Winfield Kelly Heads Group to Purchase Storer Cable Franchise in P.G. County

Former County Executive Winfield Kelly, Jr. announced on November 21 that he and a group of local investors will purchase franchises held by Storer Communications, Inc. in northern Prince Georges County and Fort Belvoir and Lees-burg, Virginia. The sale is conditioned upon aprovals of the various agencies and jurisdictions within the Storer network, including the City of Greenbelt.

Kelly, vice president of Storer Cable Communications of Prince Georges County, Inc. and Storer Cable Communications of Maryland, Inc. played the major role in obtaining 19 franchises in the northern half of Prince Georges County. Kelly heads the pur-

Storer, a Miami-based telecommunications company, shall, for the present time, continue to build the various systems on schedule and honor its financial and other franchise commit-ments. Most of the company's 20,000 area subscribers are in Prince Georges County. The system is expected ultimately to serve 140,000 households. In Greenbelt about 1,000 homes are hooked into the cable system.

In a press conference in Storer's College Park studio, Todd Spoeri, Storer vice president and general manager of the firm's northeast region, said, "We have known Kelly for many years and as we depart we will be leaving the system in good hands. It is not a question of here today and

gone tomorrow. We intend to continue with construction and meet our commitments. This will require us to work very closely with Kelly."

Kelly said he was delighted to get into the operating end of the cable business. The possibility about buying Storer came up about six months ago, he explained, but "it became a real possibility in the last two or three weeks." He initially invested \$18,000 in the local Storer

Transfer Process

Kelly did not know how long the transfer would take. "There are a lot of contingencies," he explained. Approvals and recommendations of the various jurisdictions, including the county cable commission and a county council resolution and setting up of the limited partnership, as yet unnamed, are two major undertakings. Kelly had contacted county officials as well as mayors prior to the official announcement last Thursday. "We appeared to have a comfortable response," he ob-

Storer is agreeing to sell the systems to the Kelly group at actual cost in order to reduce outstanding debt and curtail capital requirements.

Spoeri said, "We are doing this with mixed emotions . . . Much of the lucrative aspects of cable have not appeared . . . We reached the point where we had to make a business judgment. . . (we are) better advised to invest money elsewhere."

Cable companies have a big capital investment initially. It takes years to show substantial profit. According to experts in the field, the companies, in their eagerness to get franchises, have promised "overly" expensive sys-

A significant drop in earnings has hurt Storer. As an earnings company, Storer must generate net earnings for stockholders and bondholders. Kelly believes that the establishment of a limited partnership to buy Storer's depreciated assets will prove successful. In such an arrangement, he said, investors are looking for tax shelters and depreciation.

If the necessary approvals are obtained, Kelly said his firm will make a public offering of limited group, in addition to Kelly, who will own a controlling interest, will be comprised of current local investors in the Prince Georges County and Virginia franchises. as well as other investors and individuals with technical expertise and experience in operating and financing cable television.

According to Kelly, early discussions with several of the larger banks and investment houses in the Washington, D.C. area have been well received and strong interest in the project has been indicated.

After reviewing the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission's draft Traffic Study for Greenbelt Road, the Greenbelt City Council has sent a letter to the M-NCPPC identifying council's concerns and asking for more detail. The letter, dated November 18 and signed by

The traffic study, which was prepared earlier this year (See News Review Nov. 3) under the M-NCPPC Planning Assistance to Municipalities program, examines present traffic loads on Greenbelt Road and the proposed development in the area, and projects future traffic levels. The study also proposed solutions to

First the study did not include in its calculations development outside of Greenbelt which would increase the amount of traffic on Greenbelt Road.

Council also pointed out that the study did not take into account the traffic consequences of certain potential developments, including the recently rezoned tract in Capital Office Park, (its immediate and significant effect would be on the Kenilworth Avenue-Ivy Lane intersection) the 10-acre Bresler-Lerner tract south of Parcel 2 and some of the undeveloped land along Hanover Parkway south of Hunting Ridge Apartments. Council questioned the study's assumptions that the Smith-Ewing tract would be downzoned from highrise to townhouses and the Tidler tract would be developed in the Rural-Residential zone. A preliminary plan for highrise has been submitted for the former. The current Master Plan indicates higher density development for the

more details on how the proposed "T" intersection at the Parkway would work.

Beth Kessler

Beth Kessler of 2-D Woodland Way died of cancer on Sunday, November 27 at the Washington Home Hospice after an illness of many years. She was born in Brooklyn in New York City, and with her husband, Dr. Bernard V. Kessler, a physicist at the Naval Surface Weapons Center, moved to the Washington area in 1959 and later to Greenbelt in 1964.

She had many talents, which she shared with both her family and friends. Her first interest had been in home economics and chemistry, and she received a B.A. from Hunter College with a major in each. This was followed by further study in textiles at the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York. When World War II came this training was put to good use as she worked in an army laboratory with textile flammability and strength.

Like many others caught up first in the Depression and then in World-War II, she had become convinced that education was important, and she turned to teaching. She taught in both elementary and high schools in the New York City system, at the same time taking courses in education at New York University to get a Master of Arts degree.

The Kesslers were married in 1957 and had two daughters, Ellen and Susan, When the youngest, Susan, was in kindergarten Beth returned to teaching in 1966, first in fourth grade, then fifth, and finally sixth. She was a very able teacher, interested in her profession and its problems.

This meant that she was active in the Prince Georges County Teachers Association, and year after year she was the Center School delegate to the Association, attending meetings frequently. At these she was not one of the silent representatives who corrected papers during the meetings, but fre quently spoke on issues. That she was an able speaker with a constructive viewpoint was obvious: when Beth, tiny though she was, got to the microphone there would be a silence because the other delegates knew something with some substance would be said. She represented the Prince Georges association at meetings of the Maryland Association and was a delegate more than once to the national convention. She was always interested in not only teacher working conditions but in matters pertaining to the professional activities of teachers.

In her own classroom Mrs. Kessler expected her pupils to learn. In her classes students found much emphasis on basics

Harry E. Beck, a two-year resident of Greenbelt, died at home on Saturday, November 26, after being ill for several months. He was buried with full military honors at Washington National Cemetery on November 29. Mr. Beck attended St. Hugh's Church and was a member of American Legion Post 136 of Greenbelt.

He was born in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, where most of his family died during the 1918 flu epidemic. He served in the Army during World War II. After the war, he moved to Washington and worked as a painter and paperhanger for the Jaffe Company until his retirement.

Mr. Beck is survived by his wife, Nilza N. Beck, his stepdaughter Jean Pumphrey and his granddaughter, Christine Pumphrey. His first wife, Mary, died in 1979. He had numerous friends on Plateau Place and will be remembered as "Uncle Harry" by many children in the area

Her family was of course a source of great pride and pleasure to her. She encouraged her daughters to use all their talents, to try to aim high, and to work for excellence in all things. to the door and refused to show you his city permit?" (All solicitors have to have a city permit which can be obtained without charge for charitable activities, Sappington said.)

Many of the answers Sappington got from the audience implied an unwillingness to "bother" the police with a report about something which might turn out to be an innocent activity. Over and over, Sappington emphasized that the police don't mind being "bothered." He pointed out that checking out such a report takes only a few minutes of one officer's time but processing a crime scene may take several officers 3-4 hours.

In reply to a question, Sappington emphasized that for the present Greenbelt residents will get much faster service in emergency situations by calling the Greenbelt police department emergency number (474-5454) than they will if they call the much-publicized 911 number. The 911 number goes to the Prince Georges County police and it will take time for the message to be relayed to the Greenbelt department. The Greenbelt emergency line will bring a response immediately, often in less than one minute. "What is an emergency?" "If you hear someone breaking into your house or your neighbor's house. Or if you come home and see the door open or other signs that someone has been in the house. If you hear a scream and don't see any obvious ex-planation for it," answered the police officer, citing these as examples. He emphasized that no one should enter a house they think has been broken into-the criminal could still be there. He advised that the resident should hurry to a neighbor's home and call the police-on the emergency number. Non-emergency calls

Other examples of suspicious activity cited by Sappington included business transactions being made from a vehicle and any residence where lots of people knock on the door, enter for a few minutes and then leave. Such activities may be indicative of drug dealing, he said.

Dorothy Pyles, a member of the Crime Prevention Committee and Director of the Greenbrian Phase III Mobile Crime Watch, described how the crime watch works and how communications are maintained. While the Phase III operation is a full-scale mobile crime watch Pyles emphasized that a static crime watch is also very important. She urged all citizens to form a habit of jotting down unusual occurrences as they see them-license numbers and descriptions with dates and times. Such observations may be useful to the police.

At the end of the evening, Sappington called for volunteers to spearhead a Lakewood crime

The Greenbelt City Council merits commendation for its asking the Transportation Planning Division of the Maryland-Na-tional Capital Park and Planning Commission to expand its recent traffic study. Once more Council proves that it will act wisely, decisively and rapidly on an important matter.

Greenbelters should understand the vital significance of the study. The traffic consequences of developments in process and others contemplated must be factored into planning and zoning decisions. The immediate result of a failure to assess them accurately could be a gigantic parking lot for several hours each day to the east of the Parkway. Similiar dire consequences could follow elsewhere in the city as development continues. It is council's view that it must have the conclusions of a study roughly equal in scope to what has already been done so that it may comment knowledgeably on planning and other developmental plans as they are presented to the Prince Georges County Planning Board and County Council.

If the potential value of the study proposed by City Council were limited to its value to the city, the need for it would be appreciably less than is the case. It is really the Planning Board and County Council for whom the expanded study would have the greatest value. The former should urge the Transportation Planning Division to honor the city's request.

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



The City Council of Greenbelt, Maryland will conduct a Public Hearing as part of its regular meeting to receive citizens comments on a proposal to join with the Art Deco Society of Washington in co-sponsoring an application to the Prince George's County Historic Preservation Commission to have Greenbelt Center School designated as a county historic site, to be added to the county's Historic Sites and Districts Plan.

The draft proposal indicates that the building is historically significant for its Art Deco architecture, and its planning as the educational and community center of the original Greenbelt planned community.
