CFG Game Winners Receive Special Tour of BARC Land and Buildings

The Beltsville Agricultural Research Center has about 20,000 visitors a year from around the world. But, on Saturday, Oct. 1, the winners of the Citizens For Greenbelt adopt an acre game at the Labor Day Festival received a special personalized tour of the center by its director, Dr. Paul A. Putnam.

According to CFG President Steve Curtis, the CFG, a community activist group concerned with local zoning, would like to keep "some degree of separation" between Greenbelt and other urban sprawl areas, in order to maintain the quality of life in Greenbelt.

The group sponsored the adopt an acre tour game to "convey to people the idea that, as taxpayers, they do own a part of the land," and they have a say in how it is used, Curtis said.

The agricultural center is one of the last large open areas around Greenbelt.

The tour started at the visitor's center where each member of the tour received an information folder complete with maps, publications by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Smithsonian Institute, and even a BARC pennant.

After a few words of history about the center, which opened in 1910, the group boarded a BARC bus and made their way toward the Main Administration Building on Rte. 1. Passing those ever-present plots of vegetation along Kenilworth Ave., Dr. Putnam pointed out that these are part of the center's work with the Goddard Space Flight Center (NASA).

He said that being close to other governmental installations is an advantage because they can share in research. For example, NASA does satellite monitoring of crops.

Near the National Agricultural Library, across from the administration building, Dr. Putnam pointed out an area of land, between Route 1 and Rhode Island Ave., that has been declared surplus land. This area is "probably the most valuable piece of land" in the approximately 7000 BARC acres.

At the main headquarters, Dr. Putnam showed a display of the aerosol bomb, the Beltsville turkey, and the russet potato, all of which were developed at the Beltsville center. The aerosol bomb protected soldiers against mosquitos. The Beltsville turkey introduced in 1945 and still being bred, was developed for tenderness and plentiful white meat. Dr. Putnam said the center often cooperates with states, other governmenal bodies and industry.

Down the corridors, past scientific instruments and shelves of magazines and books, the group watched two scientific machines in action. The first, an electronic analyzer which Beltsville scientists began developing in 1968, provides a rapid prediction of grain and oilseed compositions. The second predicts the fat content of living animals. Some

members of the group tested the fat content of their own bodies.

Also in the administration building is a "growth room." In this room, part of the fruit laboratory, tissue cultures from fruit trees grow in rack upon rack of petri dishes and test tubes.

This process allows scientists to grow thousands of identical trees that are virus free. It is much faster and more efficient than the ancient method of grafting.

Most of the research here is on dwarf fruit trees which will probably become the orchards of the future, because they produce as much fruit per acre and are easier for the farmers to tend as regular trees. The researchers make these production increasing discoveries and "industry is coming in right behind them" to make them work, Dr. Putnam said.

We made our way to an office where Dr. Putnam showed the group the BARC master plan, which has been approved by the MNCPPC. On a multi-colored map, he explained what each area of the Center is used for. He also pointed out which lands have been released to Goddard, the Patuxent Wildlife Refuge and other federal bodies.

From the administration building, the tour bus drove past the dwarf fruit tree orchards before stopping at the greenhouse complex. Here scientists do research on ornamental plants. The research helps American industry and can be generalized to other areas to increase food production.

After seeing parasitology area where scientists search for antibodies to fight parasites and diseases, the tour went through the heart of the center, stopping here and there, until it arrived at the entomology labs. Here Suzanne Batra, a CFG member and BARC employee, explained a trailer full of exhibits about bees.

On the road back to the visitor's center, Dr. Putnam said, "Agricultural research is really research about the world around us. We were blessed to be born in an environment with such abundant supply," he said.

In the future, he added, people will comment on the "good foresight that these people had" to maintain the Beltsville-Greenbelt area as it its. "I'm glad you adopted an acre of Beltsville," he

Greenhorne & O'Mara Showcase Capabilities at Gala Open House

The architectural and engineering firm of Greenhorne & O'Mara, Inc. rolled out the ceremonial red carpet on September 15 for an Open House at the firm's new corporate headquarters in Greenbelt. About 600 guests, including city, county and state officials and the company's clients and employees, were given guided tours of the 80,000 square-foot building. They also enjoyed a lavish buffet served in a gigantic white tent, which was pitched on the three-acre tract at 9001 Greenbelt Road.

Founded in 1950 by A. James O'Mara and Marcus F. H. Greenhorne the firm has grown steadily through the years. At the time of incorporation in 1965, the company employed 80 people. Today there are 450 persons in the firm's full service branch and field offices. In addition to three offices in Maryland, Greenhorne & O'Mara is located in Colorado, Michigan, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Virginia. Prior to the opening of the new building, the company's headquarters was located in Riverdale.

Greenhore & O'Mara has been involved in prominent area projects such as the Capital Center, New Carrollton Metro and the Prince Georges County Administration Building. The firm has developed studies for the city of Greenbelt and for private development projects located within the city limits.

Projects currently underway in

Greenbelt include:

(1) Greenbelt Metro. The company has a contract with the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority to provide the civil engineering, design and site work for the Greenbelt Metro Station on the Springhill Lake Industrial tract. Design work by the firm's structural engineering team has also begun on the Beltway Metro exit and entrance ramps. A parking facility for 3,000 cars is on the drawing boards. It is expected that an interim parking facility will be used for B & O commuters. A B & O station will also be constructed on the Industrial tract.

(2) Indian Creek. In conjunction with the Metro project flood plain and hydrology studies will be undertaken by Greenhorne & O'Mara's Water Resources Section. A system will be designed by computer for the Indian Creek-Paint Branch area.


CHARTER AMENDMENT RESOLUTION NUMBER 1983-1

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT, ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE 11E OF THE CONSTITUTION OF MARYLAND AND SECTION 13 OF AR-TICLE 23A OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND, SUBTITLE "HOME RULE", to AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF GREENBELT FOUND, IN WHOLE OR IN PART, IN THE COMPILATION OF MUNICIPAL CHARTERS OF MARYLAND (1983), AS PREPARED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 77 OF THE ACTS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARY-LAND OF 1983, BY REPEALING AND REENACTING WITH AMENDMENTS SUBSECTION 9 OF SECTION 3, TITLE "GEN-ERAL POWERS," TO PROVIDE THAT FINES FOR THE VIO-LATION OF ORDINANCES OR REGULATIONS SHALL NOT EXCEED \$500; AND TO PROVIDE THAT A VIOLATION OF AN ORDINANCE OR REGULATION MAY BE DECLARED A MUNICIPAL INFRACTION, A CIVIL OFFENSE

The above Charter amendment shall become and be considered a part of the Charter of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, according to the terms of the amendment, in all respects to be effective and observed as such, upon the 22nd day of November, 1983, unless on or before the 12th day of November, 1983 there shall be presented to the Council of the City of Greenbelt, Maryland, or mailed to it by registered mail, a petition for referendum signed by twenty percent or more of the persons qualified to vote in the regular election of the City of Greenbelt, requesting that the above Charter amendment be submitted to referendum to the voters of the City of Greenbelt.

(3) North Springhill Lake-Capital Office Park. The company's land development, surveying and transportation departments have been involved in the project located off Kenilworth Avenue north of the Beltway. 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
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

IT'S THE LAW IN GREENBELT

Sec. 12-2 Loitering—Obstructing passage on sidewalks, streets, etc.

It shall be unlawful for any person to congregate or assemble in any street, avenue, alley, road, highway or mall, or in any foot pavements thereof, or the free entrance into any public or private building or en-

Any person violating this section shall be subject to a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars, and not more than fifty dollars, or up to thirty days in the county jail, or both. (Ord. No. 598.)

To report a violation of this ordinance, place notify the Greenbelt Police Department at 474-7200.

Sec, 11-50 Licensing and regisration of bicycles

All bicycles owned by residents of the city and operated within the city shall be registered and licensed. Applications for such license shall be made with the police department and shall be affixed to the bicycles in a manner prescribed by the chief of police.

OF UPSTAIRS FRAME APARTMENTS

Some members have expressed concern about outside hose bibs not being available for upstairs frame apartments. This was dropped from Phase I of the rehab project as it was considered prohibitively expensive. Because this has caused inconvenience for the members of frame home apartments and since new water mains have now been installed, GHI has reviewed the situation.

As a service to members, GHI Maintenance will install the cut off valves at no charge to the members affected. These valves will be located in the crawl space and will be connected to the water meter of the upstairs frame unit. This program will begin immediately and will take approximately six months to complete.

To have the hose bib turned off in winter and on in the summer members of upstairs frame apartments will need to call the Maintenance Department.


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
