# Chi-Chi's, Mexican Restaurant, Is Planned for Beltway Plaza

Chi-Chi's, a Tex-Mex restaurant that caters to families on Sunday, Muchachos Day, children eat for 99c - will be the next major addition to Sidney Brown's Beltway Pla-The last barrier, approval of a BLX liquor license on July 26, is no longer expected to be a problem as the City of Greenbelt on July 9 voted to "take no position" on the license. While the city council does not favor equor licences, traditionally they have not opposed them either.

The coming of Chi-Chi's to Greenbelt, another in a string of surprises to the city, had a few uncertain weeks as Greenbelt first voted to recommend denial of the license to the Prince Georges liquor board. The board held up granting the license, suggesting to Chi-Chi's that they meet with city officials. At that meeting, on July 9, the council was less than cordial and the hour was worse -the agenda item came up after midnight and dragged through an hour of testiness on the part of some members of council.

Council was not impressed with attorney Linda Carter's efforts to "sell" Chi-Chi's as "nice," "comfortable," and "affordable." Nor did they like hearing that "Greenbelt is a growing community." Only council member Richard Pilski responded favorably to the idea that "Chi-Chi's will be an asset to your commun-Pilski feared Greenbelt could fare far worse if they blocked the restaurant.

The 10,600 sq. ft. building will seat 280 patrons in the restaurant and another 120 in the lounge. The kitchen will require over 30 percent of the total interior floor space, as all food is prepared on site, said Carter. The low background music will be Mexican. A half million dollars will be spent on the interior decor-a requirement for a BLX liquor license. Carter mentioned skylights and lots of plants. The restaurant will employ 200 local people.

# In Free Food Program

On Wednesday and Thursday, August 8 and 9, the City will again participate in the free food program sponsored by Prince Georges County. Cheese, butter, cornmeal, dry milk, honey and flour will be distributed to eligible persons on these two days from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the Council Room of the Municipal Building.

Eligibility requirements are: (1) receipt of food stamps, unemployment compensation, Medicaid, welfare or Supplemental Security Income; or (2) an income that is less than \$7,290 for one person; \$9,810 for two people; \$12,330 for three people; or \$12,330 for four people.

The location of the restaurant lies north of Greenbelt Road and west of Cherrywood Lane. The two entrances planned from Cherrywood Lane brought agonized cries for help from two Springhill Lake residents. Cherrywood Lane, one of only two access roads into the large apartment complex, is choked with traffic during the morning and afternoon rush hours. The Greenbelt Road access lies between two gas stations, Phillips 66 and Exxon. The company, Carter explained, has a 20-year lease with option to renew from Beltway Plaza Developers, but will own the build-

J. Harold Allen, Director of Architectural Services, who had flown in earlier in the day from the company's headquarters in Louisville, Kentucky, showed council the final site plans. Parking is in excess of the county building requirements. Allen agreed to the six concerns expressed by the city's Advisory Planning Board (APB), even to agreeing to the construction of a sidewalk along Greenbelt Road. Currently there is no sidewalk from Kenilworth Avenue to Branchville Road on the north side.) The other items included (1) pedestrian access from Cherrywood Lane, (2) landscaping

along Greenbelt Road and as buffer from the adjacent service stations, (3) any free standing signs placed low, (4) no more than three signs, and (5) access road from Cherrywood Lane lined up across from driveway to Beltway Plaza in front of the A&P. Council tacked on an additional request-only one vehicular access from Cherrywood Lane. Specifically, they deleted a proposed entrance adjacent to the car

#### Council's Concern

Councilman Thomas X. White, who most sharply expressed council's concern about growing traffic problems along Greenbelt Road, said, "My primary reason for (opposing this project) is that development in Beltway Plaza lacks an over-all plan"-a phrase that has been heard each time a new addition has been made to the plaza. (Council will meet with a representative of Beltway Plaza Developers on August 7 to discuss development of the regional shopping center.) White moved to recommend denial of the site plan for the restaurant.

Reminded by the city manager that Chi-Chi's does not need its site plan approved, Mayor Gil Weidenfeld struggled to find a way to separate the issues facing council. He split White's motion into two parts: (1) to show council's displeasure with Beltway Plaza's development process and (2) to ask for acceptance by Chi-Chi's of APB's recommendations. White accepted the changes, withdrawing his original motion. Council agreed with Weidenfeld's approach and then moved ahead on the liquor license vote, 4 to 1, with White voting no.

# **Beltway Plaza Representative** City to Participate Again Seeks Second Traffic Signal

by Virginia Beauchamp A raft of specific actions were taken by the Greenbelt City Council in record time at a continuation meeting on July 17 of agenda items postponed at the regular meeting on July 9 when time and energy ran out. (That meeting had adjourned at 1:30 a.m.) But most of the discussion on July 17 centered around a non-action — a repetition of a dreary history of non-cooperation between the city and the developer of Beltway Plaza. In the end, a date was set for a work session with a Plaza representative. Everyone agreed there was much to discuss.

The Beltway Plaza topic was introduced by Robert W. Ruzza, Vice President for Development. He attended the council session to ask for the city's help in supporting a request to the State Highway Administration for modifications along Greenbelt Rd. in front of the Plaza in conjunction with construction of the new interchange with Kenilworth Ave. In particular, Ruzza expressed concern about the impact of through traffic at the Plaza entrance next to Wendy's fast-food

restaurant. Noting that left turn traffic now backs up almost to Marshall's, he expressed the hope for two left-turn lanes.

Other requests to SHA include two curb cuts along Greenbelt Rd. for two-way traffic into the Plaza, a traffic signal installed in front of the restaurant by Big Boy's Restaurant, and a retaining wall in front of Wendy's where the state is acquiring additional

# Kliman Wins Skolnik Award

Eighteen-year-old Todd Kliman was awarded the Alfred M. Skolnik prize as the most talented journalism student among the Eleanor Roosevelt graduates this June. It was not the first time his talent has been recognized.

Kliman received the first prize award for feature writing from the Maryland Women's Press Association in a statewide high school competition. He was named to fourth place in the Maryland-Delaware-D.C. High School Journalist of the Year competition. He received first place in the Prince Georges Sentinel's annual county journalism contest for both feature and sports writing.

As editor of Eleanor Roosevelt's school newspaper, the Raider, Kliman changed its rather dull format to a more interesting layout. He served as an intern on the Sentinel during the summer and fall of 1983 and was contributing reporter for the Prince Georges Journal during the summer and fall of 1982. He had his first byline when he was 15 years old in the Journal.

Kliman hopes to continue with a career in journalism, either on a newspaper, eventually to be a feature writer, or on a magazine where there would be less pressure. He loves to write and cannot remember when he did not.

He enjoys the idea of working in journalism, preparing material for a deadline and stating ideas simply and honestly.

He is, he thinks, "fortunate to be on the East Coast and in Washington, which is a major world capital" and finds the idea of working in journalism "exciting." Asked whether he thinks there is really a great future in journalism since the number of major newspapers in the United States is dwindling and people seem to be relying for information on the superficial coverage of television, he replied that he is optimistic about the future of the free press. He thinks that television journalism is not really journalism as the art has come to be defined, and that television is too much a "cult of the celebrity" with too little careful analysis of news.

"If you can write well there are many ways to go," he thinks. He does not plan to start college in the fall since he is now an intern for the Washington Weekly, a new tabloid style journal of opinion and news of the national scene. He calls it "a thoughtful journal with articles on politics, art, entertainment, that appeals to the Washington type audience only more newsy." Serving as an intern for a few months will give him time away from an academic atmosphere where he can think about his interests and goals. So far he has done some research, particularly fact-checking, and some copy editing for the publi-

He does intend to go to college, probably to major in journalism at the University of Maryland. In addition to work in journalism he plans to take courses in history, English, and other areas in the humanities. He is not particularly interested in the staples of most young adults his age, mathematics, science, or computers. "I have used a word processor," he said, "but I'm really not terribly interested in other aspects of computers."

Since his father, Ted Kliman, is a painter of considerable stature and his mother is interested in writing, Todd is also interested in art and art history. saying "How could I not be interested with the parents I have?"

Brown eyes, curly brown hair, talented, with a good assessment of his talents and goals, Todd Kliman seems to be a young man on his way to fill a worthy position in the community.

# **Issues of Concern**

Parents protesting the discontinuance of busing to Eleanor Roosevelt High School from the core of Greenbelt, produced some exaggeration mixed with the truth, we think. For instance, we doubt that dead bodies along the route to school will be a common occurrence or that flashers and robbers will accost students along the overpass. There is safety in numbers.

But there are some issues which do concern us and should concern parents and the city as well. What happens if students don't use the overpass? What if students from Lakeside, for example, choose to walk along the traffic-congested Greenbelt Road because they think it is a shorter route to school for them than the overpass? While sidewalks may be in the offing in a year or two, they don't exist now. And what about more students hitching rides? This can be a problem with cars suddenly pulling off to the side of the road. One hopes that high school students would not ride with strangers, but this could be a temptation in bad weather especially. And then there is the problem of additional teenage drivers on the road. And will the parking lot at Roosevelt accommodate the extra cars? Or will the cars spill onto Hanover Parkway?

There are legitimate concerns about whether the distance from Lakeside North and parts of Boxwood fall within the two-mile limit for walking to Eleanor Roosevelt. The school board ought to more thoroughly investigate this issue. We think the activity bus is a good idea - a must, really, during the winter when students will be coming home in the dark.

The city, too, has some responsibility in safeguarding the route - any route - that students will take to walk to school. The police cadet could be employed along the overpass during the hours students would be walking to and from school. School patrols might be formed. Increased lighting and paving might be needed in places. Parents should be firm in insisting that students utilize the overpass. And they may want to organize to discuss how best to provide transportation to those who will want to ride with friends or neighbors who have cars.

The school board enunciated its policy requiring high school students to walk if they live within two miles of the school and the roads are safe. Kids walk to Parkdale and Bowie High School, among others. It is not disastrous for Roosevelt students to walk to their neighborhood school. But, there are some safety issues which need to be addressed.

I was startled to learn from last week's News Review that my principal reason for not objecting to our high school students walking to Eleanor Roosevelt was that their health might be improved. What I did say was that I myself had walked for some months when the school opened, and if I could do it at my age without difficulty or harmful effects I knew these adolescents could.

My principal point was that the decision not to bus students has to do with the budget cuts caused by TRIM. It is ironic that Greenbelt was not in favor of TRIM, but we have to suffer with the rest of the county when services are cut. We all ought to share in the hardships created by TRIM. not only teachers, librarians, police, firemen/county civil servants who must manage with pay that does not keep pace with infl -

I can't understand the 200 people who reportedly signed a petition to bus these students. Why are they not concerned about the increasingly tattered textbooks, and the constantly larger classes instead of the awful suggestion that able-bodied young adults walk two miles to school? (They refer to these as "children" in their speeches and letters I had never observed that the students in front of me during my years as a high school teacher were "children" and faculty generally referred to them as "young adults", unaware that they were six years old and frail.)



right-of-way. The Plaza also seeks a special exception from the county relating to green space requirements because of the loss of green space from the state's taking right-of-way.

Traffic Light

Mention of a request to SHA for a traffic light brought a snort from council member Richard Pilski, who recalled how the Giant food corporation had paid the whole cost for the present light, which gave access to the old Klein's department store, when Sidney Brown refused to pay his share. Ruzza was visibly surprised by this piece of old history, with which he was clearly unfamiliar. Pilski noted that Greenway Plaza developers, in contrast, had paid for two lights. "No way am I going to vote for that light," he said.

Mayor Gil Weidenfeld commented that Ruzza had a difficult situation because of Brown's long-standing practice of refusing to communicate or plan with the city on design changes. He heralded the more cooperative approach that a meeting with Ruzza, and perhaps Brown himself, seemed to suggest.

Council member Toni Bram asked sarcastically, "Where is the green space? What is there besides crab grass?"

One promise from Ruzza brought cheers from all concerned—the Plaza's plan to bolt down benches for bus passengers in front of Marshall's. Ruzza had been negotiating with Metro officials, he said, to try to have the more sheltering booths installed. If that attempt failed, he promised the Plaza would put benches in place. City manager Jim Giese promised the city's help in dealing with Metro.

Ruzza also confirmed to council that a lease has been signed with AMC for an additional movie theater complex—an extension to the mall. He estimated that the new theaters would be ready to

open within a year.

The council-Plaza work session was later scheduled for August 7.

Other Business In other actions council:

—Declared vacant a position on the Advisory Planning Board previously held by Jeff Gallagher; —Accepted the resignation of Stephen Polaschik from the 50th anniversary committee;

—Declared Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday a paid holiday for classified city employees;

Raised the cabaret tax from
 to 4 per cent (Pilski opposed);
 Approved the expenditure of

\$3,169 by the 50th anniversary committee for a booth and sale items at the Labor Day Festival, of which \$2,252 was expected to be reimbursed from sale of these items, such as city flags and commemorative buttons;

—Authorized emergency repairs to the 20-year-old air conditioner that serves the police department.

Council refused to:

—Waive the requirement that APB members file a financial disclosure statement (an issue introduced by Bram as being in conformity with state law, which requires such statements only from boards and commissions empowered to take official actions, not from boards whose functions are only advisory);

—Approve proposed new Board of Liquor License Commissioners' rules for the granting of liquor licenses unless the super license (which would apply to such facilities as the Hilton Hotel and Martin's West) would be exempted;

—Approve a Maryland Municipal League proposal for a classification of cities by size.

Bram brought up a request by a resident that the city lock the Northway ball field gates at night. Impossible during the baseball season, said Giese.

Councilmember Ed Putens brought up the question of a dangerous intersection at Hillside and Research. This is already a three-way stop, said Giese. The problem stems from the sharp cresting of Hillside from the Lakewood development and the partially blocked view because of overhanging bushes. Nearby residents, however, oppose removal of the bushes



### GCC Does Price Survey

by Dorrie Bates
During the week of July 12-18, a price comparison survey was done of four of the local supermarkets: Giant, A&P, Safeway and Co-op. Using information provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, a Greenbelt Consumer Cooperative (GCC) member compiled a market basket of 65 grocery items. The list of items compared included meats, produce, prepared or processed foods, house brands such as Scotch Buy as well as national brands and junk food. Non-edible items, al-

coholic beverages and health products were not included,

neither were generic brands.

The total cost of the 65 items at each of the various stores was as follows: A&P—\$105.56; Giant—\$105.16; Safeway—\$104.90, and Co-op—\$103.58. In addition, the survey showed that the Co-op came in with the lowest price in 21 instances, Safeway in 19 while both Giant and A&P had the lowest price in 13 instances. Asked for his reaction to the survey, GCC Board Chairman Jim Cassels said, "This shows we are competitive in our prices." Copies of the survey are available at the store.




