COUNTY SCHOOLS OPEN TUESDAY

The Prince Georges County Public Schools will re-open on Tuesday, Sept. 6; 184 school days have been scheduled.

Projected enrollment for this fall will be 8,000 kindergarten, 62,016 elementary and 69,570 secondary pupils. While this is a decline of 4,946 from last year, the school system remains the tenth largest in the nation.

Special attention this year is being paid to the teaching of reading skills at the intermediate grade levels and extending it to grade 7 in the junior high. The senior high English program was extended last year to require grammar and composition courses in each grade. This year certain required courses in literature will be added.

Starting Times

The starting times for most schools will remain the same as last year. However, some starting times are earlier in response to complaints of parents and students who found the times inconvenient. The late starting times interfered with student desire for afternoon jobs and parents' need for students to care for younger siblings. Eleanor Roosevelt Senior High School will continue its last year's hours: 9:30 a.m. - 4:15 p.m.

As for junior high schools, Greenbelt Jr. High hours will be 8:50 a.m. to 3:20 p.m.; Kent Jr. High, 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Mary Bethune Jr. High, 7:50 a.m. to 2:20 p.m.

The time for Greenbelt Center School will be 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.; Greenbelt North End, 9:35 a.m. to 3:25 p.m.; John Carroll, 8:15 a.m. to 2:15 p.m.; Magnolia, 9:08 a.m. to 3:08 p.m.; Oakcrest, 9:08 a.m. to 3:08 p.m. and Springhill Lake, 9:08 a.m. to 3:08 p.m.

All students who ride buses are asked to be at bus stops 10 minutes earlier than the scheduled pick-up time.

Lunch

The cost of lunch for elementary schools is 50c and for secondary schools, 55c. Milk is 10c.

Applications for free or reduced lunch will be sent home the first week of school. Some foster children are counted as a family of one and may be eligible for the program.

State law requires school attendance by every child between the ages of 6 and 16. Children who will be five years old on or before January 1, 1978 may attend kindergarten this fall. Parents registering their children for kindergarten or to begin school in Prince Georges County for the first time should have their child's birth certificate, proof of residence (deed to home or lease to apartment) and their children's immunization records with them at the time of registration.

Name Needed for Elderly Residence

The Advisory Committee on Housing for the Elderly is looking for an appropriate name for the elderly housing building planned for the Ridge Road site. Contracts are about to be let for the construction of the 100 unit building, and the Greenbelt City Council wants to have a name to use in the legal papers for the facility. With the present time-table, construction could begin this fall, and completion may be even earlier than the previously set date of August 1979.

The name might honor a former or present Greenbelt citizen who has made a notable contribution to the general welfare. Any suggestions will be appreciated and can be dropped off at the city offices in the Municipal Building.

ABSENTEE VOTING

SECTION 7-4 OF THE GREENBELT CITY CODE PROVIDES THAT CITIZENS OF GREENBELT WHO ARE QUALIFIED VOTERS SHALL HAVE THE PRIVILEGE OF VOTING IN MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS OF THE CITY BY ABSENTEE BALLOT, SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS:

1. APPLICATIONS SHALL BE MADE IN WRITING TO THE CITY CLERK FOR AN ABSENTEE BALLOT NOT EARLIER THAN TWENTY DAYS PRECEDING THE ELECTION — AUGUST 31, 1977 AND SEPTEMBER 19, 1977, RESPECTIVELY.
2. ALL SUCH BALLOTS RETURNED SHALL REACH THE OFFICE OF THE CITY CLERK NOT LATER THAN TWO HOURS BEFORE THE CLOSING OF THE POLLS ON THE DAY OF ELECTION IN ORDER TO BE COUNTED — 6:00 P.M., SEPTEMBER 20, 1977.

ANY QUALIFIED ELECTOR WHO WOULD BE PREVENTED FROM VOTING IN A MUNICIPAL ELECTION BY REASON OF RELIGIOUS BELIEFS, PHYSICAL CONDITION OR ABSENCE FROM THE CITY OF GREENBELT ON THE DAY OF AN ELECTION, SHALL BE ENTITLED TO VOTE BY ABSENTEE BALLOT.

Concert, Outstanding Citizen Award Kick Off Labor Day Festival Fun

A fun-filled four-day Labor Day Festival is in store for Greenbelters this week-end. Beginning tomorrow night with Opening Ceremonies, which will include a performance by the Greenbelt Concert Band, announcement of the Outstanding Citizen of 1977, and the first presentation of the Miss Greenbelt contestants, each day will bring special events designed to delight the young and the young at heart. Festival Parking

To alleviate the usual parking problem this year, the Festival Steering Committee has inaugurated a shuttle bus service. Those who park their cars at the Armory parking lot will be bused to the carnival area at approximately 15-minute intervals. Persons coming to the Festival who must drive are urged to use this shuttle service to avoid parking on residential streets or circling the Municipal Parking Lot time after time. Bus service will begin Friday night at 7 p.m. and run to 11:30 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday 1 - 11:30 p.m.; Monday, 1 p.m. - 5 p.m.

Children's Pet Show

Saturday morning at 10 a.m., judges will be measuring for the pet with the longest tail, closest to the ground, biggest nose, and many other unusual features. Kids should bring their pets and try for the best costume and best trick awards. There will be ribbons awarded to all who enter. Proof of rabies shots, when appropriate, are required. Pets must also be leashed or in a container. Pet owners under six years old must be accompanied by an adult. Registration will be from 9:30 - 10 a.m. on the lawn in front of Center School.

Gymnastics

The Prince George's Gymnastic Club will perform in front of the Festival stage at 1 p.m. Saturday. Students, ages nine through seventeen who are training for competition, will be tumbling, performing on the balance beam and doing floor routines.

Karate

The College of Korean Karate will demonstrate their art form on the Festival stage, Saturday at 3 p.m. Blackbelt, Neil McVoy, blue belt, Greenbelt Cliff Brown, and Eric Flores, with a gold belt, and Al Marblestein, with a green belt, will demonstrate free sparring as well as show a simulated attack on an unsuspecting karate expert. They will also break boards and cinder blocks with their restrained jabs, punches and kicks.

Hang Gliding

A display of hang gliders will take place in Braden Field at 4 p.m. followed by a movie on the joys of hang gliding at the Greenbelt Library at 4:30 p.m. Members of Hang Gliders International will be on hand to answer questions.

Smoke Detectors

Let the Greenbelt Fire Department demonstrate "how smoke detectors can save lives" on Saturday at 1 p.m., Braden Field, and in their booth at the carnival.

Art Show and Photography Exhibit

The third annual Art Show and second annual Photography Exhibit will be held Saturday and Sunday from 1-4 p.m., Center School auditorium. All work must be completely original and ready to be displayed. Work will be accepted on Friday, Sept. 2, from 4-6 p.m. at the school, or Saturday morning, from 10-11:30 a.m. See the Schedule of Events for entry fees.

The Art Show will be judged by two local artists. Bette Valenti is the Visual Arts Specialist for the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission. She is the director of the Capital Gallery at the Capital Centre. Primarily a painter, she also is an arts administrator with training in the United States, Chile, Madagascar and Australia.

Joseph Mayer, a second judge, is an art instructor and former head of the Art Dept. at Prince Georges Community College. He formerly taught high school and has been art director for several establishments. His M.F.A. is in printmaking from Catholic Univ., but he is primarily a water colorist, having studied with Edgar Whitney. His work has been exhibited at the Vierhoff, Corcoran and Baltimore Museum.

Judging will take place Saturday afternoon at 3:30 p.m.; awards will be presented Sunday evening, 8 p.m., at the Festival stage. For further information, contact Toni Foster, 474-0347.

Bobettes

Students from Bobbe's School of Dance will perform a variety act on the stage at 2 p.m. Saturday. Tap, ballet, gymnastics, Hawaiian, jazz, Tahitian song and dance routines will be featured.

Mime Show

At 2 p.m. Sunday on the Stage, a member of the Towson State Mime Troup, will perform pantomime, moods and situations. Mime is an ancient form of art which goes back to the Greeks, and is enjoying a revival among college students.

St. Hugh's Folk Group

Greenbelt's own St. Hugh's Folk Group will be on stage, Sunday, at 5 p.m. Their program will include a medley from "Godspell," popular folk songs, a talking-blues song, and others. Led by Eris Hein on 12-string guitar, the group also consists of Bernie Kozak, Kenny Costa, Jeff Beyrent, Adele Jenkins, Chris Witherspoon and Louise Wilding.

Long Distance Races

One of the oldest races in the Washington area has been the 15 kilometer (9.3 mile) race through the Streets of Greenbelt and the Agricultural Farm as part of the Labor Day Festival. Last year about 200 men, women and children were in this long race and the same number in the 3 kilometer (1.75 mile) race around the lake.

Both races on Sunday, Sept. 4 will start at Braden Field at 6:30 p.m. and finish there. Runners are urged to sign up at least one hour early at the Youth Center. All Greenbelters who finish will receive an award. There is a fee for both races. Alexander Barnes 474-5310 is the race director.

The course record for the 15 kilo is 47 minutes, 45.4 seconds set back in 1973 by Jack Fultz of Georgetown University who later won the Boston Marathon in 1976.

Variety Show

A special event for Monday is a musical variety act performed by members of Gallaudet College, a school for the deaf and physically handicapped. The variety show will be simultaneously translated in American sign language.

Appreciation Party

All participants in the Labor Day Festival — those who work on the parade, in the booths, at the carnival, or whatever — are invited to the Festival Appreciation Party on Friday, September 16, at 8:30 p.m. A live band will entertain and photographs of this year's Festival will be shown. Plan now to attend.

I have often heard it said that words are inadequate to express either your thoughts or thanks. I never knew that these words were as meaningful as they are now to us. Our daughter, Mrs. Donna J. Hardman, was injured in an automobile accident in Greenbelt on July 19, 1977. We flew into Washington National Airport that night and were met at the plane by a Greenbelter who took us to Donna's apartment. The next day we were expecting to rent a car but were told that a car pool had been formed and we would be taken anywhere we needed to go at any time. We were taken to the hospital by members of the Mowatt United Methodist Church several times without charge. During our stay we were never in need of anything that wasn't provided many times over. One man came to the apartment and took Donna's flowers to his home to keep them until she could return. Everyone asked about her. One man offered blood if it was needed and many said prayers in her behalf, even some not used to doing so.

A special commendation is offered to State Policeman M. Dorsey for his quick thinking in getting help. Also, to the emergency squad of Greenbelt, Greenbelt Realty, where Donna works, helped tremendously in making arrangements.

Although Donna does not remember anything about the accident or her stay in the University of Maryland hospital or her flight to a Parkersburg, West Virginia hospital in an air ambulance she is getting along fine now. As many of you know she is in a body cast with both legs broken but she says that she is thankful that this is all that is wrong with her. For the lack of space and the fear of missing someone's name we are not going to mention any names. The ones who have helped, and they are many, will know who they are.

Donna is now in a hospital at Spencer, West Virginia which is close to our home. She has received almost two hundred letters and cards from the people there. Any other correspondence to her should be sent in care of us. Many thanks to everyone in Greenbelt. It sure is a nice place.


Cross-country is a sport in which everyone has a chance to run in the race. It is also excellent training for other sports.



Labor Day Festival Parade Begins Monday's Activities

The 23rd annual Greenbelt Labor Day Parade begins a day of special events for the Festival. Greenbelt's Outstanding Citizen, to be announced at Opening Ceremonies Friday evening, will lead off the event as parade marshal.

Marching in the parade will be the Maryland-National Capital Park Police Mounted Color Guard, Twinkle the Kid, the Greenbelt Marching Kazoo Band, the U.S. Naval Ceremonial Guard, U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps, Huff and Puff from the Lung Association of Southern Maryland, American Legion Post 136 Senior Color Guard and Auxiliary Unit with its Junior, Senior Color Guards and Poppy Misses, the Patuxent Martial Musick group, the U.S. Army Band, and the Decorated Bicycles and Triecycles.

Majorette groups will include The Dynamics, the Riverdale Majorettes, and the Waldorf Majorettes and Color Guard as well as the Clinton Goldiggers, the Mt. Rainier Majestics and the Berwyn Heights Bravados.

Representing the U.S. Postal Service will be Miss Zip, Patty Young. She will be driven by local carrier, Eugene C. Prowant, Jr. Other marchers will be Big Boy, the Maryland Medieval Mercenary Militia, and the Charlestowne Crazies. This will be the last appearance of the Crazies in the Labor Day Parade. The Crazies have consistently won first place for their comic entry in the parade, but are disbanding because many of their members are moving from Greenbelt. The troupe includes Rich, Jimmy, Steve and Marty Colby; Jim, Marlee and Jimmy Frasier; Sherri Fulton and Carol and Rick Young. For their final bizarre act, look for a tall building and a "Fay" who looks more like a "Ray". Another clown group will be the Knights of the Clown Table.

APB Studies Feasibility Of Retirement Village

Several months ago, the City Council listened to the tentative plans from architects representing the owners of Springhill Lake for an 800-unit retirement village. This "village" was envisioned as providing several types of housing for the elderly of different health levels as well as economic levels. Located near the State Roads Commission, the complex would include garden apartments, with communal dining facilities available but not essential; a 10-story high rise; sheltered housing for those who would be in need of assistance for meals and house-keeping; and a nursing home.

The city did not officially comment on the SHL plan, but sent the matter to its Advisory Planning Board for its advice.

APB has reached the following conclusions: 1) that there are three other elderly housing facilities in operation in the county with two more being planned, including one by the city of Greenbelt; (2) that the size of the facility is not consistent with the County Housing Assistance Plan; 3) that a facility of this size, added to the one the city will break ground for soon, would greatly increase the elderly population within the city; 4) that a large percentage of the city's housing stock is multi-family units and this development would further increase that percentage; and 5) that the site location bounded by the Beltway and Kenilworth Avenue makes it relatively inaccessible to shopping, churches and other activity centers except by vehicle. Thus its suitability for this type of development is also questioned.

Race For Mayor Seems Only Spark In Issueless Campaign

The lack of issues and the small number of candidates in the upcoming City Council elections on September 20 appears to be the combination causing apathy among the citizenry. Virtually the only interesting aspect of the election so far appears to be the race for high vote. Traditionally the top vote getter is tapped for mayor.

Five incumbents—Mayor Gil Weidenfeld and councilmen Charles Schwan, Thomas X. White, Richard Castaldi and Richard Pilski — and one newcomer, Robert B. Phillips, Jr., are vying for the five council seats.

Some 2,661 Greenbelters are currently on the voter registration rolls, a drop of 12.8% over 1975 (3,051) and a 25% decrease over 1973 (3,568). While voter registration figures have been on the decline, Greenbelt's population between the years of 1971 to 1977 increased by about 7.2% — from 18,199 to 19,606.

The decline in registration since 1971 has occurred, in the main, at the Springhill Lake Precinct #8, Center School Precinct #3 and North End Precinct #6 have remained relatively stable.

According to predictions, fewer than half of those qualified to vote will trek to the polls on election day to cast their votes for five city council persons who will head the city government in the next two years. In 1975, 48% of the electorate turned out, in 1973 54% and in 1971 58%. These elections, except for some sparks in 1971, were relatively free of the fireworks that marked those of the 1960's, when zoning controversies were inflammatory issues.

In 1971 eight candidates took part in the council race, while in 1973 twelve candidates threw their hats into the ring. (There was an increase in registration at both Center and North End precincts during the latter election. Seven chose to run in 1975 and six are the current contenders.

New Registrations

City Clerk Gudrun Mills reports that there are 276 new registrants. Of these, approximately 220 registered by mail — a new procedure instituted by the present council.

Center Precinct #3, which includes new residents from Green-

briar, Glen Oaks and Windsor Green, currently has 1,176 registered voters, some 5.3% less than 1975. North End Precinct #6 has a total of 1,049, an 8% dip from 1975, and Springhill Lake Precinct #8 figures reveal 436 qualified voters, down 35% from 1975.

This decrease in registration can be attributed to more effective purging of the registration rolls as a result of the November 1976 Housing for the Elderly Referendum. At the time, flyers were sent to all residents. Those that were returned to the city clerk indicated that residents had moved.

Weidenfeld Holds Maryland Municipal League Posts

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld has been appointed to the Legislative Action Committee (LAC) of the Maryland Municipal League (MML). The MML represents all the cities and towns in Maryland. The LAC formulates, proposes, and lobbies for State legislation that is beneficial to municipalities. Weidenfeld, now a senior committee member, has been reappointed for the fourth consecutive year.

Weidenfeld, who is also a member of the Board of Directors of the MML, recently attended a two-day Directors Workshop. At that workshop the Directors planned goals and policies for the coming year and set up procedures for long-range planning. Also at the workshop, a Classification of Cities Committee was appointed to consider classifying Maryland's cities according to the municipal services they provide to their residents. Such classification is thought to improve the chance for passage of legislation providing for State aid to municipalities. Weidenfeld was appointed by the president of the MML to serve on this committee also.

CITY OF GREENBELT, MARYLAND NOTICE OF CHARTER AMENDMENT

On July 11, 1977, the City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland, adopted Charter Amendment Resolution 1977-4 (Resolution No. 368), and the following Title of the Resolution is a fair summary of the amendment:

Charter Amendment Resolution Number 1977-4

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF ARTICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND (1957 EDITION AS AMENDED), TITLE "CORPORATION-MUNICIPAL," SUBTITLE "HOME RULE", TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, SAID CHARTER BEING SUBTITLE 40 OF ARTICLE 17 OF THE CODE OF PUBLIC LOCAL LAWS OF MARYLAND (1963 EDITION AS AMENDED) AND CONTAINING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SECTION 4, TITLE "CREATION; QUALIFICATIONS; COMPENSATION" TO PROVIDE A SALARY OF \$2,900 PER ANNUM FOR THE MAYOR AND \$2,500 PER ANNUM FOR EACH OF THE OTHER MEMBERS OF COUNCIL.

The above amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 21st day of September, 1977, unless on or before the fortieth day after passage, which shall be the 20th day of August, 1977, there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the general election of the City of Greenbelt requesting that the above Charter Amendment be submitted on referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.

A copy of the above Charter Amendment Resolution is posted in the Greenbelt Municipal Building in accordance with the requirements of Section 13(d) of Article 23A of the Annotated Code of Maryland, and may be obtained from the City Clerk, 25 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, Maryland, telephone 474-3870 or 474-8000.
