Zoning Petitions for Parcels 1 & 2 Resurface

Rezoning petitions for approximately 112 acres of undeveloped land on parcels 1 and 2 - the land between the Baltimore - Washington Parkway and Greenbelt Homes, Inc. (see map) - are scheduled for a hearing before the county Zoning Hearing Examiner on January 22, 1981. The city council has the matter on the agenda for its January 4 meeting.


The latest happening has stirred up memories of the 1960s and early 1970s when the 230-acre tract was the center of controversy. During that period, proposals for rezoning the land to a higher density and for a 3-school complex were bitterly opposed by Greenbelters. Such uses of the virtually land-locked tract were considered to be disruptive of the Greenbelt Master Plan (1964) and, later, of the county's Master Plan (1970).

Four rezoning petitions, dor-

mant since 1971, were reactivated recently in a move by the hearing examiner to resolve these and other antiquated zoning applications. While some applicants have indicated they are no longer interested, the owners of Parcel 1 and of the remaining privately owned part of Parcel 2 are ready to move forward.

According to a spokesman for the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission (MNCPPC), applicants Charles Bresler and Theodore Lerner are requesting a zoning change for the entire privately owned acreage from R-R (rural residentialsingle family, 2 units per acre) to R-T (townhouses, up to 12 units an acre). About 102 acres are located north of Northway Extended in parcel 1, and about 10 acres are south of Northway Extended in parcel 2. (Earlier petitions for these parcels contained more acreage. The School Board had purchased 72 acres - 62 in 1966 and 10 in 1969 - for a 3-school complex never built. The county later declared this land surplus.

Sewage, Roads Continue To Create Problems

The major problems with parcels 1 and 2 continue to be lack of sewage facilities and roads. The Greenbelt city council in 1970 proposed that the parcels be designated by the county as a special treatment area because of the difficulties in getting public facilities for the area at a price that would be compatible with the cost of development. At the time, the city council also asked that studies be made by the MNCPPC, the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission, the Prince Georges County Council, and the Board of Education to determine if the approved Master Plan was appropriately drawn. It called for R-T townhouse development west of the proposed perimeter road and R-80 single family development east of the perimeter road. The city preferred that the entire acreage be designated single fam-

Sewage

Under the county's Ten Year Water & Sewage Plan for Prince Georges County, parcels 1 and 2 will not be serviced by sanitary sewers within the next 10 years.

In order to service this section of Greenbelt, it will be necessary to run an extension sewer main through the Agricultural Research Center. Alternatives are constructing a lift station and pumping the sewage uphill to another sewer main, if one adequate in size is available, or building a special treatment plant. In 1970 when the school board was still planning to construct a high school on parcel 2, the cost estimates for sewer service ranged from \$570,000 to \$716,000. WSSC officials say that an amendment to the Water & Sewer plan by the County Council would be required to service the area sooner.

Perimeter Road

The 1970 College Park-Greenbelt & Vicinity Master Plan shows the proposed perimeter road cutting through the northern portions of parcels 3 and 4 (east and west side of Research Road) and through parcels 1 and 2. One purpose of the controversial road was to handle traffic generated by the proposed three-school complex (elementary, junior high, senior high). With the removal of the high school from the tract, the the rezoning petitions to the MNCPPC for reexamination of the perimeter road.

Whether or not the perimeter road is seriously considered depends on the density of the zoning that is finally approved for the 112 acres now under consideration, and on the disposition of the 72 acres of surplus land that the county no longer wants for schools. A factor to be weighed also is the reduction of acreage for residential development by the city's acquisition of land in both parcels for a perimeter trail and

Greenbelt Lake's Ice Skating Guidelines

The Greenbelt Lake is open for ice skating when weather conditions are favorable. In order to provide a wholesome, safe activity, the city has developed certain guidelines that should be followed. During cold weather, persons interested in ascertaining the conditions of the ice at the lake should call the Greenbelt Police Department, 474-7200. It is impossible to continually test ice thickness over all of the lake, so skating will always be at the risk of the participant. Recommended areas of skating are the shore lines and the bay around the peninsula. A green flag will be displayed on the bandstand flagpole to indicate SKATING AT YOUR OWN RISK. The lake area around the dam and spillway should be avoided, as open water is usually found in these areas. Parents should accompany young children. Skaters should also avoid gathering in groups on the ice.

The city's guide to ice condi-

tions is as follows -

YOUNG OR BLACK ICE: 21/2 inches uniform; safe if cautious and no congregating. Four inches will support the weight of skaters. SKATE AT YOUR OWN RISK.

LAYERED OR WHITE ICE: one foot of this kind will support the weight of skaters. SKATE AT YOUR OWN RISK.

OLD OR ROTTEN ICE: thickness is under the above conditions. ABSOLUTELY NO SKATING.





Zoning History

When the Federal government withdrew from Greenbelt in 1952-1953, it sold 750 acres of undeveloped land, including parcels 1 and 2, to the Greenbelt Veterans Housing Corporation (GVHC), later Greenbelt Homes, Inc. These parcels were zoned Rural Planned Community (RPC). This zoning category permitted multiple uses, but required an overall plan for the tract to be approved by the county commissioners. (The city of Greenbelt does not have zoning authority.)

The vacant land purchased by GVHC was transferred to Greenbelt Land Improvement Corporation (GLIC)₄ its wholly-owned subsidiary. After several unsuccessful attempts to develop the vacant property, GVHC sold GLIC to Warner-Kanter Construction Company, a private developer, in May 1955. Portions of the land were later sold to various developers.

In 1961, owners Garvin and Martin requested high-density zoning for parcels 1 and 2-(R-18 apartment zoning; 21 units an acre.) At a marathon zoning hearing at which Greenbelters protested rezoning for these and other tracts in the city, the county commissioners denied the petitions. On February 21, 1962, the commissioners rezoned parcels 1 and 2 to R-R (rural residential), which allowed for single family development, two units per acre. This zoning in harmony with the city's wishes, exists today.

From 1963 to 1971, subsequent owners (Bresler, Lerner, Ammerman) hoped to gain approval for R-30 apartment zoning (14 units an acre). The R-30 zoning conformed with the 1965 draft of the College Park-Greenbelt Master Plan, which was vigorously and successfully fought by the city. Adoption of this plan would have required the widening of city streets to four lanes.

Master Plan

The county commissioners finally adopted a Master Plan for College Park-Greenbelt and Vicinity in 1970. This Plan had the general approval of the city council as meeting the goal of preserving the fundamental character of Greenbelt as a low-density, planned residential community with emphasis on ample parkland and spaciousness, adequate community facilities and minimum traffic congestion. The Master Plan's secommendation for parcels 1 and 2 was R-T townhouse zoning for the land west of a proposed perimeter road, and R-80 (singlefamily, three units an acre) east of the perimeter road. The proposed road would run from Springhill Lake property through parcels 1 and 2 and cross the Baltimore-Washington Parkway to Mandan Road.

At the time the MNCPPC noted: "In view of the existing single-family (row-house) character of adjacent development, the R-T and R-80 Zones proposed on the Plan would be a compatible and logical extension of the existing housing within Greenbelt without adversely increasing the residential density... The R-30 Zone for these properties would produce an imbalance of multi-family dwelling units, detrimental to the sur-

rounding development and the overall public facilities shown on the plan."

The Greenbelt city council preferred R-80 zoning for both parcels because of the need for additional single family homes in Greenbelt.

The last action taken by the Prince Georges County Council, sitting as the District Council, on parcels 1 and 2 was on June 2, 1971. The District Council sent the rezoning petitions for R-30 apartment zoning back to the MNC-PPC to be updated, instructing the planners not to return the applications until the location and/or existence of a perimeter road was determined. The District Council also asked for more information on matters of traffic and water for the property.




