Proposed City Budget Would Maintain Current Services, Increase Tax Rate

The Greenbelt municipal budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1982, as presented to the City Council by its manager on April 6, would require an increase in the tax rate of 6c per \$100 assessed valuation for a total tax rate of \$1.10. The budget provides for closely maintaining the current level of services. No funds would be available for new or expanded services. In order to reduce the tax rate council would have to reduce expenditures and/or find additional revenues in the amount of \$12,881 for each cent of rate

General Fund

The proposed general fund budget provides for an increase of 14.7% in the total expenditures during fiscal 1982 or \$3,173,000 to be balanced by revenues of \$3,105,000 and reappropriation of the FY1981 Reserve for Capital Improvements of \$68,000. The most significant single change from the previous year is a requirement that local governments contribute to the state's retirement fund's accrued liability. When added to increases in this year's social security and state retirement contributions, the increase in this account comes to \$145,700 or 50% of the total increase in General Fund expendi-

Other Funds

The total city budget anticipates expenditures of \$3,628,000 for an overall increase of 8.6%. However, this total budget reflects five additional funds, four of which show decreases from last year: 1) Capital Improvements Fund, \$950,000 Bond Issue (down .3%); 2) Community Development Grant Fund (down 44%); 3) Motor Equipment Maintenance Fund (up 12.4%); 4) Replacement Fund (down 20%); and 5) Revenue Sharing Fund (down 5.5%).

Expanding Tax Base

The General Fund budget accounts for the operating expenditures of the four departments of the city - Police, Recreation, CARES and Public Works - and the administrative staff services.

balanced by the property tax. By year's end, Greenbelt's tax base will have grown by 15.5% with the completion of the Greenway Shopping Center, additional buildings in Windsor Green, a second Capital Office Park office building, Pepco Substation and, possibly, Prudential's office build-

However the bulk of the addition will be taxable for less than a full year. The city's real property tax base for FY 1982 is estimated at \$110,800,000, up 8.4% over that of a year ago, and is expected to yield \$1,204,500. Real property taxes thus amount to 38% of the total operating budget revenues. (The taxes from the Greenway Shopping Center will be phased in over 3 to 5 years as part of the annexation agree-ment.) Personal property taxes paid by commercial businesses and utilities will add another \$212,400. Total revenues from all sources are expected to rise by

Policy Decisions

In his written message, city manager James K. Giese outlines the kinds of decisions council will have to make during the next six weeks. While his budget strives to maintain the current level of services, council could decide to improve those services, a somewhat unlikely choice in an election year unless there is strong pressure from citizens - for example, wishing to beef-up the police department. On the other hand, council could choose to go in the opposite direction and cut back services, following the lead of the county and now the federal government.

More specifically, Giese discusses a variety of policy decisions open to council, such as determining the level of services of the various departments and of miscellaneous expenditures, determining whether the property tax can be reduced by increasing other revenues, determining the use of unappropriated surplus, the level of compensation for city employees; and whether new programs or facilities should be pro-

Ten Year Review

In order to help council make This is the budget that must be informed budget decisions, Giese

and Dennis Piendak, assistant city manager and city treasurer, prepared a ten-year budget comparison of Fiscal 1972 and 1982 expressed in 1967 dollar values. During this 10-year period the city's population has remained constant, the housing stock has increased by 23%, a new shopping center has opened and there is substantial office development underway. During the same period, the city government has increased by one-third both in dollars expended and in number of employees.

The Police Department received the largest increase - both in dollars (50%) and number of employees (52%). The Parks and Recreation Department registered a 28% increase in expenditures and almost doubled the size of its small staff, from 3.5 to 6.5 persons, largely due to the opening of a second recreation cen-Administration gained 11% in expenditures and 1.5 persons, from 9 to 10.5; Public Works gained 16% for expenditures, while its staff grew by two positions, from 31 to 33. There are no comparison figures for Greenbelt CARES, which became a department within the last 10 years.

Police Department

The greatest growth has occurred within the police department. The gain of 11 employees is greater than all other departments put together, including CARES. According to the study, serious crime has increased 19% over the 10 years, though it has slightly decreased in the past year. Breakings and enterings are up more than 21/2 times and crimes of violence to persons are up significantly, Giese says. With the opening of the new shopping center, he continues, further increases in the number of crimes committed can be expected. There are no standards for the size of police departments," Giese said, adding that while studies do not show that "the number of police officers has any relation-ship to the determent of crime," neither is there any satisfactory evidence to the contrary. Out of Sympathy

To the Editor:

I find myself totally out of sympathy with the recent ads placed by several persons not wanting their houses rehabilitated. They charge that GHI has not given proper study to the program. How much more study could have been given? In 1964 such studies began when president Charles Schwan appointed a Blue Ribbon Committee to set goals for GHI's future. and they continued with one planning committee after another. In 1971 the Board engaged the services of an architectural and engineering firm to assess our needs and give specific suggestions for bringing the houses up to post-World-War II standards. The recommendations of this firm were unfortunately not followed, due largely to misrepresentations of their study by a small but vocal group opposed to the then Board. Some of these people signed the present ads, and apparently are still misrepresenting rehab plans.

They persistently charge that the total cost for rehab will be over \$30 million, although it has been shown repeatedly that this figure includes contingency funds that need not be used but which must be included for legal reasons, and a \$3 million fund re quired to ensure payment were GHI temporarily unable to meet even one payment to the bond holders.

They insist that our contracts forbid borrowing a large sum at interest although our contracts

make no such stipulation. I want to see our houses brought up to 1981 standards. I would like the increased living space that will result when my radiators are removed. I got new windows, and I would like to think that all Greenbelt could like me enjoy a warmer house in win ter and a quieter one all year round because so much outdoor noise is shut out. I would like to think that my house has been ex amined for structural defects by somebody who knows what to look for, so I can quit worrying

Nels Anderson II, 22, of 1-H Gardenway, died on Sunday, April 19 in a climbing accident near Fredericton, New Brunswick, Canada. Two companions were also killed. Two other climbers were able to return safely and reported the accident.

Nels was a fourth-year student in a five-year civil engineering program at the University of New Brunswick, where his grandfather. Nels Anderson, is Professor Emeritus of Sociology. Nels recently was recognized for outstanding scholarship, winning the Allan K. Grimmer Award. A lifelong resident of Greenbelt, Nels graduated from Parkdale in 1977. He was a member of the National Honor Society and the varsity soccer and wrestling teams. He also played football and soccer for the local Boys' Club.

Nels is survived by his parents, Martin and Hattie Anderson; his brother Hassell, a student at Eleanor Roosevelt High School; and a sister. Elizabeth MacLellan, a graduate of Parkdale and of the University of New Brunswick, where she currently serves as a lecturer in geology. His grandfather also survives.

"The largest city department (in terms of man power) has not increased in size as rapidly as the rest of the city government," says Giese. During the 10 years, both the street mileage and park acreage have increased significantly. However, little impact has registered on the budget as new streets, built to higher city standards, require little maintenance and much of the parkland has not been developed. Giese is concerned, however, that inadequate major maintenance is being done on the older streets. Parks, he admits, "could be better maintained if more funds were made available." Refuse collection, paid for by user fees, has been reduced in scope - conversion to a 5-day work week, separate collection of newspapers, and the loss of some apartments has been somewhat offset by the addition of Windsor Green. A new recreation center and addition to the municipal building are added responsibilities for this department.

Recreation Acknowledging that recreation is not "an essential public service," Giese emphasizes that "Greenbelt has traditionally offered a strong recreation program to its citizens - one that has re-

CITY BUDGET, cont. fr. p. 1 ceived national recognition . . . and is an important amenity to our community life."

While county programs offer some specialized programs not offered by the city, past studies indicate a poor tax dollar return to Greenbelt residents for their support of the county program. Giese also points out that many residents (SHL, Greenbriar and others) support private recreation facilities in additon. About a quarter of the city's recreation programs are paid for by users fees. Of these fees, 42% come from the municipal swimming pool operation.

CARES

Greenbelt's Youth Services Bureau, a relatively new department, provides a counseling service to families and youths. Earlier this month the state legislature cut back a significant portion of its grant program, posing new problems for the council.

New Programs or Facilities?

No new services or facilities are provided for in this budget. Considerable community concern has been expressed over the closing of North End School. If operated as a city facility, Giese notes, the school would be costly both in operating expenses and program-ming. Possibly rental or user fees might offset all or part of those costs. 
