Community Awareness Expo: A Greenbelt Jaycees Project

Eleven public service organizations were part of the small but informative Community Awareness Expo 1982 on October 28 - 30 at the Beltway Plaza in Greenbelt. The Expo was sponsored by the Greenbelt Jaycees to introduce service groups to the local community.

"We hope to do it every six months, once in the spring and again in the fall," Jerald I. Garfinkel, president of the Greenbelt Jaycees, said. The Jaycees invited over 40 groups to participate, but less than 20 expressed a desire to attend.

According to Garfinkel, several of the attending organizations were grateful for the chance to be a part of the Expo. "We wanted any organization that worked within the public to come," he said. "We got the (groups') names from a directory in the library."

Some groups, such as the Mental Health Association of Prince George's County, Inc., in River dale, focused on educating the public. Their booth had information on the organization and its Prince George's County Hotline.

"It's a source of information of services for the people in the community experiencing difficulties," Susan Carter, P.G. Hotline volunteer, explained.

The display also emphasized stress. "It's a really big and common problem," Carter said, "because of the changes in today's society." The Association has many resources, including speakers and the P.G. Hotline, to help people cope with stress, she added.

Three groups, Metro Home Safety from Alexandria, Va., Prince George's County REACT, Inc., of College Park, and Na-tional Capital Poison Center of Washington, D.C., had informa-tion on how to help people in emergencies.

The Metro Home Safety's booth had a survey testing fire knowledge as well as numerous booklets on fire safety. They also were publicizing that group members "can come to your home and tell you how to get out and what to do in case of a fire," Pearleana Morris, fire safety consultant, said.

Volunteers working mostly from their homes help provide REACT, Inc.'s emergency radio service. Bob Kinser, a REACT board of directors member, said the group monitors the citizens band radio channel nine. "We take the calls and then contact the appropriate authorities."

Other groups, such as the Parents Without Partners Nomad

Unapter and the Prince George's County Council of Big Brothers, offered information on their support groups in addition to looking for new members.

Commenting on the public's response, Jay Arnold, vice pres-ident of the Prince George's Big Brothers, said, not too meny people came to the booth. "We've found it more productive to approach some people."

The public did stop by the Dis-abled American Veterans booth. "We were able to help several men who didn't even know they were eligible for aid," Lewis Fowler, commander of the DAV's 23rd chapter in Greenbelt and Hyattsville, said.

The American Smoke Out and many patient services were highlighted at the American Cancer Society Prince George's County Chapter's booth. They also had information on a new service, a Make Today Count group. "It's a support group for cancer patients and whoever is important to them," Andrea Hay, a Society volunteer said.

Also attending the Expo were the United Way, The Washington Area Intergroup Association of Alcoholics Anonymous and the Second Mile House. The Second Mile House, a United Way agency in Hyattsville, offers help to runaways.

Education Week

Teachers, students and staff will showcase the Prince Georges County Public Schools through a wide variety of activities next week as the school system celebrates American Education Week (November 14-20) in the classrooms and in local shopping centers.

The celebration will begin with an education extravaganza to be held at Iverson Mall on Friday, November 12, from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. and on Saturday, November 13. from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Miniclasses, student art demonstra-tions, hearing and vision screenings and 20 displays focusing on the instructional programs offered by the public school system will be open to the public throughout the two-day fair.

Staff from the school system's Howard B. Owens Science Center will produce popular "Magic on the Mall" program every hour on the half hour.

Harvey Geller: **6 Medal Winner**

Harvey Geller, long time resident of Greenbelt, won six medals in the Maryland Senior Olympics, held at Towson State University on October 16. He competed in the 60 to 64-year age group in this annual affair sponsored by the State of Mary-land and Blue Cross. Geller demonstrated his versatility by collecting medals in bicycling, running, swimming, race walking,

and jumping. He started the day by winning both the half mile and one mile bicycle races, posting the fastest times for all age groups in both of these races. With just enough time to change from cycling shoes to running shoes, he ran and placed third in the one-mile running race.

He then had to take a bus to the swimming pool where the next event was to take place. After changing into swimming trunks, he stayed long enough to win the 50-yard breast stroke race. A quick shower and a change back to running clothes preceded another bus ride back to the stadium and the track, where he arrived in time to place third in the standing broad jump.

In his sixth and final event of the day, the one and a half mile race walk, Geller won with a winning time of 15 minutes 12 seconds. This was not only the fastest time for all competitors in all age groups, but was almost two minutes faster than the previous Maryland Senior Olympics record for this event.

While there are no records kept on the number of medals won by individuals, the four gold and two bronze medals that Geller was awarded is believed to be one of the outstanding achievements in the three-year history of this event.

About a dozen people gathered in the Greenbelt Library on October 19 to determine if and how a Greenbelt Museum could be formed. A committee was originally organized by Greenbelt Homes, Inc. to determine the feasibility of preserving an original home unit in light of the changes rehabilitation was bringing. The GHI committee, chaired by Ray McCawley, felt that the museum should be a city-wide venture, not just one involving the housing coopera-tive. Thus, who would run it, how to start it, where it would be located, how would it be financed, and a lot of other questions, were discussed.

The group included a number of residents in addition to a few representing groups such as the American Legion and the Greenbelt Historical Society, and two original residents who live outside of Greenbelt now, but treasure their roots. Richard Stevenson, director of parks and recreation for the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission, and a former Greenbelter as well as former city director of recreation, also attended. Stevenson has much experience in setting up museums for the

The group felt that such an organization, under the auspices of the city, would provide a sense of continuity as well as services from year to year.

From this nucleus of an organization, other activities such as fundraising would emanate. The group further recommended that North End School be the temporary location for the museum pending future purchase (or possible donation) of a GHI house for the permanent site.

McCawley appeared before council to present the group's request on Nov. 8.







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Federal Program to Aid In Heating Bill Payments

Through the Home Energy Assistance Program, income eligible homeowners and renters may receive financial aid in paying their bills. This aid is applied only to the primary heat source. It is available to renters even if their heating bill is included in their rent.

Jaycees Seek Volunteers Chanteys, Ballads, Harmony For Big Brothers Program

The Greenbelt Jaycees have initated, with the cooperation of the Big Brothers Organization, a multi-action community service project to assist the Big Brothers Organization in providing service to more boys from father-absent homes in the local area. Part of the Jaycees' action plan is to involve more eligible men in the program as Big Brother volunteers so that more potential and currently unmatched Little Brothers can be afforded the benefits of the Big Brothers program. In addition, the Jaycees are planning and sponsoring a series of group activities for the matched and unmatched Little Brothers in the Greenbelt area as a supplement to the Big Brothers program.

The Big Brothers Organization is a nationwide movement established over 75 years ago. The program is based on the premise that a boy, in order to reach his full potential as an adult, needs the positive influence of a mature, responsible and responsive male adult (in addition to maternal love and guidance) during his formative years. Where that influence is inadequate because of parental limitations or absence, the boy may be deterred in reaching his full potential as a responsible, contributing adult. The Big Brothers service is designed to meet the needs of such boys through the provision, in one-to-one supportive relation-ships, of professionally selected, screened and matched Big Brother volunteers. The relationship between the matched youth and the Big Brother serves to enhance the quality of the boy's life and provide a method for the boy to reach his potential.

Weatherization Program

The Prince Georges County Office of Emergency Preparedness is operating a weatheriza-tion program, which is specifically designed to help low income households, especially the elderly and handicapped, offset the bur-den of high energy costs. Assistance is available for weatherization activities such as new storm doors and windows, caulking, insulation, etc. Priority is given to those households which are headed by senior citizens. 

Officer Pleads Guilty To Misconduct Charge

John C. Krob, 17-year veteran of the Greenbelt Police Department, pled guilty on Oct. 29 to a charge of misconduct in office. Krob was indicted by the grand jury last July for selling eight firearms which had been confiscated by the police and converting proceeds from the sales to his personal use.



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

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
