City Taxpayers to Get Break On County Property Tax Bills

Responding to the leadership of County Executive Parris Glendening, County Council on November 29 passed a bill to set up procedures to reduce the county real property tax rate in municipalities to reflect the cost of services not provided to municipal residents by the county.

It has long been the contention of city officials that their residents have been victims of double taxation - once by municipalities for services they provide and once by the county for the same services that the county does not provide within those municipalities. City officials in Prince Georges County, particularly those of Greenbelt, have over the years led the fight to remedy the problem. Their effort culminated in state legislation to require counties, in setting their real property tax rates, to consider services they were not providing because municipalities were already doing so.

Glendening and his representatives worked with a small group of municipal officials, headed by Greenbelt City Manager James K. Giese, to work out the complex formulas and guidelines to satisfy the spirit of the state legislation. Throughout the process Glendening provided political leadership, while Giese handled the technical aspects of the complicated package.

Municipal residents will enjoy reduced county real property tax rates as a result of the County Council action. When the new policy is in full effect in fiscal year 1986, the reduction in the county rate for Greenbelt residents will be an estimated 64 cents, less the current county tax differential of 10 cents, or an estimated net reduction of 54 cents. Annual savings for all residents will be an estimated \$908,000. These figures represent current estimates of costs of services that the City of Greenbelt will perform (and its residents pay for in city taxes) that otherwise the county would perform.

Laurel stands to gain the most -at least in the first year of full implementation of the new legislation. Its residents' estimated savings in fiscal year 1986 will be \$1,236,000 based on a net property tax rate of 73 cents. Greenbelt is second to Laurel. The largest net tax rate change will be experienced by Takoma Park residents. Laurel is second, Mount Rainier third and Green belt fourth. For the county's 28 municipalities, savings range downward to an estimated \$2,000 and net rate changes to 7 cents.

What the size of the county rate reduction will be in fiscal 1985 is not known. It will be not less than the equivalent of the current tax differential, i.e., 10 cents. It could be more.

As stated, the gross reduction for Greenbelt residents is expected to be 64 cents in fiscal 1986; the net 54 cents. The difference, or the equivalent of 10 cents on the tax rate, is the amount of the current tax differential rebated to the city by the county. This 10 cents is then used by the city to reduce the real property tax rate it levies.

Beginning in fiscal year 1986, the county will no longer make this payment to the city and the city will have to raise its taxes by an equivalent amount. To put it another way, in fiscal 1986, assuming no other change in county or city tax rates between now and then, the county rate will be reduced for Greenbelters by 64 cents and the city rate increased by 10 cents, for a net reduction of 54 cents in the combined city and county rate.

Guest Editorial

Time for Review

The City Council should act quickly to commission a study of the police department by a qualified organization.

With the retirement of the Chief of Police in the offing, there should be no delay in naming his successor. If possible, that successor should have a hand in prescribing the metes and bounds of the departmental evaluation. In any case, analysis of the department should be begun as soon as reasonably possible.

In the 20 years of Chief William T. Lane's service, the city has grown a great deal, and its character has changed in certain important respects. During that same period, the police force has nearly quadrupled in size. If ever there were a time to take stock and to seek ways to improve police performance in the Greenbelt of today and tomorrow, that time is now, during the transition in departmental leadership.

Twenty years ago, Springhill Lake was still brand new, with the first residents moving in. There was no "East Greenbelt." Beltway Plaza was much smaller than it is now. The Golden Triangle was covered by trees, as was what is now Capital Office Park and much of most of the area now occupied by the Greenway Shopping Center and the Maryland Trade Center Park. The Capital Beltway was being built. Kenilworth Avenue had not been widened and extended beyond Greenbelt Road. A relatively few commercial establishments were to be found along the two-lane Greenbelt Road.

No, this is not a trip along memory lane. Rather, it suggests how the problems and the responsibilities of police work within our city have changed within two decades-and are still changing.

A comprehensive study now will assist the new chief and all members of the department, the city manager, council, and the citizenry in determining where the Greenbelt department is strong, where it needs help, what size force Greenbelt will need when planned development is completed, what future police responsibilities are likely to be added, and what can be done to support and strengthen performance now and in the future.

What is being requested is an in-depth and independent evaluation of the department in the setting in which it must operate. This is owed the citizens of Greenbelt and the present and future members of the department.

Editor's Note: The views expressed by Schwan are endorsed by the editorial board of the News Review. This topic is on the agenda for the next council meeting on December 19.

Do Your Duty To the Editor:

I am enclosing the article from the Diamondback, reporting on the petition brought before the Council by certain citizens of Greenbelt. Altough not completely, word for word, perfect, it is a much bolder brief report of the council hearing than the News Review's report.

I recognize the need for caution when dealing with specifics but it seems to me that the News Review is over-cautious. Unless an instrument such as a local newspaper is willing to face issues and at least report them factually it is of no use to the community.

The need to monitor police forces, to eliminate corruption and brutality, while supporting

Dusko Doder, Washington Post Foreign Service, writes today: "A prominent Soviet official suggested at a news conference today that Andrei Sakharov, the country's foremost civil rights activist and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, was mentally unbalanced."

Bill Rowland, Greenbelt News Review, wrote last week: "Within a matter of days after he gave his court testimony, Blake was ordered by (Chief) Lane to undergo a medical examination, and was subsequently referred to a psychiatrist." Blake is one of our city's finest police officers and one who far outshines those who are "out to get him."

This is one of the most trite of charges and the stink lingers in my nostrils. I have nothing against Blake being evaluated, providing that those who are bringing these matters up, are also willing to be evaluated by the same psychiatrist. Since there always seems to be some question as to who is and who isn't "normal," let's have a group of at least three and take the best two out of three opinions. Seems only fair to me! And let's not omit the other officers whose behavior has been questioned in the past. O.K.? Just to make sure that there is no "discrimination," why not have the whole force evaluated? Since council seems to have such difficulty deciding right from wrong, maybe some professional help is also indicated here. And, if you want, you can throw me in the ring with the rest. My wife has always thought I am a little nuts for thinking that what I write is going to make any difference.

There is one redeeming statement in the article, however, and that is that at least one member of council is finally aware that there is a very sensitive problem in our city. That's most astute of him, especially since complaints have been made rather steadily for the past several years and the council's failure to address these complaints, and to make a few decisions however they regret that the problems will not go away of themselves, surely must know by now that little problems grow into bigger ones if they are not solved at the start. You just can't stick your head in the sand for look at what you leave exposed!





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
