Eleanor Roosevelt Sr. High Has Smooth Opening Day

Eleanor Roosevelt had a quiet opening on Sept. 7. The buses started rolling up to the new building at about 9 a.m., discharging students who were routed into the cafeteria (known as the "Commons") before going to class. Considering that the school is vast, with rooms far apart, that the airconditioning was not working in several rooms, and that many teachers had exchanged classes in order to balance teaching loads, the day went smoothly. First period lasted longer than the others, since the counselors and vice-principals were busy changing schedules and assigning new students to classes; and the lunch period had to be extended since the cafeteria lines moved more slowly than anticipated, but for the most part students got to class on time and teachers managed to take accurate rolls and give students a first-day-of-school description of the courses and lay down classroom rules. ("Please try to behave as if this is a business office. You have something to learn here . . . ")

To be sure there were still workmen busy on the building itself, and the teachers often appeared somewhat vague as to instructions to students on reaching the next class, but twenty minutes after the first class had begun the school had settled into that quiet that indicates that the new school year is under way. Lunch is to be on the fifth period, and the cafeteria served over 1000 lunches, exceeding expectations.

- Open House -

Principal Ray Ogden said that an open house is planned for all parents in the near future. This is to be during a weekend, it is hoped, so that more parents will be able to attend. At that time teachers will be present to meet the parents and the school will be open for inspection.

An open house for parents of students in the competitive athletics program is scheduled next week.

The school at present has only 9th, 10th, and 11th grade students. For the most part classes are of about 27 students or fewer in the academic subjects, and no teacher has more than three subjects to

"He is 80 years young, a familiar figure around Greenbelt and we find him active in such youth groups as Greenbelt CARES and Boy Scouts . . . and at the other end of the spectrum, he is chaplain of the Golden Age Club, active in senior citizen activities . . ." These words of Ruth Dee in tribute to the "Outstanding Citizen of the Year" left no doubt in anyone's mind that the award was about to be presented to the Rev. Kenneth Buker.

In accepting the plaque given by the Cipriano family in memory of "Pop" Cipriano, Buker said, "It is a great honor to be considered the Citizen of the Year, a great honor to be a citizen of Greenbelt,

REGISTRATION: Residents of Greenbelt are urged to assure proper registration, since registration with Prince George's County for federal, state and county elections does not qualify Greenbelt residents to vote in the upcoming city election. Also, citizens who have been removed for failure to vote in the last two regular city elections need to re-register no later than September 20, 1976 in order to be eligible to vote in the special election. A list of eligible registered voters has been posted in the City Offices, and any person in doubt as to his or her eligibility may check with the City Clerk, 474-8000.

Once an absentee ballot has been issued, the voter shall not be authorized to cast the ballot in any manner other than by casting the absentee ballot.

On April 26, 1976, the Department of Housing and Urban Development amended its 1975 regulations pertaining to projects like the proposed Greenbelt senior citizen housing project. Sec. 880.218, after affirming the responsibility of the owner, the city in our case, to determine the eligibility of applicants and select occupants, added a provise to the 1975 regulations " that in establishing criteria for the selection of applicants, no local residency requirements or priority systems relating to place of residence may be applied to applicants who are working in the commun-

It follows from this that residency requirements may be in order as long as persons working in Greenbelt are treated as residents. City council has already decided that first preference or priority of eccupancy will be given to those who reside or work in the city. Incidentally, the HUD regula-

tions were issued six days after the much discussed Supreme Court decision in the Chicago case.

Simply for good business reasons, I plan to vote YES on the Senior Citizens Housing Referendum Sept. 28. This project will add a sub-stantial asset to the city's net worth - at no cost to local taxpayers. Mortgage retirement payments will be made solely from rents paid by the tenants and federal rent supplements. Each year the city's equity in the property will increase, and in 40 years, the local taxpayers will own a very valuable income producing property (not like the city hall and other properties that produce no income) and completely free of debt! It is rare that the poor taxpayer gets a break like this.

There are other benefits - New York bankers base interest rates they charge cities to finance local bond issues largely on total property assets that the city can show. A substantial equity in this property could help lower interest rates to the city for other projects. This property will also pay the city substantial taxes on land that is now producing no tax income. Some citizens now receiving real estate property tax credits, and others receiving rent rebates from the city, beause of age and low income, will move into this project, and lift some load at least, from local tax payers.

I recommend this project, not only to the humanitarian-minded voter but to the thrifty-minded, as well.

Housing Regulations

Many questions have been raised with respect to the housing for the elderly project, which will be subject to a referendum vote by Greenbelt citizens on Tuesday, September 28. One such question involves the selection of tenants. The following excertps are from the rules and regulations issued by the U. S Department of Housing and Urban Development.

DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT Low Income Housing

Section 8 Housing Assistance Program **New Construction**

§ 880.219 Marketing.

(a) Compliance with Equal Opportunity requirements. Marketing of units and selection of Families by the Owner shall be in accordance with the Owner's HUD-approved Affirmative Fair Housing Marketing Plan, if required, and with all regulations relating to fair housing advertising including use of the equal opportunity logotype, statement, and slogan in all advertising. Projects shall be managed and operated without regard to race, color creed, religion, sex, or national origin.

(b) Eligibility, selection and admission of Families. (1) The Owner (e.g. City of Greenbelt) shall be responsible for determination of eligibility of applicants, selection of families from among those determined to be eligible, and computation of the amount of housing assistance payments on behalf of each selected Family, in accordance with schedules and criteria established by HUD; provided that in establishing criteria for the selection of applicants, no local residency requirements or priority systems relating to place of residence may be applied to applicants who are working in the community.

Health Fair on Sept. 18

On Sat., Sept. 18, from 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. the Greenbelt Lions Club will sponsor a Health Fair at the Center School. At the Fair screening procedures are available to test for certain diseases and medical conditions which could require further treatment. The Health Fair screening does not, of course, take the place of a good medical exam by a doctor, but it can help in early detection of medical problems.

Free hearing, vision, glaucoma, and pap tests will be given as well as free breast examinations for women and blood pressure read-

For \$4 participants can get a blood test for twelve different constituents such as cholesteral, glucose uric acid, albumin, etc. The results of the test can be used to determine the presence of gout, diabetes, certain bone and kidney diseases and other conditions. People interested in this test should fast for twelve hours before taking it. Water, coffee or tea without cream or sugar may be taken,

Pharmacists Larry Jason and Barbara Kopelman from Consumers Co-op Pharmacy will be on hand to explain Consumers Patient Profile Cards. These cards, kept by Consumers, list all prescriptions a patient is taking and their numbers, the patient's allergies and any adverse reactions to any drugs. In this way the pharmacy can help patients avoid taking drugs, or combinations of drugs, that can be dangerous. The Profile Cards, too, can help if a patient loses a prescription number since the cards are filed by name, while the prescriptions are filed by number.

There are also plans to have a Social Security Administration representative at the Health Fair to answer questions concerning social security and Medicare. For further information concerning the Fair call Ivan Lindahl at 344-2283 or Henry Fisher at 474-1817.


