Council Turns Thumbs Down to Maryland Trade Center III Till Roads Improve

Confronted with proposed development of Maryland Trade Center III, the Greenbelt City Council stopped the representatives from developers Coakley and Williams dead in their tracks at a special work session on Monday, June 2. A public hearing on traffic problems in the Greenbelt Road corridor is scheduled for Monday, July 17.

Declaring the roads which include Hanover Parkway, Greenbelt Road and Greenway Center Drive inadequate and the traffic already reaching gargantuan proportions, Mayor Gil Weidenfeld told Terry Coakley, developer, and Russell Shipley, attorney for the developer, that the "city will oppose any future development until all parties get together to expedite traffic improvements. Even without further development," he exclaimed, "traffic is getting worse every day."

The developers had hoped to begin construction of Maryland Trade Center III before this winter, which would place them fourteen to sixteen months away from occupancy.

However, the council members stressed that since no timeframe existed stating when actual road improvements would occur and no funds were committed, they could not support construction. Specific improvements that the city called for, and which were in the covenants agreed to at the time the Maryland Trade Center property was annexed to

the city include:

• Extension of Hanover Parkway to Good Luck Road or Good Luck Road or Good Luck Road via Brae Brook Drive;

 Widening of Hanover Parkway to six lanes between Greenway Center Drive and Greenbelt Road and to a four lane width to Hanover Drive; Adding a lane to Greenbelt Road on the north side between Hanover Parkway and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway.

 Improving the ramps to and from the northbound lane of the Baltimore - Washington Parkway at Greenbelt Road.

Only the last item is actually being funded by the federal government with construction slated to begin some time in the fall.

Although the Coakley and Williams property is part of the county's Tax Increment Financing District, and therefore funds have been collected from the developers for road improvements, the county has yet to make any commitment of funds to the area. The widening of Greenbelt Road is in the county's Capital Improvement Budget, but funds have not been appropriated.

"The county has to move forward to make improvements if the county wants development," declared Weidenfeld. "We don't want to wind up in the same situation as 10-12 years ago when we thought Kenilworth Avenue and Greenbeit Road interchange would be redesigned within 2-3 years."

Building Size Questioned
Council also questioned the
developer on the projected size
of the new building. The covenants stipulated that the second
and third trade center buildings
would not exceed 400,000 square
footage feet and Building III is
proposed to be 297,000, thereby
totaling 469,000 square feet.
Terry Coakley replied that the
figure is arrived at by deleting
from the gross figures those areas

used for mechanical systems and elevators. Therefore, there is only 400,000 square feet of "usable" office space, he said. Council appeared skeptical of this reasoning.

Council members and developers left the meeting with a clear understanding of where each stood. The developers want to go full steam ahead with construction of their building. The city said "fine"-but show us some commitments to alleviate the traffic problems first. In a conciliatory tone, Russell Shipley noted that he understood the concerns of the city council for Greenbelt residents. In turn, the city agreed to work with the developer to pressure the county to produce more than letters saying that help was on the way.

Crossing Gates to Go Up This Summer at Sunnyside

Safety features will be installed this summer at the grade-level crossing on Sunnyside Avenue near Greenbelt, according to a letter from State Highway Administrator Hal Kassoff to State Senator Leo Green. As part of this project, gates will be installed at the crossing to prevent motorists' crossing the track against the warning lights. The crossing was the scene of a fatal accident on March 7 when Greenbelt resident David Craig was killed there. Five accidents have occurred at this crossing since

Kassoff's letter said that the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad would be notified to proceed with construction in the first week of July and that completion of the project is expected before the end of the summer.

Senator Green and Prince Georges County Councilman Richard J. Castaldi are among the elected officials who have been trying to get action on this crossing which is reported to be ranked as the sixth most dangerous of the 990 public crossings in Maryland. In April, Castaldi was instrumental in straightening out 'miscommunication' between the Maryland State Highway Administration and the County Department of Public Works and ransportation which had apparently resulted in a nine-month delay in the installation of the gates after they had been au-

According to Kassoff's letter to Green, all railroad crossings in Prince Georges County will be reviewed this summer by a diagnostic team consisting of representatives of the State Highway Administration, the county government, the various railroads and the Federal Highway Administration.

Change of Command Ceremony Marks Chief Lane's Retirement

At a formal change of command and retirement ceremony on June 29, Greenbelt said "Farewell" to former Police Chief William T. Lane and "Welcome" to his successor, Chief Francis T. Hutson. The ceremony was highlighted by the transfer of the authority of the office, symbolized by the passing of the Greenbelt flag from Chief Lane to Chief Hutson. Greenbelt Mayor Gil Weidenfeld administered the oath of office to Chief Hutson, and Chief Lane pinned his badge on the new chief.

The occasion was designed by its planners to be solemn and inspirational. The ceremony was opened by presentation of the colors by a contingent from the 209th Military Police Company, Ft. George G. Meade, Md. All members of the Greenbelt police department were present in full uniform. The two chiefs reviewed the troops together.

During the retirement ceremony, Chief Lane, who headed the Greenbelt department for 20 years, was praised by speaker after speaker for his crucial role in raising the department to its present level of professionalism. City Manager James K. Giese spoke of Lane's achievements in bringing the department from five members to a professional department of 30 officers, and eight civilian support personnel. Giese also read a long series of statements from public officials and Lane's police colleagues, who praised the chief's professionalism, his dedication to training and high standards of achievement. Giese also expressed his own feelings as "a mixture of pleasure and regret"-regret that 20 years of close association were ending and pleasure that the chief would be enjoying his retirement.

Weidenfeld presented Lane with a plaque and thanked him "on behalf of the citizens of Greenbelt" for his service to the city. City Councilman Thomas White expressed his thanks to the chief and presented him with a letter informing him of a monetary gift from the city on his retirement. City Councilwoman Antoinette Bram presented Lane a 20-year service pin. State Senator Leo Green presented him with a proclamation from the State of Maryland and thanked him and all the officers who "put their lives on the line each day" to protect the citizens.

A plaque containing all the

badges worn by Lane during his 30-year career as a police officer was presented to an obviously touched and delighted recipient by Chief Hutson on behalf of the Greenbelt department. Included were replicas of the first badges Lane wore in the Takoma Park force, where he started his career. These badges, which had to be especially made, were correct down to the number of the badge.

Chief Lane responded to these honors by expressing his gratitude and giving credit to the people—"the best people"—who had worked for him over the years.

To further mark the occasion, promotions within the department were announced as follows: Sgt. Kenneth L. Stair and Sgt. James R. Craze to Lieutenant; Cpls. John A. Lann, Michael D. Craddock, Daniel P. O'Neil and Terrence M. McGrath to the rank of Sergeant; Pfc. Thomas R. Justin and Pfc. James D. Love to the rank of Corporal. The newly promoted officers were brought forward to receive their promotion letters from Chief Hutson and their new badges from Chief Lane.

In a surprise announcement, Office Assistant Cindy McKnew was named the Outstanding Police Department Employee of 1984. Like the officers, she received a certificate from Chief






