABLE television to be a viable reality in Greenbelt, a cooperative effort between the city and county is required. The committee also recommends the city oppose any efforts to transfer CATV franchising authority to the State. It notes the importance of the support of landlords for any Greenbelt area CATV to be successful. The committee also recommends that questions pertaining to CATV be included in the bi-annual survey conducted by the city at its council election.



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


