# **GHI** Solar Heat Project **Runs Into Cost Problems**

With Phase I of the solar heat project now completed, Greenbelt Homes Inc. and Goddard Space Flight Center are considering Phase II. Phase I provided for installation of storm doors and windows on two rows of brick houses that were instrumented to measure heat loss and fuel consumption characteristics. The data collected over the next 12-month period will be computerized by Goddard.

Phase II of the project has run into problems because of costs involved. Goddard is concerned that the revised estimate of cost per home for solar heat was approaching \$16,000, far above the original estimated cost per home.

Currently, Goddard is reevaluating and scaling down some of the engineering aspects of the original Phase II program. The architectural firm had designed a rather elaborate aluminum structure to support the solar collectors on the roof. This design is presently being replaced with a wood type structure resulting in considerable reduction in cost. Additionally, the piping system and controls are being scaled down to a more simple system. It is also now current thinking that Phase II may be confined to only the flat roof building.

Another problem involves the 3,100 gallon storage tanks which were objected to by members. Currently, the reevaluation plan will utilize smaller tanks of 275 gallon capacity. It is contemplated that excavation of dirt from the crawl space would be effected to accommodate ten of the tanks, which are commercially available. Other Matters

GHI has only two tenants who are affected by the county-passed 2 percent apartment tax on rentals of more than \$150. Its GDC apartments have 12 affected tenants, but some may be exempt under the various provisions of the ordinance.

GHI has signed a contract with Takoma Fuel Company for the coming year. This contract is for #2 oil; the current price, including sales tax is .3252 cents per gallon.

The Supreme Court ruled June 16 that stock purchased in a coop housing project that in reality represented acquisition of a residential apartment, does not qualify as a security subject to SEC regulations. This decision reversed a U. S. Circuit Court ruling in a case brought by some tenants of Co-op City in New York

# **GREENBRIARSEWAGE PLANT GETS PERMIT EXTENSION**

The Maryland Water Resources Administration (WRA) has extended the State permit for the Greenbriar sewage treatment plant to June 30, 1976. WRA also stipulated that the permit reflect "a November 14, 1975 deadline for diversion of wastewaters to the Western Branch facility," so that sufficient flexibility is provided "to evaluate the status of existing flows and scheduled expansion of the Western Branch Treatment facility."

At the June 16 hearing in Upper Marlboro before hearing officer Ro-ger Kanerva of WRA on the extension of the permit, scheduled to ex-pire on July 1, the city of Greenbelt and the Prince Georges Environ-ment Coalition (PGEC) urged immediate transferral of the Greenbriar development's wastewater to the public system rather than ex-

# **GHI 1st Qtr. Spending** Much As Budgeted; **Rough Waters Ahead**

First-quarter operations of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. kept very close to budget plans, according to the fiscal statement prepared by GHI comptroller Don McGinn. The corporation spent \$898,000 in the three-month period ending March 31, 1975 - about \$5,000 less than anticipated when the budget was prepared in December 1974. At the same time income was up some \$12,000 over the \$776,200 predicted, mainly due to an upsurge in resales which increased the revenue from sales department fees. Altogether, the net improvement in actual experience over predicted experience was \$17,000.

(As is always the case because of the seasonal nature of GHI expenditures, first quarter income does not equal first-quarter expenditures. For the first three months of 1975, this deficit, while amounting to \$110,000, was considerably below the comparable defdeficit of \$162,000 in 1974.)

This cheery picture is not expected to last long, however. The already announced hike in fuel oil prices, with more predicted to come, will be fully felt in the GHI budget by the fall when the heating season begins.

The heating budget has little to spare to meet this contingency. In the first quarter, fuel oil costs for the brick homes were \$93,500, some \$8,500 below the budgeted amount and for the frame homes were \$189,200, some \$4,500 below the budget. When other heating costs are included, the frame home expenditures actually exceeded the heating budget during the first quarter — by \$4,500, although the brick costs still stayed below the budget.

But even more serious are the costs facing the corporation if required to replace eleven rotary cup burners in frame home heating plants within the next two years. The cost of this conversion, which is dictated by State anti-pollution laws, is estimated to be beween \$110,00 and \$150,000.

tending the permit as requested by the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC). The Commission said it was its

understanding that the Greenbrier plant was to operate until the expansion of the Western Branch Treatment plant to 15 million gallons a day (mgd) was complete, which should come about barring any delays, in early 1976.

City Position The city felt that hooking up now the public system was justi-fied since occupancy at the project is presently a fraction, (about 150 units) of both the ultimate goal (1,193 units) and the design ca-pacity of the interim plant. Presently the Greenbriar plant, which has a capacity of 200,000 gallons a day is treating approximately 38,000 gallons of wastewater each day. PGEC additionally contends that there is now enough capacity at Western Branch, since the introduction of chemical treatment has increased the plant's capacity from 5 mgd to 7.5 mgd.

#### WRA Dubious

However, WRA felt that it did not have all the pertinent information relating to the capacity of the Western Branch at this time to justify denying extension of the permit. In the months to come it is expected that unanswered questions will be resolved so that a reevaluation can take place in November.

WSSC had submitted a detailed report of projects with reserved capacity and conditional authorizations at the Western Branch, but Kanerva wanted additional material relating to unconditional authorizations. He and EPA representatives were concerned about the relationship between conditional and unconditional authorizations, establishment of priorities, and possible revisions in authorizations.

#### **WSSC** Position

WSSC stressed that in analyzing present and future flows, much depended on whether the state directs the Collington lagoon and Marleton sewage treatment plants to be hooked up to the Western Branch this fall.

WSSC also indicated that it had recently approved additional projects representing about 500,000 gallons of wastewater to be discharged to the Western Branch. In terms of authorization these were ahead of the Greenbriar condominium development. Recently operation of the Capital Arena secondary interim sewage plan was phased out, and the arena hooked directly into the regional system.

#### PGEC Views

In urging immediate hook up of the wastewater from the Greenbriar interim plant, PGEC expressed concern that during the summer months there will be a "heightened risk to the public health and the environment because of the stream's low flow." WSSC and WRA say that the plant is operating satisfactorily and that test results are well within the permit's allowable limits. Both agencies point out that the effluent discharging from the advanced Greenbriar plant is of a higher quality than that coming from the Western Branch, a secondary treatment facility. Greenbriar has an emergency connection to the public sewer system so that if any serious problems develop at the plant, sewage can be directly discharged into the system instead of into the receiving stream.

# WHAT GOES ON

Signs are not too promising for GHI to acquire Federal grant money through Housing and Urban Development programs. GHI was looking for funds for the development of a master plan. HUD officials said that any hope for funds would depend on sponsorship of the city as part of a community action program that includes a full range of community services other than just reliabilitation.

Other costs are also going up. Effective July 1, the city's trash collection charges went up 25 percent and the water and sewer charges about 15 percent. Neither of these increases was allowed for in the budget prepared last December.

On the other hand, real estate taxes this year will be below the amounts budgeted, as neither the city nor county tax rate ended up as high as was predicted last December.

First quarter spending for structural and ground maintenance was a few thousand dollars below the forecast, but comparisons with budget figures are somewhat misleading since much depends on whether the weather or other factors permit such work. Structural maintenance costs for the frame homes actually ran ahead of the budget as considerable emergency water line replacement work was needed.

#### Condition

In extending the permit WRA required that (1) the effluent parameters and related loadings as modified remain the same in the final permit and (2) the special condition regarding operator requirements remain the same. WRA felt that "circumstances and opinions have not changed since the issuance of the original permit on January 17, 1974, and the Administration's position remains essentially the same."

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# **County Council Imposes** 2% Tax on Apt. Dwellers

The Prince Georges county council has imposed a 2 percent tax on the monthly rents paid by the county's apartment dwellers as a means of closing the gap between the tax burden carried by homeowners as compared with tenants.

According to figures recently assembled by council's staff, the huge increases in tax assessments on family homes have not correponded to equally large assessment increases against apartment houses. Since 1969, tax assessments on homes have jumped 50 percent while apartment assessments during the same years increased only 10 percent - figures that account for the significant disparity in the tax burden of homeowners and tenants.

The measure is expected to provide the county with an additionat \$3.5 million in revenue, half of which will be spent on public education, with the other half going for salary increases for county employees and purchases by the police department.

The one-year tax will be levied beginning July 1. Exempted from the tax are elderly renters age 65 or older, those living in apartments costing \$150 or less monthly, families of six or more paying \$250 or less monthly, those receiving a housing subsidy, and disabled persons earning below \$7,500 per year.

### The Police Blotter

A juvenile resident of Ridge Road had confessed responsibility for robbery of a citizen which took place recently. The suspect approached the victim, and assaulted her while attempting to steal her purse. The defendant has been charged and is awaiting court action.
