County Schools Open Monday, Aug. 31

Monday, August 31 is the first day of school for approximately 116,000 students in the Prince Georges county school system. Because enrollment is steadily decreasing, more facilities have had to be closed and changes made in others. There are now ten 4 year high schools, nine 3 year high schools, 25 junior high schools, 12 middle schools, 127 elementary schools, 12 special centers and 2 vocational schools.

Last year Greenbelt's Eleanor Roosevelt High School was made a four-year high school. This year change has come to three more city schools. Greenbelt Junior High School has become a middle school for seventh and eighth graders only. Greenbelt North End elementary has been closed and most of its students have been transferred to Greenbelt Center elementary. (See stories elsewhere in this issue.)

Registration

State law requires school attendance by every child between the ages of 6 and 16. Children who will be five years old on or before January 1, 1982 may attend kindergarten. Parents who have not pre-registered their children for kindergarten or to begin school in Prince Georges County for the first time should bring the following: the child's birth certificate (or proof of birth date); record of immunization for children kindergarten through grade 6 (diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles (rubeola) and rubella (German measles); record of rubeola for all students through

grade 12; legal proof of residence (settlement papers, rental contract, etc.); student's transfer card or last report card from previous school for students entering above grade 1.

Lunch Costs

Regular lunch prices have increased from 70 to 90 cents in the elementary school and from 75 to 95 cents in secondary schools. Reduced lunches now cost 40c (formerly 20c) and more stringent guidelines will be used to determine eligibility for both reduced and free lunches. The price of milk went from 15c to 25c. Breakfast prices increased five cents to a total of 55c. The cost of reduced price breakfasts jumped from 5c to 30c. These increases, which were approved by the Board of Education at its August 20 meeting, are the result of federal legislation that decreased the federal subsidy for school lunch programs. They do not reflect increased costs in labor, food, etc.

Instruction

The instructional program will continue to focus on programs relating to basic skills. This is particularly evident in the development of curriculum for the new middle schools where students receive more individual attention through team-teaching and other techniques to provide for extended skill and personal development. The county continues its expansion of the basal textbook program which includes a language text with specific writing assignments for each grade level. Concentration on basic skills has led to increasingly higher test scores. In the 1980-81 school year

scores increased for reading and comprehensive tests as well as the Maryland functional reading test. The Talented and Gifted (TAG) program will be expanded, especially in the high schools.

The operating budget for the 1981-82 school year is \$308.4 million which represents a 6.9% increase over last year. The cost per student, exclusive of transportation, is \$2,474. Despite a \$3.1 million reduction because of the closing of 22 schools as well as other reductions in staff, streamlining transportation services, etc., inflationary rises in the cost of supplies, fuel, utilities, employee health care, Social Security, etc. made an increase in budget necessary. Improvements such as added teaching positions, increased funds for special programs (ex. TAG) and funding for salary adjustments resulting from contract negotiations with employee unions all added to the increase.

Center School Getting Readied For New School Year As North End Joins Up

There's an air of expectancy in Center School that one feels as soon as one enters. Principal John VanSchoonhoven and his staff are getting ready for the first day of school — Monday, August 31 — the day two of Greenbelt's elementary schools will be combined. North End elementary has been closed and all of its Greenbelt students and most of its bused students will be coming to Center. The school seems to be bursting at the seams as every classroom is being readied. "It's nice to see the building being utilized," Van Schoonhoven said.

Besides Center's returning staff, seven new classroom teachers, some from North End, will be on hand to greet pupils next Monday. Van Schoonhoven reports that there is a lot of enthusiasm. "New staff bring new ideas . . . new thoughts," Van Schoonhoven added in anticipation of an interesting year.

Anza Manning will be back in kindergarten. So far, a half day kindergarten has been added with Vicki Rooney as teacher. Should more children enroll, Rooney will have two classes. First grade teachers Peggy Foman and Isabel Field will be joined by Kay Jones, who taught second at Center last year. Dixie Binning, along with newcomers Carolyn Anderson and Yvonne Johnson, will teach second grade; Liz Solakian and Marcia Marino will be back in third, as will Janet Pappas. A combination two/three will be taught by Sylvia Garvin. Returning to fourth grade are Barbara Jackson and Arlene Taylor. Janet Miller will teach a four/five and Beth Kessler and Sharon Hoffman, fifth. Newcomer Sarah Sutton will teach sixth grade as will Miriam Gruver and Jim Parham. Carolyn Lubetsky will have a five/six.

Physical Education teacher Stape Shields will be assisted by Nelson Gibson, who will be at Center two days a week. In bad weather they will share the gym. Jean Radspieler will teach music

part time and will go from class to class to teach. Dolores Cook will be in the music room again this year.

Center's guidance counselor will be Joan Massino, who comes from North End. Greenbelter Paula Marinelli will be the new health aide. In the office is a new part time secretary, Grace Miles.

Coming from North End also are aides in the "Operation: Moving Ahead" program — June Glesener, Ann Olaker and Marie Chamberlain.

Other staff members returning are Peg Rudd, Roz Efron and Barbara Weeks, special resource teachers, Randy Kosik, reading specialist, Sheryl Joseph, speech, Jean Sullivan, librarian, Mary Gary, hearing, aides Pat Savage, Wendy Geagan, Mae Gingel, Virginia Rich, Shirley Bailey, Mary MacQuillan and Jeff Finkel, and secretaries, Carla Kappas and Mary Hefflebower.

Questions Raised About Actions After High Speed Chase Accident

Early on the morning of Friday, August 14, two Greenbelt police officers in separate squad cars, pursued a speeding motorcyclist northbound on Ridge Road. At 4:33 a.m., just beyond the intersection of Ridge Road and Research Road, the lead police car and the motorcycle collided, and the second police car hit the rear of the lead car.

The police report stated that the young man riding the motorcycle then attempted to run, and was apprehended. Nearby residents, however, who were awakened by the crash, contend that the young man appeared to be too seriously injured to walk, much less run. They further allege that one of the police officers repeatedly kicked the young man while he lay on the street and that the officers moved the young man before the nature of his injuries had been determined.

The young man, a Greenbelt resident in his early twenties, was later moved from the scene by Greenbelt ambulance and remained hospitalized for four days.

As a result of a letter from a witness, the News Review staff has gathered information about the crash and its immediate aftermath, both from city officials and a number of eyewitnesses.

The Police Report

Acting City Manager Dennis Piendak and Greenbelt Police Chief William Lane said they were unaware of the eyewitness allegations until the News Review started asking questions. The two officials described the circumstances of the event as presented by the officers in their written report on the vehicle accident, and gave the News Review a copy of that written report.

According to Piendak and Lane, the pursuit of the speeding motorcycle began around Ridge Road and Southway. The accident report indicated that the motorcycle's lights were not on and that speeds of more than 90 miles

Public Hearings Set On Redistricting Plan

Public hearings on four separate plans for redistricting Prince Georges County into nine councilmanic districts have been scheduled by the Councilmanic Redistricting Commission. The Commission has been charged with presenting to the County Council a single plan which can be put into effect before the 1982 elections. The single plan may be a composite of the four plans, of testimony received at the public hearings and of any relevant information provided to the Commission.

Public hearings will be held in the north, south and central areas of the county. The northern area hearing, which is closest to Greenbelt, is scheduled for Tuesday, September 1, at 8 p.m. in Hyattsville Library, 6530 Adelphi Road.

Persons wishing to testify may telephone the Office of the Clerk of the Council at 952-3600 if they wish to be placed on the advance speakers' list. Time limits of three minutes for an individual and five minutes for a spokesman for a group may be imposed. Those unable to attend the hearings may submit written comments to the Councilmanic Redistricting Commission, c/o The Clerk of the Council, Room 2198, County Administration Building, Upper Marlboro, Md. 20772.

Copies of the four proposed plans are available for review at the Library.

an hour were clocked during the chase. The report further stated that near the Research Road intersection the young man applied his brakes hard, and the motorcycle went on its side but then righted itself. The young man stayed on the motorcycle for another 40 to 45 feet along Ridge Road until the motorcycle again fell on its side and began to slide. At the first fall, both police officers had locked their cars' brakes. The multiple collision took place when the motorcycle fell for the second time.

It was Lane's understanding that the young man landed on his feet when the motorcycle fell the second time, and that he attempted to run and was restrained. Lane said he was given no indications of heavy resistance by the young man, or of any firmer efforts needed to restrain him.

After his release from the hospital, the young man was charged by the police with eight violations.

Eyewitness Accounts

News Review staff members visited the crash scene at night and found that it is brightly lit by two nearby street lights. Witnesses have alleged to the News Review

good year. There has been good cooperation from North End parents and he expects the adjustment to take place smoothly.

Kindergarten Bus

For those who live in the North End, a bus will pick up morning kindergarten children from school and drop them off in front of North End school about 12:10 p.m. Afternoon kindergarten children will be picked up at the same spot at 1 p.m. Although the distance is less than a mile and a bus is not mandatory, these mid-day stops will be made for kindergarten children only. The morning group will be expected to walk to school since that is when other neighborhood children will be going. The afternoon group will be expected to walk home with the other children.

An adult crossing guard will be stationed at Northway and Crescent mornings, afternoons and during mid-day kindergarten hours.

As in other years children are to assemble on the blacktop behind the school on the first day. They will then be grouped into classes and go to their classrooms. It may be necessary to make some adjustments in classes later in September, depending on enrollment and class size, Van Schoonhoven said. Continued registrations are anticipated.

Lunch hours will be fifteen minutes later than last year, reflecting the later school opening (9:35 a.m.). Grades one and two will eat at 12, three and four at 12:30 and five and six at 1.

This year Center will have eight large buses and three small ones. The front parking lot will be expanded to meet this need. The city has been very cooperative in all these arrangements. Although the job is not yet completed, Van Schoonhoven sees no resulting difficulties. The count-down has begun!

Robert Scott, Sr.

Robert L. Scott, Sr., known as "Red" or "Scottie," died August 16 at the age of 85, at his home in Hyattsville.

Mr. Scott was an original resident of Greenbelt, moving in at 4-G Southway in 1938. The family later lived at 7-K Crescent and 19-A Ridge Road before moving to Hyattsville in 1953.

A native of Tennessee, Mr. Scott came to work in Washington in 1930. He helped to construct many of the public buildings and bridges in Washington and the surrounding area and worked actively as a crane operator until the age of 74. He was a member of Local 77, International Union of Operating Engineers.

A Navy veteran of World War I, Mr. Scott was a long-time member of Greenbelt American Legion Post No. 136.

Mr. Scott's wife, Mary, died in 1972. He is survived by three daughters, Kathleen McFarland and Rosemary Scott of Greenbelt and Joanne Kennedy of Williamsburg, Va.; a son, LTC (ret.) Robert L. Scott, Jr., of Tempe, Ariz.; nineteen grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

Greenbelt Junior High Will be Middle School

An observant driver traveling along Edmonston Road recently may have noticed County service vehicles parked in front of Greenbelt Middle School. Freshly painted walls will greet students when the school year begins next Monday.

But the physical change occurring in the school is only the beginning of alterations taking place there. Formerly known as Greenbelt Junior High School, it is now Greenbelt Middle School. Under the direction of a new principal and vice principal, the transformation from junior high to middle school is proceeding.

Principal Nicholas J. Poulos was principal at Carole Highlands Elementary School prior to coming to Greenbelt Middle School in June. Vice Principal Dr. Janice Lantz was previously vice principal at Benjamin Foulis Junior High School. Poulos' educational background in curriculum development is being applied as he and Dr Lantz work on the instructional program and scheduling. Both are enthusiastic about the middle school concept.

Greenbelt Middle is one of ten schools in Prince Georges County opening as middle schools for the first time this fall. They join Thomas Johnson, which pioneered as a middle school last year. Middle schools teach grades seven and eight. Ninth graders attend a four-year high school. Because scheduling in the middle school is not prescribed by ninth grade unit requirements, the middle school time schedule can be more flexible than that in a junior high school.

Administrators closely involved in the middle school program say it holds exciting promise for improvements in student learning. The program is designed to provide a better transition from elementary to high school. The guiding philosophy is to deal exclu-

sively with adolescents so that problems particular to that age group can receive concentrated attention and deficiencies in basic skills can be recognized. The program as adopted in Prince Georges County brings the concept of teamwork to teaching in the seventh and eighth grades.

The program at Greenbelt Middle will operate on an instructional team basis, where an academic "team" of teachers is responsible for the grouping, scheduling and teaching of a group of students. The students will be divided among three "teams." This team concept will make adjustments in a student's schedule easier, allowing him to keep the same teachers, even if his schedule is changed.

The school day will be divided into nine 42-minute periods. Some classes will be taught back-to-back by the same teacher in a double period of 84 minutes. English and reading will be taught one after the other, as will social studies and study skills. Other courses will be math, physical education, science and exploratory foreign language. An exploratory "team" will coordinate and teach art, music, home economics and industrial arts. Average class size will be about 33 students.

Greenbelt Middle will have a TAG (Talented and Gifted) program, as well as SLRD and resource programs. The school, built for 1500-2000 students, will have 500 when school begins. The number is expected to increase to 900 in the 1982-1983 school year when Mary Bethune Jr. High closes and Greenbelt students previously slated to attend there will go instead to Greenbelt Middle.



EYEWITNESSES, fr. page 1 that the following is what took place there after the crash:

The noise of the crash, they noted, was loud enough to awaken nearby residents. Within seconds after the crash, moans and cries could be heard. The young man was lying on his back on the street, approximately ten feet from the motorcycle. He repeatedly cried out that he was hurt. It appeared to one witness that the two Greenbelt police officers forced the young man to roll over onto his stomach, and to extend his hands above his head so that he could be searched. The young man seemed to be trying to raise his head. One of the officers was shouting at him and repeatedly kicked him in the side and "stomped" him with his heel one time.

At some point during the kicking, the officers handcuffed the young man. They took hold of him from behind and lifted him to his feet. The young man cried out in pain. They walked him across the street to a police car, pushed him into the back seat, and left him there by himself. The young man continued to moan and scream.

The police officers eventually went back to the car and removed the young man from the back seat. He appeared to be in a state of shock and unable to walk alone. They walked him to a strip of grass and put him face-down on the grass. A Greenbelt ambulance and fire engine arrived shortly afterward, approximately 15 minutes after the crash.

Three other Greenbelt police cars with four more officers had already arrived quite soon after the crash.

Action by City

Police Chief Lane told the News Review that he would ask the two officers for a more detailed report. He could not speak to the ques-

tion of how the young man could have attempted to run after the crash if he was so seriously injured that he required four days of hospitalization. Lane added that he would ask the hospital for information about the young man's injuries, as well as for the doctor's opinions as to how the injuries might have been caused. (Lane later told the News Review that the hospital had refused to provide the information.)

Piendak and Lane explained that a Maryland law—the "Law-Enforcement Officers' Bill of Rights"—provides strict procedural safeguards for police officers during any investigation and subsequent hearing which could lead to disciplinary action, demotion, or dismissal. The city officials emphasized that in this present case, the law will not let the police department investigate the allegations of police brutality unless the department receives a signed complaint, witnessed by a notary public. Such a complaint must be from the alleged victim, a member of his immediate family, or an eyewitness, and must be filed within 90 days. Piendak and Lane went on to explain that a person who files such a complaint must be prepared to appear as a witness.

The News Review learned Tuesday that city officials received a notarized letter late Monday afternoon from a witness containing allegations of unnecessary use of force by a police officer. Chief Lane has assigned the case to two detectives within his department for investigation.

(Editor's Note: Most witnesses interviewed by the News Review gave permission to use their names. Names of witnesses, of the young man, or of the police officers involved as provided by Police Chief Lane, however, are not being used in the News Review at this time.)



PG School System Is 13th Largest

The Prince Georges County Public Schools remained the 13th largest school system in the United States this year, despite an enrollment decline of more than 5,200 students.

According to a recent national ranking by the Educational Research Service, the largest school system in the country was again New York City with an enrollment of 963,142 students. This is nearly eight times the enrollment, 122,384 students, in Prince Georges County.

After New York City, the next largest school districts were Los Angeles, Chicago, Dade County, FL, Philadelphia, Detroit, Houston, Hawaii, Broward County, FL, Baltimore City, Dallas, Fairfax County and Prince Georges County. Other Maryland school districts among the 50 largest systems were Baltimore County as 19th, Montgomery County as 20th, and Anne Arundel as 35th.


