City Points Out Problems With Site Plan and Road Improvement Waiver

Continuing development within and east of the Greenway Center added two more items to the Greenbelt city council agenda at the last regular meeting on May 21. One involved a site plan review for the last, and final. section of Glen Ora townhouse development. The other involved who would pay for the widening and other improvements of Hanover Parkway.

Some difference of opinion appeared about how council should proceed with the site plan approval request. The city's Advisory Planning Board in its official report asked council to withhold approval until the first section of the Glen Ora Gardens development, which has been occupied now for half a year, is brought into conformity with its approved site plan. But the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission staff, on the other hand, claimed that the APB's reasoning is not a valid basis for denial. As reported in agenda comments from the city manager's office, MNCPPC contends that "the site plan review for one area cannot be made contingent on the progress of another area in the same develop-ment."

The property in question is a 6.63-acre parcel between the Smith-Ewing tract on the west (the undeveloped forested section across Hanover Parkway from the Greenway Center) and the Tidler tract on the east. Section 5 lies directly south of Ora Glen Drive, which parallels Greenbelt Rd. to the south.

The site plan calls for 63 townhouse units, (9.5 units per acre), a tot lot, a pre-teen lot, and a multi-purpose court. According to the APB's report, the "proposed parking and green space exceed County Code requirements." But the city staff reports that the site plan gives a crowded appearance-primarily because all recreational areas are placed at the outside edges of the property.

Trash Removal

The city staff, as well as council, were equally concerned about the failure to plan for adequate trash removal. As mayor Gil Weidenfeld commented, only the GHI property in Greenbelt (the original planned community built by the federal government in 1937) had really included careful thought to removal of trash. (Each GHI home has a trash closet near the rear door of the residence, in closest proximity to access from residential parking lots.)

At Glen Ora Gardens, city manager Jim Giese noted, no paved walkways are provided to the rear of the property to be used by trash collectors, nor is space provided for dumpster type container units. He suggested, and council unanimously agreed, that council recommend approval of the site plan to the MNCPPC with the stipulation that level graded areas three feet wide be provided adjacent to all rear lot lines to hold trash receptacles.

On the other issue raised by the APB-the inadequate completion of the site plan approved for the first section of Glen Ora Gardens - Giese recommended, with council approval, that the city express to both the MNCPPC and the developer, U.S. Homes, its concern and displeasure with the failure to complete the work The APB report particularly called attention to uncompleted interior walkways to connect with walkways in adjacent Windsor Green, incompleted roadways to parking areas, substandard curbs and other concrete work, and incompleted grading and landscaping that had led to erosion and the creation of gullies.

Hanover Parkway Responsibility W. F. Chesley, a dentist who is building the row of professional office buildings known as Greenway East, appeared at the coun See COUNCIL, page 3, col. 1

In the audience were many family members and a who's who of colleagues, campaign workers and citizens of the county.

Impact on Roads Serious Problem With Maryland Trade Center III

"Council needs to be very tough," said Greenbelt may-or Gil Weidenfeld at the May 21 regular city council meeting. He was talking about roads, or the lack of them, to support projected new commercial development in the city. Specifically he was responding negatively to approval at this time of a site plan proposal for a third highrise office building, Maryland Trade Center III, in the tract lying between the Greenway Center and the Beltway. The proposal was presented to council by attorney Russell Shipley.

With the Maryland Trade Center II building already topped out and the projected Martins East catering facility scheduled for groundbreaking sometime in August, the prospect of an ad-ditional 19-story office building south of the Greenway Center raised understandable concern. Access to all these facilities would be possible only from the already congested Hanover Parkway. And this is not counting traffic to be generated by a row

of professional offices now rising on Hanover Parkway itself.

Shipley, with the aid of Jack Ferri of Coakley & Williams, Inc., presented several visual aids to show what was being planned. MTC III would be placed approximately east of the Holiday Inn. It would stand in a line south from MTC I. Because the land elevation is about 20 feet lower and the method of construction different than that utilized in MTC I, the new building's roof height would be slightly lower than that of the first build-Ferri explained, even ing,

though it would have three more stories than the 16-floor MTC I. It would also look very different. Instead of a square glass box, MTC III is designed with curving sides with pie-shaped wedges cut out on both the north and south faces. The building would be sited on a large green plaza—what Ferri described as "a nice pod." It would occupy parcels E and F of the Maryland Trade Center Park, totaling 9.21 acres.

Endless Development? To the Editor:

The argument in favor of development cites increased living space requirements to justify urban sprawl. Civilization must stop its consumption of rural lands and instead recycle city space that contains deteriorated buildings. There is already adequate space within developed (but dilapidated) Prince Georges County to provide for urban renewal. Increased tax dollars-to pay for increased crime-from expanded, compact populations is not necessarily the goal of the general citizenry.

As an example of the above in Greenbelt, Prince Georges County and in the state of Maryland, legislation was recently proposed by citizen activists who hoped to return zoning decisionmaking power to the voting constituency. However, the legislators rejected this and have continued to usurp zoning decisions as their proprietary privilege. We citizens are apparently to be satisfied with limiting our desires to the perspective of our legislators and accept passively the relentless development that continues to abound.

An important test of these development concerns will be con-sidered on Monday, June 11, at 7 p.m. when the District Council holds a public hearing on the Washington Gas Light Company's proposal for changing the zoning of rural lands in southern Prince Georges County to allow for development of the Brookefield New Town. This proposal would result in the destruction of some 2000 acres of forest and farm lands, destruction of the purity of the Piscataway and Mattawoman waterways through sedimentation of the water, and contribute to the tragic demise of the beleaguered Chesapeake Bay-but it would produce shortterm economic advantage.

I believe that the citizens of Prince Georges County appreciate and need the green space and farm lands that are still with ... easy access of the current population centers. Each year the county loses too many hundreds of acres to subdivisions, highways, reservoirs, office buildings and other urban uses.

Concerned citizens should consider going to the County Council Chamber in the County Administration Building in Upper Marlboro to provide presence in opposition to this unnecesary development. The Sierra Club and the Chesapeake Bay Foundation intend to present testimony opposing the Brookefield development with the hope of informing the District Council that the citizens of Prince Georges County do not desire endless "development."

cil meeting, represented by attor-ney Russell Shipley. Greenway East has a 700-foot frontage on Hanover Parkway north of Greenway Center Drive. (It is to be distinguished from a similar row south of Greenway Center Drive, which is called Greenbelt East.)

According to Shipley, Chesley bought what was represented as "a finished lot, not raw property" from the original owner, Western Development Corporation. He was thus later stunned by representations from the city of Greenbelt that he was liable for the cost of improving Eanover Parkway adjacent to his property. This would involve adding a third lane in the center and providing curb and gutter for the median strip—"an unexpected expense" Shipley estimated at \$50,-000. Both developers, Shipley said, had understood at the time of acquiring the property that street improvements had alreaJybeen comple. 1.

On the basis that the county government, as confirmed in a letter from Chief Administrative Officer John Wesley White , had made a commitment to construct the road improvements, Shipley requested a waiver by the city of Chesley's responsibility in this regard.

Council, however, did not look on the White letter as an enforceable legal document. In the letter White claimed that the cost of the widening of ilenover Parkway would be covered by additional funds generated by the Greenbelt Tax Incremental Financing District (TIF funds), a fund set aside for the design of Cherrywood Lane and the construction and extension of Hanover Parkway. White recom-mended against "a piecemeal widening of the Parkway," which the city would be requiring if Chesley was obligated to com plete his small section of the road improvement.

There was some dispute among Giese and council about how early Chesley had been informed of his obligation as adjacent property owner but none at all concerning the importance of widening Hanover Parkway. "I feel strongly," Giese said, "that six lanes are needed with the occupancy of this building and Mary

On the basis that Shipley would prepare an agreement with the county clarifying the understanding that the street improvement could be covered under the TIF monies, council expressed itself as willing to waive Chesley's ob-ligation. "Otherwise the owner would have to construct." That was how Mayor Weidenfeld summed up the issue.

The Springhill Lake Civic Association will hold a general membership meeting on Wednesday. June 13 at 7:30 p.m. in the Springhill Lake Community House, 6220 Springhill Drive.

The emphasis of the meeting will be planned highway construction projects in the Greenbelt Road - Kenilworth Avenue area, the BW Parkway, and 495. Commuters who travel daily through the Greenbelt Road-Kenilworth Avenue intersection, and the entrances and exists from SHL, will find this program particularly beneficial. Officials from the State Highway Administration will present an overview of the construction plans for the new interchange, the resulting traffic flow diversions and problems which the residents of the area may face during the two year period of construction.

(Continued from page 1) The city's Advisory Planning Board, which had reported to council previously on the site plan proposal, was particularly concerned about the building's size. According to covenants signed with the city when the property was annexed, a limit of 400,000 square feet of office space was agreed to beyond that already provided in MTC I. Since building II has a gross amount of 172,000 square feet and building III, as designed, has 297,000, the total for the two structures would come to 469,000 square feet.

The developers, on the other hand, contend that only 400,000 square feet of usable office space is provided in the two buildings, when the square footage allocated to mechanical systems and elevators is deleted. (In MTC III, because there will be no basement level, a major portion of the ground floor will be utilized by space for mechanical systems. Six elevators—as opposed to four in MTC I—will also be installed.)

According to a memo, however,

from the city's administrative as-

sistant Michael McLaughlin, the

gross square foot figure—not the net figure for usable office space —is employed by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission to calculate parking requirements and traf-

fic generation figures. And those traffic generation figures were what was most troubling to council. According to the covenants, the scheduling of construction of buildings was to be coordinated with road improvements, "so that there exist at all times," as McLaughlin's report puts it, "adequate public facilities to serve the property." But as the report states, "This has not been done."

In response to a question concerning the time frame for projected construction, Shipley noted that MTC I is now fully occupied and MTC II. 40% leased. The developers would like to break ground for the new building, he said, in the fall, with completion projected by the end of 1985, some 14 to 16 months later.

Council concluded that too many issues needed to be resolved for any action to be taken at the May 18 meeting—in particular ambiguities in the covenants concerning building size and prospects for action on road improvements. To deal with these mat-

(Continued from page one) lic servants." Hoyer followed Spellman as the Fifth District Representative. Spellman suffered a near-fatal cardiac arrest a week before winning her fourth term. She remains semiconscious in a nursing home.

Rep. John Seiberling (Dem., Ohio), chairman of the House subcommittee on public lands and national parks, helped Hoyer guide through the House and especially the Senate his legislation to dedicate the federal parkway to Gladys-the first woman to be honored. In speaking of Gladys, Seiberling compared the natural beauty of the parkway which she loved to 'my beautiful, warm, generous colleague." The key to her success? "No one could say 'no' to Gladys," remarked Seiberling later at the reception.

Gladys's husband Reuben gratefully accepted the spoken tributes to his wife, and the decision to dedicate the Parkway in her honor, a fitting memorial. Perhaps some would remember the "lady who accomplished so much in so short a time," Reuben summed up what others had detailed. Dorothy Lupo, Gladys's sister, sat beside Reuben on the platform.

A series of switches was thrown, the curtains parted to reveal the handsome wooden marker set in stone, bearing the words: "This Parkway is dedicated to Gladys Noon Spellman." The sign faces the northbound lanes of the 25-mile federal stretch of the parkway just above Route 450. A matching marker faces the southbound traffic below Route 175. The Maryland portion of the parkway to the north has already been
