Council to Explore Possible Sharing Of Theater by Cable TV, Arts Group

Two recurring issues, cable TV and the Greenbelt Cultural Arts Center, merged at council's January 21 session. Mayor Gil Weidenfeld explained: "One of the things that prompted us to move ahead (with cable TV) is the preservation of the theater." It has been suggested that a cable TV company could use the old theater on a shared basis with a Cultural Arts Center. "This would be a useful reward to the city for granting a franchise," Councilman Charles Schwan felt.

Councilman Thomas White cautioned that the granting of a cable TV franchise be done properly. He suggested that council first agree on the conditions of a franchise. He felt the shared use of the theater with the cultural arts center would be one of several conditions. Next council should hold a public hearing on those conditions and finally invite cable TV companies, including those that have already appeared before council to bid on the franchise.

Because of the critical time element for Greenbelt Cultural Arts Center, Inc. (GCACI), others felt it would be appropriate preliminarily to ask those companies

which have appeared before council about the feasibility of the shared use of the theater. Councilman Richard Castaldi warned that the theater owner, George Christacos, should also be informed, to forestall any other possible theater tenants. Council directed city staff to draw up a formal approach for granting a franchise and to contact cable TV companies.

Konrad Herling gave an update on the Cultural Center. He told council that State Senator Edward Conroy, Delegates Gerald Devlin, Charles Ryan, Joan Pitkin and Prince Georges County Councilman Paris Glendening were given a presentation and tour. All felt a cultural arts center was a good idea, he added.

The group has a month to month lease for the theater and will be arranging a calendar of events. Research will soon begin at a foundation library for possible funding. GCACI also plans to submit a request for funding in next year's recreation department budget.

Council received a Park and Recreation Advisory Board report recommending the city support GCACI, especially in finding grants for possible funding. Council unanimously passed motions instructing city staff to help GCACI with grants and licenses and permits if necessary, but

At its February 4 meeting City Manager James Giese informed council that there had been, as yet, no response about the shared use of the theater from the cable TV companies contacted. A monkey wrench has been thrown into the plans, he added, the Greenbelt Credit Union wants to rent the theater lobby.

Although it is not under a lease deadline, the credit union would like to relocate soon because of space requirements. Actually, Giese explained, if it were available, the credit union would prefer a location with even more space. They've had their eye on the post office.

Giese said that he understood Greenbelt Cooperative Inc. would like to remodel, using the present credit union space.

With the theater lobby leased, a new entrance might have to be constructed in the side of the building near the cleaners.

In response, council felt it was important to meet soon with Christacos. A meeting was set for February 12. White felt there was "a huge game of musical chairs in the center," and hoped the city could play a role in helping center businesses "meet each other's needs synergistically."

Co-op Offers Lower Level Space For Possible Postal Service Use

Greenbelt Co-operative, Inc., (Co-op) has offered space on the lower floor of its building for a post office, City Manager James Giese informed Council at its January 21 regular session.

The space would come in part and other sites be considered and from a reduction in the size of the bowling alley and archery range, which is acceptable to the operator. An entrance to the postal facility could be made in the side of the building facing the lower parking lot. People shopping in the center mall would have to go down a flight of steps to reach the post office. The post office has been informed, but has not yet responded to the suggestion. Giese felt the site might not satisfy the postal service's desire for exclusive parking and ownership instead of tenancy.

Concerned about the postal facility, Greenbelt resident Bill Wilkerson gave council a written list of possible sites for a distribution center along Greenbelt Road. The nine locations all had good access, in some cases near a traffic light. Although he did not check on "the cost. availability, or other constraints that the United States Postal Service (USPS) may have," Wilkerson, a Greenbelt resident, did feel the sites "are worthy of future investigation by the city and USPS Councilman Richard Castaldi thanked Wilkerson for his efforts and suggested these

belt area. Of these only one site, the East Greenbelt Elementary-Junior-Senior High School site located on parcel 2, has been declared surplus. Council members feared that location would be inaccessible except by increasing traffic in a residential area.

At its February 4 meeting Weidenfeld explained that he was reluctant to change the city's position with only three members present. Nevertheless, he wanted to put the ball in the court." Councilman Thomas White responded by moving that council send the post office the four sites it suggested last spring and information on commercial developments in the city. Even though the motion passed 2-1, it failed because any action of council requires three votes.

Castaldi offered a counter motion that council's four sites and the seven additional ones offered. by Wilkerson be sent to the postal service. "We should send everything (that we think is more acceptable) than Parkway," he said. That motion failed for lack of a second. The following night council (Schwan absent) agreed to forward 6 sites from Wilkerson's list - essentially the same 4 sites council had already agreed on plus two east of the city limits on Greenbelt Road.

VOLK SEEKS CITY'S AID ON GHI CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Donald Volk, president of Greenbelt Homes, Inc., appeared before the City Council Monday, February 4, to request low-cost revenue-bond financing for GHI's member-approved Capital Improvement Project. Under the same bond issue, GHI would also finance the conversion of its expensive oil heating system and some additional work now planned for the brick homes. The bond issue would also refinance outstanding capital improvement borrowing.

We need to get the wheels in motion," Volk told the council. Two factors are forcing GHI to push the city for an early commitment on the bond issue: (1) The GHI board hopes that conversion to a more efficient and therefore less costly heating system can be started by April or May and completed by the next heating season. (2) HUD is now asking GHI to show within 60 days a commitment for financing its capital improvement project prior to settlement with HUD on its \$6.4 million rehabilitation

Ice Skating Guidelines

The Greenbelt Lake is open for ice skating when weather conditions are favorable. In order to provide a wholesome, safe activity, the city has developed certain guidelines that should be followed. During cold weather, persons interested in ascertaining the conditions of the ice at the lake should call the Greenbelt Police Department, 474-7200. It is impossible to continually test ice thickness over all areas of the lake, so skating will always be at the risk of the participant. Recommended areas of skating are the shorelines and the bay around the peninsula. A green flag will be displayed on the bandstand flagpole to indicate SKATING AT YOUR OWN RISK. The lake area around the dam and spillway should be avoided, as open water is usually found in these areas. Parents should accompany young children. Skaters should avoid gathering in groups on the ice.

The city's guide to ice conditions is as follows-

Young or Black Ice: 21/2 inches uniform; safe if cautious and no congregating. Four inches will support the weight of skaters. SKATE AT YOUR OWN RISK. Layered or White Ice: one foot of this kind will support the weight of skaters. SKATE AT YOUR OWN RISK. Old or Rotten Ice: thickness is under the above conditions. ABSOLUTELY

NO SKATING. The Recreation Department

will attempt to provide assistance at the lake during week days from 4 pm. until dark and on holidays, Saturdays and Sundays from 9 a,m. to dark. No skating will be allowed on the lake after dark. No fires will be allowed at the lake except those provided by the city, because of the scarcity of firewood and danger from brush fires.

All skaters and parents should keep in mind the dangers involved in ice sports. A person who falls through the ice is in danger of drowning and freezing if he is not cared for immediately. Alertness to emergency and readiness to help other participants is stressed in such situations. A public telephone is located at the entrance to the Lake Park. For assistance, call-474-7200 for police; 911 for amto issue low-interest rate revenue bonds. This special tool, lowcost tax-exempt city bonds, can be used to finance rehabilitation and energy conservation projects for homes and businesses throughout the city at no cost to the taxpayer. GHI s Program

GHI members last August overwhelmingly approved the \$5.2 million capital improvement project, along with the \$6.4 million rehabilitation program which will be financed at 3% interest through HUD, Rehabilitation will include replacement windows (all older homes), insulation and new siding (frames and masonry); the capital improvements include insulation of crawl spaces, electrical heavy-up and rewiring.

Heating Conversion
In a special meeting Friday, February 1, the GHI board formalized its intent to convert to an alternate heating system utilizing city revenue bonds.

"I am not sure that electricity is the long range way to go,' cautioned board member James Smith, "but it is an attractive alternative to what we have now. Our best guess is that an electric system would cost half as much to operate as the present system." The board hopes to present information on various alternatives - gas, electric baseboard, electric radiant, other - for membership decision as soon as

Director Wayne Williams was concerned about going to the council before going to the membership. "We have to do this now or the conversion is lost for the next heating season" was the response he received. In fact, that was the concern of an ad hoc committee which had been studying conversion.

"Our comptroller is now preparing a five-year budget and the staff engineer is working up the cost figures for heating and the additional work to be done on the brick homes," deputy general manager Ken Kopstein told the board. "We know council will want to review our plans in detail to be assured of GHI's financial ability to repay the loan."

City council and the GHI board met in a work session Tuesday to determine where to go next, what information is needed and how to proceed.

Barber Shop Moves

Pat Griffin, the barber and a Greenbelter for 33 years, is en thusiastic about the new quarters, which should be ready next week, when the plumbing is in stalled. The barber shop has been at its present location above High's dairy store for three years. Before that it was in what is now Maria's Beauty Shop.

The new location will offer an advantage for handicapped patrons who found negotiating the steps to the second floor almost impossible. The new shop will also have the benefit of lots of natural light.

Invitation to Bike Racers

Bicycle races at Greenbelt Park got off to an excellent start on Sunday, Feb. 3 with over 60 racers, some from as far away as Pennsylvania, braving the clear, cold weather to find out how out of shape they were after the winter lavoff.

There were five categories of races, including two short novice races of three and six miles for beginners. Although it helps to have a good, light ten-speed racing bike, it is not entirely necessary. There was even one competitor with a souped-up threespeed! There is a free but mandatory safety inspection before each race.

Potential competitors may like to know that novices ran about minutes-30 seconds or faster for the 1.5 mile circuit around the north end of the park. The class A riders (the highest category) averaged under four minutes a lap for nine laps. The races will probably lengthen as the weather gets warmer.

You don't have to win to have fun. Just racing along with a pack of cyclists can be exhilarating. To get in shape, it is recommended that you ride at least ten to twenty miles a day for



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

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
