# City Council Looks at Development Plans of Springhill Lake Associates

The Greenbelt Hilton moved one step closer to existence on June 14 when the City Council, at its regular meeting, voted to accept the generally favorable Advisory Planning Board (APB) report and forward the report to the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC) as the city position.

The Council was shown an artist's rendition of the planned 17story, 296-room hotel by Nancy Slepicka of the law firm Fossett and Brugger, who represented the hotel's developers, Springhill Lake Associates, who are developing both the Hilton and the office buildings on the Capital Office Park. The hotel will be built on a site of slightly more than 11 acres lying south and west of the State Highway Administration building on Ivy Lane. More than 20% of the site will be landscaped.

The APB report recommended that an additional walkway to Ivy Lane be provided to serve pedestrian traffic to a bus stop and also suggested a close examination of the traffic flow in the hotel area and at the intersection of Ivy Lane and Kenilworth Avenue. APB also recommended that a check be made for access by fire equipment to be sure that the entrance way and the landscaped berms do not interfere with fire safety vehicles.

#### Building Height Questioned

The report also recommended that, if the height of the building is not yet finalized, consideration be given to the impact such a high building will have on the skyline viewed from the Lake Park. Donald Volk, chairman of APB, commented that this hotel will be the tallest building in Greenbelt and the closest private building to the lake. It will tend to overshadow the lake and may be visually obtrusive. If the design is fixed, as City Manager James K. Giese's comments indicated it Volk recommended that the is, external face of the building and signs on the face of the building on the lake side be as unobtrusive as possible. Slepicka stated that the applications for building permits have already been made, indicating that the design of the building is fixed.

She also indicated that construction is scheduled to begin in the next few months,

#### **Rezoning** Application

Slepicka dealt with the question of the traffic density at Ivy Lane and Kenilworth Avenue during the discussion of an application to change the zoning of a 21.78-acre tract north of the Capital Office Park from R-18 (multiple-family) to C-O (commercialoffice). The parcel is part of a larger tract owned by the same group of developers. The tract lies in the northwest quadrant of the intersection of Ivy Lane with Kenilworth Avenue. The rest of the tract is largely floodplan area, for the most part, undevelopable.

According to a study made on traffic capacity, the Ivy Lane/-Kenilworth intersection can handle, without additional paved improvements, the traffic generated by the three office buildings already built, a fourth building which is planned, the Hilton Hotel and another 160.000 sq. ft. of office space which might be constructed as a result of the rezoning of the tract under consideration.

The APB recommended approval of the rezoning request subject to site plan review and recommended that any future construction be integrated and in harmony with existing development. Giese noted that development as office space would provide the best tax return for the city because such development would require fewer city services than multiplefamily housing, particularly in the area of police protection.

Mayor Richard Castaldi raised the question of the impact the construction might have on the city-owned cemetery which is almost completely surrounded by this tract. He suggested that proper buffering be established when the site plan is made and Slepicka agreed that this factor would be considered.

Councilman Thomas White requested that a meeting with the owners be arranged to discuss this and other questions before the Council takes a position on the rezoning request. Tuesday, June 29, was set as a tentative date for such a meeting.

The council also took up the question of the status of approximately 50 acres of land in the Springhill Lake Industrial property which had been put into reservation by the owners pending its purchase by Metro for use as the Greenbelt Metro station. The reservation, which provides that no taxes will be paid on the property by the owners in return for an agreement not to develop the property, expires June 30. MNC-PPC had proposed extending the period of reservation for an addiperiod of time. However, tional Slepicka, again representing the owners, stated that the owners would not agree to the extension because the taking of the land by Metro is expected before the end of the year. Since land cannot be placed in reservation without the owner's consent, the question was moot and the council could take no action.

Councilman Richard Pilski attempted to find out if there was a connection between the financing of the Hilton Hotel and the taking of the land but Slepicka maintained that to her knowledge

#### there was no such connection. Accepts Reports

In other actions, the council accepted a long list of reports from boards and committees. These reports will be considered by the council at its July meeting. The reports included the Park and Recreation Advisory Board's (PRAB) reports on uses for North End school, proposed renaming of city streets and the Center Mall, a proposal concerning action tennis, the impact of the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission pipeline on Lake Park and new construction designed to provide access by the elderly and handicapped to the municipal pool.

The council also accepted reports from the Community Relations Advisory Board on possible uses of the North End school and commemoration for Roosevelt, Tugwell and Filene as well as draft bylaws of the Crime Prevention Committee and a suggested expenditure for audio-visual equipment by that committee.

The council received two petitions to rename the lake park. The first petition was presented by Katherine Keene speaking for the Franklin D. Roosevelt Commemoration Committee which was established on February 22 and charged with the definition of activities suitable for the celebration of the Roosevelt centennial. The committee petitioned that the lake park be renamed the Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial Park.

The council also received a petition from Councilman Pilski to rename the lake park in honor of the recently deceased and longtime resident Buddy Attick. Pilski made a very moving appeal, citing Attick's long and manyslded service to the city and noting that Gladys Attick would be able to appreciate the renaming of the park in her late husband's honor.

The council initially decided to refer Keene's petition to PRAB. However, upon receiving the second petition later in the evening, council decided to table both petitions and meet with the petitioners to work out a compromise.

#### **Refuse Fee**

As usual at the end of the fiscal year, the council also dealt with a number of financial matters. Of general interest was the second reading and passing of a resolution to increase garbage collection fees to \$8.50 per month up from the current fee of \$7. Councilman Edward Putens warned that with this increase, the city collection fees are approaching those of independent contractor garbage collection charges and that some areas of the city may begin to hire their own services. Giese replied that the city still provides competitive service in that special trash pickups, which are charged separate-

Fireworks! This Fourth of July Greenbelt will sponsor, as usual, a fireworks display at the lake to culminate this commemorative celebration. The loud color, visual display, supplied by Columbus Fireworks of Ohio, will be launched by city staff. The show costs \$2900, which is comparable with last year. Other activities abound to include something for everyone this July 4 weekend. The youngsters can begin by registering for twoweek summer classes, from 9:30-11 a.m. Golden Age Club members and guests can visit the Morrison Senior Citizens' Lounge at the Youth Center from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., for socializing, cardplaying, and memento-viewing. Both groups and those in-between, may attend a workshop on Action Tennis, tennis played on a court 1/4 the usual size, from 11 a.m. to noon.

Anyone may go to the Youth Center or the Springhill Lake recreation center for such activities as playing table games, billiards, or basketball. Both centers are open Friday from noon to 11 p.m.; Saturday from 9 a.m. until 11 p.m.; and Sunday from 1 to 6 p.m. The pool will be open the usual hours, 1 to 8:15 p.m. The swim team has a meet there 9 a.m. to noon Saturday. For the teens, there will be a Saturday evening splash party from 8:30 to 10:30.

Baseball fans can see a Little League game, Lions vs. Orioles, at MacDonald Field Friday, 6 p.m. The softball fan can watch youth slow-pitch action, as there are games at Braden Field Friday, 6 to 11 p.m. The Firecracker Softball Tournament, for men's A and B leagues, is played Saturday, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Sunday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., at Braden Field No 2 and Northway Field No. 1.

The tennis courts at Braden Field and Lakecrest will be available for use Saturday and Sunday, 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. Please sign in at registration board.

### **Voter Registration**

To register to vote residents of Prince Georges County may: (1) call the Hotline - 627-2814 - to receive a registration form by mail. The form will be sent within five days. When the form has been filled in and mailed back to the election office, the resident is registered. (2) Pick up a mail registration application at any Prince Georges County Library or municipal office. Again, when filled out and returned to the election office, the resident is registered. (3) Go personally to the Board of Supervisors of Elections at 14744 Main Street, Upper Marlboro, Maryland (across the street from the Courthouse) any weekday 8:30 a.m. to 9 p.m.

August 16 is the last day to register before the primary election. It is too late to change party affiliation!

Persons who have a change of address should notify the Board of Elections within 30 days. This request must be written and signed by the voter.

Absentee ballots can be obtained by writing or calling the Board of Elections at least 45 days before an election. Requests should begin with resident's name and address as it appears on the voter registration record, reason for requesting the absentee ballot and the address where resident would like ballot sent. A request for an absentee ballot can be accepted by the election office up to 7 days before an election. The voted ballot must be received in the Election Office not later than 8 p.m. on election day.

August 15 is the deadline for certification of candidates to local boards by State Board of Elections.

The Franklin D. Roosevelt Committee, established by the Greenbelt City Council to explore ways of commemorating FDR's 100th birthday, is planning to compile a set of recollections such as Couchoud's of both the Roosevelt era and the early days of Greenbelt. Presentation of these recollections to the Tugwell Room of the Greenbelt Library will be one of the special activities of the week of September 29 - October 3. These dates were selected for celebrating both FDR's birthday and the 45th anniversary of the day the first families moved into the city.

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"In order to get to Greenbelt, which then was a beautiful wilderness," Couchoud continued, "I took a train from Union Station to Beltsville, where a truck met us (the workers) and took us to Greenbelt.

"I remember working on the Center, also the houses surrounding it. I remember how the Lake was made. Trees were cut down and the stumps were removed by picks and shovels. It was formed into a bowl shape and dammed up on one end. It took a long

time for the little stream that ran through it to fill the lake."

In other fiscal matters the council approved the Green Ridge House budget, passed a resolution amending the compensation plan classified city employees for which provides for an average 7% across-the-board pay increase and approved a transfer of funds among city departments to provide operating funds through the end of June. The council deferred a decision on the appointment of an auditing firm to examine the city financial records until council members have time to study the bids of the four firms competing for the contract.

Conditional on acceptance of a certain storm drainage line by WSSC, the council approved acceptance of certain roads and other construction in the Greenbriar subdivision.

#### Gypsy Moths

The council approved a motion to set up a pilot project to monitor the population of gyspy moths in Greenbelt. The proposal provides for coordination of efforts by employees of GHI, the city public works crew and Greenbelt resident Ralph Webb, an employee of the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center, to put out gypsy moth traps at strategic locations. These traps would not be intended to decrease the population of moths to any significant degree but to allow the infestation to be assessed.

The council also selected projects for which MNCPPC plan-ning assistance is to be solicited. In first priority is a more comprehensive traffic analysis of Greenbelt Road, taking into consideration all present and future developments. The other two projects were the bikeway study and training for APB members and other municipal officials in planning procedures.

The council was also informed that a change in ownership had occurred in Greenway Liquors in the Greenway Shopping Center. The name added the name of Winfield Kelly Jr. to the three other names previously listed as the owners. In accordance with its usual practice, the council took no mosition on the change.

## Special Holiday Schedules Set for Metrorail, Bus

Metrobus and Metrorail service will be on special schedules for the July 4 activities on the Mall and the federal holiday on Monday, July 5.

Trains will operate on Saturday schedules, from 8 a.m. to midnight, with rush hour frequencies between trains beginning at 6 p.m. Fares will be 50 cents in cash, collected in barrels, for trips of any distance.

Station attendants, transit police and special Metro volunteer helpers will not make change. Flash Pass No. 1, valid from June 26 through July 10 and marked with orange ink, may be used to pay the fare. An adult who pays the 50-cent fare may escort two children four or younger for free. There will be no free rides after the fireworks. Because Metrobuses will oper-

ate on Sunday schedules Greenbelt will have no bus service on July 4 and 5.

Parking at all Transit Authority-operated lots will be free all weekend. On July 4, parking at the Silver Spring garage operated by Montgomery County will be free. The Stadium Armory lot operated by the D.C. government will be closed, and the Pentagon City lot operated by Atlantic Garage open and charging \$1.25 per car all day.

In case of rain, if the fireworks display is cancelled on July 4 and moved to July 5, the Transit Authority will adjust schedules to provide the same levels of service as planned for July 4.
