New Survey of BARC Property Will Study Land Needs for Future Research

A review of the land use of the 7,000-acre Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC) begins this month. In a letter to Congressman Steny Hoyer, Ex-Director Joshua ecutive Muss of the Federal Property Review Board announced that the study will be conducted by Sasaki Associates of Watertown, Massachusetts for the Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service (ARS). Sasaki developed the 1979 BARC Master Plan.

In his letter Muss noted that "purpose of the review is very limited. It will analyze what property assets at BARC are needed to accomplish the research program which has been approved in the BARC Six Year Plan. It is our intention that this BARC review serve as a model example of the value in con-sidering land use as a part of the agency program planning processes."

Jesse Jacobs, special assistant to Hoyer, said: "We will watch the process very carefully, as we have in the past. We are con-cerned about the outcome."

Earlier Study

A previous evaluation by a General Services Administration (GSA) survey team in January 1983 had been postponed to June 1983, but it was never carried out. Reasons suggested for the lack of action vary. Opponents of further sales of BARC land believe pressure from Hoyer, U.S. Senators Charles McC. Mathias and Paul Sarbanes, State Senator Leo Green and other state, county and municipal officials, including those from the city of Greenbelt, was a key factor in cancelling the study.

Of particular concern at the time was the proposed sale of 260 acres of BARC land declared unneeded by the Department of Agriculture in October 1982. Although the land was turned over to GSA for disposal, the sale has been put "on hold" until the latest review is completed, according to a spokesperson from the Department of Agriculture.

Bruce Selfon, director of the Federal Property Review Board, said the 1983 GSA evaluation was cancelled so that a broader study could be conducted — one that would be an "in house" study by Sasaki involving BARC scientists

At the time of the GSA evaluation in 1983, GSA said its goal was to determine if BARC land was being properly utilized and if it should be sold to other federal agencies or to state and local governments or be auctioned off to private developers.

Selfon notes that in the upcoming review, scientists would be asked to determine what their programs would encompass in the next six years and which parcels of BARC land would be needed to accomplish their activities. In this way, he noted, the board would get a "snapshot of where they will be in 1985 to

Michael Hobach, confidential assistant to the Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Science and Education, explained that the latest review will broaden the previous study by also including BARC tenants in the processthe Federal Drug Administration, the Secret Service, the Environ-mental Protection Agency, the Treasury Department, etc., but excluding NASA. Hobach added: "We want an update on property utilization - the immediate and long-range needs of BARC scientists and tenants. This is not a "quick run through; we are looking at property in depth."

Disposal of the 260 acres of surp'us land and the creation of recent studies of BARC land are being accomplished under President Reagan's Executive Order 12348 (dated February 25, 1982), which set up the Federal Property Review Board to screen available land for sale. The executive action was taken in the hope that sale proceeds would help reduce the federal deficit.

The reduction in 1979 of 1,050

acres of the then 8,220-acre Beltsville facility resulted from (1) a 1972 executive order under which various parts of BARC were declared "excess" over a period of years, and (2) a GSA survey performed in late 1978. Of the 1,050 acres "excessed" 350 acres were turned over to the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center and 500 to 600 acres to the Goddard Space Flight Center.

A total of 2,200 acres have been stripped from BARC in the past 13 years-most given to other federal agencies, some sold to private interests. One parcel, wholly within the industrial tract on the north side of Sunnyside Avenue, sold for \$50,000 an acre.

In January 1984, the Agricultural Research Service signed a \$27,000 contract with Sasaki Associates for the 90-day study. The firm's report will be sent to ARS to be reviewed by land management personnel at the Department. Both the Federal Property Review Board and Representative Hoyer will be given

In the meantime, the Greenbelt city council on February 6 directed the City Manager to contact the new BARC Director, Dr. Waldemor Klassen, to learn more about the study.

Preliminary reports are also expected soon on the results of an archeological survey of that section of BARC which has been declared surplus. The survey, which has been conducted by the Mid-Atlantic Archeological Research Corporation, a New Jersey firm, has looked for fossils, artifacts and evidence of Indian occupation on the property. According to GSA regulations, the exploration is required to determine any possible historic value of a property before it is put up for sale. Following results of the survey, a determination will be made by GSA on what should be done with the so-called surplus acreage. According to Horbach, results of the archeological survey will be studied together with the upcoming review.

At the meeting on Jan. 12, the board of directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. authorized management to solicit bids for a comprehensive study that will include aerial mapping of the terrain occu-pied by GHI homes. prehensive survey would not be large, the board decided unanimously to do the complete study. With the authorization of the drainage study and the December decision to authorize a program to repair structural damage to masonry homes reportedly caused by inadequate drainage, the board started the remedial programs to repair past water damage and prevent future problems from the same cause.

The board also voted to allow loans made under the Maryland

unit (as most rehab loans do) instead of requiring that present members repay the loans in full at the time of sale. According to General Manager Shekar Narasimhan's summary, this would "put the MHRP borrowers on the same footing in terms of repayment as other GHI members whose rehab was financed by HUD and NCCB," Other concerns of the members who financed under MHRP were to be taken up at a January 19 meet-

Coop Will Maintain Divestiture Schedule

Greenbelt's city council has received a reply to its mid-January letter in which it asked that Greenbelt Cooperative, Inc. (GCI) to extend its time-frame for di-vestiture of its food store and service station operations.

In a January 31 letter to Mayor Gil Weidenfeld and made available to the News Review, Paul O. Mohn, GCI Board Chairman, said, "In response to your request for an extension of the time period, I would like to point out that the board's resolution on divestiture stated that the March 1 deadline was for the submission of a credit-worthy proposal. This does not anticipate that a group would be expected to be in a position to assume operations at that time, but merely to have a basic proposal. In checking with various resources we have been informed that the allotted time is sufficient. To delay further may have deleterious effects on the Cooperative in many aspects, particularly with respect to marketability of the facilities."

New Co-op Gets Name And Financing Plan

Greenbelt Consumers Cooperative is the name selected by the Committee to Preserve Greenbelt's Co-op facilities at its Feb. 3 meeting. This will be the corporate name in which it will take over and control the assets of the local Co-op food store, pharmacy and service station.

The new Co-op expects to take over management and operation of the facilities on April 1.

To finance the purchase, Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative (GCC) plans to raise 20% from Co-op members and 80% from bank loans, probably from the National Consumer Cooperative Bank. GCC is asking for contributions to help with the organizing expenses, \$100 memberships, loans at 6% interest and \$100 Save Our Co-op Certificates selling for \$95, refundable after one year. Details are outlined in their ad appearing elsewhere in this pa-

To Boxwood Citizens:

We are writing to our neighbors in Boxwood Village on a matter of critical importance to all of us - CRIME PREVEN-TION. During the past year, ten homes in Boxwood were either burglarized or broken into and vandalized-better than five percent of the 198 single-family residences in our subdivision. Within the last two weeks, houses on Lastner Lane and Hedgewood Drive were victimized after their front doors were kicked in. At another home on Lastner Lane, it appeared that no one was home last Friday afternoon. However, a female resident was home and noticed that her front door knob was being tampered with from the outside. When the door came open, she was confronted by a 6'4", 230-pound male intruder. Fortunately, he was startled by her presence, ran off and was later detained by the Greenbelt Police for interrogation.

Boxwood Village needs to organize an active mobile Crime Watch program, such as those already in operation in the Greenbriar and Lakewood sections of our city. Thirty residents of Boxwood have attended the Crime Watch training seminars conducted by our city police. However, to date, we have remained indi-vidual "static" watchers, monitoring the comings and goings on of our streets. We will need to coordinate these individualized resources into a concerted mobile Crime Watch.

Toward this end, the Boxwood Civic Association will sponsor a meeting on Tuesday, February 14 at 8 p.m. in the City Council Room at 25 Crescent Road. On this Valentine's Day, won't you partake in an effort to help protect the health and safety of your loved ones? The essentials for a successful mobile Crime Watch will be discussed and volunteers will be solicited for patrol duty. We need the involvement of all neighbors who would be willing to invest a very small portion of their time.

Of great importance is the identification of potential day-time Crime Watchers, since the vast majority of the crimes committed in Boxwood occur during the normal weekday working hours between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

We wish to stress that we are not advocating armed vigilance. but merely seeking to assist our police department by reporting suspicious activities.

Robert A. Hill, 70, a resident of Greenbelt for the past 25 years, died on January 29 of a heart attack while he and his wife, Pauline, were vacationing in Florida.

Mr. Hill was born in Biddeford, Maine, and grew up in Orono, Maine. He graduated with "Highest Distinction" from the University of Maine in 1934 with a B.S. in Mechanical Engineering, and was awarded Departmental Honors, He was also elected to membership in Tau Beta Pi and in Phi Kappa Phi. He then attended MIT on a scholarship and in 1935 received a Masters Degree in Mechanical Engineering. Later he attended GWU Law School for a time.

Mr. Hill came to the Washington area in 1937. He spent the next 36 years with the U.S. Patent Office, first as a Patent Examiner and then as a Patent Classifier specializing in heat exchange mechanisms. He retired

Favorite pastimes for Mr. Hill were travel and reading. He and his wife became avid campers in a house trailer over a number of years. He was a former member of the Board of Directors of Twin Pines Savings and Loan and belonged to Greenbelt's Golden Age Club. He was an active volunteer during his retirement years in various community service projects within Prince Georges County sponsored by the Retired Senior Volunteer Pro-

Survivors include his wife, Pauline M. Hill; three daughters, Marianne T. Hill, Margaret P. Buchler, and Barbara J. Hill; a son, James M. Hill; a sister, Elinor Hinnman; and three grandchildren.

Funeral services were held on February 3 at Gate of Heaven Cemetery Chapel in Silver Spring, Md., followed by interment in the cemetery. The family has asked that donations in lieu of flowers be sent to the American Heart Association of Prince Georges County, 6216 Baltimore Blvd., Riverdale, Md.







In other actions, the board approved the member information section of a revised Rules and Regulations Handbook (to be completed in September), declined to grant a member permission to sell his garage and set the date of the 1984 Annual Membership Meeting for May 16.

The board also took severai actions to support efforts being made in response to the threatened closure of the Co-op food store and service station by Greenbelt Cooperative, Inc. (GCI). The GHI board voted to send a letter to GCI expressing GHI's concern and displeasure at the threatened closures. The board set up an ad hoc committee to work toward forming a new co-op or otherwise assuring the continued existence of a food store in the Center and to support other groups working toward this goal. The board also voted to provide some administrative

support to such effort nd authorized the expenditure of up to \$200 for such support.

GHIDC Business

The board, sitting as board of directors of Greenbelt Homes, Inc. Development Corporation, gave unanimous approval to a management recommendation that GHIDC hire a construction management firm to supervise the structural repair program to be carried out in the masonry homes. In previous phases of rehab, GHIDC was able to act as its own construction manager because it could recruit and retain qualified personnel for the rehab period; as most of these employees are no longer with GHIDC and, according to Narasimhan, it would be almost impossible to recruit qualified personnel for the six-month period of the structural repair program.

The board also voted to negotiate agreements with Capitol Electric, the firm which did the heat conversion, for some reloca-

tion of service-side conduits, provision of extra baseboard heaters

nd air-to-air heat exchangers at the member's option. The need for extra heat in some units was emphasized by a petition from 13 Court of Hillside Rd. in which the signers complained of inadequate heat during the recent severe weather. In response to a query from Director Frank Gervasi. management also noted that the crew which is reinsulating crawl spaces had not been to this court and it was agreed that the crew should get to this court as soon as possible.
