Bedication of Springhill Lake Recreation Center Sunday

"The best thing about the new building is the great potential we now have for expansion of the city's recreation program," declares recreation director Hank Irving when discussing the advantages of the recently completed Springhill Lake Recreation Center. Intended for use by all Greenbelt residents, the new center is a natural-look, earth-tone, brick and wood air conditioned building, which houses a full size gymnasium including bleachers and an exercise room, plus shower and rest room facilities. In addition, there are a large game room, a TV lounge, a separate multi-purpose room, and a "fish bowl" style control office. Located on Springhill Lake's golf course, the new building will now be used in conjunction with the golf club house, where recreation classes and meetings will be held.

Greenbelters are all cordially invited to come take a look at the new SHL center during its dedication this Sunday, September 21, at 5 p.m. Light refreshments will be served following dedication by city council members. There will also be games, entertainment, and guest celebrities, including WASH radio personality Bob Duckman, who will be master of ceremonics. KAVA Teen Club will sponsor a dance (admission free) in the new gym from 7-10 p.m. featuring music by the Free Spirit band.

History

The \$390,000 SHL Recreation Center was first conceived in 1968 when a referendum successfully submitted to the voters listed the Center as one of a half-dozen projects that would be financed through the sale of \$950,000 worth of bonds. At that time the cost of the project was estimated at \$60,-000, but included no plans for a gymnasium.

The site for the building was to be donated by the Springhill Lake apartment owners as part of a package which involved the sale of the 12.9 acre SHL golf course to the city. Since this land was partly within a flood plain, delays were encountered in obtaining necessary Federal (HUD) and State approval for open-space grants to finance the purchase of the golf course. Such grants in the amount of \$89,000 were finally approved in the fall of 1972, but in the meantime construction costs had begun to escalate rapidly.

By the time the city was ready to let bids out, the estimates for the building were in the neighborhood of \$300,000. The city's financial problem, however, was eased somewhat by the availability of Federal revenue-sharing funds, of which about \$95,000 was allocated to the Recreation Center, leaving \$295,000 of the \$390,000 total to come from the bond issue. Activities Open 365 days a year, as is the Youth Center, SHL center will be utilized at once for a great variety of recreational programs. Fall activities will include basketball, floor hockey, table games, volleyball tournaments, movies, TV, and open gym. Free programs will be available in arts and crafts, model building, and group games/physical fitness (Chucks and Lassies) for elementary school children. For preschoolers through grade 3 there will be Fun Time, a combination of stories, games, and crafts. Organized gym activities will be offered for girls and women, for men, and an open co-recreation gym for all ages. On family night the first Friday of each month from 7-11 p.m., families are encouraged to use game room facilities.

All the above mentioned programs are also conducted at other recreational centers in Greenbelt, and information concerning them may be obtained by calling 474-6878 weekdays (recreation department business office) or 345-2770 for Springhill Lake center activities. The recreation department plans to work in cooperation with Mrs. Sutton, social director at the Springhill Lake community house, in developing new programs and activities.

An exceptionally wide choice of activities is offered through the recreation department. In fact, recently Greenbelt has become a National Gold Medal award finalist for parks and recreation management excellence. Springhill Lake Recreation Center is expected to make a superior recreation program even better.

Health Fair - Sept. 26-27 At Beltway Plaza Mall

The Greenbelt Jaycees, in cooperation with the Prince Georges County Health Department and Beltway Plaza Merchants Association, will sponsor a Health Fair from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 26-27, at Beltway Plaza. Fifty private, public and voluntary groups will participate.

Weidenfeld Gets High Vote But Castaldi Close Second

In one of the closest finishes in years, which saw only 22 votes separating the first and third-place winners, Mayor Pro-Tem Gil Weidenfeld eked out the high vote in last Tuesday's Greenbelt city council election. His 999 votes were just 12 more than Richard Castaldi's, who in turn finished 10 votes ahead of Mayor Richard Pilski. All three were incumbents, with Weidenfeld winning his third term to office and Castaldi his second. For Mayor Pilski, the veteran of the council, it was his sixth straight election to office.

The other two spots on the fivemember council also went to incumbents — Charles F. Schwan and Thomas X. White, who finished in that order. Sixth place went to Jack Queen who in his first outing finished strong with 820 votes — some 74 votes behind the fifthplace winner, (See accompanying box for votes.)

National Quilt Exhibit At Greenbelt Library

Greenbelters will have an opportunity to see unusual and beautiful quilts at the National Quilting Association's Sixth Annual Quilt Exhibit at the Greenbelt Library on September 18, 19 and 20 during library hours. According to the president of the Association, Ms. Lynn Harris, 9 Empire Place, there will be at least 300 entries from all over the United States. These will include both traditional quilt patterns and original designs. In addition the Stearns & Foster Company, makers of quilt batting who also provide patterns for traditional designs will send six very old quilts from their collection. The firm gives one of the awards in the show.

Judges are Celene Mahler of New York who decorated the White House last Christmas, Doris Bowman of the Smithsonian Textile Dept., and Fay Galdex, a teacher. Quilts are judged for quality of workmanship, design, color choice, and in the case of the nontraditional quilts, for quality of the design and its originality. The new council, which will serve for two years, will hold an organizational meeting on Monday, September 22, at which time the new mayor will be elected. Although the charter is silent on this point, past councils have generally chosen the top vote gatherer.

The 1,451 votes cast represented 48 percent of the 3,053 registered voters. This is one of the lowest turnouts in recent history. In 1973, 54 percent of the electorate turned out and in 1971 53 percent.

An analysis of the voting by precinct reveals some interesting patterns. For example, Weidenfeld was not the high vote-getter in any of the three precincts but he drew consistently well in all three. Pilski was high man at North End and Springhill Lake and Castaldi was high man at Center. Outside of the top three mon. Schwan was the only one to finish above fourth in any precinct — that was in the Center.

Solicits Views **On Juvenile Justice**

To the Editor:

Recently, I was appointed by the House of Delegates to serve on the newly created Commission on Juvenile Justice. It so happens that I am the only Commission Member from Prince George's County. The charge of the Commission is to examine all facets of the juvenile justice system in the State and make recommendations for improvement to the 1976 and 1977 sessions of the General Assembly.

A 19 year old female resident was charged by Officer Duprat with driving while intoxicated after she struck a United States Park Police car parked in the municipal parking lot.

Following apprehension by Officer Duprat for a traffic violation, male from Crofton was found to be in possession of a stolen citizen band radio, and in possession of manufactured items from which the serial numbers had been removed. The defendant was charged with both property offenses, which are felonies under Maryland State laws.

Some Precautions On Encephalitis

Anxious Frince Georges County residents are assured by county health officials that encephalitis, which recently has hospitalized three persons, is not contagious. Dr. David Anders, Chairman of the P. G General Hospital's Infectious Disease Committee, said, "The disease can only be transmitted by an infected mosquito and the chances of serious infection are only 2 in 300." He advises that anyone who has been bitten recently by a mosquito and who is experiencing chills, fever, muscle pain, severe headache, nausea and vomiting to contact his family physician.

Health officials urge that residents take the following precautions

1. Empty and clean all buckets, wading pools or other containers that collect water because mosquitoes prefer to breed in this type of environment rather than in streams.

2. Avoid being outdoors at dawn or dusk, which is when mosquitoes are most likely to be actively seeking food.

3. Anyone who does go outdoors at those times should wear long pants and long sleeves, covering as much of the body as possible. 4. Use bug repellants.

5. Avoid wooded, marshy or grassy areas where mosquitoes might thrive.

6. Measures should be taken to assure that mosquitoes cannot enter the house. Doors and windows should be adequately screened. Tape up holes in screens. For added protection, spray house screens at night with insecticides.

Mosquito control units of the Maryland Department of Agriculture began additional spraying operations in Prince Georges County, Sept. 11, to control and prevent the spread of encephalitis. The additional spraying in the county will involve four spray units and cover a four-square-mile area around Bladensburg, Hyattsville and Riverdale

Stop For School Buses

School bus accidents kill over 200 people annually in the United States. In Maryland, approximately 170 students are injured each year in school bus-related accidents, according to a survey by the National Safety Council.

Joseph Ruprecht, Director of Safety for Prince Georges County Public Schools, says, "Drivers should remember to watch out for the buses discharging or loading students now that school is in session.

The Maryland Driver's Handsays that upon meeting a book school bus coming in either direction that has stopped or is stopping, the motorist should come to a full stop of ten feet in front of or behind the bus. He shall not proceed until the bus has begun moving again. The only exception to this is when approaching a bus from the front on a dual (divided) highway

The penalty for passing a school bus while it is loading or disstudents has in charging creased from one to two points on a motorist's driving record.

The Treasury Division of the Prince Georges County Office of Finance has announced that senior citizen tax credit certificates are being mailed. Any senior citizen who receives the credit certificate late will not be penalized for late payment of his tax bill, due at the end of September.

Senior citizens who have not filed for tax credit and wish to do so are asked to call the Supervisor of Assessments and Taxation at 627-3000, Ext. 312.
